1 AN ACT Relating to the creation of the Washington head start
2 program; and adding new sections to chapter 43.215 RCW.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

4 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** (1) The legislature finds that:

5 (a) The state is committed to providing early learning services to
6 all eligible economically disadvantaged families;

7 (b) Research has demonstrated that comprehensive services,
8 including family support services designed to meet the early education
9 needs of low-income and at-risk children, are successful in improving
10 school readiness, reducing the risk of juvenile delinquency and
11 incarceration, and reducing reliance on public assistance among these
12 children later in life;

13 (c) The state's early childhood education and assistance program
14 was originally established to serve as the state counterpart to the
15 federal head start program. When it was created, it aligned with the
16 federal program in both standards and funding levels;

17 (d) The state early childhood education and assistance program has
18 served an important role in providing comprehensive services to low-
19 income children. However, since it was first created, per-child

1 funding levels for the state program have not kept pace with funding
2 levels for the federal program. This has resulted in fewer service
3 hours for children and less intensive services for families;

4 (e) Aligning performance standards and funding levels for the state
5 early childhood education and assistance program with federal head
6 start will improve the quality of state-supported early learning
7 programs. Additionally, it will improve school readiness through
8 measures, such as a forty percent increase in class time, and it will
9 achieve administrative efficiencies and make state-supported services
10 more easily recognizable and accessible to parents and families
11 eligible for these programs; and

12 (f) Providing quality early learning services for children from
13 birth to age three is the most cost-effective investment society can
14 make. Additionally, the state can use the demonstrated results from
15 the federal early head start program as an example to expand its reach
16 of services already provided to three and four-year old children to
17 children in the critical birth to three years age category.

18 (2) Therefore, it is the goal of the legislature to establish the
19 Washington head start program, aligning the state early childhood
20 education and assistance program with the federal head start and early
21 head start programs, by the year 2010. There should then be one
22 integrated Washington head start program implemented statewide,
23 supported by both state and federal funds.

24 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2.** (1) The department shall develop a plan to
25 implement a statewide Washington head start program. The program must
26 align the state early childhood education and assistance program with
27 federal head start program eligibility criteria, guidelines, and
28 performance standards. In this plan, the department shall make
29 recommendations that:

30 (a) Identify federal head start program guidelines, performance
31 measures and standards, or other requirements for which state
32 flexibility would be recommended. This shall include an analysis of
33 how state flexibility may impact outcomes for children and how that
34 flexibility might deviate from outcomes associated with the federal
35 standards. Areas to be examined must include, but are not limited to,
36 transportation requirements, service hour configurations, and delivery
37 methods;

1 (b) Identify any change in the state early childhood education and
2 assistance program laws that would be required to implement a
3 Washington head start program;

4 (c) Identify additional resources needed to meet federal guidelines
5 and standards. Areas to be examined must include, but are not limited
6 to: Per-child funding levels, professional development and training
7 needs, facilities needs, and technical assistance;

8 (d) Identify state early childhood education and assistance
9 programs that offer full-day, full-year services to children, and what
10 steps need to be taken to transition these programs into a Washington
11 head start program; and

12 (e) To the extent that state funds are provided for this purpose,
13 identify and report on the implementation of state-supported pilot
14 programs modeled on the federal early head start program.
15 Recommendations must include a timeline, strategy, and funding needs to
16 implement a statewide, state-supported early head start program that
17 will be a part of the Washington head start program.

18 (2) The department shall deliver this report to the governor and
19 legislature by December 1, 2008. In developing its recommendations for
20 this plan, the department shall consult with and solicit input from
21 existing state early childhood education and assistance program
22 providers, including providers who operate solely state-supported
23 programs.

24 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 3.** Sections 1 and 2 of this act are each added
25 to chapter 43.215 RCW.

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
