AN ACT Relating to the children's safe products act; amending RCW 43.70.660; adding a new chapter to Title 70 RCW; creating a new section; and prescribing penalties.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. Research shows that many toys and other children's products contain toxic chemicals, such as lead, cadmium, and 6 phthalates that have been shown to cause harm to children's health and 7 8 the environment. These chemicals have been linked to long-term health impacts, such as birth defects, reproductive harm, impaired learning, 9 10 liver toxicity, and cancer. Because children's bodies are growing and developing, they are especially vulnerable to the effects of toxic 11 chemicals. Regulation of toxic chemicals in children's toys and other 12 products is woefully inadequate. To protect children's health, it is 13 important to phase out the use of lead, cadmium, and phthalates in 14 children's toys and other products and to begin collecting information 15 on other chemicals that are present in toys and other products to 16 17 determine whether further action is required.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. The definitions in this section apply throughout this chapter unless the context clearly requires otherwise. (1) "Children's cosmetics" means cosmetics that are made for, marketed for use by, or marketed to children under the age of twelve. "Children's cosmetics" includes cosmetics that meet any of the following conditions:

7 (a) Represented in its packaging, display, or advertising as
8 appropriate for use by children;

9 (b) Sold in conjunction with, attached to, or packaged together 10 with other products that are packaged, displayed, or advertised as 11 appropriate for use by children; or

12 (c) Sold in any of the following:

(i) Retail store, catalogue, or online web site, in which a person exclusively offers for sale products that are packaged, displayed, or advertised as appropriate for use by children; or

(ii) A discrete portion of a retail store, catalogue, or online web
site, in which a person offers for sale products that are packaged,
displayed, or advertised as appropriate for use by children.

19 (2) "Children's jewelry" means jewelry that is made for, marketed 20 for use by, or marketed to children under the age of twelve. 21 "Children's jewelry" includes jewelry that meets any of the following 22 conditions:

(a) Represented in its packaging, display, or advertising asappropriate for use by children under the age of twelve;

(b) Sold in conjunction with, attached to, or packaged together with other products that are packaged, displayed, or advertised as appropriate for use by children;

28 29 (c) Sized for children and not intended for use by adults; or

(d) Sold in any of the following:

30 (i) A vending machine;

(ii) Retail store, catalogue, or online web site, in which a person exclusively offers for sale products that are packaged, displayed, or advertised as appropriate for use by children; or

34 (iii) A discrete portion of a retail store, catalogue, or online
35 web site, in which a person offers for sale products that are packaged,
36 displayed, or advertised as appropriate for use by children.

37 (3)(a) "Children's product" includes any of the following:

38 (i) Toys;

- (ii) Children's cosmetics; 1
- 2 (iii) Children's jewelry;

(iv) A product designed or intended by the manufacturer to help a 3 child with sucking or teething, to facilitate sleep, relaxation, or the 4 5 feeding of a child, or to be worn as clothing by children; or

- (v) Child car seats. 6
- 7 (b) "Children's product" does not include the following:
- 8 (i) Batteries;
- (ii) Slings and catapults; 9
- (iii) Sets of darts with metallic points; 10
- 11 (iv) Toy steam engines;
- (v) Bicycles and tricycles; 12

13 (vi) Video toys that can be connected to a video screen and are operated at a nominal voltage exceeding twenty-four volts; 14

15 (vii) Chemistry sets;

16 (viii) Consumer electronic products, including but not limited to 17 personal computers, audio and video equipment, calculators, wireless phones, game consoles, and handheld devices incorporating a video 18 screen, used to access interactive software and their associated 19 peripherals; 20

- 21 (ix) Interactive software, intended for leisure and entertainment, 22 such as computer games, and their storage media, such as compact disks; 23
  - (x) BB guns, pellet guns, and air rifles;

24 (xi) Snow sporting equipment, including skis, poles, boots, snow 25 boards, sleds, and bindings;

- (xii) Sporting equipment, including, but not limited to bats, 26 27 balls, gloves, sticks, pucks, and pads;
- (xiii) Roller skates; 28
- 29 (xiv) Scooters;
- 30 (xv) Model rockets;

31 (xvi) Athletic shoes with cleats or spikes; and

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(xvii) Pocket knives and multitools.

(4) "Cosmetics" includes articles intended to be rubbed, poured, 33 sprinkled, or sprayed on, introduced into, or otherwise applied to the 34 human body or any part thereof for cleansing, beautifying, promoting 35 36 attractiveness, or altering the appearance, and articles intended for 37 use as a component of such an article. "Cosmetics" does not include

soap, dietary supplements, or food and drugs approved by the United
 States food and drug administration.

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(5) "Department" means the department of ecology.

(6) "High priority chemical" means a chemical identified by a state
agency, federal agency, or accredited research university, or other
scientific evidence deemed authoritative by the department on the basis
of credible scientific evidence as known to do one or more of the
following:

9 (a) Harm the normal development of a fetus or child or cause other 10 developmental toxicity;

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(b) Cause cancer, genetic damage, or reproductive harm;

12 (c) Disrupt the endocrine system;

13 (d) Damage the nervous system, immune system, or organs or cause 14 other systemic toxicity;

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6 (e) Be persistent, bioaccumulative, and toxic; or

16 (f) Be very persistent and very bioaccumulative.

17 (7) "Manufacturer" includes any person, firm, association, 18 partnership, corporation, governmental entity, organization, or joint 19 venture that produces a children's product or an importer or domestic 20 distributor of a children's product. For the purposes of this 21 subsection, "importer" means the owner of the children's product.

(8) "Phthalates" means di-(2-ethylhexyl) phthalate (DEHP), dibutyl
phthalate (DBP), benzyl butyl phthalate (BBP), diisonoyl phthalate
(DINP), diisodecyl phthalate (DIDP), or di-n-octyl phthalate (DnOP).

(9) "Toy" means a product designed or intended by the manufacturerto be used by a child at play.

(10) "Trade association" means a membership organization of persons engaging in a similar or related line of commerce, organized to promote and improve business conditions in that line of commerce and not to engage in a regular business of a kind ordinarily carried on for profit.

32 (11) "Very bioaccumulative" means having a bioconcentration factor 33 or bioaccumulation factor greater than or equal to five thousand, or if 34 neither are available, having a log Kow greater than 5.0.

35 (12) "Very persistent" means having a half-life greater than or 36 equal to one of the following:

37 (a) A half-life in soil or sediment of greater than one hundred38 eighty days;

(b) A half-life greater than or equal to sixty days in water or
 evidence of long-range transport.

3 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. (1) Beginning July 1, 2009, no manufacturer, 4 wholesaler, or retailer may manufacture, knowingly sell, offer for 5 sale, distribute for sale, or distribute for use in this state a 6 children's product or product component containing the following:

7 (a) Except as provided in subsection (2) of this section, lead at
8 more than .009 percent by weight (ninety parts per million);

9 (b) Cadmium at more than .004 percent by weight (forty parts per 10 million); or

(c) Phthalates, individually or in combination, at more than 0.10 percent by weight (one thousand parts per million).

(2) If determined feasible for manufacturers to achieve and necessary to protect children's health, the department, in consultation with the department of health, may by rule require that no manufacturer, wholesaler, or retailer may manufacture, knowingly sell, offer for sale, distribute for sale, or distribute for use in this state a children's product or product component containing lead at more than .004 percent by weight (forty parts per million).

20 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 4. (1) By January 1, 2009, the department, in 21 consultation with the department of health, shall identify high 22 priority chemicals that are of high concern for children after 23 considering a child's or developing fetus's potential for exposure to 24 each chemical. In identifying the chemicals, the department shall 25 include chemicals that meet one or more of the following criteria:

(a) The chemical has been found through biomonitoring studies that
demonstrate the presence of the chemical in human umbilical cord blood,
human breast milk, human urine, or other bodily tissues or fluids;

(b) The chemical has been found through sampling and analysis to be present in household dust, indoor air, drinking water, or elsewhere in the home environment; or

32 (c) The chemical has been added to or is present in a consumer33 product used or present in the home.

34 (2) By January 1, 2009, the department shall identify children's
 35 products or product categories that may contain chemicals identified
 36 under subsection (1) of this section.

1 (3) By January 1, 2009, the department shall submit a report on the 2 chemicals of high concern to children and the children's products or 3 product categories they identify to the appropriate standing committees 4 of the legislature. The report shall include policy options for 5 addressing children's products that contain chemicals of high concern 6 for children, including recommendations for additional ways to inform 7 consumers about toxic chemicals in products, such as labeling.

8 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 5. Beginning six months after the department 9 has adopted rules under section 8(5) of this act, a manufacturer of a 10 children's product, or a trade organization on behalf of its member 11 manufacturers, shall provide notice to the department that the 12 manufacturer's product contains a high priority chemical. The notice 13 must be filed annually with the department and must include the 14 following information:

15 (1) The name of the chemical used or produced and its chemical 16 abstracts service registry number;

17 (2) A brief description of the product or product component18 containing the substance;

19 (3) A description of the function of the chemical in the product;

20 (4) The amount of the chemical used in each unit of the product or 21 product component. The amount may be reported in ranges, rather than 22 the exact amount;

(5) The name and address of the manufacturer and the name, address,and phone number of a contact person for the manufacturer; and

25 (6) Any other information the manufacturer deems relevant to the 26 appropriate use of the product.

27 Sec. 6. RCW 43.70.660 and 2001 c 257 s 2 are each amended to read 28 as follows:

29 (1) The legislature authorizes the secretary to establish and 30 maintain a product safety education campaign to promote greater 31 awareness of products designed to be used by infants and children( $(\tau$ 32 excluding toys,)) that:

33 (a) Are recalled by the United States consumer products safety 34 commission;

35 (b) Do not meet federal safety regulations and voluntary safety 36 standards; ((or)) (c) Are unsafe or illegal to place into the stream of commerce
 under the infant crib safety act, chapter 70.111 RCW; or

3 (d) Contain chemicals of high concern for children as identified
4 under section 4 of this act.

5 (2) The department shall make reasonable efforts to ensure that 6 this infant and children product safety education campaign reaches the 7 target population. The target population for this campaign includes, 8 but is not limited to, parents, foster parents and other caregivers, 9 child care providers, consignment and resale stores selling infant and 10 child products, and charitable and governmental entities serving 11 infants, children, and families.

12 (3) The secretary may utilize a combination of methods to achieve 13 this outreach and education goal, including but not limited to print 14 and electronic media. The secretary may operate the campaign or may 15 contract with a vendor.

16 (4) The department shall coordinate this infant and children 17 product safety education campaign with child-serving entities 18 including, but not limited to, hospitals, birthing centers, midwives, 19 pediatricians, obstetricians, family practice physicians, governmental 20 and private entities serving infants, children, and families, and 21 relevant manufacturers.

(5) The department shall coordinate with other agencies and entities to eliminate duplication of effort in disseminating infant and children consumer product safety information.

(6) The department may receive funding for this infant and children product safety education effort from federal, state, and local governmental entities, child-serving foundations, or other private sources.

29 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 7. (1) A manufacturer of products that are 30 restricted under this chapter must notify persons that sell the 31 manufacturer's products in this state about the provisions of this 32 chapter no less than ninety days prior to the effective date of the 33 restrictions.

34 (2) A manufacturer that produces, sells, or distributes a product
 35 prohibited from manufacture, sale, or distribution in this state under
 36 this chapter shall recall the product and reimburse the retailer or any
 37 other purchaser for the product.

1 (3) A manufacturer of children's products in violation of this 2 chapter is subject to a civil penalty not to exceed five thousand 3 dollars for each violation in the case of a first offense. 4 Manufacturers who are repeat violators are subject to a civil penalty 5 not to exceed ten thousand dollars for each repeat offense. Penalties 6 collected under this section must be deposited in the state toxics 7 control account created in RCW 70.105D.070.

8 (4) Retailers who unknowingly sell products that are restricted 9 from sale under this chapter are not liable under this chapter.

10 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 8.** (1) Before the prohibitions under section 3 11 of this act take effect, the department shall prepare and distribute 12 information to in-state and out-of-state manufacturers, to the maximum 13 extent practicable, to assist them in identifying products prohibited 14 for manufacture, sale, or distribution under this chapter.

15 (2) The department must assist in-state retailers in identifying 16 products restricted under this chapter.

17 (3) The department may require manufacturers to electronically file 18 the notice required under section 5 of this act to the department that 19 the manufacturer's product contains a high priority chemical.

20 (4) The department shall develop and publish a web site that 21 provides consumers with information on the chemicals used in children's 22 products, the reason the chemical has been identified as a high 23 priority chemical, and any safer alternatives to the chemical.

(5) The department shall adopt rules to finalize the list of high
priority chemicals that are of high concern for children identified in
section 4(1) of this act by January 1, 2010.

27 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 9.** The department may adopt rules as necessary 28 for the purpose of implementing, administering, and enforcing this 29 chapter.

30 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 10. Sections 1 through 5 and 7 through 9 of 31 this act constitute a new chapter in Title 70 RCW.

32 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 11. If specific funding for the purposes of 33 this act, referencing this act by bill or chapter number, is not

1 provided by June 30, 2008, in the omnibus appropriations act, this act

2 is null and void.

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
