1 AN ACT Relating to modifying excise tax laws to preserve funding
2 for public schools, colleges, and universities, as well as other public
3 systems essential for the safety, health, and security of all
4 Washingtonians; amending RCW 82.04.220, 82.04.2907, 82.04.460,
5 82.04.080, 82.32.090, 82.12.020, 82.45.033, 82.45.070, 82.45.080,
6 82.45.100, 82.45.220, 43.07.390, 82.04.423, 82.04.4266, 82.04.250,

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

2 **PART I**

3 **Minimum Nexus Standards**

4 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 101.** (1) The legislature finds that out-of-
5 state businesses that do not have a physical presence in Washington
6 earn significant income from Washington residents from providing
7 services or collecting royalties on the use of intangible property in
8 this state. The legislature further finds that these businesses
9 receive significant benefits and opportunities provided by the state,
10 such as: Laws providing protection of business interests or regulating
11 consumer credit; access to courts and judicial process to enforce
12 business rights, including debt collection and intellectual property
13 rights; an orderly and regulated marketplace; and police and fire
14 protection and a transportation system benefiting in-state agents and
15 other representatives of out-of-state businesses. Therefore, the
16 legislature intends to extend the state's business and occupation tax
17 to these companies to ensure that they pay their fair share of the cost
18 of services that this state renders and the infrastructure it provides.

19 (2)(a) The legislature also finds that the current cost
20 apportionment method in RCW 82.04.460(1) for apportioning most service
21 income has been difficult for both taxpayers and the department to
22 apply due in large part (i) to the difficulty in assigning certain
23 costs of doing business inside or outside of this state, and (ii) to
24 its dissimilarity with the apportionment methods used in other states
25 for their business activity taxes.

26 (b) The legislature further finds that there is a trend among
27 states to adopt a single factor apportionment formula based on sales.
28 The legislature recognizes that adoption of a sales factor only
29 apportionment method has the advantages of simplifying apportionment
30 and making Washington a more attractive place for businesses to expand
31 their property and payroll. For these reasons, the legislature adopts
32 single factor sales apportionment for purposes of apportioning royalty
33 income and certain service income.

34 (c) Nothing in this act may be construed, however, to authorize
35 apportionment of the gross income or value of products taxable under
36 the following business and occupation tax classifications: Retailing,

1 wholesaling, manufacturing, processing for hire, extracting, extracting
2 for hire, printing, government contracting, public road construction,
3 the classifications in RCW 82.04.280 (2), (4), (6), and (7), and any
4 other activity not specifically included in the definition of
5 apportionable activities in RCW 82.04.460.

6 **Sec. 102.** RCW 82.04.220 and 1961 c 15 s 82.04.220 are each amended
7 to read as follows:

8 (1) There is levied and (~~shall be~~) collected from every person
9 that has a substantial nexus with this state a tax for the act or
10 privilege of engaging in business activities. (~~Such~~) The tax (~~shall~~
11 be) is measured by the application of rates against value of products,
12 gross proceeds of sales, or gross income of the business, as the case
13 may be.

14 (2) A person who has a substantial nexus with this state in any tax
15 year will be deemed to have a substantial nexus with this state for the
16 following tax year.

17 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 103.** A new section is added to chapter 82.04
18 RCW to read as follows:

19 "Engaging within this state" and "engaging within the state," when
20 used in connection with any apportionable activity as defined in RCW
21 82.04.460, means that a person generates gross income of the business
22 from sources within this state, such as customers or intangible
23 property located in this state, regardless of whether the person is
24 physically present in this state.

25 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 104.** A new section is added to chapter 82.04
26 RCW to read as follows:

27 (1) A person engaging in business is deemed to have substantial
28 nexus with this state if the person is:

29 (a) An individual and is a resident or domiciliary of this state;

30 (b) A business entity and is organized or commercially domiciled in
31 this state; or

32 (c) A nonresident individual or a business entity that is organized
33 or commercially domiciled outside this state, and in any tax year the
34 person has:

35 (i) More than fifty thousand dollars of property in this state;

1 (ii) More than fifty thousand dollars of payroll in this state;
2 (iii) More than two hundred fifty thousand dollars of receipts from
3 this state; or
4 (iv) At least twenty-five percent of the person's total property,
5 total payroll, or total receipts in this state.

6 (2)(a) Property counting toward the thresholds in subsection
7 (1)(c)(i) and (iv) of this section is the average value of the
8 taxpayer's property, including intangible property, owned or rented and
9 used in this state during the tax year.

10 (b)(i) Property owned by the taxpayer, other than loans and credit
11 card receivables owned by the taxpayer, is valued at its original cost
12 basis. Loans and credit card receivables owned by the taxpayer are
13 valued at their outstanding principal balance, without regard to any
14 reserve for bad debts. However, if a loan or credit card receivable is
15 charged off in whole or in part for federal income tax purposes, the
16 portion of the loan or credit card receivable charged off is deducted
17 from the outstanding principal balance.

18 (ii) Property rented by the taxpayer is valued at eight times the
19 net annual rental rate. For purposes of this subsection, "net annual
20 rental rate" means the annual rental rate paid by the taxpayer less any
21 annual rental rate received by the taxpayer from subrentals.

22 (c) The average value of property must be determined by averaging
23 the values at the beginning and ending of the tax year; but the
24 department may require the averaging of monthly values during the tax
25 year if reasonably required to properly reflect the average value of
26 the taxpayer's property.

27 (d)(i) For purposes of this subsection (2), loans and credit card
28 receivables are deemed owned and used in this state as follows:

29 (A) Loans secured by real property, personal property, or both real
30 and personal property, are deemed owned and used in the state if the
31 real property or personal property securing the loan is located within
32 this state. If the property securing the loan is located both within
33 this state and one or more other states, the loan is deemed owned and
34 used in this state if more than fifty percent of the fair market value
35 of the real or personal property is located within this state. If more
36 than fifty percent of the fair market value of the real or personal
37 property is not located within any one state, then the loan is deemed
38 owned and used in this state if the borrower is located in this state.

1 The determination of whether the real or personal property securing a
2 loan is located within this state must be made, as of the time the
3 original agreement was made, and any and all subsequent substitutions
4 of collateral must be disregarded.

5 (B) Loans not secured by real or personal property are deemed owned
6 and used in this state if the borrower is located in this state.

7 (C) Credit card receivables are deemed owned and used in this state
8 if the billing address of the cardholder is in this state.

9 (ii)(A) Except as otherwise provided in (d)(ii)(B) of this
10 subsection (2), the definitions in the multistate tax commission's
11 recommended formula for the apportionment and allocation of net income
12 of financial institutions as existing on the effective date of this
13 section or such subsequent date as may be provided by the department by
14 rule, consistent with the purposes of this section, apply to this
15 section.

16 (B) "Credit card" means a card or device existing for the purpose
17 of obtaining money, property, labor, or services on credit.

18 (e) Notwithstanding anything else to the contrary in this
19 subsection, property counting toward the thresholds in subsection
20 (1)(c)(i) and (iv) of this section does not include a person's
21 ownership of, or rights in, computer software as defined in RCW
22 82.04.215, including computer software used in providing a digital
23 automated service; master copies of software; and digital goods and
24 digital codes residing on servers located in this state.

25 (3)(a) Payroll counting toward the thresholds in subsection
26 (1)(c)(ii) and (iv) of this section is the total amount paid by the
27 taxpayer for compensation in this state during the tax year plus
28 nonemployee compensation paid to representative third parties in this
29 state. Nonemployee compensation paid to representative third parties
30 includes the gross amount paid to nonemployees who represent the
31 taxpayer in interactions with the taxpayer's clients and includes sales
32 commissions.

33 (b) Employee compensation is paid in this state if the compensation
34 is properly reportable to this state for unemployment compensation tax
35 purposes, regardless of whether the compensation was actually reported
36 to this state.

37 (c) Nonemployee compensation is paid in this state if the service

1 performed by the representative third party occurs entirely or
2 primarily within this state.

3 (d) For purposes of this subsection, "compensation" means wages,
4 salaries, commissions, and any other form of remuneration paid to
5 employees or nonemployees and defined as gross income under 26 U.S.C.
6 Sec. 61 of the federal internal revenue code of 1986, as existing on
7 the effective date of this section.

8 (4) Receipts counting toward the thresholds in subsection
9 (1)(c)(iii) and (iv) of this section are those amounts included in the
10 numerator of the receipts factor under section 105 of this act and, for
11 financial institutions, those amounts included in the numerator of the
12 receipts factor under the rule adopted by the department as authorized
13 in RCW 82.04.460(2).

14 (5)(a) Each December, the department must review the cumulative
15 percentage change in the consumer price index. The department must
16 adjust the thresholds in subsection (1)(c)(i) through (iii) of this
17 section if the consumer price index has changed by five percent or more
18 since the later of the effective date of this section, or the date that
19 the thresholds were last adjusted under this subsection. For purposes
20 of determining the cumulative percentage change in the consumer price
21 index, the department must compare the consumer price index available
22 as of December 1st of the current year with the consumer price index as
23 of the later of the effective date of this section, or the date that
24 the thresholds were last adjusted under this subsection. The
25 thresholds must be adjusted to reflect that cumulative percentage
26 change in the consumer price index. The adjusted thresholds must be
27 rounded to the nearest one thousand dollars. Any adjustment will apply
28 to tax periods that begin after the adjustment is made.

29 (b) As used in this subsection, "consumer price index" means the
30 consumer price index for all urban consumers (CPI-U) available from the
31 bureau of labor statistics of the United States department of labor.

32 (6) Subsections (1) through (5) of this section only apply with
33 respect to the taxes imposed under this chapter on apportionable
34 activities as defined in RCW 82.04.460. For purposes of the taxes
35 imposed under this chapter on any activity not included in the
36 definition of apportionable activities in RCW 82.04.460, a person is
37 deemed to have a substantial nexus with this state if the person has a
38 physical presence in this state, which need only be demonstrably more

1 than a slightest presence. For purposes of this subsection, a person
2 is physically present in this state if the person has property or
3 employees in this state. A person is also physically present in this
4 state if the person, either directly or through an agent or other
5 representative, engages in activities in this state that are
6 significantly associated with the person's ability to establish or
7 maintain a market for its products in this state.

8 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 105.** A new section is added to chapter 82.04
9 RCW to read as follows:

10 (1) The apportionable income of a person within the scope of RCW
11 82.04.460(1) is apportioned to Washington by multiplying its
12 apportionable income by the receipts factor. Persons who are subject
13 to tax under more than one of the tax classifications enumerated in RCW
14 82.04.460(4)(a) (i) through (ix) must calculate a separate receipts
15 factor for each tax classification that the person is taxable under.

16 (2) For purposes of subsection (1) of this section, the receipts
17 factor is a fraction and is calculated as provided in subsections (3)
18 and (4) of this section and, for financial institutions, as provided in
19 the rule adopted by the department under the authority of RCW
20 82.04.460(2).

21 (3)(a) The numerator of the receipts factor is the total gross
22 income of the business of the taxpayer attributable to this state
23 during the tax year from engaging in an apportionable activity. The
24 denominator of the receipts factor is the total gross income of the
25 business of the taxpayer from engaging in an apportionable activity
26 everywhere in the world during the tax year.

27 (b) Except as otherwise provided in this section, for purposes of
28 computing the receipts factor, gross income of the business generated
29 from each apportionable activity is attributable to the state:

30 (i) Where the customer received the benefit of the taxpayer's
31 service or, in the case of gross income from royalties, where the
32 customer used the taxpayer's intangible property.

33 (ii) If the customer received the benefit of the service or used
34 the intangible property in more than one state, gross income of the
35 business must be attributed to the state in which the benefit of the
36 service was primarily received or in which the intangible property was
37 primarily used.

1 (iii) If the taxpayer is unable to attribute gross income of the
2 business under the provisions of (b)(i) or (ii) of this subsection (3),
3 gross income of the business must be attributed to the state from which
4 the customer ordered the service or, in the case of royalties, the
5 office of the customer from which the royalty agreement with the
6 taxpayer was negotiated.

7 (iv) If the taxpayer is unable to attribute gross income of the
8 business under the provisions of (b)(i), (ii), or (iii) of this
9 subsection (3), gross income of the business must be attributed to the
10 state to which the billing statements or invoices are sent to the
11 customer by the taxpayer.

12 (v) If the taxpayer is unable to attribute gross income of the
13 business under the provisions of (b)(i), (ii), (iii), or (iv) of this
14 subsection (3), gross income of the business must be attributed to the
15 state from which the customer sends payment to the taxpayer.

16 (vi) If the taxpayer is unable to attribute gross income of the
17 business under the provisions of (b)(i), (ii), (iii), (iv), or (v) of
18 this subsection (3), gross income of the business must be attributed to
19 the state where the customer is located as indicated by the customer's
20 address: (A) Shown in the taxpayer's business records maintained in
21 the regular course of business; or (B) obtained during consummation of
22 the sale or the negotiation of the contract for services or for the use
23 of the taxpayer's intangible property, including any address of a
24 customer's payment instrument when readily available to the taxpayer
25 and no other address is available.

26 (vii) If the taxpayer is unable to attribute gross income of the
27 business under the provisions of (b)(i), (ii), (iii), (iv), (v), or
28 (vi) of this subsection (3), gross income of the business must be
29 attributed to the commercial domicile of the taxpayer.

30 (viii) For purposes of this subsection (3)(b), "customer" means a
31 person or entity to whom the taxpayer makes a sale or renders services
32 or from whom the taxpayer otherwise receives gross income of the
33 business. "Customer" includes anyone who pays royalties or charges in
34 the nature of royalties for the use of the taxpayer's intangible
35 property.

36 (c) Gross income of the business from engaging in an apportionable
37 activity must be excluded from the denominator of the receipts factor
38 if, in respect to such activity, at least some of the activity is

1 performed in this state, and the gross income is attributable under (b)
2 of this subsection (3) to a state in which the taxpayer is not taxable.
3 For purposes of this subsection (3)(c), "not taxable" means that the
4 taxpayer is not subject to a business activities tax by that state,
5 except that a taxpayer is taxable in a state in which it would be
6 deemed to have a substantial nexus with that state under the standards
7 in section 104(1) of this act regardless of whether that state imposes
8 such a tax. "Business activities tax" means a tax measured by the
9 amount of, or economic results of, business activity conducted in a
10 state. The term includes taxes measured in whole or in part on net
11 income or gross income or receipts. "Business activities tax" does not
12 include a sales tax, use tax, or a similar transaction tax, imposed on
13 the sale or acquisition of goods or services, whether or not
14 denominated a gross receipts tax or a tax imposed on the privilege of
15 doing business.

16 (d) This subsection (3) does not apply to financial institutions
17 with respect to apportionable income taxable under RCW 82.04.290.
18 Financial institutions must calculate the receipts factor as provided
19 in subsection (4) of this section and the rule adopted by the
20 department under the authority of RCW 82.04.460(2) with respect to
21 apportionable income taxable under RCW 82.04.290. Financial
22 institutions that are subject to tax under any other tax classification
23 enumerated in RCW 82.04.460(4)(a) (i) through (v) and (vii) through
24 (ix) must calculate a separate receipts factor, as provided in this
25 section, for each of the other tax classifications that the financial
26 institution is taxable under.

27 (4) A taxpayer may calculate the receipts factor for the current
28 tax year based on the most recent calendar year for which information
29 is available for the full calendar year. If a taxpayer does not
30 calculate the receipts factor for the current tax year based on
31 previous calendar year information as authorized in this subsection,
32 the business must use current year information to calculate the
33 receipts factor for the current tax year. In either case, a taxpayer
34 must correct the reporting for the current tax year when complete
35 information is available to calculate the receipts factor for that
36 year, but not later than October 31st of the following tax year.
37 Interest will apply to any additional tax due on a corrected tax
38 return. Interest must be assessed at the rate provided for delinquent

1 excise taxes under chapter 82.32 RCW, retroactively to the date the
2 original return was due, and will accrue until the additional taxes are
3 paid. Penalties as provided in RCW 82.32.090 will apply to any such
4 additional tax due only if the current tax year reporting is not
5 corrected and the additional tax is not paid by October 31st of the
6 following tax year. Interest as provided in RCW 82.32.060 will apply
7 to any tax paid in excess of that properly due on a return as a result
8 of a taxpayer using previous calendar year data or incomplete current-
9 year data to calculate the receipts factor.

10 (5) Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the definitions
11 in this subsection apply throughout this section.

12 (a) "Apportionable activities" and "apportionable income" have the
13 same meaning as in RCW 82.04.460.

14 (b) "State" means a state of the United States, the District of
15 Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, any territory or possession
16 of the United States, or any foreign country or political subdivision
17 of a foreign country.

18 **Sec. 106.** RCW 82.04.2907 and 2009 c 535 s 407 are each amended to
19 read as follows:

20 (1) Upon every person engaging within this state in the business of
21 receiving income from royalties (~~(or charges in the nature of royalties~~
22 ~~for the granting of intangible rights, such as copyrights, licenses,~~
23 ~~patents, or franchise fees)), the amount of tax with respect to~~
24 ~~((such))~~ the business (~~(shall be))~~ is equal to the gross income from
25 royalties (~~(or charges in the nature of royalties from the business))~~)
26 multiplied by the rate of 0.484 percent.

27 (2) For the purposes of this section, "gross income from royalties"
28 means compensation for the use of intangible property, (~~(such as))~~
29 including charges in the nature of royalties, regardless of where the
30 intangible property will be used. For purposes of this subsection,
31 "intangible property" includes copyrights, patents, licenses,
32 franchises, trademarks, trade names, and similar items. (~~((It))~~) "Gross
33 income from royalties" does not include compensation for any natural
34 resource, the licensing of prewritten computer software to the end
35 user, or the licensing (~~(or use))~~ of digital goods, digital codes, or
36 digital automated services to the end user as defined in RCW
37 82.04.190(11).

1 **Sec. 107.** RCW 82.04.460 and 2004 c 174 s 6 are each amended to
2 read as follows:

3 (1) Except as otherwise provided in this section, any person
4 ((rendering services)) earning apportionable income taxable under ((RCW
5 82.04.290 or 82.04.2908)) this chapter and ((maintaining places of
6 business both within and without this state which contribute to the
7 rendition of such services shall)) also taxable in another state, must,
8 for the purpose of computing tax liability under ((RCW 82.04.290 or
9 82.04.2908)) this chapter, apportion to this state, in accordance with
10 section 105 of this act, that portion of the person's ((gross))
11 apportionable income ((which is)) derived from ((services rendered))
12 business activities performed within this state. ((Where such
13 apportionment cannot be accurately made by separate accounting methods,
14 the taxpayer shall apportion to this state that proportion of the
15 taxpayer's total income which the cost of doing business within the
16 state bears to the total cost of doing business both within and without
17 the state.))

18 (2) ((Notwithstanding the provision of subsection (1) of this
19 section, persons doing business both within and without the state who
20 receive gross income from service charges, as defined in RCW 63.14.010
21 (relating to amounts charged for granting the right or privilege to
22 make deferred or installment payments) or who receive gross income from
23 engaging in business as financial institutions within the scope of
24 chapter 82.14A RCW (relating to city taxes on financial institutions)
25 shall apportion or allocate gross income taxable under RCW 82.04.290 to
26 this state pursuant to rules promulgated by the department consistent
27 with uniform rules for apportionment or allocation developed by the
28 states.)) The department must by rule provide a method of apportioning
29 the apportionable income of financial institutions, where such
30 apportionable income is taxable under RCW 82.04.290. The rule adopted
31 by the department must, to the extent feasible, be consistent with the
32 multistate tax commission's recommended formula for the apportionment
33 and allocation of net income of financial institutions as existing on
34 the effective date of this section or such subsequent date as may be
35 provided by the department by rule, consistent with the purposes of
36 this section, except that:

37 (a) The department's rule must provide for a single factor
38 apportionment method based on the receipts factor; and

1 (b) The definition of "financial institution" contained in appendix
2 A to the multistate tax commission's recommended formula for the
3 apportionment and allocation of net income of financial institutions is
4 advisory only.

5 (3) The department (~~(shall)~~) may by rule provide a method or
6 methods of apportioning or allocating gross income derived from sales
7 of telecommunications service and competitive telephone service(~~(s)~~)
8 taxed under this chapter, if the gross proceeds of sales subject to tax
9 under this chapter do not fairly represent the extent of the taxpayer's
10 income attributable to this state. (~~The rules shall be, so far as~~
11 ~~feasible, consistent with the methods of apportionment contained in~~
12 ~~this section and shall require the consideration of those facts,~~
13 ~~circumstances, and apportionment factors as will result in an equitable~~

15 must provide for an equitable and constitutionally permissible division
16 of the tax base.~~

17 (4) For purposes of this section, the following definitions apply
18 unless the context clearly requires otherwise:

19 (a) "Apportionable income" means gross income of the business
20 generated from engaging in apportionable activities, including income
21 received from apportionable activities performed outside this state if
22 the income would be taxable under this chapter if received from
23 activities in this state, less the exemptions and deductions allowable
24 under this chapter. For purposes of this subsection, "apportionable
25 activities" means only those activities taxed under:

- 26 (i) RCW 82.04.255;
27 (ii) RCW 82.04.260 (3), (4), (5), (6), (7), (8), (9), and (12);
28 (iii) RCW 82.04.280(5);
29 (iv) RCW 82.04.285;
30 (v) RCW 82.04.286;
31 (vi) RCW 82.04.290;
32 (vii) RCW 82.04.2907;
33 (viii) RCW 82.04.2908; and
34 (ix) RCW 82.04.260(13), 82.04.263, and 82.04.280(1), but only to
35 the extent of any activity that would be taxable under any of the
36 provisions enumerated under (a)(i) through (viii) of this subsection
37 (4) if the tax classifications in RCW 82.04.260(13), 82.04.263, and
38 82.04.280(1) did not exist.

1 (b)(i) "Taxable in another state" means that the taxpayer is
2 subject to a business activities tax by another state on its income
3 received from engaging in apportionable activities; or the taxpayer is
4 not subject to a business activities tax by another state on its income
5 received from engaging in apportionable activities, but any other state
6 has jurisdiction to subject the taxpayer to a business activities tax
7 on such income under the substantial nexus standards in section 104(1)
8 of this act.

9 (ii) For purposes of this subsection (4)(b), "business activities
10 tax" and "state" have the same meaning as in section 105 of this act.

11 **Sec. 108.** RCW 82.04.080 and 1961 c 15 s 82.04.080 are each amended
12 to read as follows:

13 (1) "Gross income of the business" means the value proceeding or
14 accruing by reason of the transaction of the business engaged in and
15 includes gross proceeds of sales, compensation for the rendition of
16 services, gains realized from trading in stocks, bonds, or other
17 evidences of indebtedness, interest, discount, rents, royalties, fees,
18 commissions, dividends, and other emoluments however designated, all
19 without any deduction on account of the cost of tangible property sold,
20 the cost of materials used, labor costs, interest, discount, delivery
21 costs, taxes, or any other expense whatsoever paid or accrued and
22 without any deduction on account of losses.

23 (2) Financial institutions must determine gains realized from

31 institution from an affiliated person if the amounts are received from
32 transactions that are required to be at arm's length under sections 23A
33 or 23B of the federal reserve act as existing on the effective date of
34 this section or such subsequent date as may be provided by the
35 department by rule, consistent with the purposes of this section. For

1 purposes of this subsection, "financial institution" has the same
2 meaning as in RCW 82.04.080.

3 (2) As used in this section, "affiliated" means under common
4 control. "Common control" means the possession, directly or
5 indirectly, of more than fifty percent of the power to direct or cause
6 the direction of the management and policies of a person, whether
7 through the ownership of voting shares, by contract, or otherwise.

8 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 110.** A new section is added to chapter 82.04
9 RCW to read as follows:

10 (1) This chapter does not apply to amounts received by investment
11 conduits from cash and securities.

12 (2) For purposes of this section, the following definitions apply:

13 (a) "Investment conduit" means an entity formed by a financial
14 institution as defined in RCW 82.04.080 for the express purpose of
15 holding or owning cash or securities if the entity formed:

- 16 (i) Has no employees;
- 17 (ii) Has no direct profit-making motive;
- 18 (iii) Owns no tangible assets, other than cash or securities;
- 19 (iv) Holds or owns cash or securities solely as a conduit for
20 investors, allocating its income to holders of its ownership interests.
21 For the purposes of this subsection (2)(a)(iv), "ownership interest"
22 means interests categorized as debt or equity for purposes of federal
23 tax or generally accepted accounting principles; and

24 (v) Has, within twelve months of its organization or initial
25 capitalization date, issued ownership interests to other than
26 affiliated persons, equal to or greater than twenty-five percent of its
27 total issued ownership interests. For purposes of this subsection
28 (2)(a)(v), "affiliated" has the same meaning as in section 109 of this
29 act.

30 (b) "Securities" has the same meaning as in section 2 of the
31 securities act of 1933 as existing on the effective date of this
32 section or such subsequent date as may be provided by the department by
33 rule, consistent with the purposes of this section.

34 **PART II**
35 **Tax Avoidance Transactions**

1 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 201.** A new section is added to chapter 82.32
2 RCW to read as follows:

3 (1)(a) Unless otherwise specifically provided in statute, the
4 department must respect the form of a transaction, except where the
5 form of the transaction or a related series of transactions is adopted
6 for the purpose of:

7 (i) Disguising income received, or otherwise avoiding tax on
8 income, from a person that is not affiliated with the taxpayer;

9 (ii) Disguising the purchase or sale of property or services from
10 or to a person that is not affiliated with the taxpayer; or

11 (iii) Avoiding the tax imposed in RCW 82.12.020 on the use of
12 property in this state that is owned by an entity organized outside of
13 Washington.

14 (b) For purposes of this subsection, "affiliated" means under
15 common control. "Control" means the possession, directly or
16 indirectly, of more than fifty percent of the power to direct or cause
17 the direction of the management and policies of a person, whether
18 through the ownership of voting shares, by contract, or otherwise.

19 (2)(a) The department must, as resources allow, adopt rules to
20 assist in determining when to disregard the form of a transaction or a
21 related series of transactions adopted for the purposes described in
22 subsection (1)(a)(i) through (iii) of this section. In adopting rules,
23 the department may consider the following judicial doctrines, except to
24 the extent such doctrines are inconsistent with express provisions
25 contained in Washington state statutes:

26 (i) The sham transaction doctrine;

27 (ii) The economic substance doctrine;

28 (iii) The business purpose doctrine;

29 (iv) The substance over form doctrine;

30 (v) The step transaction doctrine; and

31 (vi) The assignment of income doctrine.

32 (b) The adoption of a rule as required under this subsection is not
33 a condition precedent for the department to use the authority provided
34 in this section. Any rules adopted under this section must include
35 examples of transactions that the department will disregard for tax
36 purposes.

37 (3) The provisions of this section are cumulative and nonexclusive

1 and do not affect any other remedies provided to the department under
2 statutory or common law.

3 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 202.** A new section is added to chapter 82.32
4 RCW to read as follows:

5 (1)(a) The department may not use section 201 of this act to
6 disregard any transaction, plan, or arrangement initiated before June
7 1, 2010, if, in respect to such transaction, plan, or arrangement, the
8 taxpayer had reported its tax liability in conformance with either
9 specific written instructions provided by the department to the
10 taxpayer, a determination published under the authority of RCW
11 82.32.410, or other document published by the department.

12 (b) This section does not apply if the transaction, plan, or
13 arrangement engaged in by the taxpayer differs materially from the
14 transaction, plan, or arrangement that was addressed in the specific
15 written instructions, published determination, or other published
16 document.

17 (2) For purposes of this section, "specific written instructions"
18 means tax reporting instructions provided to a taxpayer and which
19 specifically identifies the taxpayer to whom the instructions apply.
20 Specific written instructions may be provided as part of an audit, tax
21 assessment, determination, closing agreement, or in response to a
22 binding ruling request.

23 **Sec. 203.** RCW 82.32.090 and 2006 c 256 s 6 are each amended to
24 read as follows:

25 (1) If payment of any tax due on a return to be filed by a taxpayer
26 is not received by the department of revenue by the due date, there
27 (~~shall be~~) is assessed a penalty of five percent of the amount of the

18 for the collection of taxes, increases, and penalties, there (~~shall~~
19 ~~be~~) is added thereto a penalty of ten percent of the amount of the
20 tax, but not less than ten dollars.

22 business or performed any act upon which a tax is imposed under this
23 title and that person has not obtained from the department a

2 evasion penalty and the penalty for disregarding specific written

6 document a person is required by the state of Washington to file to
7 satisfy or establish a tax or fee obligation that is administered or

10 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 204.** (1) The legislature finds that this
11 state's tax policy with respect to the taxation of transactions between
12 affiliated entities and the income derived from such transactions
13 (intercompany transactions) has motivated some taxpayers to engage in
14 transactions designed solely or primarily to minimize the tax effects
15 of intercompany transactions. The legislature further finds that some
16 intercompany transactions result from taxpayers that are required to
17 establish affiliated entities to comply with regulatory mandates and
18 that transactions between such affiliates effectively increases the tax
19 burden in this state on the affiliated group of entities.

20 (2) Therefore, as existing resources allow, the department of
21 revenue is directed to conduct a review of the state's tax policy with
22 respect to the taxation of intercompany transactions. The review must
23 include the impacts of such transactions under the state's business and
24 occupation tax and state and local sales and use taxes. The department
25 may include other taxes in the review as it deems appropriate.

26 (3) In conducting the review, the department must examine how this
27 state's tax policy compares to the tax policy of other states with
28 respect to the taxation of intercompany transactions. The department's
29 review must include an analysis of potential alternatives to the
30 current policy of taxing intercompany transactions, including their
31 estimated revenue impacts if practicable.

32 (4) In conducting this review, the department may seek input from
33 members of the business community and others as it deems appropriate.

34 (5) The department must report its findings to the fiscal
35 committees of the house of representatives and senate by December 1,
36 2010. However, if the department has not completed its review by

1 December 1, 2010, the department must provide the fiscal committees of
2 the legislature with a brief status report by December 1, 2010, and the
3 final report by December 1, 2011.

4 **Direct Seller Business and Occupation Tax Exemption**

5 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 301.** (1) In 1983, the legislature provided a
6 business and occupation tax exemption in RCW 82.04.423 for certain out-
7 of-state sellers that sold consumer products exclusively to or through
8 a direct seller's representative, which was codified in RCW 82.04.423.
9 The intent of the legislature in enacting this exemption was to provide
10 a narrow exemption for out-of-state businesses engaged in direct sales
11 of consumer products, typically accomplished through in-home parties or
12 door-to-door selling.

13 (2) In *Dot Foods, Inc. v. Dep't of Revenue*, 166 Wn.2d 912 (2009),
14 the Washington state supreme court held that the exemption in RCW
15 82.04.423 applied to a taxpayer: (a) That sold nonconsumer products
16 through its representative in addition to consumer products; and (b)
17 whose consumer products were ultimately sold at retail in permanent
18 retail establishments. This decision raises questions about the
19 taxpayers intended to benefit from the narrow exemption in RCW
20 82.04.432.

21 (3) The legislature recognizes that some out-of-state businesses
22 selling consumer products in this state may be eligible for the
23 exemption under RCW 82.04.423 under the broadened interpretation or
24 could easily restructure their business operations to qualify for the
25 exemption. The legislature further finds that optimal tax policy does
26 not provide favorable treatment to out-of-state businesses, which a
27 broadened interpretation of RCW 82.04.423 could lead to; but rather,
28 the best tax policy is to have equitable tax treatment for businesses,
29 both within and without the state.

30 (4) Therefore, the legislature finds that it is necessary to
31 reaffirm the legislature's intent in establishing the direct sellers'
32 exemption by amending RCW 82.04.423 retroactively to conform the
33 exemption to the original intent of the legislature and by
34 prospectively ending the direct sellers' exemption effective July 1,
35 2010.

34 **PART IV**

35 **Business and Occupation Tax Preferences for Manufacturers of Products**
36 **Derived from Certain Agricultural Products**

1 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 401.** (1)(a) In 1967, the legislature authorized
2 a preferential business and occupation tax rate for slaughtering,
3 breaking, and/or processing perishable meat products and/or selling the
4 same at wholesale. The Washington state supreme court interpreted RCW
5 82.04.260(4), in *Agrilink Foods, Inc. v. Department of Revenue*, 153
6 Wn.2d 392 (2005), holding the preferential business and occupation tax
7 rate on the slaughtering, breaking, and/or processing of perishable
8 meat products applied to the processing of perishable meat products
9 into nonperishable finished products, such as canned food.

10 (b) In this act, the legislature intends to ensure that the
11 exemption applies to activities such as slaughtering, breaking, and/or
12 processing perishable meat products and/or selling such products at
13 wholesale by requiring that the end product be a perishable meat
14 product; a nonperishable meat product that is comprised primarily of
15 animal carcass by weight or volume, other than a canned meat product;
16 or a meat by-product.

17 (2) The legislature finds that the rationale of the *Agrilink*
18 decision, if applied to these tax preferences, could result in
19 preferential tax treatment for any processed food product that
20 contained any fresh fruit or vegetable as an ingredient, however small
21 the amount. Therefore, the legislature intends, by this act, to
22 provide direction on its policy regarding preferential tax treatment
23 for these activities.

24 (a) A business and occupation tax exemption is provided for (i)
25 manufacturing by canning, preserving, freezing, processing, or
26 dehydrating fresh fruits or vegetables, and (ii) selling such products
27 at wholesale by the manufacturer to purchasers who transport the goods
28 out of state in the ordinary course of business. This exemption
29 expires July 1, 2012, and is replaced by a preferential business and
30 occupation tax rate.

31 (b) The legislature intends to narrow the tax preference provided
32 to fruit and vegetable manufacturers by requiring that the end product
33 be comprised either (i) exclusively of fruits and/or vegetables, or
34 (ii) of any combination of fruits, vegetables, and certain other
35 substances that, cumulatively, may not exceed the amount of fruits and
36 vegetables contained in the product measured by weight or volume.

1 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 402.** A new section is added to chapter 82.04
2 RCW to read as follows:

3 (1) Upon every person engaging within this state in the business of
4 manufacturing:

5 (a) Perishable meat products, by slaughtering, breaking, or
6 processing, if the finished product is a perishable meat product; as to
7 such persons the tax imposed is equal to the value of the perishable
8 meat products manufactured, or, in the case of a processor for hire,
9 the gross income of the business, multiplied by the rate of 0.138
10 percent;

11 (b) Meat products, by dehydration, curing, smoking, or any
12 combination of these activities, if the finished meat products are not
13 canned; as to such persons the tax imposed is equal to the value of the
14 meat products manufactured, or, in the case of a processor for hire,
15 the gross income of the business, multiplied by the rate of 0.138
16 percent;

17 (c) Hides, tallow, meat meal, and other similar meat by-products,
18 if such products are derived in part from animals and manufactured in
19 a rendering plant licensed under chapter 16.68 RCW; as to such persons
20 the tax imposed is equal to the value of the products manufactured, or,
21 in the case of a processor for hire, the gross income of the business,
22 multiplied by the rate of 0.138 percent.

23 (2) Upon every person engaging within this state in the business of
24 selling at wholesale:

25 (a) Perishable meat products; as to such persons the tax imposed is
26 equal to the gross proceeds derived from such sales multiplied by the
27 rate of 0.138 percent;

28 (b) Meat products that have been manufactured by the seller by
29 dehydration, curing, smoking, or any combination of such activities, if
30 the finished meat products are not canned; as to such persons the tax
31 imposed is equal to the gross proceeds derived from such sales
32 multiplied by the rate of 0.138 percent;

33 (c) Hides, tallow, meat meal, and other similar meat by-products,
34 if such products are derived in part from animals and manufactured by
35 the seller in a rendering plant; as to such persons the tax imposed is
36 equal to the gross proceeds derived from such sales multiplied by the
37 rate of 0.138 percent.

1 (3) The definitions in this subsection apply throughout this
2 section unless the context clearly requires otherwise.

3 (a) "Animal" means all members of the animal kingdom except humans,
4 fish, and insects.

5 (b) "Carcass" means all or any parts, including viscera, of a
6 slaughtered animal.

7 (c) "Fish" means any water-breathing animal, including shellfish.

8 (d) "Hide" means any unprocessed animal pelt or skin.

9 (e)(i) "Meat products" means:

10 (A) Products comprised exclusively of animal carcass; and

11 (B) Except as provided in (e)(ii) of this subsection (3), products,
12 such as jerky, sausage, and other cured meat products, that are
13 comprised primarily of animal carcass by weight or volume and may also
14 contain water; nitrates; nitrites; acids; binders and extenders;
15 natural or synthetic casings; colorings; flavorings such as soy sauce,
16 liquid smoke, seasonings, citric acid, sugar, molasses, corn syrup, and
17 vinegar; and similar substances.

18 (ii) "Meat products" does not include products containing any
19 cereal grains or cereal-grain products, dairy products, legumes and
20 legume products, fruit or vegetable products as defined in RCW
21 82.04.260, and similar ingredients, unless the ingredient is used as a
22 flavoring. For purposes of this subsection, "flavoring" means a
23 substance that contains the flavoring constituents derived from a
24 spice, fruit or fruit juice, vegetable or vegetable juice, edible
25 yeast, herb, bark, bud, root, leaf, or any other edible substance of
26 plant origin, whose primary function in food is flavoring or seasoning
27 rather than nutritional, and which may legally appear as "natural
28 flavor," "flavor," or "flavorings" in the ingredient statement on the
29 label of the meat product.

30 (iii) "Meat products" includes only products that are intended for
31 human consumption as food or animal consumption as feed.

32 (f) "Perishable" means having a high risk of spoilage within thirty
33 days of manufacture without any refrigeration or freezing.

34 (g) "Rendering plant" means any place of business or location where
35 dead animals or any part or portion thereof, or packing house refuse,
36 are processed for the purpose of obtaining the hide, skin, grease
37 residue, or any other by-product whatsoever.

1 **Sec. 403.** RCW 82.04.4266 and 2006 c 354 s 3 are each amended to
2 read as follows:

3 (1) This chapter (~~shall~~) does not apply to the value of products
4 or the gross proceeds of sales derived from:

5 (a) Manufacturing fruit(~~s~~) or vegetable(~~s~~) products by canning,

32 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 501.** (1) The legislature recognizes that the
33 business and occupation tax applies to all activities engaged in with
34 the object of gain, benefit, or advantage to the taxpayer or to another

1 person or class, directly or indirectly, unless a specific exemption
2 applies.

3 (2) One of the major business and occupation tax exemptions is
4 provided in RCW 82.04.360 for income earned as an employee or servant
5 as distinguished from income earned as an independent contractor. The
6 legislature's intent in providing this exemption was to exempt employee
7 wages from the business and occupation tax but not to exempt income
8 earned as an independent contractor.

9 (3) The legislature finds that corporate directors are not
10 employees or servants of the corporation whose board they serve on and
11 therefore are not entitled to a business and occupation tax exemption
12 under RCW 82.04.360. The legislature further finds that there are no
13 business and occupation tax exemptions for compensation received for
14 serving as a member of a corporation's board of directors.

15 (4) The legislature also finds that there is a widespread
16 misunderstanding among corporate directors that the business and
17 occupation tax does not apply to the compensation they receive for
18 serving as a director of a corporation. It is the legislature's
19 expectation that the department of revenue will take appropriate
20 measures to ensure that corporate directors understand and comply with
21 their business and occupation tax obligations with respect to their
22 director compensation. However, because of the widespread
23 misunderstanding by corporate directors of their liability for business
24 and occupation tax on director compensation, the legislature finds that
25 it is appropriate in this unique situation to provide limited relief
26 against the retroactive assessment of business and occupation taxes on
27 corporate director compensation.

17 liability upon selling tangible personal property, digital goods,
18 digital codes, or digital automated services, or upon providing
19 facilities or other services for which a special charge is made to
20 members or others. If dues are in exchange for any significant amount
21 of goods or services rendered by the recipient thereof to members
22 without any additional charge to the member, or if the dues are
23 graduated upon the amount of goods or services rendered, the value of
24 such goods or services (~~(shall)~~) may not be considered as a deduction
25 under this section.

26 "Bona fide dues and initiation fees" means those amounts paid to
27 join or continue membership in an organization solely for the right to
28 associate with other members. Amounts paid to receive goods or
29 services in the future do not constitute bona fide dues or initiation
30 fees.

31 **PART XI**

32 **Limiting the Bad Debt Deduction**

33 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1101.** The legislature intends with sections
34 1102 and 1103 of this act to supersede the holding of the supreme court
35 of the state of Washington in *Puget Sound National Bank v. Department*

8 seller until the full purchase price is paid;

11 the third party is without recourse against the seller; and

12 (d) Repossessed property.

13 (3) If a credit or refund of sales tax is taken for a bad debt and

32 transaction that generated the bad debt or, as provided in subsection
33 (5) of this section, a certified service provider, is entitled to claim
34 a credit or refund under this section. If the original seller in the
35 transaction that generated the bad debt has sold or assigned the debt
36 instrument to a third party with recourse, the original seller may
37 claim a credit or refund under this section only after the debt
38 instrument is reassigned by the third party to the original seller.

1 **Sec. 1103.** RCW 82.12.037 and 2007 c 6 s 103 are each amended to

2 **Brokered Natural Gas**

3 **Sec. 1201.** RCW 82.12.010 and 2009 c 535 s 304 are each amended to
4 read as follows:

5 For the purposes of this chapter:

6 (1) "Purchase price" means the same as sales price as defined in
7 RCW 82.08.010;

8 (2)(a) "Value of the article used" (~~shall be~~) is the purchase
9 price for the article of tangible personal property, the use of which
10 is taxable under this chapter. The term also includes, in addition to
11 the purchase price, the amount of any tariff or duty paid with respect
12 to the importation of the article used. In case the article used is
13 acquired by lease or by gift or is extracted, produced, or manufactured
14 by the person using the same or is sold under conditions wherein the
15 purchase price does not represent the true value thereof, the value of
16 the article used (~~shall be~~) is determined as nearly as possible
17 according to the retail selling price at place of use of similar
18 products of like quality and character under such rules as the
19 department may prescribe.

20 (b) In case the articles used are acquired by bailment, the value
21 of the use of the articles so used (~~shall~~) must be in an amount
22 representing a reasonable rental for the use of the articles so bailed,
23 determined as nearly as possible according to the value of such use at
24 the places of use of similar products of like quality and character
25 under such rules as the department of revenue may prescribe. In case
26 any such articles of tangible personal property are used in respect to
27 the construction, repairing, decorating, or improving of, and which
28 become or are to become an ingredient or component of, new or existing
29 buildings or other structures under, upon, or above real property of or
30 for the United States, any instrumentality thereof, or a county or city
31 housing authority created pursuant to chapter 35.82 RCW, including the
32 installing or attaching of any such articles therein or thereto,
33 whether or not such personal property becomes a part of the realty by
34 virtue of installation, then the value of the use of such articles so
35 used (~~shall be~~) is determined according to the retail selling price
36 of such articles, or in the absence of such a selling price, as nearly
37 as possible according to the retail selling price at place of use of
38 similar products of like quality and character or, in the absence of

1 either of these selling price measures, such value may be determined
2 upon a cost basis, in any event under such rules as the department of
3 revenue may prescribe.

4 (c) In the case of articles owned by a user engaged in business
5 outside the state which are brought into the state for no more than one
6 hundred eighty days in any period of three hundred sixty-five
7 consecutive days and which are temporarily used for business purposes
8 by the person in this state, the value of the article used (~~shall~~)
9 must be an amount representing a reasonable rental for the use of the
10 articles, unless the person has paid tax under this chapter or chapter
11 82.08 RCW upon the full value of the article used, as defined in (a) of
12 this subsection.

13 (d) In the case of articles manufactured or produced by the user
14 and used in the manufacture or production of products sold or to be
15 sold to the department of defense of the United States, the value of

19 of serving as a prototype for the development of a new or improved
20 product, the value of the article used (~~shall be~~) is determined by:
21 (i) The retail selling price of such new or improved product when first
22 offered for sale; or (ii) the value of materials incorporated into the
23 prototype in cases in which the new or improved product is not offered
24 for sale.

25 (f) In the case of an article purchased with a direct pay permit
26 under RCW 82.32.087, the value of the article used (~~shall be~~) is
27 determined by the purchase price of such article if, but for the use of
28 the direct pay permit, the transaction would have been subject to sales
29 tax;

30 (3) "Value of the service used" means the purchase price for the
31 digital automated service or other service, the use of which is taxable
32 under this chapter. If the service is received by gift or under
33 conditions wherein the purchase price does not represent the true value
34 thereof, the value of the service used (~~shall~~) must be determined as
35 nearly as possible according to the retail selling price at place of
36 use of similar services of like quality and character under rules the
37 department may prescribe;

1 (4) "Value of the extended warranty used" means the purchase price
2 for the extended warranty, the use of which is taxable under this
3 chapter. If the extended warranty is received by gift or under
4 conditions wherein the purchase price does not represent the true value
5 of the extended warranty, the value of the extended warranty used
6 (~~shall~~) must be determined as nearly as possible according to the
7 retail selling price at place of use of similar extended warranties of
8 like quality and character under rules the department may prescribe;

9 (5) "Value of the digital good or digital code used" means the
10 purchase price for the digital good or digital code, the use of which
11 is taxable under this chapter. If the digital good or digital code is
12 acquired other than by purchase, the value of the digital good or
13 digital code must be determined as nearly as possible according to the
14 retail selling price at place of use of similar digital goods or
15 digital codes of like quality and character under rules the department
16 may prescribe;

17 (6) "Use," "used," "using," or "put to use" have their ordinary
18 meaning, and mean:

19 (a) With respect to tangible personal property, except for natural
20 gas and manufactured gas, the first act within this state by which the
21 taxpayer takes or assumes dominion or control over the article of
22 tangible personal property (as a consumer), and include installation,
23 storage, withdrawal from storage, distribution, or any other act
24 preparatory to subsequent actual use or consumption within this state;

25 (b) With respect to a service defined in RCW 82.04.050(2)(a), the
26 first act within this state after the service has been performed by
27 which the taxpayer takes or assumes dominion or control over the
28 article of tangible personal property upon which the service was
29 performed (as a consumer), and includes installation, storage,
30 withdrawal from storage, distribution, or any other act preparatory to
31 subsequent actual use or consumption of the article within this state;

32 (c) With respect to an extended warranty, the first act within this
33 state after the extended warranty has been acquired by which the
34 taxpayer takes or assumes dominion or control over the article of
35 tangible personal property to which the extended warranty applies, and
36 includes installation, storage, withdrawal from storage, distribution,
37 or any other act preparatory to subsequent actual use or consumption of
38 the article within this state;

1 (d) With respect to a digital good or digital code, the first act
2 within this state by which the taxpayer, as a consumer, views,
3 accesses, downloads, possesses, stores, opens, manipulates, or
4 otherwise uses or enjoys the digital good or digital code;

5 (e) With respect to a digital automated service, the first act
6 within this state by which the taxpayer, as a consumer, uses, enjoys,
7 or otherwise receives the benefit of the service;

8 (f) With respect to a service defined as a retail sale in RCW
9 82.04.050(6)(b), the first act within this state by which the taxpayer,
10 as a consumer, accesses the prewritten computer software; (~~and~~)

11 (g) With respect to a service defined as a retail sale in RCW
12 82.04.050(2)(g), the first act within this state after the service has
13 been performed by which the taxpayer, as a consumer, views, accesses,
14 downloads, possesses, stores, opens, manipulates, or otherwise uses or
15 enjoys the digital good upon which the service was performed; and

16 (h) With respect to natural gas or manufactured gas, the use of
17 which is taxable under RCW 82.12.022, including gas that is also
18 taxable under the authority of RCW 82.14.230, the first act within this
19 state by which the taxpayer consumes the gas by burning the gas or
20 storing the gas in the taxpayer's own facilities for later consumption
21 by the taxpayer;

22 (7) "Taxpayer" and "purchaser" include all persons included within
23 the meaning of the word "buyer" and the word "consumer" as defined in
24 chapters 82.04 and 82.08 RCW;

25 (8)(a)(i) Except as provided in (a)(ii) of this subsection (8),
26 "retailer" means every seller as defined in RCW 82.08.010 and every
27 person engaged in the business of selling tangible personal property at
28 retail and every person required to collect from purchasers the tax
29 imposed under this chapter.

30 (ii) "Retailer" does not include a professional employer
31 organization when a covered employee coemployed with the client under
32 the terms of a professional employer agreement engages in activities
33 that constitute a sale of tangible personal property, extended
34 warranty, digital good, digital code, or a sale of any digital
35 automated service or service defined as a retail sale in RCW 82.04.050
36 (2)(a) or (g), (3)(a), or (6)(b) that is subject to the tax imposed by
37 this chapter. In such cases, the client, and not the professional

1 employer organization, is deemed to be the retailer and is responsible
2 for collecting and remitting the tax imposed by this chapter.

3 (b) For the purposes of (a) of this subsection, the terms "client,"
4 "covered employee," "professional employer agreement," and
5 "professional employer organization" have the same meanings as in RCW
6 82.04.540;

7 (9) "Extended warranty" has the same meaning as in RCW
8 82.04.050(7);

9 (10) The meaning ascribed to words and phrases in chapters 82.04
10 and 82.08 RCW, insofar as applicable, shall have full force and effect
11 with respect to taxes imposed under the provisions of this chapter.
12 "Consumer," in addition to the meaning ascribed to it in chapters 82.04
13 and 82.08 RCW insofar as applicable, shall also mean any person who
14 distributes or displays, or causes to be distributed or displayed, any
15 article of tangible personal property, except newspapers, the primary
16 purpose of which is to promote the sale of products or services. With
17 respect to property distributed to persons within this state by a
18 consumer as defined in this subsection (10), the use of the property
19 shall be deemed to be by such consumer.

20 **Sec. 1202.** RCW 82.14.230 and 1989 c 384 s 2 are each amended to

34 (3) The tax imposed under this section (~~(shall)~~) does not apply to
35 the use of natural or manufactured gas if the person who sold the gas
36 to the consumer has paid a tax under RCW 35.21.870 with respect to the
37 gas for which exemption is sought under this subsection.

1 (4) There (~~shall be~~) is a credit against the tax levied under
2 this section in an amount equal to any tax paid by:

3 (a) The person who sold the gas to the consumer when that tax is a
4 gross receipts tax similar to that imposed pursuant to RCW 35.21.870 by
5 another (~~state~~) municipality or other unit of local government with
6 respect to the gas for which a credit is sought under this subsection;
7 or

8 (b) The person consuming the gas upon which a use tax similar to
9 the tax imposed by this section was paid to another (~~state~~)
10 municipality or other unit of local government with respect to the gas
11 for which a credit is sought under this subsection.

12 (5) The use tax (~~hereby~~) imposed (~~shall~~) must be paid by the
13 consumer. The administration and collection of the tax (~~hereby~~)
14 imposed (~~shall be~~) is pursuant to RCW 82.14.050.

16 Limiting Community Solar Incentives

17 **Sec. 1301.** RCW 82.16.110 and 2009 c 469 s 504 are each amended to
18 read as follows:

19 The definitions in this section apply throughout this chapter
20 unless the context clearly requires otherwise.

21 (1)(a) "Community solar project" means:

22 (i) A solar energy system that is capable of generating up to
23 seventy-five kilowatts of electricity and is owned by local
24 individuals, households, nonprofit organizations, or nonutility
25 businesses that is placed on the property owned by a cooperating local
26 governmental entity that is not in the light and power business or in
27 the gas distribution business; or

28 (ii) A utility-owned solar energy system that is capable of
29 generating up to seventy-five kilowatts of electricity and that is
30 voluntarily funded by the utility's ratepayers where, in exchange for
31 their financial support, the utility gives contributors a payment or
32 credit on their utility bill for the value of the electricity produced
33 by the project.

34 (b) For the purposes of "community solar project" as defined in (a)
35 of this subsection:

1 (i) "Nonprofit organization" means an organization exempt from
2 taxation under Title 26 U.S.C. Sec. 501(c)(3) of the federal internal
3 revenue code of 1986, as amended, as of January 1, 2009; and

4 (ii) "Utility" means a light and power business, an electric
5 cooperative, or a mutual corporation that provides electricity service.

6 (2) "Customer-generated electricity" means a community solar
7 project or the alternating current electricity that is generated from
8 a renewable energy system located in Washington and installed on an
9 individual's, businesses', or local government's real property that is
10 also provided electricity generated by a light and power business.
11 Except for community solar projects, a system located on a leasehold
12 interest does not qualify under this definition. Except for utility-
13 owned community solar projects, "customer-generated electricity" does
14 not include electricity generated by a light and power business with
15 greater than one thousand megawatt hours of annual sales or a gas
16 distribution business.

17 (3) "Economic development kilowatt-hour" means the actual kilowatt-
18 hour measurement of customer-generated electricity multiplied by the
19 appropriate economic development factor.

20 (4) "Local governmental entity" means any unit of local government
21 of this state including, but not limited to, counties, cities, towns,
22 municipal corporations, quasi-municipal corporations, special purpose
23 districts, and school districts.

24 (5) "Photovoltaic cell" means a device that converts light directly
25 into electricity without moving parts.

26 (6) "Renewable energy system" means a solar energy system, an
27 anaerobic digester as defined in RCW 82.08.900, or a wind generator
28 used for producing electricity.

29 (7) "Solar energy system" means any device or combination of
30 devices or elements that rely upon direct sunlight as an energy source
31 for use in the generation of electricity.

32 (8) "Solar inverter" means the device used to convert direct
33 current to alternating current in a photovoltaic cell system.

34 (9) "Solar module" means the smallest nondivisible self-contained
35 physical structure housing interconnected photovoltaic cells and
36 providing a single direct current electrical output.

1 **PART XIV**

2 **Livestock Nutrients**

3 **Sec. 1401.** RCW 82.08.890 and 2009 c 469 s 601 are each amended to
4 read as follows:

5 (1) Except for sales made between July 1, 2010, and June 30, 2013,
6 the tax levied by RCW 82.08.020 does not apply to sales to eligible
7 persons of:

8 (a) Qualifying livestock nutrient management equipment;

9 (b) Labor and services rendered in respect to installing,
10 repairing, cleaning, altering, or improving qualifying livestock
11 nutrient management equipment; and

12 (c)(i) Labor and services rendered in respect to repairing,
13 cleaning, altering, or improving of qualifying livestock nutrient
14 management facilities, or to tangible personal property that becomes an
15 ingredient or component of qualifying livestock nutrient management
16 facilities in the course of repairing, cleaning, altering, or improving
17 of such facilities.

18 (ii) The exemption provided in this subsection (1)(c) does not
19 apply to the sale of or charge made for: (A) Labor and services
20 rendered in respect to the constructing of new, or replacing previously
21 existing, qualifying livestock nutrient management facilities; or (B)
22 tangible personal property that becomes an ingredient or component of
23 qualifying livestock nutrient management facilities during the course
24 of constructing new, or replacing previously existing, qualifying
25 livestock nutrient management facilities.

26 (2) The exemption provided in subsection (1) of this section
27 applies to sales made after the livestock nutrient management plan is:

28 (a) Certified under chapter 90.64 RCW; (b) approved as part of the
29 permit issued under chapter 90.48 RCW; or (c) approved as required
30 under subsection (4)(c)(iii) of this section.

31 (3)(a) The department of revenue must provide an exemption
32 certificate to an eligible person upon application by that person. The
33 department of agriculture must provide a list of eligible persons, as
34 defined in subsection (4)(c)(i) and (ii) of this section, to the
35 department of revenue. Conservation districts must maintain lists of
36 eligible persons as defined in subsection (4)(c)(iii) of this section
37 to allow the department of revenue to verify eligibility. The
38 application must be in a form and manner prescribed by the department

1 and must contain information regarding the location of the dairy or
2 animal feeding operation and other information the department may
3 require.

4 (b) A person claiming an exemption under this section must keep
5 records necessary for the department to verify eligibility under this
6 section. The exemption is available only when the buyer provides the
7 seller with an exemption certificate in a form and manner prescribed by
8 the department. The seller must retain a copy of the certificate for
9 the seller's files.

10 (4) The definitions in this subsection apply to this section and
11 RCW 82.12.890 unless the context clearly requires otherwise:

12 (a) "Animal feeding operation" means a lot or facility, other than
13 an aquatic animal production facility, where the following conditions
14 are met:

15 (i) Animals, other than aquatic animals, have been, are, or will be
16 stabled or confined and fed or maintained for a total of forty-five
17 days or more in any twelve-month period; and

18 (ii) Crops, vegetation, forage growth, or postharvest residues are
19 not sustained in the normal growing season over any portion of the lot
20 or facility.

21 (b) "Conservation district" means a subdivision of state government
22 organized under chapter 89.08 RCW.

23 (c) "Eligible person" means a person: (i) Licensed to produce milk
24 under chapter 15.36 RCW who has a certified dairy nutrient management
25 plan, as required by chapter 90.64 RCW; (ii) who owns an animal feeding
26 operation and has a permit issued under chapter 90.48 RCW; or (iii) who
27 owns an animal feeding operation and has a nutrient management plan
28 approved by a conservation district as meeting natural resource
29 conservation service field office technical guide standards and who
30 possesses an exemption certificate under RCW 82.08.855.

31 (d) "Handling and treatment of livestock manure" means the
32 activities of collecting, storing, moving, or transporting livestock
33 manure, separating livestock manure solids from liquids, or applying
34 livestock manure to the agricultural lands of an eligible person other
35 than through the use of pivot or linear type traveling irrigation
36 systems.

37 (e) "Permit" means either a state waste discharge permit or a
38 national pollutant discharge elimination system permit, or both.

1 (f) "Qualifying livestock nutrient management equipment" means the
2 following tangible personal property for exclusive use in the handling
3 and treatment of livestock manure, including repair and replacement
4 parts for such equipment: (i) Aerators; (ii) agitators; (iii) augers;
5 (iv) conveyers; (v) gutter cleaners; (vi) hard-hose reel traveler
6 irrigation systems; (vii) lagoon and pond liners and floating covers;
7 (viii) loaders; (ix) manure composting devices; (x) manure spreaders;
8 (xi) manure tank wagons; (xii) manure vacuum tanks; (xiii) poultry
9 house cleaners; (xiv) poultry house flame sterilizers; (xv) poultry
10 house washers; (xvi) poultry litter saver machines; (xvii) pipes;
11 (xviii) pumps; (xix) scrapers; (xx) separators; (xxi) slurry injectors
12 and hoses; and (xxii) wheelbarrows, shovels, and pitchforks.

13 (g) "Qualifying livestock nutrient management facilities" means the
14 following structures and facilities for exclusive use in the handling
15 and treatment of livestock manure: (i) Flush systems; (ii) lagoons;
16 (iii) liquid livestock manure storage structures, such as concrete
17 tanks or glass-lined steel tanks; and (iv) structures used solely for
18 the dry storage of manure, including roofed stacking facilities.

19 **Sec. 1402.** RCW 82.12.890 and 2009 c 469 s 602 are each amended to
20 read as follows:

21 (1) The provisions of this chapter do not apply with respect to the
22 use by an eligible person of:

- 23 (a) Qualifying livestock nutrient management equipment;
- 24 (b) Labor and services rendered in respect to installing,
25 repairing, cleaning, altering, or improving qualifying livestock
26 nutrient management equipment; and
- 27 (c)(i) Tangible personal property that becomes an ingredient or
28 component of qualifying livestock nutrient management facilities in the
29 course of repairing, cleaning, altering, or improving of such
30 facilities.

31 (ii) The exemption provided in this subsection (1)(c) does not
32 apply to the use of tangible personal property that becomes an
33 ingredient or component of qualifying livestock nutrient management
34 facilities during the course of constructing new, or replacing
35 previously existing, qualifying livestock nutrient management
36 facilities.

1 (2)(a) To be eligible, the equipment and facilities must be used
2 exclusively for activities necessary to maintain a livestock nutrient
3 management plan.

Repealing the Sales and Use Tax Exemption on Bottled Water

Sec. 1901. RCW 82.08.0293 and 2009 c 483 s 2 are each amended to read as follows:

(1) The tax levied by RCW 82.08.020 (~~shall~~) does not apply to sales of food and food ingredients. "Food and food ingredients" means substances, whether in liquid, concentrated, solid, frozen, dried, or dehydrated form, that are sold for ingestion or chewing by humans and are consumed for their taste or nutritional value. "Food and food ingredients" does not include:

(a) "Alcoholic beverages," which means beverages that are suitable for human consumption and contain one-half of one percent or more of alcohol by volume; and

(b) "Tobacco," which means cigarettes, cigars, chewing or pipe tobacco, or any other item that contains tobacco.

(2) The exemption of "food and food ingredients" provided for in subsection (1) of this section (~~shall~~) does not apply to prepared food, soft drinks, bottled water, or dietary supplements.

(a) "Prepared food" means:

(i) Food sold in a heated state or heated by the seller;

(ii) Food sold with eating utensils provided by the seller, including plates, knives, forks, spoons, glasses, cups, napkins, or straws. A plate does not include a container or packaging used to transport the food; or

(iii) Two or more food ingredients mixed or combined by the seller for sale as a single item, except:

(A) Food that is only cut, repackaged, or pasteurized by the seller; or

(B) Raw eggs, fish, meat, poultry, and foods containing these raw animal foods requiring cooking by the consumer as recommended by the federal food and drug administration in chapter 3, part 401.11 of The Food Code, published by the food and drug administration, as amended or renumbered as of January 1, 2003, so as to prevent foodborne illness.

(b) "Prepared food" does not include the following food or food ingredients, if the food or food ingredients are sold without eating utensils provided by the seller:

(i) Food sold by a seller whose proper primary North American

1 industry classification system (NAICS) classification is manufacturing
2 in sector 311, except subsector 3118 (bakeries), as provided in the
3 "North American industry classification system--United States, 2002";

4 (ii) Food sold in an unheated state by weight or volume as a single
5 item; or

6 (iii) Bakery items. The term "bakery items" includes bread, rolls,
7 buns, biscuits, bagels, croissants, pastries, donuts, Danish, cakes,
8 tortes, pies, tarts, muffins, bars, cookies, or tortillas.

9 (c) "Soft drinks" means nonalcoholic beverages that contain natural
10 or artificial sweeteners. Soft drinks do not include beverages that
11 contain: Milk or milk products; soy, rice, or similar milk
12 substitutes; or greater than fifty percent of vegetable or fruit juice
13 by volume.

14 (d) "Dietary supplement" means any product, other than tobacco,
15 intended to supplement the diet that:

16 (i) Contains one or more of the following dietary ingredients:

17 (A) A vitamin;

18 (B) A mineral;

19 (C) An herb or other botanical;

20 (D) An amino acid;

21 (E) A dietary substance for use by humans to supplement the diet by
22 increasing the total dietary intake; or

23 (F) A concentrate, metabolite, constituent, extract, or combination
24 of any ingredient described in this subsection;

25 (ii) Is intended for ingestion in tablet, capsule, powder, softgel,
26 gelcap, or liquid form, or if not intended for ingestion in such form,
27 is not represented as conventional food and is not represented for use
28 as a sole item of a meal or of the diet; and

29 (iii) Is required to be labeled as a dietary supplement,
30 identifiable by the "supplement facts" box found on the label as
31 required pursuant to 21 C.F.R. Sec. 101.36, as amended or renumbered as
32 of January 1, 2003.

33 (e) "Bottled water" means water that is placed in a sealed
34 container or package for human consumption or other consumer uses.
35 Bottled water is calorie free and does not contain sweeteners or other
36 additives except that it may contain: (i) Antimicrobial agents; (ii)
37 fluoride; (iii) carbonation; (iv) vitamins, minerals, and electrolytes;
38 (v) oxygen; (vi) preservatives; and (vii) only those flavors, extracts,

1 or essences derived from a spice or fruit. "Bottled water" includes
2 water that is delivered to the buyer in a reusable container that is
3 not sold with the water.

4 (3) Notwithstanding anything in this section to the contrary, the
5 exemption of "food and food ingredients" provided in this section shall
6 apply to food and food ingredients that are furnished, prepared, or
7 served as meals:

8 (a) Under a state administered nutrition program for the aged as
9 provided for in the Older Americans Act (P.L. 95-478 Title III) and RCW
10 74.38.040(6);

11 (b) That are provided to senior citizens, individuals with
12 disabilities, or low-income persons by a not-for-profit organization
13 organized under chapter 24.03 or 24.12 RCW; or

14 (c) That are provided to residents, sixty-two years of age or
15 older, of a qualified low-income senior housing facility by the lessor
16 or operator of the facility. The sale of a meal that is billed to both
17 spouses of a marital community or both domestic partners of a domestic
18 partnership meets the age requirement in this subsection (3)(c) if at
19 least one of the spouses or domestic partners is at least sixty-two
20 years of age. For purposes of this subsection, "qualified low-income
21 senior housing facility" means a facility:

23 project under ((Title)) 26 U.S.C. Sec. 42 of the federal internal
24 revenue code, as existing on August 1, 2009;

18 enough annually to keep pace with increasing health care, child care,
19 and work-related expenses. The legislature further finds that revenues

21 safety, health care, and safety net services for elderly, disabled, and
22 vulnerable people during the unprecedented economic crisis in the 2009-
23 2011 fiscal biennium. Therefore, it is the intent of the legislature
24 to provide a means to stabilize revenue collections by imposing a
25 temporary sales and use tax. It is also the legislature's intent to
26 provide relief to lower-income working families in Washington in the
27 form of a sales and use tax exemption.

29 read as follows:

30 (1) There is levied and (~~there shall be~~) collected a tax on each
31 retail sale in this state equal to six and five-tenths percent of the
32 selling price.

34 tax on each retail car rental, regardless of whether the vehicle is
35 licensed in this state, equal to five and nine-tenths percent of the

30 **Miscellaneous Provisions**

31 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2201.** (1) Except as provided in subsection (2)
32 of this section, if any provision of sections 101 through 110 of this
33 act or its application to any person or circumstance is held invalid,
34 the remainder of sections 101 through 110 of this act or the

1 application of the provision to other persons or circumstances is not
2 affected.

3 (2) If a court of competent jurisdiction, in a final judgment not
4 subject to appeal, adjudges any provision of section 104(1)(c) of this
5 act unconstitutional or otherwise invalid, sections 101 through 110 of
6 this act are null and void in their entirety.

7 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2202.** Sections 101 through 110 of this act
8 apply with respect to gross income of the business, as defined in RCW
9 82.04.080, including gross income from royalties as defined in RCW
10 82.04.2907, generated on and after July 1, 2010. For purposes of
11 calculating the thresholds in section 104(1)(c) of this act for the
12 2010 tax year, property, payroll, and receipts are based on the entire
13 2010 tax year.

14 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2203.** Sections 201 through 212 of this act must
15 be construed liberally to effectuate the legislature's intent to ensure
16 that all businesses and individuals pay their fair share of taxes.

1 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2208.** Sections 301, 302, and 2205 of this act
2 are necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace,
3 health, or safety, or support of the state government and its existing
4 public institutions, and take effect immediately.

5 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2209.** Except for sections 301, 302, 406, 2103,
6 and 2205 of this act, this act is necessary for the immediate
7 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the
8 state government and its existing public institutions, and takes effect
9 June 1, 2010.

10 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2210.** Section 405 of this act expires July 1,
11 2011.

12 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2211.** Section 406 of this act takes effect July
13 1, 2011.

14 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2212.** Sections 1102 and 1103 of this act apply
15 to claims for credit or refund filed with the department of revenue
16 after June 30, 2010.

17 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2213.** Section 1501 of this act applies
18 prospectively only.

19 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2214.** Section 2102 of this act expires January
20 1, 2011.

21 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2215.** Section 2103 of this act takes effect
22 January 1, 2011.

23 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2216.** Sections 1901 through 1904 of this act
24 expire June 1, 2015.

25 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2217.** In accordance with Article VIII, section
26 5 of the state Constitution, sections 502 and 2205 of this act do not
27 authorize refunds of business and occupation tax validly collected
28 before July 1, 2010, on amounts received by an individual from a

1 corporation as compensation for serving as a member of that
2 corporation's board of directors.

3 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2218.** If any provision of this act or its
4 application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the
5 remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other
6 persons or circumstances is not affected.

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
