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HOUSE BILL 1369

State of Washington 63rd Legislature 2013 Regular Session

By Representatives Lytton, Walsh, Kagi, Maxwell, and Tharinger; by request of Superintendent of Public Instruction

Read first time 01/24/13. Referred to Committee on Education.

- AN ACT Relating to using school days for meeting with parents and families as part of the Washington inventory of developing skills;
- 3 amending RCW 28A.150.220; and creating a new section.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 5 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. The legislature finds that one of the most valuable components of the Washington kindergarten inventory of 6 7 developing skills is the opportunity for teachers to meet individually with parents and families at the beginning of the school year. 8 9 meetings allow teachers to learn about individual children and their 10 families and help the parents and family to get to know the teacher and 11 what will be expected in the classroom. These meetings are approximately thirty to sixty minutes in length and, for a class of 12 13 twenty-five students, take approximately three to five days to conduct. 14 The legislature further finds that with the increase in instructional 15 time in state-funded full-day kindergarten from four hundred fifty 16 hours to one thousand hours, there is added time for these critical teacher-parent conferences to occur. It is therefore the intent of the 17 18 legislature to allow school districts to use up to five days of the

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school year in state-funded full-day kindergarten schools for the purpose of the family connection component of WaKIDS.

- Sec. 2. RCW 28A.150.220 and 2011 1st sp.s. c 27 s 1 are each amended to read as follows:
- (1) In order for students to have the opportunity to develop the basic education knowledge and skills under RCW 28A.150.210, school districts must provide instruction of sufficient quantity and quality and give students the opportunity to complete graduation requirements that are intended to prepare them for postsecondary education, gainful employment, and citizenship. The program established under this section shall be the minimum instructional program of basic education offered by school districts.
- (2) Each school district shall make available to students the following minimum instructional offering each school year:
- (a) For students enrolled in grades one through twelve, at least a district-wide annual average of one thousand hours, which shall be increased to at least one thousand eighty instructional hours for students enrolled in each of grades seven through twelve and at least one thousand instructional hours for students in each of grades one through six according to an implementation schedule adopted by the legislature, but not before the 2014-15 school year; and
- (b) For students enrolled in kindergarten, at least four hundred fifty instructional hours, which shall be increased to at least one thousand instructional hours according to the implementation schedule under RCW 28A.150.315.
 - (3) The instructional program of basic education provided by each school district shall include:
 - (a) Instruction in the essential academic learning requirements under RCW 28A.655.070;
 - (b) Instruction that provides students the opportunity to complete twenty-four credits for high school graduation, subject to a phased-in implementation of the twenty-four credits as established by the legislature. Course distribution requirements may be established by the state board of education under RCW 28A.230.090;
- 35 (c) If the essential academic learning requirements include a 36 requirement of languages other than English, the requirement may be met

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by students receiving instruction in one or more American Indian
languages;

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- (d) Supplemental instruction and services for underachieving students through the learning assistance program under RCW 28A.165.005 through 28A.165.065;
- (e) Supplemental instruction and services for eligible and enrolled students whose primary language is other than English through the transitional bilingual instruction program under RCW 28A.180.010 through 28A.180.080;
- (f) The opportunity for an appropriate education at public expense as defined by RCW 28A.155.020 for all eligible students with disabilities as defined in RCW 28A.155.020; and
- 13 (g) Programs for highly capable students under RCW 28A.185.010 14 through 28A.185.030.
 - (4) Nothing contained in this section shall be construed to require individual students to attend school for any particular number of hours per day or to take any particular courses.
 - (5) Each school district's kindergarten through twelfth grade basic educational program shall be accessible to all students who are five years of age, as provided by RCW 28A.225.160, and less than twenty-one years of age and shall consist of a minimum of one hundred eighty school days per school year in such grades as are conducted by a school district, and one hundred eighty half-days of instruction, equivalent, in kindergarten, to be increased to a minimum of one hundred eighty school days per school year according to the implementation schedule under RCW 28A.150.315. However, <u>schools</u> administering the Washington kindergarten inventory of developing skills may use up to five school days at the beginning of the school year to meet with parents and families as required in the parent involvement component of the inventory. In addition, effective May 1, 1979, a school district may schedule the last five school days of the one hundred and eighty day school year for noninstructional purposes in the case of students who are graduating from high school, including, but not limited to, the observance of graduation and early release from school upon the request of a student, and all such students may be claimed as a full-time equivalent student to the extent they could otherwise have been so claimed for the purposes of RCW 28A.150.250 and 28A.150.260.

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(6) Nothing in this section precludes a school district from enriching the instructional program of basic education, such as offering additional instruction or providing additional services, programs, or activities that the school district determines to be appropriate for the education of the school district's students.

(7) The state board of education shall adopt rules to implement and ensure compliance with the program requirements imposed by this section, RCW 28A.150.250 and 28A.150.260, and such related supplemental program approval requirements as the state board may establish.

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
