1 AN ACT Relating to reducing tuition; amending RCW 28B.15.031,
2 28B.15.066, 28B.15.067, and 28B.15.069; reenacting and amending RCW
3 28B.95.020 and 28B.95.030; adding a new section to chapter 28B.92
4 RCW; creating a new section; and repealing RCW 28B.15.068 and
5 28B.15.102.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

7 **Sec. 1.** RCW 28B.15.031 and 2012 c 230 s 6 are each amended to
8 read as follows:

9 (1) The term "operating fees" as used in this chapter shall
10 include the fees, other than building fees, charged all students
11 registering at the state's colleges and universities but shall not
12 include fees for short courses, self-supporting degree credit
13 programs and courses, marine station work, experimental station work,
14 correspondence or extension courses, and individual instruction and
15 student deposits or rentals, disciplinary and library fines, which
16 colleges and universities shall have the right to impose, laboratory,
17 gymnasium, health, technology and student activity fees, or fees,
18 charges, rentals, and other income derived from any or all revenue
19 producing lands, buildings and facilities of the colleges or
20 universities heretofore or hereafter acquired, constructed or
21 installed, including but not limited to income from rooms,

1 dormitories, dining rooms, hospitals, infirmaries, housing or student
2 activity buildings, vehicular parking facilities, land, or the
3 appurtenances thereon, or such other special fees as may be
4 established by any college or university board of trustees or regents
5 from time to time. All moneys received as operating fees at any
6 institution of higher education shall be deposited in a local account
7 containing only operating fees revenue and related interest:
8 PROVIDED, That (~~a minimum of five percent of operating fees shall be~~
9 ~~retained by the four-year institutions of higher education that~~
10 ~~increase tuition for resident undergraduate students above assumed~~
11 ~~tuition increases in the omnibus appropriations act,~~) a minimum of
12 four percent of operating fees shall be retained by four-year
13 institutions of higher education (~~that do not increase tuition for~~
14 ~~resident undergraduates above assumed increases in the omnibus~~
15 ~~appropriations act,~~) and a minimum of three and one-half percent of
16 operating fees shall be retained by the community and technical
17 colleges for the purposes of RCW 28B.15.820. At least thirty percent
18 of operating fees required to be retained by the four-year
19 institutions for purposes of RCW 28B.15.820 shall be used only for
20 the purposes of RCW 28B.15.820(10).

21 (2) In addition to the three and one-half percent of operating
22 fees retained by the institutions under subsection (1) of this
23 section, up to three percent of operating fees charged to students at
24 community and technical colleges shall be transferred to the
25 community and technical college innovation account for the
26 implementation of the college board's strategic technology plan in
27 RCW 28B.50.515. The percentage to be transferred to the community and
28 technical college innovation account shall be determined by the
29 college board each year but shall not exceed three percent of the
30 operating fees collected each year.

31 (3) Local operating fee accounts shall not be subject to
32 appropriation by the legislature but shall be subject to allotment
33 procedures by budget program and fiscal year under chapter 43.88 RCW.

34 **Sec. 2.** RCW 28B.15.066 and 2003 c 232 s 3 are each amended to
35 read as follows:

36 (~~It is the intent of the legislature that:~~
37 ~~In making appropriations from the state's general fund to~~
38 ~~institutions of higher education, each appropriation shall conform to~~

1 ~~(1) The appropriation shall not be reduced by the amount of~~

14 ~~28B.15.915-.)~~ (1) Beginning with the 2015-2017 omnibus appropriations
15 act, the legislature shall appropriate to the state board for
16 community and technical colleges and to each of the four-year
17 institutions of higher education an amount that is at least equal to
18 the total state funds appropriated in the 2013-2015 biennium and the
19 net revenue loss from resident undergraduate tuition operating fees
20 based on budgeted full-time equivalent enrollment received for the
21 2015-2017 fiscal biennium under RCW 28B.15.067 (3) and (6), each
22 adjusted for inflation in subsequent biennia.

23 (2) As used in this section and RCW 28B.15.069, "inflation" shall
24 be based on the consumer price index, using the official current
25 base, compiled by the bureau of labor statistics, United States
26 department of labor for the state of Washington. If the bureau of
27 labor statistics develops more than one consumer price index for
28 areas within the state, the index covering the greatest number of
29 people and covering areas exclusively within the boundaries of the
30 state shall be used.

31 **Sec. 3.** RCW 28B.15.067 and 2013 2nd sp.s. c 4 s 958 are each
32 amended to read as follows:

33 (1) Tuition fees shall be established under the provisions of
34 this chapter.

35 (2) Beginning in the 2011-12 academic year and through the
36 2014-15 academic year, reductions or increases in full-time tuition
37 fees shall be as provided in the omnibus appropriations act for
38 resident undergraduate students at community and technical colleges.

1 (3)(a) As specified in the omnibus appropriations act, in the
2 2015-16 academic year, full-time tuition operating fees for resident
3 undergraduates at community and technical colleges shall be no more
4 than the 2014-15 tuition operating fee and no less than six percent
5 of the state's average wage as defined in RCW 50.04.355.

6 (b) Beginning in the 2016-17 academic year, full-time tuition
7 operating fees for resident undergraduates at community and technical
8 colleges shall be six percent of the state's average wage as defined
9 in RCW 50.04.355.

10 (4) The governing boards of the state universities, regional
11 universities, and The Evergreen State College; and the state board
12 for community and technical colleges may reduce or increase full-time
13 tuition fees for all students other than resident undergraduates,
14 including nonresident students, summer school students, and students
15 in other self-supporting degree programs. Percentage increases in
16 full-time tuition may exceed the fiscal growth factor. Except during
17 the 2013-2015 fiscal biennium, the state board for community and
18 technical colleges may pilot or institute differential tuition
19 models. The board may define scale, scope, and rationale for the
20 models.

21 ~~((3))~~ (5)(a) Beginning with the 2011-12 academic year and
22 through the end of the 2014-15 academic year, the governing boards of
23 the state universities, the regional universities, and The Evergreen
24 State College may reduce or increase full-time tuition fees for all
25 students, including summer school students and students in other
26 self-supporting degree programs. Percentage increases in full-time
27 tuition fees may exceed the fiscal growth factor. Reductions or
28 increases may be made for all or portions of an institution's
29 programs, campuses, courses, or students; however, during the
30 2013-2015 fiscal biennium, reductions or increases in tuition must be
31 uniform among resident undergraduate students.

32 (b) Prior to reducing or increasing tuition for each academic
33 year, the governing boards of the state universities, the regional
34 universities, and The Evergreen State College shall consult with
35 existing student associations or organizations with student
36 undergraduate and graduate representatives regarding the impacts of
37 potential tuition increases. Each governing board shall make public
38 its proposal for tuition and fee increases twenty-one days before the
39 governing board of the institution considers adoption and allow
40 opportunity for public comment. However, the requirement to make

1 public a proposal for tuition and fee increases twenty-one days
2 before the governing board considers adoption shall not apply if the
3 omnibus appropriations act has not passed the legislature by May
4 15th. Governing boards shall be required to provide data regarding
5 the percentage of students receiving financial aid, the sources of
6 aid, and the percentage of total costs of attendance paid for by aid.

7 (c) Prior to reducing or increasing tuition for each academic
8 year, the state board for community and technical college system
9 shall consult with existing student associations or organizations
10 with undergraduate student representation regarding the impacts of
11 potential tuition increases. The state board for community and
12 technical colleges shall provide data regarding the percentage of
13 students receiving financial aid, the sources of aid, and the
14 percentage of total costs of attendance paid for by aid.

16 ~~((through the 2018-19 academic year, the governing boards of the
17 state universities, regional universities, and The Evergreen State
18 College may set tuition for resident undergraduates as follows:~~

20 state funding provided in the operating budget for fiscal year 2011,
21 the governing board may increase tuition up to the limits set in (d)
22 of this subsection, reduce enrollments, or both;~~

23 ~~(b) If state funding for a college or university is at least at
24 the level of state funding provided in the operating budget for
25 fiscal year 2011, the governing board may increase tuition up to the
26 limits set in (d) of this subsection and shall continue to at least
27 maintain the actual enrollment levels for fiscal year 2011 or
28 increase enrollments as required in the omnibus appropriations act;~~

29 ~~(c) If state funding is increased so that combined with resident
30 undergraduate tuition the sixtieth percentile of the total per-
31 student funding at similar public institutions of higher education in

34 total per student funding to be at the sixtieth percentile under RCW

39 institutions of higher education in the global challenge states.~~

2 undergraduates shall be provided in the omnibus appropriations act
3 and for:

4 (i) State universities shall be no more than the 2014-15 tuition
5 operating fee and no less than fourteen percent of the state's
6 average wage as defined in RCW 50.04.355; and

7 (ii) Regional universities and The Evergreen State College shall
8 be no more than the 2014-15 tuition operating fee and no less than
9 ten percent of the state's average wage as defined in RCW 50.04.355.

10 (b) Beginning with the 2016-17 academic year, full-time tuition
11 operating fees for resident undergraduates at state universities
12 shall be fourteen percent of the state's average wage as defined in
13 RCW 50.04.355 and full-time tuition operating fees for resident
14 undergraduates at regional universities and The Evergreen State
15 College shall be ten percent of the state's average wage as defined
16 in RCW 50.04.355.

17 (7) The tuition fees established under this chapter shall not
18 apply to high school students enrolling in participating institutions
19 of higher education under RCW 28A.600.300 through 28A.600.400.

20 ~~((6))~~ (8) The tuition fees established under this chapter shall
21 not apply to eligible students enrolling in a dropout reengagement
22 program through an interlocal agreement between a school district and
23 a community or technical college under RCW 28A.175.100 through
24 28A.175.110.

25 ~~((7))~~ (9) The tuition fees established under this chapter shall
26 not apply to eligible students enrolling in a community or technical
27 college participating in the pilot program under RCW 28B.50.534 for
28 the purpose of obtaining a high school diploma.

29 ~~((8) Beginning in the 2019-20 academic year, reductions or~~
30 ~~increases in full-time tuition fees for resident undergraduates at~~
31 ~~four-year institutions of higher education shall be as provided in~~
32 ~~the omnibus appropriations act.~~

33 ~~(9))~~ (10) The legislative advisory committee to the committee on
34 advanced tuition payment established in RCW 28B.95.170 shall:

35 (a) Review the impact of differential tuition rates on the funded
36 status and future unit price of the Washington advanced college
37 tuition payment program; and

38 (b) No later than January 14, 2013, make a recommendation to the
39 appropriate policy and fiscal committees of the legislature regarding
40 how differential tuition should be addressed in order to maintain the

1 ongoing solvency of the Washington advanced college tuition payment
2 program.

3 (11) As a result of any changes in tuition under section 3,
4 chapter ..., Laws of 2015 (this section), the governing boards of the
5 state universities, the regional universities, and The Evergreen
6 State College shall not reduce resident undergraduate enrollment
7 below the 2014-15 academic year levels.

8 NEW SECTION. Sec. 4. A new section is added to chapter 28B.92
9 RCW to read as follows:

10 Beginning with the 2015-2017 omnibus appropriations act and each
11 biennium thereafter, reductions in tuition levels resulting from
12 section 3, chapter ..., Laws of 2015 (section 3 of this act) will
13 allow the legislature to reduce state need grant appropriations by an
14 equal amount from the 2013-2015 fiscal biennium amounts.

15 **Sec. 5.** RCW 28B.15.069 and 2013 2nd sp.s. c 4 s 959 are each
16 amended to read as follows:

17 (1) The building fee for each academic year shall be a percentage
18 of total tuition fees. This percentage shall be calculated by the
19 office of financial management and be based on the actual percentage
20 the building fee is of total tuition for each tuition category in the
21 1994-95 academic year, rounded up to the nearest half percent. After
22 the effective date of this section, the dollar value of the building
23 fee shall not be reduced below the level in the 2014-15 academic year
24 adjusted for inflation. As used in this subsection, "inflation" has
25 the meaning in RCW 28B.15.066(2).

26 (2) The governing boards of each institution of higher education,
27 except for the technical colleges, shall charge to and collect from
28 each student a services and activities fee. A governing board may
29 increase the existing fee annually, consistent with budgeting
30 procedures set forth in RCW 28B.15.045, by a percentage not to exceed
31 the annual percentage increase in student tuition fees for resident
32 undergraduate students: PROVIDED, That such percentage increase shall
33 not apply to that portion of the services and activities fee
34 previously committed to the repayment of bonded debt. These rate
35 adjustments may exceed the fiscal growth factor. For the 2013-2015
36 fiscal biennium, each governing board is authorized to increase the
37 services and activities fees by amounts judged reasonable and
38 necessary by the services and activities fee committee and the

1 governing board consistent with the budgeting procedures set forth in
2 RCW 28B.15.045. The services and activities fee committee provided
3 for in RCW 28B.15.045 may initiate a request to the governing board
4 for a fee increase.

5 (3) Tuition and services and activities fees consistent with
6 subsection (2) of this section shall be set by the state board for
7 community and technical colleges for community college summer school
8 students unless the community college charges fees in accordance with
9 RCW 28B.15.515.

10 (4) Subject to the limitations of RCW 28B.15.910, each governing
11 board of a community college may charge such fees for ungraded
12 courses, noncredit courses, community services courses, and self-
13 supporting courses as it, in its discretion, may determine,
14 consistent with the rules of the state board for community and
15 technical colleges.

16 (5) The governing board of a college offering an applied
17 baccalaureate degree program under RCW 28B.50.810 may charge tuition
18 fees for those courses above the associate degree level at rates
19 consistent with rules adopted by the state board for community and
20 technical colleges, not to exceed tuition fee rates at the regional
21 universities.

22 **Sec. 6.** RCW 28B.95.020 and 2012 c 229 s 606 are each reenacted
23 and amended to read as follows:

24 The definitions in this section apply throughout this chapter,
25 unless the context clearly requires otherwise.

26 (1) "Academic year" means the regular nine-month, three-quarter,
27 or two-semester period annually occurring between August 1st and July
28 31st.

29 (2) "Account" means the Washington advanced college tuition
30 payment program account established for the deposit of all money
31 received by the office from eligible purchasers and interest earnings
32 on investments of funds in the account, as well as for all
33 expenditures on behalf of eligible beneficiaries for the redemption
34 of tuition units and for the development of any authorized college
35 savings program pursuant to RCW 28B.95.150.

36 (3) "Committee on advanced tuition payment" or "committee" means
37 a committee of the following members: The state treasurer, the
38 director of the office of financial management, the director of the
39 office, or their designees, and two members to be appointed by the

1 governor, one representing program participants and one private
2 business representative with marketing, public relations, or
3 financial expertise.

4 (4) "Contractual obligation" means a legally binding contract of
5 the state with the purchaser and the beneficiary establishing that
6 purchases of tuition units will be worth the same number of tuition
7 units at the time of redemption as they were worth at the time of the
8 purchase, except as provided in RCW 28B.95.030(7).

9 (5) "Eligible beneficiary" means the person for whom the tuition
10 unit will be redeemed for attendance at an institution of higher
11 education. The beneficiary is that person named by the purchaser at
12 the time that a tuition unit contract is accepted by the governing
13 body. Qualified organizations, as allowed under section 529 of the
14 federal internal revenue code, purchasing tuition unit contracts as
15 future scholarships need not designate a beneficiary at the time of
16 purchase.

17 (6) "Eligible purchaser" means an individual or organization that
18 has entered into a tuition unit contract with the governing body for
19 the purchase of tuition units for an eligible beneficiary. The state
20 of Washington may be an eligible purchaser for purposes of purchasing
21 tuition units to be held for granting Washington college bound
22 scholarships.

23 (7) "Full-time tuition charges" means resident tuition charges at
24 a state institution of higher education for enrollments between ten
25 credits and eighteen credit hours per academic term.

26 (8) "Governing body" means the committee empowered by the
27 legislature to administer the Washington advanced college tuition
28 payment program.

29 (9) "Institution of higher education" means an institution that
30 offers education beyond the secondary level and is recognized by the
31 internal revenue service under chapter 529 of the internal revenue
32 code.

33 (10) "Investment board" means the state investment board as
34 defined in chapter 43.33A RCW.

35 (11) "Office" means the office of student financial assistance as
36 defined in chapter 28B.76 RCW.

37 (12) "State institution of higher education" means institutions
38 of higher education as defined in RCW 28B.10.016.

39 (13) "Tuition and fees" means undergraduate tuition and services
40 and activities fees as defined in RCW 28B.15.020 and 28B.15.041

1 rounded to the nearest whole dollar. For purposes of this chapter,
2 services and activities fees do not include fees charged for the
3 payment of bonds heretofore or hereafter issued for, or other
4 indebtedness incurred to pay, all or part of the cost of acquiring,
5 constructing, or installing any lands, buildings, or facilities.

6 (14) "Tuition unit contract" means a contract between an eligible
7 purchaser and the governing body, or a successor agency appointed for
8 administration of this chapter, for the purchase of tuition units for
9 a specified beneficiary that may be redeemed at a later date for an
10 equal number of tuition units, except as provided in RCW
11 28B.95.030(7).

12 (15) "Unit purchase price" means the minimum cost to purchase one
13 tuition unit for an eligible beneficiary. Generally, the minimum
14 purchase price is one percent of the undergraduate tuition and fees
15 for the current year, rounded to the nearest whole dollar, adjusted
16 for the costs of administration and adjusted to ensure the actuarial
17 soundness of the account. The analysis for price setting shall also
18 include, but not be limited to consideration of past and projected
19 patterns of tuition increases, program liability, past and projected
20 investment returns, and the need for a prudent stabilization reserve.

21 **Sec. 7.** RCW 28B.95.030 and 2011 1st sp.s. c 12 s 2 and 2011 1st
22 sp.s. c 11 s 170 are each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

23 (1) The Washington advanced college tuition payment program shall
24 be administered by the committee on advanced tuition payment which
25 shall be chaired by the director of the office. The committee shall
26 be supported by staff of the office.

27 (2)(a) The Washington advanced college tuition payment program
28 shall consist of the sale of tuition units, which may be redeemed by
29 the beneficiary at a future date for an equal number of tuition units
30 regardless of any increase in the price of tuition, that may have
31 occurred in the interval, except as provided in subsection (7) of
32 this section.

33 (b) Each purchase shall be worth a specific number of or fraction
34 of tuition units at each state institution of higher education as
35 determined by the governing body, except as provided in subsection
36 (7) of this section.

37 (c) The number of tuition units necessary to pay for a full
38 year's, full-time undergraduate tuition and fee charges at a state
39 institution of higher education shall be set by the governing body at

1 the time a purchaser enters into a tuition unit contract, except as
2 provided in subsection (7) of this section.

3 (d) The governing body may limit the number of tuition units
4 purchased by any one purchaser or on behalf of any one beneficiary,
5 however, no limit may be imposed that is less than that necessary to
6 achieve four years of full-time, undergraduate tuition charges at a
7 state institution of higher education. The governing body also may,
8 at its discretion, limit the number of participants, if needed, to
9 ensure the actuarial soundness and integrity of the program.

10 (e) While the Washington advanced college tuition payment program
11 is designed to help all citizens of the state of Washington, the
12 governing body may determine residency requirements for eligible
13 purchasers and eligible beneficiaries to ensure the actuarial
14 soundness and integrity of the program.

15 (3)(a) No tuition unit may be redeemed until two years after the
16 purchase of the unit. Units may be redeemed for enrollment at any
17 institution of higher education that is recognized by the internal
18 revenue service under chapter 529 of the internal revenue code.

19 (b) Units redeemed at a nonstate institution of higher education
20 or for graduate enrollment shall be redeemed at the rate for state
21 public institutions in effect at the time of redemption.

22 (4) The governing body shall determine the conditions under which
23 the tuition benefit may be transferred to another family member. In
24 permitting such transfers, the governing body may not allow the
25 tuition benefit to be bought, sold, bartered, or otherwise exchanged
26 for goods and services by either the beneficiary or the purchaser.

27 (5) The governing body shall administer the Washington advanced
28 college tuition payment program in a manner reasonably designed to be
29 actuarially sound, such that the assets of the trust will be
30 sufficient to defray the obligations of the trust including the costs
31 of administration. The governing body may, at its discretion,
32 discount the minimum purchase price for certain kinds of purchases
33 such as those from families with young children, as long as the
34 actuarial soundness of the account is not jeopardized.

35 (6) The governing body shall annually determine current value of
36 a tuition unit.

37 (7) For the 2015-16 and 2016-17 academic years, the committee and
38 the governing body shall make such one-time adjustments to all
39 unredeemed tuition units purchased before the effective date of this
40 section as may be necessary to ensure that the total payout value of

1 each account at the effective date of this section is not decreased
2 or diluted as a result of the initial application of any changes in
3 tuition under section 3, chapter ..., Laws of 2015 (section 3 of this
4 act). The first notification to holders of tuition units after the
5 adjustment in this subsection is made must include a statement
6 concerning the adjustment. For accounts that are opened prior to the
7 effective date of this section, the committee and the governing body
8 shall make such adjustments to the number of tuition units that may
9 be redeemed in one year as may be necessary to ensure that any change
10 in tuition policy under section 3 of this act does not result in the
11 decrease of the dollar value of the maximum tuition units that may be
12 used in any one year.

13 (8) The governing body shall promote, advertise, and publicize
14 the Washington advanced college tuition payment program.

15 ((+8)) (9) In addition to any other powers conferred by this
16 chapter, the governing body may:

17 (a) Impose reasonable limits on the number of tuition units or
18 units that may be used in any one year;

19 (b) Determine and set any time limits, if necessary, for the use
20 of benefits under this chapter;

21 (c) Impose and collect administrative fees and charges in
22 connection with any transaction under this chapter;

23 (d) Appoint and use advisory committees and the state actuary as
24 needed to provide program direction and guidance;

25 (e) Formulate and adopt all other policies and rules necessary
26 for the efficient administration of the program;

27 (f) Consider the addition of an advanced payment program for room
28 and board contracts and also consider a college savings program;

29 (g) Purchase insurance from insurers licensed to do business in
30 the state, to provide for coverage against any loss in connection
31 with the account's property, assets, or activities or to further
32 insure the value of the tuition units;

33 (h) Make, execute, and deliver contracts, conveyances, and other
34 instruments necessary to the exercise and discharge of its powers and
35 duties under this chapter;

36 (i) Contract for the provision for all or part of the services
37 necessary for the management and operation of the program with other
38 state or nonstate entities authorized to do business in the state;

39 (j) Contract for other services or for goods needed by the
40 governing body in the conduct of its business under this chapter;

1 (k) Contract with financial consultants, actuaries, auditors, and
2 other consultants as necessary to carry out its responsibilities
3 under this chapter;

4 (l) Solicit and accept cash donations and grants from any person,
5 governmental agency, private business, or organization; and

6 (m) Perform all acts necessary and proper to carry out the duties
7 and responsibilities of this program under this chapter.

8 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 8.** The following acts or parts of acts are
9 each repealed:

10 (1) RCW 28B.15.068 (Tuition fees increase limitations—State
