Washington State Registered Sex and Kidnapping Offender Address and Residency Verification Grant Program—2023 Annual Report

In 2010, the Washington State Legislature established the Registered Sex Offender and Kidnapping Offender Address and Residency Verification Grant Program (RCW 36.28A.230). When funded, the Washington Association of Sheriffs and Police Chiefs (WASPC) administers a grant program to local governments for the purpose of verifying the address and residency of sex offenders and kidnapping offenders registered under RCW 9A.44.130 who reside within the county sheriff's jurisdiction.

The Registered Sex Offender and Kidnapping Offender Address and Residency Verification Grant Program continues to be a valuable resource for local law enforcement agencies. Agencies continue to report they would not be able to fund the resources needed for face-to-face address verifications without the grant money. Agencies also report the following concerns:

- The passage of ESHB 1394¹ (2023) redirected significant resources as it relates to the review for relief of all registered sex offenders who were adjudicated or convicted under the age of 18 per chapter 9A.44 RCW. Valuable resources were redirected from verification responsibility to review and relief efforts.
- Law enforcement agencies report challenges conducting verifications for offenders that have registered a shelter as their fixed addresses. Housing managers at shelters are often unwilling to confirm or deny that someone is living in the shelter.
- Agencies continue to experience staffing shortages which has an impact on the priority of address verifications, leading to less verifications being completed.

For the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2022, WASPC granted \$4.81 million to local law enforcement agencies through the Registered Sex Offender and Kidnapping Offender Address and Residency Verification Grant Program. For the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2023, WASPC again granted \$4.81 million to local law enforcement agencies. The following information describes the efforts by local law enforcement agencies utilizing the Address and Residency Verification Grant Program.

From July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2023:

- Average number of statewide sex and kidnapping offenders: 20,347
- Average number of compliant sex and kidnapping offenders: 18,730
- Average number of non-compliant sex and kidnapping offenders: 1,581
- Average number of sex and kidnapping offender registered transient: 1,137
- Total face-to-face address verifications reported statewide: 26,492
- Total statewide investigations for failure to register investigations: 893

The following charts display the above information over a five-year span. The charts are based on fiscal
