- 1 AN ACT Relating to naturopathic physicians; amending RCW
- 2 18.36A.010, 18.36A.020, 18.36A.030, 18.36A.040, 18.36A.050, 18.36A.070,
- 3 18.06.050, 18.74.010, 18.120.020, and 43.70.470; and reenacting and
- 4 amending RCW 18.130.040.
- 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 6 Sec. 1. RCW 18.36A.010 and 1987 c 447 s 1 are each amended to read 7 as follows:
- 8 The legislature finds that it is necessary to regulate the practice
- 9 of ((naturopaths)) naturopathic physicians in order to protect the
- 10 public health, safety, and welfare. It is the legislature's intent
- 11 that only individuals who meet and maintain minimum standards of
- 12 competence and conduct may provide service to the public.
- 13 **Sec. 2.** RCW 18.36A.020 and 1991 c 3 s 87 are each amended to read
- 14 as follows:
- 15 Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the definitions in
- 16 this section apply throughout this chapter.
- 17 (1) "Department" means the department of health.

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- 1 (2) "Secretary" means the secretary of health or the secretary's 2 designee.
- 3 (3) "((Naturopath)) Naturopathic physician" means an individual licensed under this chapter.
- 5 (4) "Committee" means the Washington state naturopathic practice 6 advisory committee.
- 7 (5) "Educational program" means ((a)) <u>an accredited</u> program 8 preparing persons for the practice of ((naturopathy)) <u>naturopathic</u> 9 medicine.
- 10 (6) "Nutrition and food science" means the prevention and treatment 11 of disease or other human conditions through the use of foods, water, 12 herbs, roots, bark, or natural food elements.
- 13 (7) "Manual manipulation" or "mechanotherapy" means manipulation of 14 a part or the whole of the body by hand or by mechanical means.
- 15 (8) "Physical modalities" means use of physical, chemical, 16 electrical, and other noninvasive modalities including, but not limited 17 to heat, cold, air, light, water in any of its forms, sound, massage, 18 and therapeutic exercise.
- 19 (9) "Homeopathy" means a system of medicine based on the use of 20 infinitesimal doses of medicines capable of producing symptoms similar 21 to those of the disease treated, as listed in the homeopathic 22 pharmacopeia of the United States.
- (10) (("Medicines of mineral, animal, and botanical origin" means 23 24 medicines derived from animal organs, tissues, and oils, minerals, and 25 plants administered orally and topically, excluding legend drugs with 26 the following exceptions: Vitamins, minerals, whole gland thyroid, and substances as exemplified in traditional botanical and herbal 27 pharmacopoeia, and nondrug contraceptive devices excluding interuterine 28 29 devices. The use of intermuscular injections are limited to vitamin 30 B-12 preparations and combinations when clinical and/or laboratory evaluation has indicated vitamin B-12 deficiency. The use of 31 controlled substances is prohibited.)) "Naturopathic medicine" includes 32 legend drugs, excluding controlled substances listed in Schedules I, 33 34 II, and III of the uniform controlled substances act, chapter 69.50 RCW; vitamins; minerals; botanical medicines; hormones; and other 35 physiologic substances as exemplified in standard naturopathic medical 36 37 texts, journals, and pharmacopeia, including nondrug contraceptive

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devices.

(11) "Hygiene and immunization" means the use of such preventative 1 2 as personal hygiene, asepsis, public techniques health, and 3 immunizations, to the extent allowed by rule.

- 4 (12) "Minor office procedures" means <u>limited surgical</u> care <u>and</u> procedures incident thereto of superficial lacerations, lesions, and abrasions, and the removal of foreign bodies located in superficial structures, not to include the eye; treatment of chemical dependency with auricular or hand therapy; injections and insertion of needles for therapeutic purposes; and the use of antiseptics and topical or local anesthetics in connection therewith.
- (13) "Common diagnostic procedures" means the use of venipuncture 11 12 ((to withdraw blood)) consistent with naturopathic medical practice, commonly used diagnostic modalities consistent with naturopathic 13 practice, ((health history taking,)) physical examination, radiography, 14 15 examination of body orifices excluding endoscopy beyond the rectum, ((and)) laboratory medicine ((which obtains)), and obtaining samples of 16 human tissues ((products)), ((including superficial scrapings)) but 17 excluding ((procedures which would require)) surgical ((incision)) 18 19 excision beyond that which is authorized as minor office procedure and excluding the removal of malignant lesions. 20
- (14) "Suggestion" means techniques including but not limited to 21 counseling, biofeedback, and hypnosis. 22
- 23 (15) "Radiography" means ordering, performing, and interpretation 24 of radiographs; it includes the ordering but not the performing or 25 interpretation of ((radiographic diagnostic studies and the taking and 26 interpretation of standard radiographs)) nuclear medicine and contrast die studies. Radiography includes the ordering and interpretation of 27 ultrasonic and other nonroentgenographic imaging procedures. 28
- 29 Sec. 3. RCW 18.36A.030 and 1991 c 3 s 88 are each amended to read
- (1) No person may practice naturopathy or represent himself or 31 herself as a ((naturopath)) naturopathic physician without first 32 33 applying for and receiving a license from the secretary to practice 34 naturopathy.
- 35 (2) A person represents himself or herself as a ((naturopath)) 36 naturopathic physician when that person adopts or uses any title or any 37 description of services that incorporates one or more of the following

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- 1 terms or designations: Naturopath, naturopathic physician, or doctor
- 2 of naturopathic medicine.

- 3 **Sec. 4.** RCW 18.36A.040 and 1991 c 3 s 89 are each amended to read 4 as follows:
- Naturopathic medicine 5 or naturopathy is the practice ((naturopaths)) naturopathic physicians of the art and science of the 6 7 diagnosis, prevention, and treatment of disorders of the body by stimulation or support, or both, of the natural processes of the human 8 9 A ((naturopath)) naturopathic physician is responsible and accountable to the consumer for the quality of naturopathic care 10
- 12 The practice of naturopathy includes manual manipulation (mechanotherapy), the prescription, administration, dispensing, and 13 14 use, except for the treatment of malignancies or neoplastic disease, of 15 nutrition and food science, physical modalities, homeopathy, certain medicines of mineral, animal, and botanical origin, hygiene and 16 immunization, common diagnostic procedures, and suggestion; however, 17 18 nothing in this chapter shall prohibit consultation and treatment of a 19 patient in concert with a practitioner licensed under chapter 18.57 or 18.71 RCW. No person licensed under this chapter may employ the term 20 21 "chiropractic" to describe any services provided by a ((naturopath)) 22 naturopathic physician under this chapter.
- 23 **Sec. 5.** RCW 18.36A.050 and 1991 c 3 s 90 are each amended to read 24 as follows:
- Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to prohibit or restrict:
- 26 (1) The practice of a profession by individuals who are licensed,
- 27 certified, or registered under other laws of this state who are
- 28 performing services within their authorized scope of practice;
- 29 (2) The practice of naturopathic medicine by an individual employed
- 30 by the government of the United States while the individual is engaged
- 31 in the performance of duties prescribed for him or her by the laws and
- 32 regulations of the United States;
- 33 (3) The practice of naturopathic medicine by students enrolled in
- 34 a school approved by the secretary. The performance of services shall
- 35 be pursuant to a course of instruction or assignments from an
- 36 instructor and under the supervision of the instructor. The instructor

- 5 **Sec. 6.** RCW 18.36A.070 and 1991 c 3 s 92 are each amended to read 6 as follows:
- (1) There is hereby created the Washington state naturopathic 7 advisory committee consisting of five members appointed by the 8 9 secretary who shall advise the secretary concerning the administration of this chapter. Three members of the initial committee shall be 10 persons who would qualify for licensing under this chapter. Their 11 12 successors shall be ((naturopaths)) naturopathic physicians who are licensed under this chapter. Two members of the committee shall be 13 14 individuals who are unaffiliated with the profession. For the initial 15 committee, one unaffiliated member and one ((naturopath)) naturopathic physician shall serve four-year terms, one unaffiliated member and one 16 ((naturopath)) naturopathic physician shall serve three-year terms, and 17 18 one ((naturopath)) naturopathic physician shall serve a two-year term. The term of office for committee members after the initial committee is 19 Any committee member may be removed for just cause 20 four years. including a finding of fact of unprofessional conduct, impaired 21

- (2) Committee members shall be compensated in accordance with RCW 43.03.240 and reimbursed for travel expenses in accordance with RCW

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- 30 (3) The committee may elect annually a chair and vice-chair to 31 direct the meetings of the committee. The committee shall meet at 32 least once each year, and may hold additional meetings as called by the 33 secretary or the chair.
- 34 **Sec. 7.** RCW 18.06.050 and 1991 c 3 s 7 are each amended to read as 5 follows:
- Any person seeking to be examined shall present to the secretary at least forty-five days before the commencement of the examination:

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The secretary may

- 1 (1) A written application on a form or forms provided by the 2 secretary setting forth under affidavit such information as the 3 secretary may require; and
 - (2) Proof that the candidate has:

- (a) Successfully completed a course, approved by the secretary, of 5 didactic training in basic sciences and acupuncture over a minimum 6 7 period of two academic years. The training shall include such subjects 8 as anatomy, physiology, bacteriology, biochemistry, pathology, hygiene, 9 and a survey of western clinical sciences. The basic science classes 10 must be equivalent to those offered at the collegiate level. However, if the applicant is a licensed chiropractor under chapter 18.25 RCW or 11 a ((naturopath)) naturopathic physician licensed under chapter 18.36A 12 13 RCW, the requirements of this subsection relating to basic sciences may be reduced by up to one year depending upon the extent of the 14 15 candidate's qualifications as determined under rules adopted by the 16 secretary;
- (b) Successfully completed a course, approved by the secretary, of clinical training in acupuncture over a minimum period of one academic year. The training shall include a minimum of: (i) Twenty-nine quarter credits of supervised practice, consisting of at least four hundred separate patient treatments involving a minimum of one hundred different patients, and (ii) one hundred hours or nine quarter credits of observation which shall include case presentation and discussion.
- 24 **Sec. 8.** RCW 18.74.010 and 1991 c 12 s 1 are each amended to read 25 as follows:
- 26 Unless the context otherwise requires, the definitions in this 27 section apply throughout this chapter.
- 28 (1) "Board" means the board of physical therapy created by RCW 29 18.74.020.
- 30 (2) "Department" means the department of health.
- (3) "Physical therapy" means the treatment of any bodily or mental 31 32 condition of any person by the use of the physical, chemical, and other properties of heat, cold, air, light, water, electricity, sound, 33 34 massage, and therapeutic exercise, which includes posture and rehabilitation procedures; the performance of tests and measurements of 35 36 neuromuscular function as an aid to the diagnosis or treatment of any human condition; performance of treatments on the basis of test 37 findings after consultation with and periodic review by an authorized 38

- 1 health care practitioner except as provided in RCW 18.74.012;
- 2 supervision of selective forms of treatment by trained supportive
- 3 personnel; and provision of consultative services for health,
- 4 education, and community agencies. The use of Roentgen rays and radium
- 5 for diagnostic and therapeutic purposes, the use of electricity for
- 6 surgical purposes, including cauterization, and the use of spinal
- 7 manipulation or manipulative mobilization of the spine and its
- 8 immediate articulations, are not included under the term "physical
- 9 therapy" as used in this chapter.
- 10 (4) "Physical therapist" means a person who practices physical
- 11 therapy as defined in this chapter but does not include massage
- 12 operators as defined in RCW 18.108.010.
 - (5) "Secretary" means the secretary of health.
- 14 (6) Words importing the masculine gender may be applied to females.
- 15 (7) "Authorized health care practitioner" means and includes
- 16 licensed physicians, osteopathic physicians, chiropractors,
- 17 ((naturopaths)) naturopathic physicians, ((podiatrists)) podiatric
- 18 physicians and surgeons, and dentists: PROVIDED, HOWEVER, That nothing
- 19 herein shall be construed as altering the scope of practice of such
- 20 practitioners as defined in their respective licensure laws.
- 21 **Sec. 9.** RCW 18.120.020 and 1996 c 178 s 9 are each amended to read
- 22 as follows:

- The definitions contained in this section shall apply throughout
- 24 this chapter unless the context clearly requires otherwise.
- 25 (1) "Applicant group" includes any health professional group or
- 26 organization, any individual, or any other interested party which
- 27 proposes that any health professional group not presently regulated be
- 28 regulated or which proposes to substantially increase the scope of
- 29 practice of the profession.
- 30 (2) "Certificate" and "certification" mean a voluntary process by
- 31 which a statutory regulatory entity grants recognition to an individual
- 32 who (a) has met certain prerequisite qualifications specified by that
- 33 regulatory entity, and (b) may assume or use "certified" in the title
- 34 or designation to perform prescribed health professional tasks.
- 35 (3) "Grandfather clause" means a provision in a regulatory statute
- 36 applicable to practitioners actively engaged in the regulated health
- 37 profession prior to the effective date of the regulatory statute which
- 38 exempts the practitioners from meeting the prerequisite qualifications

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set forth in the regulatory statute to perform prescribed occupational tasks.

- 3 (4) "Health professions" means and includes the following health 4 and health-related licensed or regulated professions and occupations: 5 Podiatric medicine and surgery under chapter 18.22 RCW; chiropractic under chapter 18.25 RCW; dental hygiene under chapter 18.29 RCW; 6 7 dentistry under chapter 18.32 RCW; denturism under chapter 18.30 RCW; 8 dispensing opticians under chapter 18.34 RCW; hearing ((aids)) 9 instruments under chapter 18.35 RCW; ((naturopaths)) naturopathic 10 physicians under chapter 18.36A RCW; embalming and funeral directing under chapter 18.39 RCW; midwifery under chapter 18.50 RCW; nursing 11 home administration under chapter 18.52 RCW; optometry under chapters 12 18.53 and 18.54 RCW; ocularists under chapter 18.55 RCW; osteopathic 13 medicine and surgery under chapters 18.57 and 18.57A RCW; pharmacy 14 15 under chapters 18.64 and 18.64A RCW; medicine under chapters 18.71 and 16 18.71A RCW; emergency medicine under chapter 18.73 RCW; physical therapy under chapter 18.74 RCW; practical nurses under chapter 18.79 17 RCW; psychologists under chapter 18.83 RCW; registered nurses under 18 19 chapter 18.79 RCW; occupational therapists licensed under chapter 18.59 20 RCW; respiratory care practitioners certified under chapter 18.89 RCW; veterinarians and animal technicians under chapter 18.92 RCW; health 21 care assistants under chapter 18.135 RCW; massage practitioners under 22 23 chapter 18.108 RCW; acupuncturists licensed under chapter 18.06 RCW; 24 persons registered or certified under chapter 18.19 RCW; dietitians and 25 nutritionists certified by chapter 18.138 RCW; radiologic technicians 26 under chapter 18.84 RCW; and nursing assistants registered or certified 27 under chapter 18.88A RCW.
 - (5) "Inspection" means the periodic examination of practitioners by a state agency in order to ascertain whether the practitioners' occupation is being carried out in a fashion consistent with the public health, safety, and welfare.
- 32 (6) "Legislative committees of reference" means the standing 33 legislative committees designated by the respective rules committees of 34 the senate and house of representatives to consider proposed 35 legislation to regulate health professions not previously regulated.
- 36 (7) "License," "licensing," and "licensure" mean permission to 37 engage in a health profession which would otherwise be unlawful in the 38 state in the absence of the permission. A license is granted to those

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- 1 individuals who meet prerequisite qualifications to perform prescribed 2 health professional tasks and for the use of a particular title.
- 3 (8) "Professional license" means an individual, nontransferable 4 authorization to carry on a health activity based on qualifications 5 which include: (a) Graduation from an accredited or approved program, 6 and (b) acceptable performance on a qualifying examination or series of 7 examinations.
- 8 (9) "Practitioner" means an individual who (a) has achieved 9 knowledge and skill by practice, and (b) is actively engaged in a 10 specified health profession.
- 11 (10) "Public member" means an individual who is not, and never was, 12 a member of the health profession being regulated or the spouse of a 13 member, or an individual who does not have and never has had a material 14 financial interest in either the rendering of the health professional 15 service being regulated or an activity directly related to the 16 profession being regulated.
 - (11) "Registration" means the formal notification which, prior to rendering services, a practitioner shall submit to a state agency setting forth the name and address of the practitioner; the location, nature and operation of the health activity to be practiced; and, if required by the regulatory entity, a description of the service to be provided.

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- (12) "Regulatory entity" means any board, commission, agency, division, or other unit or subunit of state government which regulates one or more professions, occupations, industries, businesses, or other endeavors in this state.
- (13) "State agency" includes every state office, department, board, commission, regulatory entity, and agency of the state, and, where provided by law, programs and activities involving less than the full responsibility of a state agency.

- 25 (3) In addition to the authority to discipline license holders, the 26 disciplining authority has the authority to grant or deny licenses 27 based on the conditions and criteria established in this chapter and 28 the chapters specified in subsection (2) of this section. This chapter 29 also governs any investigation, hearing, or proceeding relating to
- 30 denial of licensure or issuance of a license conditioned on the
- 31 applicant's compliance with an order entered pursuant to RCW 18.130.160

- 33 (4) All disciplining authorities shall adopt procedures to ensure
- 34 substantially consistent application of this chapter, the Uniform
- 35 Disciplinary Act, among the disciplining authorities listed in
- 36 subsection (2) of this section.
- 37 **Sec. 11.** RCW 43.70.470 and 1993 c 492 s 277 are each amended to 38 read as follows:

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The department may establish by rule the conditions of participation in the liability insurance program by retired primary care providers at clinics utilizing retired ((physicians [primary care providers])) primary care providers for the purposes of this section and RCW 43.70.460. These conditions shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

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- (1) The participating primary care provider associated with the clinic shall hold a valid license to practice as a physician under chapter 18.71 or 18.57 RCW, a ((naturopath)) naturopathic physician under chapter 18.36A RCW, a physician assistant under chapter 18.71A or 18.57A RCW, an advanced registered nurse practitioner under chapter 18.88 RCW, a dentist under chapter 18.32 RCW, or other health professionals as may be deemed in short supply in the health personnel resource plan under chapter 28B.125 RCW. All primary care providers must be in conformity with current requirements for licensure as a retired primary care provider, including continuing education requirements;
- (2) The participating primary care provider shall limit the scope 18 19 of practice in the clinic to primary care. Primary care shall be limited to noninvasive procedures and shall not include obstetrical 20 care, or any specialized care and treatment. Noninvasive procedures 21 include injections, suturing of minor lacerations, and incisions of 22 23 boils or superficial abscesses. Primary dental care shall be limited 24 to diagnosis, oral hygiene, restoration, and extractions and shall not 25 include orthodontia, or other specialized care and treatment;
- 26 (3) The provision of liability insurance coverage shall not extend 27 to acts outside the scope of rendering medical services pursuant to 28 this section and RCW 43.70.460;
- 29 (4) The participating primary care provider shall limit the 30 provision of health care services to primarily low-income persons 31 provided that clinics may, but are not required to, provide means tests 32 for eligibility as a condition for obtaining health care services;
- 33 (5) The participating primary care provider shall not accept 34 compensation for providing health care services from patients served 35 pursuant to this section and RCW 43.70.460, nor from clinics serving 36 these patients. "Compensation" shall mean any remuneration of value to 37 the participating primary care provider for services provided by the 38 primary care provider, but shall not be construed to include any 39 nominal copayments charged by the clinic, nor reimbursement of related

1 expenses of a participating primary care provider authorized by the 2 clinic in advance of being incurred; and

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(6) The use of mediation or arbitration for resolving questions of potential liability may be used, however any mediation or arbitration agreement format shall be expressed in terms clear enough for a person with a sixth grade level of education to understand, and on a form no longer than one page in length.

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
