AN ACT Relating to osteoporosis health services coverage; adding a new section to chapter 41.05 RCW; adding new sections to chapter 48.20 RCW; adding a new section to chapter 48.21 RCW; adding a new section to chapter 48.44 RCW; adding a new section to chapter 48.46 RCW; and creating new sections.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

7 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. This act may be known and cited as the 8 "osteoporosis health services coverage act."

9 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. (1) The legislature finds the following:

10 (a) Osteoporosis affects twenty-five million Americans and each 11 year results in one and one-half million fractures of the hip, spine, 12 wrist, and other bones, costing the nation at least ten billion 13 dollars;

(b) Osteoporosis progresses silently, in most cases undiagnosed until a fracture occurs, and once a fracture occurs the disease is already advanced and the likelihood is high that another fracture will occur;

(c) Half of all women and twenty percent of men will suffer a
 fracture due to osteoporosis;

3 (d) Since osteoporosis progresses silently and has no cure,
4 prevention and early diagnosis are key to reducing the prevalence and
5 devastation of this disease;

6 (e) Medical experts agree that osteoporosis is highly preventable 7 and treatable. However, once the disease progresses to the point of 8 fracture, its associated consequences often lead to disability and 9 institutionalization and exact a heavy toll on quality of life;

10 (f) Given the current national focus on health care reform and 11 reducing unnecessary health care expenditures through the use of health 12 promotion and disease prevention programs, mandating coverage of 13 services related to prevention, early diagnosis, and timely treatment 14 of osteoporosis is a cost-effective approach for states to embrace;

(g) Bone mass measurement is the only way to detect the presence of low bone mass and to assess the individual's risk for fracture and this aids in selecting appropriate therapies and interventions; ordinary xrays are not sensitive enough to detect osteoporosis until twenty-five to forty percent of bone mass has been lost and the disease is far advanced;

(h) Currently available technologies for bone mass measurement 21 22 include: Single and dual-photon absorptiometry; single and dual energy 23 absorptiometry; quantitative computed x-ray tomography; and 24 radiographic absorptiometry. Other technologies for measuring bone 25 mass are under investigation and may become scientifically proven 26 technologies in the future; and

(i) Other services related to the prevention, diagnosis, and 27 of osteoporosis, including visits to health 28 treatment care professionals and reimbursement for scientifically proven technologies 29 30 for bone mass measurement and United States food and drug administration-approved medications, can be used effectively to reduce 31 the cost and pain that osteoporosis inflicts upon its victims. 32

(2) To mandate coverage for services related to the prevention, diagnosis, and treatment of osteoporosis, including, but not limited to, visits to health care professionals, reimbursement for scientifically proven bone mass measurement, which is bone density testing, and United States food and drug administration-approved medications, to prevent fractures associated with osteoporosis.

1 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. A new section is added to chapter 41.05 RCW
2 to read as follows:

3 (1) All state-purchased health care that provides hospital, 4 medical, or surgical coverage shall include coverage for qualified individuals for services related to the prevention, diagnosis, and 5 treatment of osteoporosis. The services may include, but are not 6 7 limited to, visits to health care professionals, reimbursement for 8 scientifically proven bone mass measurement, which is bone density 9 testing, and United States food and drug administration-approved 10 medications.

(2) State-purchased health care shall identify and use the most up to-date, scientifically accurate educational materials to increase
 patient awareness and encourage the prevention of osteoporosis.

14 (3) The definitions in section 4 of this act apply to this section.

15 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 4. A new section is added to chapter 48.20 RCW 16 to read as follows:

17 Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the definitions in 18 this section apply to section 5 of this act.

(1) "Bone mass measurement" means a radiologic or radioisotopic
 procedure or other scientifically proven technologies performed on an
 individual for the purpose of detecting bone loss.

22 (2) "Qualified individual" means:

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(a) An estrogen-deficient woman at clinical risk for osteoporosis;

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(b) An individual with vertebral abnormalities;

(c) An individual receiving long-term glucocorticoid, which issteroid, therapy;

27 (d) An individual with primary hyperparathyroidism; or

(e) An individual being monitored to assess the response to orefficacy of approved osteoporosis drug therapies.

30 (3) "Services related to the prevention, diagnosis, and treatment 31 of osteoporosis" means visits to health care professionals, 32 reimbursement for scientifically proven bone mass measurement, which is 33 bone density testing, and United States food and drug administration-34 approved medications. Optional additional services to be covered are: 35 Psychological counseling, rehabilitation services, occupational 36 therapy, case management, home care, and prosthetic devices. <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 5. A new section is added to chapter 48.20 RCW
 to read as follows:

3 (1) An insurer that offers to any individual a health benefit plan 4 that provides hospital, medical, or surgical coverage shall include 5 coverage for qualified individuals for services related to the prevention, diagnosis, and treatment of osteoporosis. The services may 6 7 include, but are not limited to, visits to health care professionals, reimbursement for scientifically proven bone mass measurement, which is 8 9 bone density testing, and United States food and drug administration-10 approved medications.

(2) An insurer that offers to any individual a health benefit plan shall identify and use the most up-to-date, scientifically accurate educational materials to increase patient awareness and encourage the prevention of osteoporosis.

15 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 6. A new section is added to chapter 48.21 RCW 16 to read as follows:

(1) A group insurance contract or blanket disability insurance 17 18 contract providing health care services that provides hospital, 19 medical, or surgical coverage shall include coverage for qualified individuals for services related to the prevention, diagnosis, and 20 21 treatment of osteoporosis. The services may include, but are not 22 limited to, visits to health care professionals, reimbursement for 23 scientifically proven bone mass measurement, which is bone density 24 testing, and United States food and drug administration-approved 25 medications.

(2) A contract shall identify and use the most up-to-date,
 scientifically accurate educational materials to increase patient
 awareness and encourage the prevention of osteoporosis.

29 (3) The definitions in section 4 of this act apply to this section.

30 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 7. A new section is added to chapter 48.44 RCW 31 to read as follows:

(1) A health service contractor that provides hospital, medical, or surgical coverage shall include coverage for qualified individuals for services related to the prevention, diagnosis, and treatment of osteoporosis. The services may include, but are not limited to, visits to health care professionals, reimbursement for scientifically proven

bone mass measurement, which is bone density testing, and United States
 food and drug administration-approved medications.

3 (2) The contractor shall identify and use the most up-to-date,
4 scientifically accurate educational materials to increase patient
5 awareness and encourage the prevention of osteoporosis.

6 (3) The definitions in section 4 of this act apply to this section.

7 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 8.** A new section is added to chapter 48.46 RCW 8 to read as follows:

9 (1) A health maintenance organization that provides hospital, medical, or surgical coverage shall include coverage for qualified 10 individuals for services related to the prevention, diagnosis, and 11 treatment of osteoporosis. The services may include, but are not 12 limited to, visits to health care professionals, reimbursement for 13 14 scientifically proven bone mass measurement, which is bone density 15 testing, and United States food and drug administration-approved medications. 16

17 (2) A health maintenance organization shall identify and use the 18 most up-to-date, scientifically accurate educational materials to 19 increase patient awareness and encourage the prevention of 20 osteoporosis.

21 (3) The definitions in section 4 of this act apply to this section.

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
