1 AN ACT Relating to educational data and data systems; amending RCW  
2 28A.410.070; adding new sections to chapter 28A.300 RCW; and creating  
3 a new section.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** The legislature finds that:

6 (1) Reliable data on student progress, characteristics of students  
7 and schools, and teacher qualifications and mobility is critical for  
8 accountability to the state and to the public;

9 (2) Educational data should be made available as widely as possible  
10 while appropriately protecting the privacy of individuals as provided  
11 by law;

12 (3) School districts and the office of the superintendent of public  
13 instruction need robust and compatible data systems and programs to  
14 reduce inefficiencies caused by the lack of connectivity and to  
15 minimize or eliminate multiple data entry; and

16 (4) Schools and districts should be supported in their management  
17 of educational data and should have access to user-friendly programs  
18 and reports that can be readily used by classroom teachers and building  
19 principals to improve instruction.

1        NEW SECTION.    **Sec. 2.**    A new section is added to chapter 28A.300  
2    RCW to read as follows:

3        (1) As a first step in establishing a framework and baseline  
4    information for better linking data on students, teachers, and student  
5    achievement, the office of the superintendent of public instruction  
6    shall, to the extent funds are appropriated for this purpose, conduct  
7    a feasibility study on establishing a statewide longitudinal  
8    student-teacher data system. The primary purpose of the data system is  
9    to better aid research into programs and interventions that are most  
10   effective in improving student performance, better understand the  
11   state's public educator workforce, and to provide information on areas  
12   within the educational system that need improvement.

13        (2) A preliminary set of data elements shall be developed by the  
14   office of the superintendent of public instruction in collaboration  
15   with the professional educator standards board, the state board of  
16   education, and the joint legislative audit and review committee by  
17   December 2007. The feasibility study shall include conducting pilot  
18   studies on the collection of this preliminary set of identified data  
19   elements in two school districts, with one over twenty thousand in  
20   full-time equivalent enrollment and the other less than two thousand in  
21   full-time equivalent enrollment.

22        (3) By November 1, 2008, the office of the superintendent of public  
23   instruction shall provide a final report on the results of the  
24   feasibility study, including the results from the pilot studies, to the  
25   appropriate policy and fiscal committees of the legislature.

26        (4) The topics covered in the feasibility study shall include, but  
27   are not limited to:

28        (a) Detailed estimates on the cost of the development and  
29   implementation of the data system;

30        (b) A final list of specific data elements that are necessary to  
31   allow effective and efficient research on an individual school,  
32   district, and statewide basis, and of those data elements,  
33   identification of what data is currently reported by schools and school  
34   districts and what is not reported;

35        (c) The standards needed for validation and verification of data  
36   entered into the systems to ensure accuracy and compatibility of data;  
37   and

1 (d) The staffing and related impacts on schools and school  
2 districts from the collection of the recommended data elements and  
3 consideration of ways to reduce duplicate reporting of data.

4 (5) In conducting the feasibility study, the office of the  
5 superintendent of public instruction shall consult with the Washington  
6 state institute for public policy, the professional educator standards  
7 board, the state board of education, the joint legislative audit and  
8 review committee, the center for analysis of longitudinal data in  
9 education research, other research organizations as appropriate, the  
10 association of Washington school principals, the Washington association  
11 of school administrators, the Washington education association, the  
12 Washington association of school business officials, Washington  
13 association of colleges for teacher education, and the Washington state  
14 school directors' association about the needed data elements for an  
15 effective statewide longitudinal student-teacher data system.

16 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 3.** A new section is added to chapter 28A.300  
17 RCW to read as follows:

18 (1) The office of superintendent of public instruction is  
19 authorized to establish a longitudinal student data system for and on  
20 behalf of school districts in the state. Personally identifiable  
21 student data will be safeguarded consistent with the requirements of  
22 the federal family educational rights privacy act and any relevant  
23 state laws. Consistent with privacy protections in the above-  
24 referenced laws, data may be disclosed for educational purposes and  
25 studies, including but are not limited to:

26 (a) Educational studies authorized or mandated by the state  
27 legislature;

28 (b) Studies initiated by other state educational authorities and  
29 authorized by the office of superintendent of public instruction;

30 (c) Studies initiated by other state agencies and authorized by the  
31 office of superintendent of public instruction;

32 (d) Studies initiated by private study groups authorized by the  
33 office of superintendent of public instruction.

34 (2) Any group or agency that utilizes this data shall adhere to  
35 federal and state laws protecting student data and safeguarding the  
36 confidentiality and privacy of student records.

1           (3) Nothing in this section precludes the office of superintendent  
2 of public instruction from collecting and distributing nonstudent level  
3 data, nor student level data without personally identifiable  
4 information.

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
