1 AN ACT Relating to modernization grants for small school 2 districts; and adding a new section to chapter 28A.525 RCW.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. A new section is added to chapter 28A.525
RCW to read as follows:

6 (1) School construction assistance program grants for small 7 school districts and state-tribal education compact schools must be 8 determined in accordance with this section.

9 (2) Eligibility. School districts and state-tribal education 10 compact schools with enrollments that are less than or equal to one 11 thousand students are eligible for small school district 12 modernization grants. The advisory committee specified in subsection 13 (4) (a) of this section may recommend amendments to the eligibility 14 threshold as they learn more about the characteristics of school 15 districts and state-tribal education compact schools that are unable 16 to modernize their aging school facilities. Districts with incomplete 17 information in the inventory and condition of schools data system are 18 not eligible to apply for construction grants but may apply for 19 planning grants.

20 (3) The office of the superintendent of public instruction must 21 assist eligible school districts and state-tribal education compact

1 schools that are interested in applying for a small school district modernization grant under this section by providing technical 2 3 assistance and planning grants within appropriations for this purpose. Districts and state-tribal education compact schools seeking 4 planning grants must provide a brief statement of the school 5 6 condition, its deficiencies, student enrollment, student achievement measures, and financial limitations of the district or state-tribal 7 education compact school. If applications for planning grants exceed 8 funds available, the office of the superintendent of 9 public instruction may prioritize the recipients of planning grants in order 10 to help districts and state-tribal education compact schools with the 11 12 most serious apparent building deficiencies, and the most limited financial capacity. 13

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(4) Prioritized construction grants and advisory committee.

(a) The superintendent of public instruction must propose a list 15 16 of prioritized grants to the governor by September 1st of even-17 numbered years. The superintendent of public instruction must appoint an advisory committee to prioritize applications from small school 18 19 districts and state-tribal education compact schools. Committee members must have experience in financing, managing, repairing, and 20 21 improving school facilities in small school districts or state-tribal education compact schools but must not be involved in a small school 22 23 district modernization program grant request for the biennium under consideration. The office of the superintendent of public instruction 24 25 must provide administrative and staff support to the committee. The office of the superintendent of public instruction in consultation 26 27 with the advisory committee must design a grant application process 28 with specific criteria for prioritizing grant requests.

(b) The advisory committee created in (a) of this subsection must 29 30 evaluate final applications from eligible school districts and state-31 tribal education compact schools. The advisory committee must submit 32 a prioritized list of grants to the superintendent of public instruction. The list must prioritize applications to achieve the 33 greatest improvement of school facilities, in the districts and 34 state-tribal education compact schools with the 35 most limited financial capacity, for projects that are likely to improve student 36 health, safety, and academic performance for the largest number of 37 students for the amount of state grant support. The advisory 38 39 committee must develop specific criteria to achieve the 40 prioritization. The submitted prioritized list must describe the

project, the proposed state funding level, and the estimated total 1 project cost including other funding and in-kind resources. The list 2 must also indicate student achievement measures that will be used to 3 evaluate the benefits of the project. The superintendent of public 4 instruction and the governor may determine the level of funding in 5 6 their omnibus capital appropriations act requests to support small school district modernization grants, but their funding requests must 7 follow the prioritized list prepared by the advisory committee unless 8 new information determines that a specific project is no longer 9 viable as proposed. 10

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(5) Coordination with the school construction assistance program.

12 (a) The full administrative and procedural process of school construction assistance program funding under RCW 28A.525.162 through 13 28A.525.180 may be streamlined by the office of the superintendent of 14 public instruction in order to coordinate 15 eliqible school construction assistance program funding with the 16 small school 17 district modernization grants. Such coordination must ensure that 18 total state funding from both grants does not exceed total project costs minus available local resources. 19

(b) Projects seeking small school district modernization grants 20 21 must meet the requirements for a school construction assistance program grant except for the following: (i) The estimated cost of the 22 project may be less than forty percent of the estimated replacement 23 value of the facility, and (ii) local funding assistance percentage 24 25 requirements of the school construction assistance program do not 26 apply. However, available district and state-tribal education compact school resources are considered in prioritizing small school district 27 28 modernization grants.

29 (6) Disbursement of grant funds and reporting requirements. The office of the superintendent of public instruction must award grants 30 31 to school districts and state-tribal education compact schools. The 32 grant must not be awarded until the district or state-tribal education compact school has identified available local and other 33 resources sufficient to complete the approved project considering the 34 amount of the state grant. The grant must specify reporting 35 requirements from the district or state-tribal education compact 36 school, which must include updating all pertinent information in the 37 inventory and condition of schools data system and submitting a final 38 39 project report as specified by the office of the superintendent of

- 2 citizens advisory panel specified in RCW 28A.525.025.

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
