1 AN ACT Relating to fishing and hunting; amending RCW 77.08.010,
2 77.12.810, 77.32.070, 77.32.155, 77.32.350, 77.32.370, 77.32.430,
3 77.32.440, 77.32.450, 77.32.460, 77.32.470, 77.32.480, 77.32.520,
4 77.32.570, 77.32.575, 77.12.712, 77.12.714, 77.12.716, 77.12.718,
5 77.32.580, 77.50.030, and 77.65.160; adding new sections to chapter
6 77.32 RCW; adding new sections to chapter 77.12 RCW; repealing 2009 c
7 420 s 7, 2011 c 339 s 40, 2016 c 223 ss 7, 8, and 9, and 2017 3rd
8 sp.s. c 3 ss 1, 2, and 3 (uncodified); prescribing penalties;
9 providing effective dates; providing expiration dates; and declaring
10 an emergency.

11 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

12 **Sec. 1.** RCW 77.08.010 and 2017 3rd sp.s. c 8 s 2 are each
13 amended to read as follows:

14 The definitions in this section apply throughout this title or
15 rules adopted under this title unless the context clearly requires
16 otherwise.

17 (1) "Angling gear" means a line attached to a rod and reel
18 capable of being held in hand while landing the fish or a handheld
19 line operated without rod or reel.

20 (2) "Bag limit" means the maximum number of game animals, game
21 birds, or game fish which may be taken, caught, killed, or possessed

1 by a person, as specified by rule of the commission for a particular
2 period of time, or as to size, sex, or species.

3 (3) "Building" means a private domicile, garage, barn, or public
4 or commercial building.

5 (4) "Closed area" means a place where the hunting of some or all
6 species of wild animals or wild birds is prohibited.

7 (5) "Closed season" means all times, manners of taking, and
8 places or waters other than those established by rule of the
9 commission as an open season. "Closed season" also means all hunting,
10 fishing, taking, or possession of game animals, game birds, game
11 fish, food fish, or shellfish that do not conform to the special
12 restrictions or physical descriptions established by rule of the
13 commission as an open season or that have not otherwise been deemed
14 legal to hunt, fish, take, harvest, or possess by rule of the
15 commission as an open season.

16 (6) "Closed waters" means all or part of a lake, river, stream,
17 or other body of water, where fishing or harvesting is prohibited.

18 (7) "Commercial" means related to or connected with buying,
19 selling, or bartering.

20 (8) "Commission" means the state fish and wildlife commission.

21 (9) "Concurrent waters of the Columbia river" means those waters
22 of the Columbia river that coincide with the Washington-Oregon state
23 boundary.

24 (10) "Contraband" means any property that is unlawful to produce
25 or possess.

26 (11) "Covered animal species" means any species of elephant,
27 rhinoceros, tiger, lion, leopard, cheetah, pangolin, marine turtle,
28 shark, or ray either: (a) Listed in appendix I or appendix II of the
29 convention on international trade in endangered species of wild flora
30 and fauna; or (b) listed as critically endangered, endangered, or
31 vulnerable on the international union for conservation of nature and
32 natural resources red list of threatened species.

33 (12) "Covered animal species part or product" means any item that
34 contains, or is wholly or partially made from, any covered animal
35 species.

36 (13) "Deleterious exotic wildlife" means species of the animal
37 kingdom not native to Washington and designated as dangerous to the
38 environment or wildlife of the state.

39 (14) "Department" means the department of fish and wildlife.

40 (15) "Director" means the director of fish and wildlife.

1 (16) "Distribute" or "distribution" means either a change in
2 possession for consideration or a change in legal ownership.

3 (17) "Endangered species" means wildlife designated by the
4 commission as seriously threatened with extinction.

5 (18) "Ex officio fish and wildlife officer" means:

6 (a) A commissioned officer of a municipal, county, or state
7 agency having as its primary function the enforcement of criminal
8 laws in general, while the officer is acting in the respective
9 jurisdiction of that agency;

10 (b) An officer or special agent commissioned by one of the
11 following: The national marine fisheries service; the Washington
12 state parks and recreation commission; the United States fish and
13 wildlife service; the Washington state department of natural
14 resources; the United States forest service; or the United States
15 parks service, if the agent or officer is in the respective
16 jurisdiction of the primary commissioning agency and is acting under
17 a mutual law enforcement assistance agreement between the department
18 and the primary commissioning agency;

19 (c) A commissioned fish and wildlife peace officer from another
20 state who meets the training standards set by the Washington state
21 criminal justice training commission pursuant to RCW 10.93.090,
22 43.101.080, and 43.101.200, and who is acting under a mutual law
23 enforcement assistance agreement between the department and the
24 primary commissioning agency; or

25 (d) A Washington state tribal police officer who successfully
26 completes the requirements set forth under RCW 43.101.157, is
27 employed by a tribal nation that has complied with RCW 10.92.020(2)
28 (a) and (b), and is acting under a mutual law enforcement assistance
29 agreement between the department and the tribal government.

30 (19) "Fish" includes all species classified as game fish or food
31 fish by statute or rule, as well as all finfish not currently
32 classified as food fish or game fish if such species exist in state
33 waters. The term "fish" includes all stages of development and the
34 bodily parts of fish species.

35 (20) "To fish" and its derivatives means an effort to kill,
36 injure, harass, harvest, or capture a fish or shellfish.

37 (21) "Fish and wildlife officer" means a person appointed and
38 commissioned by the director, with authority to enforce this title
39 and rules adopted pursuant to this title, and other statutes as
40 prescribed by the legislature. Fish and wildlife officer includes a

1 person commissioned before June 11, 1998, as a wildlife agent or a
2 fisheries patrol officer.

3 (22) "Fish broker" means a person who facilitates the sale or
4 purchase of raw or frozen fish or shellfish on a fee or commission
5 basis, without assuming title to the fish or shellfish.

6 (23) "Fish dealer" means a person who engages in any activity
7 that triggers the need to obtain a fish dealer license under RCW
8 77.65.280.

9 (24) "Fishery" means the taking of one or more particular species
10 of fish or shellfish with particular gear in a particular
11 geographical area.

12 (25) "Food, food waste, or other substance" includes human and
13 pet food or other waste or garbage that could attract large wild
14 carnivores.

15 (26) "Freshwater" means all waters not defined as saltwater
16 including, but not limited to, rivers upstream of the river mouth,
17 lakes, ponds, and reservoirs.

18 (27) "Fur-bearing animals" means game animals that shall not be
19 trapped except as authorized by the commission.

20 (28) "Fur dealer" means a person who purchases, receives, or
21 resells raw furs for commercial purposes.

22 (29) "Game animals" means wild animals that shall not be hunted
23 except as authorized by the commission.

24 (30) "Game birds" means wild birds that shall not be hunted
25 except as authorized by the commission.

26 (31) "Game farm" means property on which wildlife is held,
27 confined, propagated, hatched, fed, or otherwise raised for
28 commercial purposes, trade, or gift. The term "game farm" does not
29 include publicly owned facilities.

30 (32) "Game reserve" means a closed area where hunting for all
31 wild animals and wild birds is prohibited.

32 (33) "To hunt" and its derivatives means an effort to kill,
33 injure, harass, harvest, or capture a wild animal or wild bird.

34 (34) "Illegal items" means those items unlawful to be possessed.

35 (35)(a) "Intentionally feed, attempt to feed, or attract" means
36 to purposefully or knowingly provide, leave, or place in, on, or
37 about any land or building any food, food waste, or other substance
38 that attracts or could attract large wild carnivores to that land or
39 building.

1 (b) "Intentionally feed, attempt to feed, or attract" does not
2 include keeping food, food waste, or other substance in an enclosed
3 garbage receptacle or other enclosed container unless specifically
4 directed by a fish and wildlife officer or animal control authority
5 to secure the receptacle or container in another manner.

6 (36) "Large wild carnivore" includes wild bear, cougar, and wolf.

7 (37) "License year" means the period of time for which a
8 recreational license is valid. The license year begins April 1st, and
9 ends March 31st.

10 (38) "Limited-entry license" means a license subject to a license
11 limitation program established in chapter 77.70 RCW.

12 (39) "Limited fish seller" means a licensed commercial fisher who
13 sells his or her fish or shellfish to anyone other than a wholesale
14 fish buyer thereby triggering the need to obtain a limited fish
15 seller endorsement under RCW 77.65.510.

16 (40) "Money" means all currency, script, personal checks, money
17 orders, or other negotiable instruments.

18 (41) "Natural person" means a human being.

19 (42)(a) "Negligently feed, attempt to feed, or attract" means to
20 provide, leave, or place in, on, or about any land or building any
21 food, food waste, or other substance that attracts or could attract
22 large wild carnivores to that land or building, without the awareness
23 that a reasonable person in the same situation would have with regard
24 to the likelihood that the food, food waste, or other substance could
25 attract large wild carnivores to the land or building.

26 (b) "Negligently feed, attempt to feed, or attract" does not
27 include keeping food, food waste, or other substance in an enclosed
28 garbage receptacle or other enclosed container unless specifically
29 directed by a fish and wildlife officer or animal control authority
30 to secure the receptacle or container in another manner.

31 (43) "Nonresident" means a person who has not fulfilled the
32 qualifications of a resident.

33 (44) "Offshore waters" means marine waters of the Pacific Ocean
34 outside the territorial boundaries of the state, including the marine
35 waters of other states and countries.

36 (45) "Open season" means those times, manners of taking, and
37 places or waters established by rule of the commission for the lawful
38 hunting, fishing, taking, or possession of game animals, game birds,
39 game fish, food fish, or shellfish that conform to the special
40 restrictions or physical descriptions established by rule of the

1 commission or that have otherwise been deemed legal to hunt, fish,
2 take, or possess by rule of the commission. "Open season" includes
3 the first and last days of the established time.

4 (46) "Owner" means the person in whom is vested the ownership
5 dominion, or title of the property.

6 (47) "Person" means and includes an individual; a corporation; a
7 public or private entity or organization; a local, state, or federal
8 agency; all business organizations, including corporations and
9 partnerships; or a group of two or more individuals acting with a
10 common purpose whether acting in an individual, representative, or
11 official capacity.

12 (48) "Personal property" or "property" includes both corporeal
13 and incorporeal personal property and includes, among other property,
14 contraband and money.

15 (49) "Personal use" means for the private use of the individual
16 taking the fish or shellfish and not for sale or barter.

17 (50) "Predatory birds" means wild birds that may be hunted
18 throughout the year as authorized by the commission.

19 (51) "To process" and its derivatives mean preparing or
20 preserving fish, wildlife, or shellfish.

21 (52) "Protected wildlife" means wildlife designated by the
22 commission that shall not be hunted or fished.

23 (53) "Raffle" means an activity in which tickets bearing an
24 individual number are sold for not more than twenty-five dollars each
25 and in which a permit or permits are awarded to hunt or for access to
26 hunt big game animals or wild turkeys on the basis of a drawing from
27 the tickets by the person or persons conducting the raffle.

28 (54) "Resident" has the same meaning as defined in RCW 77.08.075.

29 (55) "Saltwater" means those marine waters seaward of river
30 mouths.

31 (56) "Seaweed" means marine aquatic plant species that are
32 dependent upon the marine aquatic or tidal environment, and exist in
33 either an attached or free floating form, and includes but is not
34 limited to marine aquatic plants in the classes Chlorophyta,
35 Phaeophyta, and Rhodophyta.

36 (57) "Senior" means a person seventy years old or older.

37 (58) "Shark fin" means a raw, dried, or otherwise processed
38 detached fin or tail of a shark.

1 (59) (a) "Shark fin derivative product" means any product intended
2 for use by humans or animals that is derived in whole or in part from
3 shark fins or shark fin cartilage.

4 (b) "Shark fin derivative product" does not include a drug
5 approved by the United States food and drug administration and
6 available by prescription only or medical device or vaccine approved
7 by the United States food and drug administration.

8 (60) "Shellfish" means those species of marine and freshwater
9 invertebrates that have been classified and that shall not be taken
10 or possessed except as authorized by rule of the commission. The term
11 "shellfish" includes all stages of development and the bodily parts
12 of shellfish species.

13 (61) "State waters" means all marine waters and fresh waters
14 within ordinary high water lines and within the territorial
15 boundaries of the state.

16 (62) "To take" and its derivatives means to kill, injure,
17 harvest, or capture a fish, shellfish, wild animal, bird, or seaweed.

18 (63) "Taxidermist" means a person who, for commercial purposes,
19 creates lifelike representations of fish and wildlife using fish and
20 wildlife parts and various supporting structures.

21 (64) "Trafficking" means offering, attempting to engage, or
22 engaging in sale, barter, or purchase of fish, shellfish, wildlife,
23 or deleterious exotic wildlife.

24 (65) "To trap" and its derivatives means a method of hunting
25 using devices to capture wild animals or wild birds.

26 (66) "Unclaimed" means that no owner of the property has been
27 identified or has requested, in writing, the release of the property
28 to themselves nor has the owner of the property designated an
29 individual to receive the property or paid the required postage to
30 effect delivery of the property.

31 (67) "Unclassified wildlife" means wildlife existing in
32 Washington in a wild state that have not been classified as big game,
33 game animals, game birds, predatory birds, protected wildlife,
34 endangered wildlife, or deleterious exotic wildlife.

35 (68) "To waste" or "to be wasted" means to allow any edible
36 portion of any game bird, food fish, game fish, shellfish, or big
37 game animal other than cougar to be rendered unfit for human
38 consumption, or to fail to retrieve edible portions of such a game
39 bird, food fish, game fish, shellfish, or big game animal other than
40 cougar from the field. For purposes of this chapter, edible portions

1 of game birds must include, at a minimum, the breast meat of those
2 birds. Entrails, including the heart and liver, of any wildlife
3 species are not considered edible.

4 (69) "Wholesale fish buyer" means a person who engages in any
5 fish buying or selling activity that triggers the need to obtain a
6 wholesale fish buyer endorsement under RCW 77.65.340.

7 (70) "Wild animals" means those species of the class Mammalia
8 whose members exist in Washington in a wild state. The term "wild
9 animal" does not include feral domestic mammals or old world rats and
10 mice of the family Muridae of the order Rodentia.

11 (71) "Wild birds" means those species of the class Aves whose
12 members exist in Washington in a wild state.

13 (72) "Wildlife" means all species of the animal kingdom whose
14 members exist in Washington in a wild state. This includes but is not
15 limited to mammals, birds, reptiles, amphibians, fish, and
16 invertebrates. The term "wildlife" does not include feral domestic
17 mammals, old world rats and mice of the family Muridae of the order
18 Rodentia, or those fish, shellfish, and marine invertebrates
19 classified as food fish or shellfish by the director. The term
20 "wildlife" includes all stages of development and the bodily parts of
21 wildlife members.

22 (73) "Wildlife meat cutter" means a person who packs, cuts,
23 processes, or stores wildlife for consumption for another for
24 commercial purposes.

25 (74) "Youth" means a person (~~((fifteen years old for fishing and))~~)
26 under sixteen years old for fishing and hunting.

27 **Sec. 2.** RCW 77.12.810 and 1998 c 191 s 30 are each amended to
28 read as follows:

29 (~~((As provided in RCW 77.32.440, a portion))~~) Four percent of the
30 revenue received from the sale of each small game hunting license fee
31 shall be deposited in the eastern Washington pheasant enhancement
32 account created in RCW 77.12.820.

33 **Sec. 3.** RCW 77.32.070 and 2008 c 244 s 1 are each amended to
34 read as follows:

35 (1) Applicants for a license, permit, tag, or stamp shall furnish
36 the information required by the director. However, the director may
37 not require the purchaser of a razor clam license under RCW 77.32.520
38 to provide any personal information except for proof of residency.

1 The commission may adopt rules requiring licensees or permittees to
2 keep records and make reports concerning the taking of or effort to
3 harvest fish, shellfish, and wildlife. The reporting requirement may
4 be waived where, for any reason, the department is not able to
5 receive the report. The department must provide reasonable options
6 for a licensee to submit information to a live operator prior to the
7 reporting deadline.

8 (2) (a) The commission may, by rule, set an administrative penalty
9 for failure to comply with rules requiring the reporting of taking or
10 effort to harvest wildlife. The commission may also adopt rules
11 requiring hunters who have not reported (~~for the previous license~~
12 ~~year~~) to complete a report and pay the assessed administrative
13 penalty before a new hunting license is issued.

14 (~~(a) The total administrative penalty per hunter set by the~~
15 ~~commission must not exceed ten dollars.))~~

16 (b) By December 31st of each year, the department shall report
17 the rate of hunter compliance with the harvest reporting requirement,
18 the administrative penalty imposed for failing to report, and the
19 amount of administrative penalties collected during that year to the
20 appropriate fiscal and policy committees of the senate and house of
21 representatives.

22 (3) (a) The commission may, by rule, set an administrative penalty
23 for failure to comply with rules requiring the reporting of data from
24 catch record cards officially endorsed for Puget Sound Dungeness
25 crab. The commission may also adopt rules requiring fishers who
26 possessed a catch record card officially endorsed for Puget Sound
27 Dungeness crab and who have not reported (~~for the previous license~~
28 ~~year~~) to complete a report and pay the assessed administrative
29 penalty before a new catch record card officially endorsed for Puget
30 Sound Dungeness crab is issued.

31 (~~(a) The total administrative penalty per fisher set by the~~
32 ~~commission must not exceed ten dollars.))~~

33 (b) By December 31st of each year, the department shall report
34 the rate of fisher compliance with the Puget Sound Dungeness crab
35 catch record card reporting requirement, the administrative penalty
36 imposed for failing to report, and the amount of administrative
37 penalties collected during that year to the appropriate fiscal and
38 policy committees of the senate and house of representatives.

1 (4) (a) Fees for recreational fishing are specified in sections 17
2 and 18 of this act and fees for hunting are specified in section 19
3 of this act.

4 (b) Until June 30, 2025, within the funds generated by the fees
5 identified in (a) of this subsection, the department may only fund
6 activities that directly maintain or enhance current recreational
7 fishing and hunting opportunities.

8 **Sec. 4.** RCW 77.32.155 and 2017 c 255 s 1 are each amended to
9 read as follows:

10 (1) (a) When purchasing any hunting license, persons under the age
11 of eighteen shall present certification of completion of a course of
12 instruction of at least ten hours in the safe handling of firearms,
13 safety, conservation, and sporting/hunting behavior. All persons
14 purchasing any hunting license for the first time, if born after
15 January 1, 1972, shall present such certification.

16 (b) (i) The director may establish a program for training persons
17 in the safe handling of firearms, conservation, and sporting/hunting
18 behavior and shall prescribe the type of instruction and the
19 qualifications of the instructors. The director shall, as part of
20 establishing the training program, exempt the following individuals
21 from the firearms skills portion of any instruction course completed
22 over the internet:

23 (A) Members of the United States military;

24 (B) Current or retired general authority Washington peace
25 officers as defined in RCW 10.93.020;

26 (C) Current or retired limited authority Washington peace
27 officers as defined in RCW 10.93.020, if the officer is or was duly
28 authorized by his or her employer to carry a concealed pistol;

29 (D) Current or retired specially commissioned Washington peace
30 officers as defined in RCW 10.93.020, if the officer is or was duly
31 authorized by his or her commissioning agency to carry a concealed
32 pistol; and

33 (E) Current or retired Washington peace officers as defined in
34 RCW 43.101.010 who have met the requirements of RCW 43.101.095 or
35 43.101.157 and whose certification is in good standing or has not
36 been revoked.

37 (ii) The director may cooperate with the national rifle
38 association, organized sports/outdoor enthusiasts' groups, or other

1 public or private organizations when establishing the training
2 program.

3 (c) Upon the successful completion of a course established under
4 this section, the trainee shall receive a hunter education
5 certificate signed by an authorized instructor. The certificate is
6 evidence of compliance with this section.

7 (d) The director may accept certificates from other states that
8 persons have successfully completed firearm safety, hunter education,
9 or similar courses as evidence of compliance with this section.

10 (2)(a) The director may authorize a once in a lifetime, one
11 license year deferral of hunter education training for individuals
12 who are accompanied, while hunting, by a nondeferred Washington-
13 licensed hunter who (~~has held a Washington hunting license for the~~
14 ~~prior three years and~~) is over eighteen years of age. The commission
15 shall adopt rules for the administration of this subsection to avoid
16 potential fraud and abuse.

17 (b) The director is authorized to collect an application fee (~~(~~
18 ~~not to exceed twenty dollars,~~) for obtaining the once in a lifetime,
19 one license year deferral of hunter education training from the
20 department. This fee must be deposited into the fish and wildlife
21 enforcement reward account and must be used exclusively to administer
22 the deferral program created in this subsection.

23 (c) For the purposes of this subsection, "accompanied" means to
24 go along with another person while staying within a range of the
25 other person that permits continual unaided visual and auditory
26 communication.

27 (3) To encourage the participation of an adequate number of
28 instructors for the training program, the commission shall develop
29 nonmonetary incentives available to individuals who commit to serving
30 as an instructor. The incentives may include additional hunting
31 opportunities for instructors.

32 (4) The commission is authorized to adopt rules to offer a one-
33 time discount of up to twenty dollars on a hunting license purchase
34 to first-time resident hunters who have completed the Washington
35 hunter education training program.

36 **Sec. 5.** RCW 77.32.350 and 2011 c 339 s 7 are each amended to
37 read as follows:

38 In addition to a small game hunting license, a supplemental
39 migratory bird permit is required to hunt for migratory birds.

1 ((A)) The migratory bird permit is required for all persons
2 sixteen years of age or older (~~to hunt migratory birds. The fee for~~
3 ~~the permit for hunters is fifteen dollars for residents and~~
4 ~~nonresidents~~). Furthermore, a migratory bird authorization is
5 required for all persons to hunt band-tailed pigeon, brant, sea duck,
6 snow goose, and southwest Canada goose.

7 **Sec. 6.** RCW 77.32.370 and 2011 c 339 s 8 are each amended to
8 read as follows:

9 (1) A special hunting season permit is required to hunt in each
10 special season.

11 (2) Persons may apply for special hunting season permits as
12 provided by rule of the commission.

13 (3) (~~The~~) Persons may apply for multiple season hunting season
14 permits as provided by rule of the commission.

15 (4) Persons may apply for special hunting "quality" permits as
16 provided by rule of the commission. The commission designates as
17 "quality" hunts those that allow the harvest of buck deer, bull elk,
18 or allow the harvest of male big game species that are only available
19 for hunting by a special hunting permit. The commission may authorize
20 a special hunting permit for goat, sheep, moose, or other big game
21 species not specified.

22 (5) An application fee is required to enter a drawing for (~~a~~
23 ~~special hunting season permit or authorization is:~~

24 ~~(a) Six dollars for residents, or one hundred dollars for~~
25 ~~nonresidents, for the permits in categories designated by the~~
26 ~~commission for deer or elk, female big game, or for small game;~~

27 ~~(b) Twelve dollars for residents, or one hundred dollars for~~
28 ~~nonresidents, for the permits that the commission designates as~~
29 ~~"quality" hunts that allow the harvest of buck deer, bull elk, or~~
30 ~~allow the harvest of male big game species that are only available~~
31 ~~for hunting by special permit;~~

32 ~~(c) Twelve dollars for residents and nonresidents to apply for~~
33 ~~special authorizations to hunt for migratory birds; and~~

34 ~~(d) Three dollars for youth for any special hunt drawing or~~
35 ~~special authorization)) all permits in this section.~~

36 **Sec. 7.** RCW 77.32.430 and 2018 c 190 s 1 are each amended to
37 read as follows:

1 (1) Catch record card information is necessary for proper
2 management of the state's food fish and game fish species and
3 shellfish resources. Catch record card administration shall be under
4 rules adopted by the commission. Except as provided in this section,
5 there is no charge for an initial catch record card. Each subsequent
6 or duplicate catch record card (~~(costs eleven dollars)~~) is subject to
7 a fee.

8 (2) A license to take and possess Dungeness crab is only valid in
9 Puget Sound waters east of the Bonilla-Tatoosh line if the fisher has
10 in possession a valid catch record card officially endorsed for
11 Dungeness crab. (~~(The endorsement shall cost no more than seven~~
12 ~~dollars and fifty cents when purchased for a personal use saltwater,~~
13 ~~combination, or shellfish and seaweed license. The endorsement shall~~
14 ~~cost no more than three dollars when purchased for a temporary~~
15 ~~combination fishing license authorized under RCW 77.32.470(3)(a).)~~)

2 delivery of salmon or other food fish unless a vessel is designated
3 under RCW 77.65.100.
