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1 AN ACT Relating to state reimbursement of election costs;
2 amending RCW 29A.04.410, 29A.04.420, 29A.04.216, 29A.04.430,
3 29A.64.081, and 29A.32.210; making an appropriation; and providing an
4 effective date.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

6 **Sec. 1.** RCW 29A.04.410 and 2013 c 11 s 10 are each amended to
7 read as follows:

8 Every county, city, town, and district, and the state is liable
9 for its proportionate share of the costs when such elections are held
10 in conjunction with other elections held under RCW 29A.04.321 and
11 29A.04.330.

12 Whenever any county, city, town, or district, or the state holds
13 any primary or election, general or special, on an isolated date, all
14 costs of such elections must be borne by the county, city, town, or
15 district concerned, or the state as appropriate.

16 The purpose of this section is to clearly establish that the
17 county is not responsible for any costs involved in the holding of
18 any city, town, (~~or~~) district, state, or federal election.

19 In recovering such election expenses, including a reasonable
20 (~~pro-ration~~) proration of administrative costs, the county auditor
21 shall certify the cost to the county treasurer with a copy to the

1 clerk or auditor of the city, town, or district concerned, or the
2 secretary of state as appropriate. Upon receipt of such certification
3 relating to a city, town, or district, the county treasurer shall
4 make the transfer from any available and appropriate city, town, or
5 district funds to the county current expense fund or to the county
6 election reserve fund if such a fund is established. Each city, town,
7 or district must be promptly notified by the county treasurer
8 whenever such transfer has been completed. However, in those
9 districts wherein a treasurer, other than the county treasurer, has
10 been appointed such transfer procedure does not apply, but the
11 district shall promptly issue its warrant for payment of election
12 costs. State and federal offices are to be considered one entity for
13 purposes of election cost proration and reimbursement.

14 **Sec. 2.** RCW 29A.04.420 and 2019 c 161 s 2 are each amended to
15 read as follows:

16 (1) Whenever federal officers, state officers, or measures are
17 voted upon at a state primary or general election held (~~in an odd-~~
18 ~~numbered year~~) under RCW 29A.04.321, the state of Washington shall
19 assume a prorated share of the costs of that state primary or general
20 election(~~-~~

21 ~~(2) The state shall reimburse counties for~~) for the federal and
22 state offices and measures, including the prorated cost of return
23 postage, required to be included on return envelopes pursuant to RCW
24 29A.40.091(~~, for all elections~~).

25 (~~(3)~~) (2) Whenever a primary or vacancy election is held to
26 fill a vacancy in the position of United States senator or United
27 States representative under chapter 29A.28 RCW, the state of
28 Washington shall assume a prorated share of the costs of that primary
29 or vacancy election.

30 (~~(4)~~) (3) The county auditor shall apportion the state's share
31 of these expenses when prorating election costs under RCW 29A.04.410
32 and in accordance with the state budgeting, accounting, and reporting
33 system, shall file such expense claims with the secretary of state.

34 (~~(5)~~) (4) The secretary of state shall include in his or her
35 biennial budget requests sufficient funds to carry out this section.
36 Reimbursements for election costs shall be from appropriations
37 specifically provided by law for that purpose.

38 (5) State and federal offices are to be considered one entity for
39 purposes of election cost proration and reimbursement.

1 (6) In addition to the state share of election expenses under RCW
2 29A.04.410, each county auditor is entitled to an amount from the
3 state, prorated based on population, of not less than ten percent of
4 the budgeted amount under subsection (4) of this section from the
5 previous fiscal year, for voter outreach. This appropriation must be
6 calculated separately from any prorated share of state costs which
7 the state is required to reimburse under this chapter.

8 (7) As used in this section, "voter outreach" may include printed
9 materials, paid advertising, video, news coverage, social media, or
10 in-person presentations designed to:

11 (a) Educate people about the importance of voting as an act of
12 civic engagement;

13 (b) Spread information about the entire voting process, from
14 voter registration, to ballot deadlines, to election certification;
15 and

16 (c) Reduce participation gaps with outreach to communities with a
17 history of poor voter turnout.

18 **Sec. 3.** RCW 29A.04.216 and 2013 c 11 s 7 are each amended to
19 read as follows:

20 The county auditor of each county shall be ex officio the
21 supervisor of all primaries and elections, general or special, and it
22 shall be the county auditor's duty to provide places for holding such
23 primaries and elections; to provide the supplies and materials
24 necessary for the conduct of elections; and to publish and post
25 notices of calling such primaries and elections in the manner
26 provided by law. The auditor shall also apportion to the county, each
27 city, town, or district, and to the state of Washington (~~in the odd-~~
28 ~~numbered year~~), its share of the expense of such primaries and
29 elections. This section does not apply to general or special
30 elections for any city, town, or district that is not subject to RCW
31 29A.04.321 and 29A.04.330, but all such elections must be held and
32 conducted at the time, in the manner, and by the officials (with such
33 notice, requirements for filing for office, and certifications by
34 local officers) as provided and required by the laws governing such
35 elections. State and federal offices are to be considered one entity
36 for purposes of election cost proration and reimbursement.

37 **Sec. 4.** RCW 29A.04.430 and 2003 c 111 s 148 are each amended to
38 read as follows:

1 For any reimbursement of election costs under RCW 29A.04.420, the
2 secretary of state shall pay (~~interest at an annual rate equal to~~
3 ~~two percentage points in excess of the discount rate on ninety-day~~
4 ~~commercial paper in effect at the federal reserve bank in San~~
5 ~~Francisco on the fifteenth day of the month immediately preceding the~~
6 ~~payment for any period of time in excess of~~) within thirty days
7 after the receipt of a properly executed and documented voucher for
8 such expenses and the entry of an allotment from specifically
9 appropriated funds for this purpose until those funds are exhausted.
10 If funds appropriated for this purpose are not sufficient to pay all
11 claims, the secretary of state shall include a budget request to the
12 legislature during the next legislative session for sufficient funds
13 for reimbursement of all remaining claims and shall pay all properly
14 executed and documented vouchers to the counties within thirty days
15 of allotment of specifically appropriated funds for this purpose. The
16 secretary of state shall promptly notify any county that submits an
17 incomplete or inaccurate voucher for reimbursement under RCW
18 29A.04.420.

19 **Sec. 5.** RCW 29A.64.081 and 2004 c 271 s 181 are each amended to
20 read as follows:

21 The canvassing board shall determine the expenses for conducting
22 a recount of votes.

23 (~~The~~) (1) For a recount conducted under RCW 29A.64.011, the
24 cost of the recount shall be deducted from the amount deposited by
25 the applicant for the recount at the time of filing the request for
26 the recount, and the balance shall be returned to the applicant. If
27 the costs of the recount exceed the deposit, the applicant shall pay
28 the difference. No charges may be deducted by the canvassing board
29 from the deposit for a recount if the recount changes the result of
30 the nomination or election for which the recount was ordered.

31 (2) For a recount conducted under RCW 29A.64.021, for an office
32 where the candidates filed the declarations of candidacy with the
33 secretary of state, any legislative office, and any congressional
34 office, the county auditor shall file an expense claim for such costs
35 with the secretary of state. The secretary of state shall include a
36 budget request to the legislature during the next legislative session
37 for sufficient funds for reimbursement of all costs of the recount
38 and shall pay all properly executed and documented vouchers to the
39 counties within thirty days of allotment of specifically appropriated

1 funds for this purpose. The secretary of state shall promptly notify
2 any county that submits an incomplete or inaccurate voucher for
3 reimbursement under this section.

4 (3) State and federal offices are to be considered one entity for
5 purposes of election cost proration and reimbursement.

6 **Sec. 6.** RCW 29A.32.210 and 2013 c 11 s 38 are each amended to
7 read as follows:

8 ~~((At least ninety days before))~~ Before any primary or general
9 election, or ~~((at least forty days before))~~ any special election held
10 under RCW 29A.04.321 or 29A.04.330, ~~((the legislative authority of~~
11 ~~any county or first-class or code city may adopt an ordinance~~
12 ~~authorizing the publication and distribution of))~~ each county auditor
13 shall print and distribute a local voters' pamphlet. The pamphlet
14 shall provide information on all measures ~~((within that jurisdiction~~
15 ~~and may, if specified in the ordinance, include information on))~~ and
16 candidates within that jurisdiction. ~~((If both a county and a first-~~
17 ~~class or code city within that county authorize a local voters'~~
18 ~~pamphlet for the same election, the pamphlet shall be produced~~
19 ~~jointly by the county and the first-class or code city. If no~~
20 ~~agreement can be reached between the county and first-class or code~~
21 ~~city, the county and first-class or code city may each produce a~~
22 ~~pamphlet. Any ordinance adopted authorizing a local voters' pamphlet~~
23 ~~may be for a specific primary, special election, or general election~~
24 ~~or for any future primaries or elections.))~~ The format of any local
25 voters' pamphlet shall, whenever applicable, comply with the
26 provisions of this chapter regarding the publication of the state
27 candidates' and voters' pamphlets.

28 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7.** The sum of up to ten percent of the state
29 share of election expenses under RCW 29A.04.410 for the 2019 fiscal
30 year, or as much thereof as may be necessary, is appropriated for the
31 fiscal biennium ending June 30, 2021, from the general fund to the
32 office of the secretary of state for the purposes of allocation to
33 county auditors for the purpose of voter outreach, as defined in RCW
34 29A.04.420(7).

35 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 8.** This act takes effect July 1, 2021.

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
