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STYLE AND FORMAT OF THE WASHINGTON STATE REGISTER

1. ARRANGEMENT OF THE REGISTER

Documents are arranged within each issue of the Register according to the order in which they are filed in the code reviser's office during the pertinent filing period. The three part number in the heading distinctively identifies each document, and the last part of the number indicates the filing sequence within an issue's material.

2. PROPOSED, ADOPTED, AND EMERGENCY RULES OF STATE AGENCIES AND INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION

The three types of rule-making actions taken under the Administrative Procedure Act (chapter 34.04 RCW) or the Higher Education Administrative Procedure Act (chapter 28B.19 RCW) may be distinguished by the size and style of type in which they appear.

- (a) Proposed rules are those rules pending permanent adoption by an agency and set forth in eight point type.
- (b) Adopted rules have been permanently adopted and are set forth in ten point type.
- (c) Emergency rules have been adopted on an emergency basis and are set forth in ten point oblique type.

3. PRINTING STYLE—INDICATION OF NEW OR DELETED MATTER

RCW 34.04.058 requires the use of certain marks to indicate amendments to existing agency rules. This style quickly and graphically portrays the current changes to existing rules as follows:

- (a) In amendatory sections
 - (i) <u>underlined matter</u> is new matter;
 - (ii) deleted matter is ((lined out and bracketed between double parentheses));
- (b) Complete new sections are prefaced by the heading <u>NEW SECTION</u>;
- (c) The repeal of an entire section is shown by listing its WAC section number and caption under the heading REPEALER.

4. EXECUTIVE ORDERS, COURT RULES, NOTICES OF PUBLIC MEETINGS

Material contained in the Register other than rule-making actions taken under the APA or the HEAPA does not necessarily conform to the style and format conventions described above. The headings of these other types of material have been edited for uniformity of style; otherwise the items are shown as nearly as possible in the form submitted to the code reviser's office.

5. EFFECTIVE DATE OF RULES

- (a) Permanently adopted agency rules take effect thirty days after the rules and the agency order adopting them are filed with the code reviser. This effective date may be delayed, but not advanced, and a delayed effective date will be noted in the promulgation statement preceding the text of the rule.
- (b) Emergency rules take effect upon filing with the code reviser and remain effective for a maximum of ninety days from that date.
- (c) Rules of the state Supreme Court generally contain an effective date clause in the order adopting the rules.

6. EDITORIAL CORRECTIONS

Material inserted by the code reviser for purposes of clarification or correction or to show the source or history of a document is enclosed in brackets [].

7. INDEX AND TABLES

A combined subject matter and agency index and a table of WAC sections affected may be found at the end of each issue.

Chapter 248-21 WAC HOSPICE CARE CENTER

NEW SECTION

WAC 248-21-001 PURPOSE. Regulations for hospice care centers are hereby adopted pursuant to chapter 70.41 RCW. The purpose of these regulations is to provide minimal standards for safety and adequate care of terminally ill individuals who choose to receive palliative rather than curative care and treatment for varying periods of time in a segregated, organized, specialized hospital or health care center.

NEW SECTION

- WAC 248-21-002 DEFINITIONS. For the purposes of these regulations, the following words and phrases shall have the following meanings unless the context clearly indicates otherwise.
- (1) "Active volunteer" means unpaid worker(s) providing direct care to patients or clients and/or working with clinical records or confidential client information.
- (2) "Adjunctive therapies" means those prescribed services provided by medically related disciplines which include but are not limited to physical therapy, occupational therapy, recreational therapy, music therapy, respiratory therapy.
- (3) "Administrator" means an individual appointed as chief executive officer by the governing body of the center to act in its behalf in the overall management of the hospice care center.
- (4) "Authenticated" or "authentication" means authorization of a written entry in a record or chart by means of a signature which shall include, minimally, first initial, last name, and title.

- (5) "Bathing facility" means a bathtub, shower or equivalent.
- (6) "Bereavement care" means consultation, support, counseling and follow-up of the client before and following the death of a patient.
- (7) "Board" means the Washington state board of health.
- (8) "Client" means the patient and family which together compose the unit of care in the hospice care center.
- (9) "Client education" means provision of information on physical care, disease symptomatology, palliative treatment, psychosocial coping skills, availability and utilization of community resources.
- (10) "Clinical record" means a file containing all pertinent clinical information about a particular patient, to include: Identifying information, data bases, assessment, individualized comprehensive care plan, diagnosis, treatment, progress notes, other clinical events, and a discharge summary.
- (11) "Department" means the Washington state department of social and health services.
- (12) "Dietitian" means a person who is eligible for membership in the American dietetic association.
- (13) "Drug" means medication, chemical, device, or other material used in the diagnosis and/or treatment of injury, illness or disease.
- (14) "Drug administration" means an act in which a single dose of a prescribed drug or a biological is given to a patient by an authorized person in accordance with all laws and regulations governing such acts. The complete act of administration entails removing an individual dose from a previously dispensed, properly labeled container, verifying it with the order of the physician, giving the individual dose to the proper patient, and properly recording the time and dose given.
- (15) "Drug dispensing" means an act entailing the interpretation of an order (prescription) for a drug or biological and, pursuant to that order, (prescription), proper selection, measuring, labeling, packaging and issuance of the drug for a patient or for a service unit of the facility.
- (16) "Family" means individuals, who need not be relatives, who are important to a patient and designated by that patient.
- (17) "Governing body" means the individual or group legally responsible for the operation and maintenance of the hospice care center.
- (18) "Grade" means the level of the ground adjacent to the building measured at required windows. The ground must be level or slope downward for a distance of at least ten feet from the wall of the building. From there the ground may slope upward not greater than an average of one foot vertical to two feet horizontal within a distance of eighteen feet from the building.
- (19) "Hospice care center" means any building, facility, place or equivalent organized, maintained and operated specifically to provide beds, accommodations, facilities and services over a continuous period of twenty-four hours or more for palliative care of two or more

individuals, not related to the operator, who are diagnosed as being in the latter stages of an advanced disease which is expected to lead to death. Hospice care centers are specialized types of health care facilities which come within the scope of chapter 70.41 RCW. hospital licensing and regulation. Hospice care centers may be freestanding or separately licensed portions or areas of another type of health care facility: PROVID-ED, That the hospice care center is under control and administered by a separate and autonomous governing body. Hospice care centers as used in this chapter, do not include hotels or similar places furnishing only food and lodging or similar domiciliary care; nor does it include clinics or physicians offices where patients are not regularly kept as bed patients for twenty-four hours or more; nor does it include hospitals licensed pursuant to chapter 70.41 RCW which provide services in addition to or in combination with hospice care services; nor does it include nursing homes as defined and which come under the scope of chapter 18.51 RCW; nor does it include psychiatric hospitals, which come under the scope of chapter 71.12 RCW; nor any other hospital, or institution specifically intended for use in the diagnosis and care of those suffering mental illness, mental retardation, convulsive disorders or other abnormal mental conditions. Furthermore, nothing in this act or the rules and regulations adopted pursuant thereto, shall be construed as authorizing the supervision, regulation, or control of the remedial care or treatment of residents or patients in any hospital conducted for those who rely primarily upon treatment by prayer or spiritual means in accordance with the creeds or tenants of any well recognized church or religious denomination.

(20) "Hospital" means any institution, place, building or agency which provides accommodations, facilities, and services over a continuous period of twenty-four hours or more, for observation, diagnosis, or care, of two or more individuals not related to the operator who are suffering from illness, injury, deformity or abnormality, or from any other condition for which obstetrical, medical, or surgical services would be appropriate for care or diagnosis. "Hospital", as used in this chapter does not include hotels, or similar places furnishing only food and lodging, or simply domiciliary care; nor does it include clinics, or physicians offices where patients are not regularly kept as bed patients for twenty-four hours or more; nor does it include nursing homes, as defined and which come under the scope of chapter 18.51 RCW; nor does it include maternity homes, which come under the scope of chapter 18.46 RCW; nor does it include psychiatric hospitals, which come within the scope of chapter 71.12 RCW; nor any other hospital, or institution specifically intended for use in the diagnosis and care of those suffering from mental illness, mental retardation, convulsive disorders or other abnormal mental conditions. Furthermore, nothing in this chapter or the rules and regulations adopted pursuant thereto, shall be construed as authorizing the supervision, regulation, or control of the remedial care or treatment of residents or patients in any hospital conducted for those who rely primarily upon treatment by prayer or spiritual means in accordance with the creed or tenets of any well recognized church or religious denominations.

- (21) "Individualized care plan" means a written statement of care to be provided for a client based upon physical, psychosocial, spiritual assessment of the patient, and assessment of family as appropriate. This statement shall include short—and long—term goals, client education, discharge planning, and the name of the individual member of the interdisciplinary care team designated as responsible for implementation. This statement shall be developed with participation of clients as appropriate.
- (22) "Interdisciplinary care team" means a group composed of the patient, the family, and professional care providers which may include, but not limited to, required adjunctive therapists, registered nurses, nutritionists, spiritual advisors, pharmacists, physicians, mental health professionals, or social workers. "Core team" means those individuals required to provide services for clients within the hospice care center program and shall include a registered nurse, physician, medical director, social worker, spiritual consultant or advisor, and volunteer director.
- (23) "Lavatory" means a plumbing fixture designed and equipped for handwashing purposes.
- (24) "Licensed nurse" means a registered nurse under provisions of chapter 18.88 RCW or a licensed practical nurse under provisions of chapter 18.78 RCW.
- (25) "Medical staff" means physicians and other medical practitioners appointed by the governing body to practice within the parameters of the medical staff bylaws of the hospice care center.
- (26) "New construction" means any of the following started after promulgation of these rules and regulations:
- (a) New building(s) to be used as part of the hospice care center;
- (b) Addition(s) to existing hospice care center to be used as part of the hospice care center;
- (c) Alteration(s) or modification(s) other than minor alteration(s) to a hospice care center. "Minor alternation(s)" means any structural or functional modification within the existing center which does not change the approved use of the room or area. Minor alterations performed under this definition do not require prior approval of the department.
- (27) "Palliative care" means activities, interventions and interactions which are planned and executed to cause a lessening or reduction of physical, psychosocial and spiritual pain and intended to ease without curing.
 - (28) "Patient" means the terminally ill individual.
- (29) "Patient care coordinator" means a designated, qualified employee who is responsible for the organization, implementation and evaluation of the individualized care plan of a patient.
- (30) "Person" means any individual, firm, partnership, corporation, company, association or joint stock association, and the legal successor thereof.
- (31) "Personnel" means individuals employed and receiving monetary payment from the hospice care center.
- (32) "Pharmacist" means an individual who is licensed by the state board of pharmacy to engage in the

practice of pharmacy under the provisions of chapter 18.64 RCW.

- (33) "Physician" means an individual licensed under provisions of chapter 18.71 RCW, Physicians or 18.57 RCW, Osteopathy—Osteopathic Medicine and Surgery.
- (34) "Prescription" means a written or oral order for drugs issued by a medical practitioner, licensed in the state of Washington, in the course of his or her professional practice, as defined by Washington state statute, for a legitimate medical purpose (RCW 18.64.011(a)).
- (35) "Registered nurse" means an individual licensed under the provisions of the law regulating the practice of registered nursing in the state of Washington, chapter 18.88 RCW.
- (36) "Scheduled drug" means those substances or immediate precursors listed in Schedules I through V, Article II, RCW 69.50.201, state uniform substance act, now or is hereafter amended.
- (37) "Self-administration" means those instances when a patient or member of the client family administer a medication from a properly labeled container while on the premises of the hospice care center.
- (38) "Shall" means compliance when the regulation is mandatory.
- (39) "Should" means compliance with the regulation or rule is suggested or recommended but not required.
- (40) "Social worker" means an individual with a masters degree in social work from an accredited school of social work or an individual eligible for membership in the academy of certified social workers.
- (41) "Staff" means those individuals providing services within the hospice care center. These individuals may be paid or unpaid and shall be designated as medical staff, personnel or volunteers, respectively.
- (42) "Toilet" means a room containing at least one water closet.
- (43) "Useable floor area" means floor spaces in patient rooms excluding areas taken up by vestibules, closets, wardrobes, portable lockers, lavatories, and toilet rooms.
- (44) "Water closet" means a plumbing fixture fitted with a seat and a device for flushing the bowl of the fixture with water.

NEW SECTION

- WAC 248-21-005 LICENSURE. (1) After January 1, 1982, no person acting separately or jointly with any other person shall establish, maintain, conduct or operate a hospice care center in this state or use the words "hospice care center" to describe or identify a place or building which does not have a license as a hospice care center as defined and described herein.
- (2) An application for a hospice care center license shall be submitted to the department on forms provided by the department. The application shall be signed by the operator of the facility and the legal representative of the governing body.
- (3) Other requirements related to licensure, fees, and inspection are as stipulated in RCW 70.41.100, 70.41.110, 70.41.120, 70.41.130, 70.41.140, 70.41.150, 70.41.160 and 70.41.170.

- (4) There shall be compliance with other regulations to include:
- (a) Applicable rules and regulations for hospice care centers adopted by the Washington state fire marshal pursuant to RCW 70.41.080 and chapter 48.48 RCW:
- (b) Applicable national, state, and local electrical, fire, zoning, building, and plumbing codes.

NEW SECTION

WAC 248-21-010 GOVERNING BODY AND ADMINISTRATION. (1) The hospice care center shall have a governing body which is responsible for the overall operation and maintenance of the center.

(2) The governing body shall be responsible for the provision of personnel, facilities, equipment, supplies and

special services to meet the needs of clients.

- (3) The governing body shall assure, through documentation of a biennial review, the establishment and maintenance of a current, written organizational plan which includes all positions and services and delineates responsibilities, authority and relationship of the positions within the center. The governing body shall approve medical staff bylaws, rules, and regulations to include conditions for medical staff membership, delineation of medical staff privileges, and organization of the medical staff.
- (4) The governing body shall establish, review biennially, and revise as needed written policies related to the safety, care, and treatment of clients and policies for staff.
- (5) The governing body shall appoint an administrator who shall be responsible for implementing the policies adopted by the governing body.
- (6) The governing body shall have the authority and responsibility for appointment, review, and reappointment of the medical staff.
- (7) The governing body shall appoint a physician as medical director.

NEW SECTION

WAC 248-21-015 STAFF—PERSONNEL—VOLUNTEERS. (1) There shall be sufficient qualified staff to provide the services needed by clients and to provide for the safe maintenance and operation of the hospice care center. Appropriate "on call" schedules shall be available.

- (a) There shall be a written job description for each position classification, including active volunteers;
- (b) There shall be a written record for each employee and active volunteer to include application, verification of education and training, verification of a valid, current license for any staff member when licensure is required for tasks performed, record of orientation, ongoing education and an annual, written performance evaluation;
- (c) There shall be regular coordination, and supervision of each staff member consistent with the organizational plan;

(d) There shall be written policies, procedures, and

screening criteria.

(2) A planned, supervised, and documented orientation shall be provided for each new employee and active

volunteer to include but not limited to fire, disaster, infection control procedures, and confidentiality.

(3) There shall be planned ongoing education affording each employee and active volunteer an opportunity to maintain and update the skills needed to perform assigned duties.

NEW SECTION

WAC 248-21-020 POLICIES AND PROCE-DURES. Written policies and procedures shall include but not be limited to:

- (1) Admission criteria or definition of the patients who shall be eligible for services offered in the hospice care center
- (2) Coordinated transfer of patients to and from home or other facilities as desired, including transfer of appropriate information.
- (3) Needed psychosocial support for all members of the interdisciplinary care team and volunteers.
- (4) Smoking by staff, clients, and others within the center.
- (5) Fire and disaster with planned, documented rehearsals and appropriate emergency phone numbers available and posted.
- (6) Action to be taken in event of failure of essential equipment and major utilities services. The written procedure shall include a system for summoning essential assistance when required.
- (7) Actions to be taken following an accident or incident which may be injurious to clients.
- (8) Consideration of family sleeping or living spaces within the facility.
- (9) Consideration of family participation in patient care.

NEW SECTION

WAC 248-21-025 PATIENT CARE SERVICES. (1) There shall be evidence of interdisciplinary planning and provision of coordinated palliative care of clients during, between and after presence in the facility with an emphasis on symptom management specific to the desires and needs of the individual patients.

- (a) An individualized care plan shall be developed upon initial admission, implemented, monitored and modified as needed.
- (b) There shall be a designated patient care coordinator.
 - (2) Core team services shall include the following:
 - (a) Physician services.
- (i) Each patient admitted to the center shall be under the care of a physician.
- (ii) The medical director shall be responsible for general performance of medical staff within the hospice care center.
 - (b) Nursing services.
- (i) A registered nurse who is an employee shall be responsible for supervision of nursing services.

- (ii) There shall be a licensed nurse on duty within the center at all times when patients are present. A registered nurse shall be immediately available by phone at all times.
- (c) Social work services. There shall be sufficient, qualified social work staff coordinated by a social worker to provide psychosocial services as appropriate.
- (d) Spiritual counseling services. Provisions shall be made for the individual spiritual needs of each patient, and family as possible.
- (e) Bereavement care services. The center shall be responsible for arranging for the provision of a bereavement care program which shall be integrated into the individualized care plan.
- (f) Home care services. There shall be provision for continuity of patient care through a certified home care program and/or liaison with a certified home care service in the community, as indicated in the individualized care plan.
- (g) The center shall facilitate obtaining of prescribed diagnostic, treatment or palliative services.
- (h) Hospice care centers should employ and/or arrange translation and consultation to facilitate communication where barriers exist, (i.e., language or cultural differences; hearing, speech or sight impairment).

NEW SECTION

WAC 248-21-030 FOOD AND DIETARY SER-VICES. (1) The dietary and food service shall be provided and managed by an individual trained in food service.

(2) Food and dietary services shall incorporate the periodic input of a dietitian. Appropriate nutritional and dietary consultation shall be provided patients.

- (3) Food shall be prepared and served at intervals appropriate to the needs of patients. Unless contraindicated, current recommendations of the food and nutrition board of the national research counsel adjusted for age, sex, and activity shall be used. Snacks of a nourishing quality shall be available as needed for patients. Cultural and ethnic preferences of patients should be respected in planning and serving meals.
- (4) There shall be written physician orders for all therapeutic diets served to patients. A current therapeutic diet manual approved in writing by a dietitian and the medical director shall be used for planning and preparing therapeutic diets.
 - (5) All menus shall be retained for one year.
- (6) When the hospice care center policy provides for allowing for the preparation and/or storage of personal food brought in by clients for consumption by clients, there shall be adequate mechanical refrigeration capable of maintaining a temperature of forty-five degrees farenheit or lower and dishwashing facilities which provide hot water at a temperature of not less than one hundred fifty degrees farenheit. Suitable dining area(s) should be provided for clients.
- (7) Food service sanitation shall be governed by chapter 248-84 WAC, rules and regulations of the state board of health governing food service sanitation.
- (8) There shall be current written policies and procedures for food storage, food preparation, food service,

scheduled cleaning of all food service equipment and work areas. A copy of the procedures shall be kept within the food service area and shall be available for reference by dietary or food service personnel and other personnel at all times.

NEW SECTION

- WAC 248-21-035 INFECTION CONTROL. (1) There shall be written policies and procedures addressing infection control, including: Housekeeping; cleaning, sterilization, disinfection, sanitization, and storage of supplies and equipment; health of personnel; pets; food service sanitation.
- (2) Provision shall be made for isolation of patients with infectious conditions in accordance with Isolation Techniques For Use In Hospitals, United States Department of Health and Human Services, most recent edition.
- (3) There shall be reporting of communicable disease in accordance with chapter 248-100 WAC.
- (4) Recognized standards of medical aseptic technique including basic hand washing practices shall be followed in all direct personal care of patients.
- (5) Methods for cleaning, disinfecting or sterilizing, handling and storage of all supplies and equipment shall be such as to prevent the transmission of infection.
- (6) Written procedures shall specify daily and periodic cleaning schedules and routines for facility and equipment.
- (7) Sewage, garbage, refuse, and liquid waste shall be collected and disposed of in a manner to prevent the creation of an unsafe or unsanitary condition or nuisance.
- (8) There shall be in effect a current system of discovering, reporting, investigating, and reviewing infections among patients and personnel with maintenance of records on such infections.
- (9) Upon employment and annually thereafter each employee and volunteer shall have or provide documented evidence of a tuberculin skin test by the Mantoux method, unless medically contraindicated. A negative skin test shall consist of less than ten millimeters induration read at forty-eight to seventy-two hours. A positive skin test shall consist of ten millimeters of induration, or greater, read at forty-eight to seventy-two hours. Positive reactors shall have a chest x-ray within ninety days of the first day of employment. Exceptions and specifics are as follows:
- (a) Those with positive skin tests as defined above shall have an annual screening in the form of a chest x-ray;
- (b) Those with positive skin tests whose chest x-rays show no sign of active disease at least two years after the first documented positive skin test shall be exempted from further annual testing and chest x-rays;
- (c) Those with positive skin tests who have completed the recommended course of preventive or curative treatment, as determined by the local health officer, shall be exempted from further testing;
- (d) A record of test results, x-rays or exemptions from such, shall be kept by the facility.

(10) Employees with a communicable disease in a known infectious stage shall not be on duty. Policy and procedures shall specify conditions for staff who are working despite presence of communicable disease.

NEW SECTION

- WAC 248-21-040 PHARMACEUTICAL SERV-ICE. (1) Pharmaceutical services shall be available to provide drugs and supplies and to fill, without delay, orders for drugs to be administered. A pharmacist shall provide sufficient on-site consultation to ensure that medications are secured, labeled, stored and utilized in accordance with the policies of the center and appropriate standards of pharmacy practice.
- (2) The hospice care center shall provide for the proper handling and utilization of drugs in accordance with federal and state laws and regulations:
- (a) A pharmacist in conjunction with representatives from nursing, medical and administrative staff, shall be responsible for developing written policies and procedures addressing all aspects of pharmaceutical services including: Procuring, prescribing, administering, dispensing and storage of medications, transcription of orders; use of protocols; disposal of drugs; self-administration of medications; control or disposal of drugs brought into the facility by patients; and recording of drug administration in the clinical records;
- (b) There shall be written orders signed by a physician for all medications administered to patients or self-administered. There shall be a system which ensures accuracy in receiving, transcribing and implementing orders for the administration of medications;
- (c) Drugs shall be dispensed only by a pharmacist. Drugs shall be administered only by practitioners licensed to administer drugs except in those instances when self-administration has been ordered;
- (d) Drug containers within the center shall be clearly and legibly labeled and the label shall include at least the drug name (generic and/or trade), drug strength, expiration date if applicable, and in addition the lot number of the drug, if provided as floor stock;
- (e) All drugs shall be stored in specifically designated, securely locked, well illuminated cabinets, closets or store rooms and made accessible only to authorized personnel. External medications shall be separated from internal medications;
- (f) Poisonous and/or caustic drugs and materials including housekeeping and personal grooming supplies shall show proper warning or poison labels and shall be stored safely and separately from other drugs and food supplies;
- (g) All Schedule II drugs in any area of the hospice care center shall be checked by two licensed persons at least one time each shift. There shall be records of receipt, issuance, and disposition of Schedule II drugs stored in the facility.
- (3) Drugs brought into the hospice care center by patients for use by patients while in the center shall be specifically ordered by a physician. These drugs shall be checked to ensure proper identification and acceptable quality for use in the center.

NEW SECTION

WAC 248-21-045 CLINICAL RECORDS. (1) The hospice care center shall have one well defined clinical record system, adequate facilities, equipment and supplies necessary for the development, maintenance, security, control, retrieval, analysis, use and preservation of patient care data.

(2) The hospice care center shall have current written policies and procedures related to the clinical record system which shall include the following:

system which shan melude the following.

- (a) Establishment of a standardized format for clinical records;
- (b) Prohibition of the release of client information without specific, written approval of the individual client concerned;
- (c) Retention, preservation, and destruction of clinical records.
- (3) There shall be an adequate clinical record maintained for every patient and readily accessible to members of the interdisciplinary care team. Each entry shall be legible, dated and authenticated.
- (4) The originals or durable, legible direct copies of original reports shall be filed in the patients individual clinical record.
- (5) Diagnosis, abbreviations, and terminology shall be consistent with the most recent edition of the International Classification of Diseases.
 - (6) There shall be a master patient index.
- (7) Procedures related to retention, preservation or final disposal of clinical records and other patient care data and reports shall include the following:
- (a) The clinical record of each patient over the age of eighteen years shall be retained and preserved for a period of no less than ten years. Clinical records of patients under the age of eighteen shall be retained and preserved for at least ten years or until the patient attains the age of twenty—one whichever is the longer period of time;
- (b) Final disposal of any patient clinical record, or other reports which permit identification of the individual shall be accomplished so that retrieval and subsequent use of the data contained therein are impossible;
- (c) In event of a transfer of ownership or operation of a hospice care center, clinical records of the patients, indices and reports shall be retained and preserved by the new operator in accordance with subsections (2)(a), (b), and (3) of this section;
- (d) If the hospice care center ceases operation, it shall make arrangements for preservation of its clinical records and reports of patient data in accordance with subsection (3) of this section. The plan for such arrangements shall have been approved by the department prior to the cessation of operation.

NEW SECTION

WAC 248-21-050 PHYSICAL ENVIRONMENT AND EQUIPMENT. (1) The hospice care center shall provide a safe and clean environment for clients, staff, and visitors. Equipment shall be kept clean, calibrated, adjusted, and in good repair.

- (2) The hospice care center shall be accessible and equipped to accommodate physically handicapped individuals, to include minimally:
- (a) Corridors serving as egress from patient rooms eight feet wide;
- (b) Corridors elsewhere in the center minimally four feet wide:
- (c) Doorways for use by clients at least thirty-two inches clear width (thirty-four inch door);
- (d) Doorways for patient rooms and exterior exit doors from eight foot corridors forty-four inches clear width, (forty-six inch door);
- (e) Minimally, one toilet, lavatory, and bathing facility which meet barrier free code, on each floor used for client services;
- (f) Stairways and stairwells shall be minimally forty-four inches clear width;
- (i) Interior and exterior stairways and stairwells shall have handrails on both sides. Railing ends shall be returned to wall;
- (ii) Exterior stairways and stairwells shall have adequate protection from moisture, ice, other hazards, and slipping.
- (iii) Exterior steps shall be equipped with nonslip material on treads; open risers are prohibited; nosing shall be flush, slip resistant and rounded to one-half inch maximum radius.
- (g) Ramps shall be minimally forty-four inches clear width;
 - (i) There shall be handrails on both sides;
- (ii) Ramps shall not exceed slope ratio of one in twelve:
 - (iii) Ramps shall be provided with nonslip surfaces.
- (3) There shall be provision for adequate personal privacy for personal and private activities such as toileting, bathing, dressing, sleeping, communicating with family and time alone.
 - (4) Patient rooms:
- (a) Each patient room shall be directly accessible from a corridor or common use activity room or an area for patients;
- (b) Each sleeping room shall have a clear window or relite area of approximately one—tenth of the usable floor area providing for patient visibility of the out—of—doors. A court or glass covered atrium may be equivalent to out—of—doors. Distance from relites to exterior windows or atrium relites shall not exceed eight feet, six inches.
- (i) Windows shall be at least twenty-four feet from other buildings or the opposite wall of a court or at least ten feet from a property line, except on street sides;
- (ii) If the depth of a court is less than one-half its width, the width requirement shall not apply.
- (iii) Outside window walls shall be at least eight feet from outside public walkways.
- (iv) Operable windows or openings that serve for ventilation shall be provided with screening.
- (c) No room more than two foot six inches below grade shall be used for the housing of patients. Room size shall be determined by program, provided all patient rooms have at least one hundred square feet of usable floor space in each single patient room. Multi-patient

rooms shall provide not less than eighty-five square feet of usable floor area per bed. There shall not be less than seven and one-half foot ceiling height over the usable floor area;

- (d) Each patient shall be provided an enclosed space suitable for hanging garments and storage of personal belongings within his or her room or nearby. There shall be provision for secure storage of patient valuables;
- (e) Each patient shall be provided a bed appropriate to the special needs and size of the patient with a cleanable mattress which is in good repair and a cleanable or disposable pillow;
- (f) Room furnishings shall be provided and maintained in a clean and safe condition;
- (g) Patient beds shall be spaced so that they do not interfere with entrance, exit or traffic flow within the room. Patient rooms shall be of a dimension and conformation allowing not less than three feet between beds.
- (5) There shall be, minimally, one bathing facility for each six patients within the center, or major fraction thereof, (tub, shower, portable shower, portable tub or equivalent). This ratio includes the bathing facility described in WAC 248-21-050(2)(e).
- (6) Toilets shall be in a ratio of at least one toilet for every four patients, or major fraction thereof. This ratio excludes toilet described in WAC 248-21-050(2)(e).
- (7) Lavatories shall be provided in a ratio of at least one lavatory for each toilet located in toilet room(s). Lavatories shall be provided in a ratio of at least one per four patients. Lavatories shall be located at entry of patient rooms used for isolation.
- (8) At least one toilet and lavatory shall be provided on each floor for use by those who are not patients. This may include toilet and lavatory described in WAC 248-21-050(2)(e).
- (9) Carpets may be used in patient and nonpatient occupied areas with the following exceptions; toilet rooms, bathing facilities, isolation rooms, laundry rooms, utility rooms, examination or treatment rooms, house-keeping closets;
 - (a) Specifications for acceptable carpeting include:
- (i) Carpet material which meets the standards of the state fire marshal and is easily cleanable;
- (ii) Pile tufts shall be a minimum of sixty-four per square inch or equivalent density;
- (iii) Rows shall be a minimum of eight per square inch or equivalent density;
 - (b) Installation of carpet material.
- (i) Pad and carpet shall be installed according to manufacturer recommendations;
- (ii) Edges of carpet shall be covered and cove or base shoe used at all wall junctures. Seams shall be sewn or bonded together with manufacturer recommended cement.
- (10) There shall be adequate visiting and lounge areas provided, excluding hallways and corridors. Ratio of fifteen square feet per patient bed and not less than one hundred eighty square feet per facility recommended, excluding hallways and corridors.
- (11) There shall be adequate meeting rooms and office areas for use by the interdisciplinary care team.

Other rooms or areas may serve as meeting rooms provided confidentiality is maintained.

- (12) Linen and laundry:
- (a) A safe and adequate clean linen storage area shall be provided with a supply of clean linen available for patients use;
- (b) Any laundry done in the facility shall be done in a laundry room separate from the kitchen, dining areas, clean and soiled storage and handling areas:
- (c) The soiled laundry storage and sorting area shall be in a well ventilated area separate from the clean linen handling area, clean storage areas, and food preparation areas. If linen or laundry is washed on the premises, an adequate supply of hot water shall be available to provide water at a minimum of one hundred sixty degrees farenheit in the washing machine.
 - (13) Utility and storage facilities:
- (a) Sufficient clean storage and handling room(s) shall provide closed storage for clean and sterile supplies and equipment;
- (b) Washing, disinfection, storage and other handling of medical and nursing supplies and equipment shall be accomplished in a manner which ensures segregation of clean and sterile supplies and equipment from those that are contaminated;
 - (c) Soiled room(s) shall provide:
 - (i) Clinic service sink, siphon jet or equivalent;
 - (ii) Space for soiled linen or laundry containers;
- (iii) Counter top, double compartment sink, and goose-neck spout or equivalent;
 - (iv) Storage for cleaning supplies and equipment.
 - (14) Housekeeping:
- (a) Adequate and clean housekeeping equipment shall be maintained;
- (b) At least one service sink and housekeeping closet or enclosed cabinet equipped with shelving shall be provided in a suitable setting within the facility. May be combined with a soiled room as described in WAC 248–21–050(13)(c). Clinic service sink may be considered equivalent to service sink.
 - (15) Communications:
- (a) There shall be a telephone readily available for patients to make and receive confidential calls;
- (b) There shall be at least one "nonpay" telephone per floor readily accessible in event of fire and other emergencies.
- (c) A nurse call shall be provided at each bed and in each toilet room and bathing facility.
- (16) Appropriate first aid supplies and equipment shall be maintained and available in a safe and sanitary location.
- (17) Water supply and plumbing. The water supply plumbing, the fixtures and the waste and drainage system of the hospice care center shall be maintained to avoid insanitary conditions:
- (a) There shall be an adequate supply of hot and cold running water under pressure which conforms with chapter 248-54 WAC;
- (b) Hot water shall be a safe temperature at all fixtures used by patients. Hot water temperatures at bathing fixtures used by patients shall be automatically

regulated so as not to exceed one hundred and twenty degrees farenheit;

- (c) There shall be devices to prevent backflow into the water supply system from fixtures where extension hoses or other cross connections may occur.
- (18) Heating. Heating systems shall be operated and maintained to provide a comfortable, healthful temperature in rooms used by patients during the coldest weather conditions ordinarily encountered in the geographical location of the hospice care center.
- (19) Ventilation. There shall be ventilation of all rooms used by patients and personnel sufficient to remove all objectional odors, excess heat, and condensation. Inside rooms including toilets, bathrooms, smoking rooms, and other rooms in which excessive moisture, odors or contaminants originate shall be provided with mechanical exhaust ventilation.
- (20) Lighting, wiring, and power. Adequate lighting shall be provided in all usable areas of the hospice care center, appropriate to the function:
- (a) Appropriate, adequate, and safe electrical service shall be provided;
- (b) Adequate emergency lighting for means of egress, (battery operated acceptable);
- (c) Adequate emergency power available, (battery operated acceptable).

NEW SECTION

WAC 248-21-055 NONFLAMMABLE MEDI-CAL GASES—RESPIRATORY CARE. (1) Nonflammable medical gases shall include but not be limited to oxygen, nitrous oxide, medical compressed air, carbon dioxide, helium, nitrogen, and mixtures of such gases when used for medical purposes.

- (2) When nonflammable medical gases are stored or used on the premises, the following shall apply:
- (a) Electric equipment used in an oxygen enriched environment shall be properly designed for use with oxygen and should be labeled for use with oxygen;
- (b) "No smoking" signs shall be posted where oxygen is being administered;
- (c) Procedures shall specify the safe storage and handling of medical gas containers.
- (3) When piped-in medical gas systems are provided, the facility shall comply with published standards of National Fire Protection Association 56-F, 1977.
- (4) Equipment and instruments used for respiratory care shall be safe, functional, and appropriate for the respiratory care service provided.

OFFICES AND OFFICERS—STATE—STATE BOARD FOR COMMUNITY COLLEGES—RESPECTIVE POWERS OF COLLEGE BOARD AND LOCAL BOARDS OF TRUSTEES

- (1) The State Board for Community College Education has the authority, under RCW 28B.50.090, to (a) specify the number of days in an academic year or quarter in which instruction must be offered by each of the various community colleges; (b) define the number of hours of instruction that must be provided as the basis for counting a unit of academic credit for state funding purposes; (c) prescribe the maximum number of academic credit units per each particular class that are allowed to be counted for a particular degree or certificate by students enrolled in the various courses offered by the community colleges; and (d) designate a class or course involving students who are repeating a course previously completed and reduce a college's state funded enrollment count by such repeat enrollments.
- (2) The State Board for Community College Education does not have the authority, under RCW 28B.50.090, to (a) change the academic year for all community colleges from a quarter plan to a semester or a trimester plan; or (b) establish a minimum number of days of compensable service to be rendered by faculty and administrators employed by the community colleges.
- (3) To the extent that the State Board for Community College Education determines that accomplishment of the goals described in RCW 28B.50.090(3) requires either or both of those courses of action, the College Board may (a) direct a particular community college to alter its mix of courses in a manner that would make its overall curriculum more comprehensive; and (b) direct a particular community college to terminate a given course or program either because it is deemed to be unproductive (i.e., low enrollment or few completions) or because such termination would enhance the comprehensiveness of the total curriculum.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

This statement is filed pursuant to RCW 34.04.045. Amending chapter 248-17 WAC.

Purpose of the Rule Change is: To make editorial changes, add air ambulances to requirements for licensing and inspection and add eligibility rules for EMT training and performance.

Statutory Authority: RCW 18.73.080.

Summary of Rule Change: WAC 248-17-010 Declaration of Purpose, this is an editorial amendment to remove extraneous material from original rule. Does not change context from original; WAC 248-17-020 Definitions, amendment adds definition of air ambulance, air ambulance service and attending physician as applies to air ambulance operations and changes name of Emergency Medical Services Committee to conform to chapter 18.73 RCW; WAC 248-17-030 License(s) Required, adds air ambulance; deletes fees; WAC 248-17-040 License Expiration Dates, deletes staggered license requirements and changes them to annual for operators; WAC 248-17-050 License Expiration Dates, same as for 248-17-040 above; WAC 248-17-135 Air Ambulance Services, new section which describes minimum standards for personnel and equipment for air ambulances. Excludes aircraft used in rescue operations from these standards; WAC 248-17-211 Basic Life Support—Emergency Medical Technician Qualifications and Training, new section describing qualifications to enroll in EMT training. Limits training to licensed services, police, search and rescue and to qualify for employment in one of these areas. WAC 248-17-212 Emergency Medical Technician Training—Course Content, Registration and Instructor Qualifications, new which mandates the Department section Transportation's 81-hour EMT course as course material to be used; requires approved training agencies to provide training; requires a two week pre-registration for courses; outlines qualifications for instructors; WAC

248-17-213 Emergency Medical Technician Certification and Recertification, sets testing requirements for certification; WAC 248-17-214 Emergency Medical Technician—Reciprocity and Challenges, new section which explains rules on receiving certification through reciprocity; eligibility to challenge examination and eligibility to recertify when certification has expired; WAC 248-17-215 Emergency Medical Technician—Specialized Training, new section which allows a service to train in areas not a part of the standard curriculum such as pneumatic counter pressure devices or defibrillation; describes application procedures, requirement for state protocols and instructor qualifications; requires application form to be approved by the department; WAC 248-17-216 Emergency Medical Technician—Scope of Care Authorized—Prohibition, new section which defines the parameters under which an EMT may perform. Prohibits non-emergent treatment functions; and WAC 248-17-210 Emergency Medical Technician Training, this section is repealed and replaced by the new sections described above.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1150, filed 9/2/76)

WAC 248-17-010 DECLARATION OF PURPOSE. The ((primary)) purpose of this chapter is to promote safe and adequate prehospital care for victims of motor vehicle accidents, suspected coronary illnesses and other acute illness or trauma through the development of rules and regulations for the licensing and inspection of facilities and personnel providing emergency medical care. To accomplish these purposes, this chapter sets out standards governing((, among other matters,)) the ((following: The)) licensing of ambulances, first aid vehicles, ambulance operators, ambulance directors, first aid vehicle operators, and first aid directors; the training and certification of ((advanced first aid qualification and of)) emergency medical technicians; communication equipment and emergency medical communications and liability insurance.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1150, filed 9/2/76)

WAC 248-17-020 DEFINITIONS. For the purpose of these regulations, the following words and phrases shall have the following meaning unless the context clearly indicates otherwise.

(1) "Air ambulance" means a fixed or rotary winged aircraft that is currently certified under Federal Aviation Administration as an air taxi; that may be configured to accommodate a minimum of one litter and two medical attendants with sufficient space to provide intensive and life saving patient care without interfering with the performance of the flight crew; that has sufficient medical supplies and equipment to provide necessary medical treatment at the patient's origin and during flight; has radio equipment capable of two way communication ground-to-air, air-to-air, and air-to-ground including communication with physicians responsible for patient management; has been designed to avoid aggravating the patients condition as to cabin comfort, noise levels and cabin pressurization; has aboard survival equipment in sufficient quantity to accommodate crew and passengers; that has been inspected and licensed by the department as an air ambulance

(2) "Air ambulance service" means a flying service that is currently certified under Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) rules, 14 CFR Part 135, (Air Taxi Operators and Commercial Operators of Small Aircraft); has been inspected by the department and licensed as an air ambulance service and meets the minimum requirements for personnel

and equipment as described elsewhere in this chapter.

(3) "Ambulance" means an emergency vehicle designed and used to transport the ill and injured and to provide facilities and equipment to treat patients before and during transportation.

(4) "Attending physician" as applies to aeromedical evacuation, means a licensed doctor of medicine or osteopathy who provides direction for management of the patient either by attending the patient enroute, by ground-to-air radio communication or by written orders pertaining to inflight medical care. An attending physician must retain responsibility for the medical care of the patient until final destination

(((2))) (5) "First aid vehicle" means a vehicle primarily designed and used to carry first aid equipment and individuals trained in first

aid or emergency medical procedures.

(((3))) (6) "Emergency medical technician" means a person who has successfully completed a prescribed course of instruction and who has achieved a demonstrable level of performance and competence to treat victims of severe injury or other emergent conditions.

(((4))) (7) "Advanced first aid" means a course of instruction recognized by the American Red Cross, Department of Labor and Industry, the U.S. Bureau of Mines, or Fire Services training program.

(((5))) (8) "Standard first aid" means such a prescribed course of instruction recognized and offered by the American Red Cross, Department of Labor and Industries, the U.S. Bureau of Mines, or Fire Services training program.

(((6))) (9) "Ambulance driver" means that person who drives an ambulance.

 $((\frac{7}{7}))$ (10) "Ambulance attendant" means that person who has responsibility for the care of patients both before and during transportation.

(((8))) (11) "Ambulance operator" means a person who owns one or more ambulances and operates them as a private business.

(((9))) (12) "Ambulance director" means a person who is a director of a service which operates one or more ambulances provided by a volunteer organization or governmental agency.

(((10))) (13) "First aid vehicle operator" means a person who owns

one or more first-aid vehicles and operates them as a private business.

(((11))) (14) "First aid director" means a person who is a director of a service which operates one or more first aid vehicles provided by a volunteer organization or governmental agency.

(((12))) (15) "Communications system" means a radio or landline network connected with a dispatch center which makes possible the alerting and coordination of personnel, equipment and facilities

(((13))) (16) "Department" means the Department of Social and Health Services.

(((14))) (17) "Shall" means compliance is mandatory. (((15))) (18) "Should" means a suggestion or recommendation, but not a requirement.

(((16))) (19) "Committee" means the Emergency Medical ((and Ambulance Review)) Services Committee.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1150, filed 9/2/76)

WAC 248-17-030 LICENSE(S) REQUIRED, (((1) After July 1, 1976,)) No person or governmental unit shall operate an ambulance or first aid vehicle without possessing all licenses required by this chapter. Under this chapter the following must be licensed: Ambulances, first aid vehicles, ambulance operators, ambulance directors, first aid vehicle operators, ((and)) first aid directors air ambulances and air ambulance services

(((a))) (1) Application for ambulance operators, first aid vehicle operators, ambulance director and first aid director licenses and renewals((, fees:)). An application for license shall be made to the department upon forms provided by it, and shall contain such information as the department reasonably requires which may include affirmative evidence of ability to comply with standards, rules and regulations as are lawfully prescribed hereunder. An application for renewal of license shall be made to the department upon forms provided by it and submitted thirty days prior to the date of expiration of the license. ((Each application for license or renewal thereof shall be accompanied by a triennial fee of ten dollars: PROVIDED, That no fee shall be required from ambulance directors or first aid vehicle

(b)) (2) Application for ambulance license first aid vehicle license and renewals((; fees)). An application for license shall be made to the department upon forms provided by it, and shall contain such information as the department reasonably requests which may include affirmative evidence of ability to comply with standards, rules and regulations as are lawfully prescribed hereunder. An application for

renewal of license shall be made to the department upon forms provided by it, and submitted thirty days prior to the date of expiration of the license. ((Each application for license or renewal thereof shall be accompanied by an annual fee of five dollars: PROVIDED, That no fee shall be required for vehicles operated by ambulance directors or first aid vehicle directors.

(c))) (3) Licenses shall not be transferable.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1150, filed 9/2/76)

WAC 248-17-040 LICENSE EXPIRATION DATES. Ambulance Operator - Ambulance Director - First Aid Operator - First Aid Vehicle Director. The department shall issue an ambulance operator, ambulance director, first aid vehicle operator or first aid vehicle director's license initially and reissue licenses ((as often thereafter as necessary to stagger license expiration dates throughout a three-year period so as to cause approximately one-third of the total number of ambulance operator, ambulance director, first aid vehicle operator and first aid vehicle director licenses to expire on the last day of each year; but no license issued pursuant to this chapter shall exceed three years in duration: PROVIDED, That when the triennial license renewal date of a previously licensed operator or director is set by the department on a date less than thirty-six months after date of initial issue, credit will be allowed at the first renewal of a license for that period covered by the previous license fee which falls short of the full 36-month period)) every three years.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1150, filed 9/2/76)

WAC 248-17-050 LICENSE EXPIRATION DATES. Ambulance and first aid vehicle licenses initially and reissue licenses ((as often thereafter as necessary to stagger license expiration dates throughout a one-year period so as to cause approximately one-twelfth of the total number of ambulance and first aid vehicle licenses to expire on the last day of each month but no license issued pursuant to this chapter shall exceed twelve months in duration: PROVIDED, That when the annual license renewal date of a previously license than twelve months prior to the expiration date, the license fee shall be prorated on a monthly basis and a credit be allowed at the first renewal of a license for any period of one month or more covered by the previous license)) annually.

NEW SECTION

WAC 248-17-135 AIR AMBULANCE SERVICES. (1) The standards set forth in this section are applicable to those civil providers who wish to license as air ambulance services and who may not be involved in the immediate emergency medical rescue operation but provide air ambulance services between hospitals for the patient who has received initial emergency care and requires definitive care in specialized care centers.

(2) Excluded from the minimum requirements of these rules are Military Assistance to Safety and Traffic (MAST), National Search and Rescue (SAR) units and other military or civil aircraft that may be called into service to initiate the emergency air lift at the scene of the emergency and transports the patient to the nearest available treatment facility.

(3) Minimum standards for personnel and medical equipment for licensing are as follows:

(a) Pilots must possess a valid commercial pilot or air line transport pilot certificate; have a current class II medical certificate and shall be typerated and current in the aircraft to be flown.

(b) Medical flight attendants shall be qualified to the level of treatment required for the condition of the patient(s). Such levels of qualification could include physicians, registered nurses or paramedics. Basic level emergency medical technicians may perform as medical flight attendants only when the patient's medical condition requires no medication enroute, there are no intravenous therapy lines or where defibrillation may not be required. All medical flight attendants must be familiar with emergency inflight procedures, seat and litter strap requirements, emergency exit locations and the procedures for protection of the patient(s) in all possible inflight emergencies. Medical flight attendants must be familiar with the affects of altitude on the patients condition and shall be able to brief the pilot for any special flying techniques to be employed for the patients safety.

- (c) Medical equipment, supplies and drugs shall be as specified in the state recommended protocols for air ambulance services and shall be readily available for placement aboard the aircraft. Maintenance of any controlled drugs shall be in accordance with Section 406 of the federal controlled substance act.
- (d) Miscellaneous emergency and survival equipment shall be those items listed on the department's check list of approved items. All survival and emergency equipment shall be in working order at all times.
- (4) In instances where aeromedical evacuation of a patient is necessary because of a life threatening condition and a licensed aircraft is not available, patient transportation may be accomplished by the nearest available aircraft that can accommodate the patient. The attending physician shall justify the need to transport the patient in writing to the department.

NEW SECTION

WAC 248-17-211 BASIC LIFE SUPPORT—EMERGENCY MEDICAL TECHNICIAN QUALIFICATIONS AND TRAINING. (1) Applicants for training as emergency medical technicians (EMT) shall meet the following prerequisites:

(a) Be at least eighteen years of age at the beginning of the course enrollment.

(b) Have a high school diploma or equivalency qualifications.

- (c) Possess a valid and current certificate reflecting completion of the "Standard First Aid and Personal Safety" course by the American Red Cross, department of labor and industries or the equivalent training.
- (d) Be an active member of one of the following emergency medical services entities:
 - (i) Licensed ambulance service;
 - (ii) Licensed first aid vehicle service;
 - (iii) State, county or municipal police;
- (iv) Military and civilian personnel involved in search and rescue to the general public;
- (v) Individuals who have a need for training to qualify for employment in a prehospital emergency medical services system.
 - (e) Possess a current state driver's license.
- (f) Have the physical strength to carry, lift, extricate and perform similar maneuvers in a manner not detrimental to the patient, fellow emergency medical technicians or self.
- (2) The prospective student shall have his/her application for training reviewed by selection committees approved by the local emergency medical services council or their delegates. The selection committee shall determine that general prerequisites for enrollment in the course have been met and shall approve or disapprove the application.
- (3) Waivers of enrollment in the course may be recommended to the department by the local emergency medical services council selection committee when it is determined to be in the best interest of the local emergency medical services needs, except that no waivers shall be granted for the age requirement.
- (4) In counties where emergency medical services training responsibilities are established by county ordinances, the agency named in the ordinance shall have the same responsibilities for selection of students and training as the local emergency medical services councils described in this section.

NEW SECTION

WAC 248-17-212 EMERGENCY MEDICAL TECHNICIAN TRAINING—COURSE CONTENT, REGISTRATION, AND INSTRUCTOR QUALIFICATIONS. (1) The National Training Course, Emergency Medical Technician – Ambulance, United States Department of Transportation, National Highway Traffic Administration, shall be used in the course presentation. The course shall consist of a minimum of seventy—one hours classroom didactic and practical instruction and ten hours of hospital observation as described in the national course guide.

- (2) Emergency medical technician training courses shall normally be conducted by approved training agencies which have written agreements with the department to provide such training. If the regional emergency medical services council recommends another entity to conduct a course in a region, the council shall notify the department of this decision and request approval.
- (3) Registration for emergency medical technician training courses shall be submitted to the department at least two weeks prior to the beginning of the course. Registrations shall be completed on the forms

supplied by the department. The registration shall consist of a completed registration form, a lesson outline indicating the names of the instructors and a supply requisition form (if course supplies are needed). No course will be certified without an approved registration.

- (4) Course instructional and administrative personnel shall consist of:
- (a) A course coordinator who shall be responsible for the registration of the course, classroom location, scheduling of instructional personnel, arranging for the ten-hour hospital experience, compliance with contractual conditions and all other administrative matters not involving instruction. The course coordinator need not be a physician or approved lay instructor.
- (b) A physician coordinator who shall be a doctor of medicine or osteopathy who has been approved by the department. The physician coordinator shall be responsible for:
- (i) Overall supervision of the didactic and practical training aspects of the course;
- (ii) The instruction of those lessons requiring a physician and for making arrangements, for guest lecturers as desired;
- (iii) For counseling students as needed and to allow only those students who have successfully completed all the requirements of the course to be admitted to the final written and skill examination;
- (iv) The final examination of skills of all students enrolled in the class after they complete a final written examination. The physician coordinator shall have the authority to deny certification to a student when, in his/her professional judgment, the student is unable to function as an effective EMT irrespective of successful completion of the course.
- (c) A senior lay instructor who shall be approved by the physician coordinator and the department, who is a currently certified emergency medical technician or currently certified in advanced life support skills and who is currently certified as a cardiopulmonary resuscitation instructor by the Washington State Heart Association or the American Red Cross. The senior lay instructor shall:
 - (i) Assist the physician coordinator as needed;
- (ii) Be responsible for the conduct and scheduling of all nonphysician instructors and evaluators participating in an emergency medical technician training course;
- (iii) Maintain all registration and other necessary forms for the enrolled students, including the record of attendance of students and instructors;
- (iv) Supervise the distribution of textbooks and other course material to the students;
- (v) See that all written examinations are graded, discussed with the physician coordinator and that graduation lists are forwarded to the department not later than thirty days following completion of a course;
 - (vi) The senior lay instructor may be the course coordinator.
- (d) Other instructional personnel employed in a course of instruction shall consist of:
- (i) Adequate numbers of experienced emergency medical technicians to provide a ratio of one evaluator to six students during practical skills
- (ii) Other qualified individuals such as registered nurses, experts in legal affairs, experts in extrication and driving safety who may act in the capacity of guest lecturers and practical skills evaluators.
- (e) Any instruction given in cardiopulmonary resuscitation must be accomplished by an individual who is currently certified as a cardiopulmonary resuscitation instructor by the Washington State Heart Association or the American Red Cross.
- (f) Course materials used in the conduct of an emergency medical technician course shall consist of those textbooks, reference materials, visual aids and medical supplies that have been approved by the department.
- (g) Testing shall occur periodically throughout the course. There shall be a minimum of a first quarter, mid-term, third quarter and final written examination. The final written examination shall be administered through the National Registry of Emergency Medical Technicians (NREMT). Each individual student is responsible for testing fees incurred.
- (h) The practical examination shall be scored as pass or fail. Percentage points shall not be used. Failure in areas of the practical examination that are designated as life-threatening conditions of the practical examination check sheets shall be considered as failure of the examination.
- (i) A student who fails the practical examination may be retested within two months of the failure. A second failure shall require a repeat of the course.

(j) Rules governing class attendance shall be at the option of the physician coordinator. However, any student missing three sessions (nine hours of instruction) shall be considered to have withdrawn from the course.

NEW SECTION

WAC 248-17-213 EMERGENCY MEDICAL TECHNI-CIAN—CERTIFICATION AND RECERTIFICATION. (1) Upon successful completion of an emergency medical technician course, the department shall certify those eligible graduates who have passed either the state written examination or the National Registry of Emergency Medical Technicians written examination and the state practical examination and who have been recommended for certification by the physician coordinator.

- (2) The period of certification shall be valid for two years and shall terminate on the last day of the month on the second anniversary of completion of the course. The period of certification for individuals in cities having a population of four hundred thousand or more, shall be for three years and shall terminate on the last day of the month on the third anniversary of completion of the course.
- (3) Recertification of currently certified emergency medical technicians shall be by completion of twenty hours of approved continuing education, passing the written and practical examination and being recommended for recertification by the physician coordinator. Individuals who are nationally registered EMT's may elect to recertify through the NREMT.
- (4) Certification by the department as an EMT does not warrant future performance of the individuals certified. It will indicate that the cognitive and performance capabilities met the requirements for certification established for the course at the time testing was performed.

NEW SECTION

WAC 248-17-214 EMERGENCY MEDICAL TECHNI-CIAN—RECIPROCITY AND CHALLENGES. (1) Reciprocity as a Washington state emergency medical technician may be granted to a currently certified EMT from another state or territory if the applicant has proof of completion of the department of transportation's eightyone-hour emergency medical technician course.

(2) An individual certified by the National Registry of Emergency Medical Technicians (or other similar national certifying agency) may be considered for reciprocity only under the following conditions:

- (a) The applicant must have completed the minimum of an eightyone-hour department of transportation emergency medical technical course (equivalent training for certification is not acceptable):
- (b) The category of the national certification must be "EMT-Ambulance":
- (c) The candidate must be fully certified provisional certification is not acceptable;
- (d) The former state of the individual must accept the national certification or must require both state and national certification.
- (3) Certification by reciprocity shall be based on need and shall be for the duration of the former state's certification but in no case will exceed two year's duration.
- (4) An individual who wishes to challenge the emergency medical technician examination must meet the following conditions of eligibility:
- (a) There must be proof of need for certification as specified by WAC 248-17-211;
- (b) The candidate must show the testing agency proof of equivalent training and/or experience, including the ten-hour hospital experience required for initial certification.
- (5) Reinstatements are recertifications for individuals who have let their certifications lapse before applying for such recertification. Reinstatements may be accomplished in the following manner:
- (a) An individual whose expiration of certification is less than one year old may, at the option of the physician coordinator, be allowed to credit prior continuing education and take the practical and written recertification examinations;
- (b) An individual whose expiration of certification is more than one year old at the time of application, must retake the basic minimum eighty-one-hour course as described in WAC 248-17-212.

NEW SECTION

WAC 248-17-215 EMERGENCY MEDICAL TECHNI-CIAN—SPECIALIZED TRAINING. (1) For the purpose of this chapter, specialized training shall mean the training of a basic EMT to use a skill, technique and equipment that is not included as part of the standard course curriculum.

(2) In the event a regional or local emergency medical services council wishes to provide specialized training to emergency medical technicians, the following procedures shall apply:

(a) State-approved protocols shall be developed before training may

begin.

(b) Training shall be conducted by personnel experienced and qualified in the area of training. The department shall approve the instructors in advance of the beginning of any training program.

(c) Requests for specialized training shall be submitted to the department on the form "Application for Training".

(3) On completion of the specialized training, personnel using the equipment shall function under authorized physician control.

NEW SECTION

WAC 248-17-216 EMERGENCY MEDICAL TECHNI-CIAN-SCOPE OF CARE AUTHORIZED-PROHIBITION. (1) An individual who completes a basic emergency medical technician course and is certified by the department to function as an emergency medical technician shall be authorized to provide services only within the scope of training as contained within the curriculum of the course except for formally approved specialized training as described elsewhere in this chapter.

(2) Under RCW 18.73.010, an emergency medical technician certified by the department is authorized to function in a prehospital emergency environment for the purpose of providing immediate treatment for victims of motor vehicle accidents, suspected coronary illnesses and other acute illnesses or trauma. When no emergency medical situation exists, the emergency medical technician may not perform any other routine medical service which may be defined as the practice of medicine and/or service which would customarily be performed by a physician or other licensed practitioner.

WSR 81-24-007 **EMERGENCY RULES** DEPARTMENT OF FISHERIES

[Order 81-216—Filed November 20, 1981]

- I, Rolland A. Schmitten, director of the State Department of Fisheries, do promulgate and adopt at Olympia, Washington, the annexed rules relating to personal use fishing rules.
- I, Rolland A. WAC 220-57-14000B CHEHALIS RIVER. Notwithstanding the provisions of WAC 220-57-140, effective immediately until further notice, the personal use salmon bag limit in the Chehalis River shall be BAG LIMIT C.

NEW SECTION

WAC 220-57-28000B HOQUIAM RIVER. Notwithstanding the provisions of WAC 220-57-280, effective immediately through January 31, 1982, the personal use salmon bag limit in the Hoquiam River shall be BAG LIMIT C.

Steelhead trout begin milling near the mouth of Chambers Creek by middle to late November and are susceptible to capture. They begin to enter the fish trap by late November and are susceptible to capture. They begin to enter the fish trap by late November to early December. Therefore, it is necessary to immediately prohibit all taking of steelhead trout. Such rule is therefore adopted as an emergency rule to take effect upon filing with the Code Reviser.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 88, filed 7/2/81)

WAC 251-04-020 DEFINITIONS. Unless the context clearly indicates otherwise, the words used in these rules shall have the meanings given in this section.

"ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT EXEMPTION" – A president or vice president may have individual(s) acting as his/her administrative assistant(s). The employee normally performs supportive work for his/her superior as an individual contributor without subordinates.

"ADMINISTRATIVE EMPLOYEES" - Personnel whose responsibilities require them to spend at least 80% of their work hours as follows:

- (1) Primary duty is office or nonmanual work directly related to the management policies or general business operations; and
- (2) Must have the authority to make important decisions, customarily and regularly exercise discretion and independent judgment, as distinguished from using skills and following procedures; and
- (3) Must regularly assist an executive or administrative employee, or perform work under, only general supervision along specialized or technical lines requiring special training, experience or knowledge; and

(4) Must be paid at a rate of at least \$672 per month exclusive of board, lodging or other facilities.

For persons whose salaries exceed \$1083 per month, the 80% limitation does not apply if the primary duty consists of responsible office or nonmanual work directly related to management policies or general business operations.

"AGRICULTURAL EMPLOYEES" — Employees performing work which includes farming and all its branches, including cultivating the soil, or growing or harvesting crops, or raising livestock, bees, fur—bearing animals, or poultry; or doing any practices performed by a farmer or on a farm as an incident to or in conjunction with such farming operations.

"ALLOCATION" – The assignment of an individual position to an appropriate class on the basis of the kind, difficulty, and responsibility of the work of the position.

"APPOINTING AUTHORITY" - A person or group of persons lawfully authorized to make appointments.

"AVAILABILITY" — An estimate of the number of women, minorities, and handicapped persons who have the skills and abilities required for employment in a particular job group as determined from an analysis of relevant data.

"BOARD" – The higher education personnel board established under the provisions of the higher education personnel law.

"CERTIFICATION" – The act of providing an employing official or appointing authority with the names of the appropriate eligibles to be considered for appointment to fill a vacancy.

"CHARGES" – A detailed statement of the specific incidents alleging cause for dismissal or disciplinary action.

"CLASS" – One or more positions sufficiently similar with respect to duties and responsibilities that the same descriptive title may be used with propriety to designate each position allocated to the class; that the same general qualification requirements are needed for performance of the duties of the class; that the same tests of fitness may be used to select employees; and that the same schedule of pay can be applied with equity to all positions in the class under the same or substantially the same employment conditions.

"CLASSIFIED SERVICE" – All positions in the higher education institutions which are subject to the provisions of the higher education personnel law.

"COLLECTIVE BARGAINING" – The performance of the mutual obligation of the appointing authority and the certified exclusive bargaining representative to meet at reasonable times, to confer and bargain in good faith, and to execute a written agreement with respect to those personnel matters over which the appointing authority may lawfully exercise discretion.

"COMPETITIVE SERVICE" – All positions in the classified service for which a competitive examination is required as a condition precedent to appointment.

"CORRECTIVE EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM" – A program designed to increase the employment of handicapped persons and of women and minorities who are underutilized in certain job groups because of present or past practices or other conditions which resulted in limited employment opportunities.

"COUNSELING EXEMPTION" – Individuals in counseling—exempt positions are responsible for directing and/or participating in providing academic, athletic, medical, career, financial aid, student activity and/or personal counseling to students. Such activities include, but are not limited to, providing individual and group guidance services using recognized professional techniques and practices.

"DEMOTION" – The change of an employee from a position in one class to a position in another class which has a lower salary range maximum.

"DEVELOPMENT" – The attainment through work experience and training of proficiency in skills which will enable the employee to perform higher level duties.

"DIRECTOR" - The personnel director of the higher education personnel board.

"DISMISSAL" – The termination of an individual's employment for just cause as specified in these rules.

"ELIGIBLE" – An applicant for a position in the competitive service who has met the minimum qualifications for the class involved, has been admitted to and passed the examinations, and has met all requirements for eligibility as stated on the bulletin board posting; or an applicant for a position in the noncompetitive service who has met all requirements for eligibility as stated on the bulletin board posting.

ELIGIBLE LIST - A list established by the personnel officer, composed of names of persons who have made proper application, met the minimum qualifications, and successfully completed the required examination process to be certified for vacancies in a class at the institution.

"EMPLOYEE" - A person working in the classified service at an institution.

"EMPLOYEE ORGANIZATION" – Any lawful association, labor organization, federation, council, or brotherhood, having as one of its purposes the improvement of working conditions among employees, and which has filed a notice of intent to represent employees with the director, and which has been authorized in accordance with WAC 251-14-020.

"EMPLOYING OFFICIAL" - An administrative or supervisory employee designated by the appointing authority to exercise responsibility for requesting certification, interviewing eligibles, and employing classified employees.

"EXECUTIVE EMPLOYEES" – Management personnel whose responsibilities require them to spend at least 80% of their work hours as follows:

- (1) Primary duty must be management of a recognized department or subdivision; and
- (2) Must customarily and regularly direct the work of two or more employees; and
- (3) Must have the authority to hire and fire, or to recommend with authority on these and other actions affecting employees; and
- (4) Must customarily and regularly exercise discretionary powers; and
- (5) Must be paid at a rate of at least \$672 per month exclusive of board, lodging or other facilities.

For persons whose salaries exceed \$1083 per month, the 80% limitation does not apply if he/she regularly directs the work of at least two other employees and the primary duty is management of a recognized department or subdivision.

"EXECUTIVE HEAD EXEMPTION" — Executive heads of major academic or administrative divisions are analogous in the hierarchy to vice presidents, deans and chairmen. Directors may be executive heads as determined by the higher education personnel board. An executive head is in charge of a separate budget unit and directs subordinates.

"EXEMPT POSITION" - A position properly designated as exempt from the application of these rules as

provided in WAC 251-04-040. (Also see separate definitions of "administrative assistant exemption," "executive head exemption," "research exemption," "counseling exemption," "extension and/or continuing education exemption," "graphic arts or publication exemption," and "principal assistant exemption".)

"EXTENSION AND/OR CONTINUING EDU-CATION EXEMPTION" — Individuals considered exempt in this category are responsible for originating and developing formal education programs for the general public, usually involving close contact with faculty and staff or training or consulting with specific groups in the community to enable them to provide specialized training and/or services to the community.

"FRINGE BENEFITS" — As used in the conduct of salary surveys, the term shall include but not be limited to compensation for leave time, including vacation, civil, and personal leave; employer retirement contributions; health insurance payments, including life, accident, and health insurance, workmen's compensation, and sick leave; and stock options, bonuses, and purchase discounts where appropriate.

"FULL-TIME EMPLOYMENT" - Work consisting of forty hours per week.

"GRAPHIC ARTS OR PUBLICATION EXEMPTION" — Individuals qualifying for exemption under this category will be involved in performing selected graphic arts or publication activities requiring prescribed academic preparation or special training. Positions of this type are those which use special visual techniques, require original design and layout and/or can be distinguished from positions associated with the standard editorial functions.

"GRIEVANCE" - A dispute filed in accordance with a grievance procedure of a signed collective bargaining agreement.

"HANDICAPPED PERSON" – Any person with physical, mental or sensory impairments that would impede that individual in obtaining and maintaining permanent employment and promotional opportunities. The impairments must be material rather than slight, static and permanent in that they are seldom fully corrected by medical replacement, therapy, or surgical means.

"HEARING EXAMINER" – An individual appointed by the board to preside over, conduct and make recommended decisions including findings of fact and conclusions of law in all cases of employee appeals to the board

"INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION" — The University of Washington, Washington State University, Central Washington University, Eastern Washington University, Western Washington University, The Evergreen State College, and the various state community colleges. For purposes of application of these rules, the term shall be considered to include the various related boards as defined in this section, unless specifically indicated to the contrary.

"INSTRUCTIONAL YEAR" - The schedule established annually by an institution to identify the period required to meet the educational requirements of a given academic or training program.

"JOB GROUP" – For affirmative action goal-setting purposes, a group of jobs having similar content, wage rates and opportunities. An EEO job category may consist of one or more job groups.

"JOB CATEGORIES" - Those groupings required in equal employment opportunity reports to federal

agencies.

"LATERAL MOVEMENT" – Appointment of an employee to a position in another class which has the same salary range maximum as the employee's current class.

"LAYOFF" - Any of the following management initiated actions caused by lack of funds, curtailment of work, or good faith reorganization for efficiency purposes:

- (1) Separation from service to an institution;
- (2) Separation from service within a class;
- (3) Reduction in the work year; and/or
- (4) Reduction in the number of work hours.

"LAYOFF SENIORITY" – The last period of unbroken service in the classified service of the higher education institution. Authorized leave of absence or leave without pay shall not constitute a break in service; however, the time spent on such leave shall not be included in computing seniority except where required by statute and except in the case of positions established on the basis of an instructional year. Permanent employees who are veterans or their unmarried widows/widowers as identified in WAC 251-10-045 shall have added to their unbroken institution service the veteran's active military service to a maximum of five years' credit.

"LAYOFF UNIT" – A clearly identified structure within an institution, which is approved by the director, and within which employment/layoff options are determined in accordance with the reduction in force

procedure.

"LEAD" – An employee who performs the same duties as other employees in his/her work group and in addition regularly assigns, instructs and checks the work of the employees.

"NONCOMPETITIVE SERVICE" - All positions in the classified service for which a competitive examina-

tion is not required.

"ORGANIZATIONAL UNIT" – A clearly identified structure, or substructure of persons employed to achieve a common goal or function under the direction of a single official. An organizational unit may consist of either an administrative entity or a geographically separated activity.

"PART-TIME EMPLOYMENT" - Work of twenty or more hours per week but less than full time employment with an understanding of continuing employment

for six months or more.

"PERIODIC INCREMENT DATE" - ("P.I.D.") - The date upon which an employee is scheduled to move to a higher salary step within the range for his/her current class, as provided in WAC 251-08-090 and 251-08-100.

"PERMANENT EMPLOYEE" – An employee who has successfully completed a probationary period at the institution within the current period of employment.

"PERSONNEL OFFICER" – The principal employee in each institution/related board responsible for administrative and technical personnel activities of the classified service.

"P.I.D." - Commonly used abbreviation for periodic increment date.

"POSITION" - A set of duties and responsibilities normally utilizing the full or part time employment of one employee.

"PRINCIPAL ASSISTANT EXEMPTION" – Individuals qualifying for exemption under this category function as second—in—command in importance levels. The individual may perform many of the functions of his/her superior in the superior's absence, or alternatively may have major administrative or program responsibilities. Reporting relationships will not be below that of the executive head. In some institutions an executive head may have more than one principal assistant as determined by the higher education personnel board.

"PROBATIONARY PERIOD" - The initial six months of employment in a class following appointment from an eligible list of a nonpermanent employee of the institution.

"PROBATIONARY REAPPOINTMENT" - Appointment of a probationary employee from an eligible list to a position in a different class.

"PROFESSIONAL EMPLOYEES" - Personnel whose responsibilities require them to spend at least 80% of their work hours as follows:

- (1) Primary duty must involve work that requires knowledge of an advanced type in a field of science or learning, customarily obtained by a prolonged course of specialized instruction and study or work that is original and creative in character in a recognized field of artistic endeavor and the result of which depends primarily on invention, imagination, or talent; and
- (2) Must consistently exercise discretion and judgment; and
- (3) Must do work that is predominantly intellectual and varied, as distinguished from routine or mechanical duties; and
- (4) Must be paid at a rate of at least \$737 per month exclusive of board, lodging or other facilities.

For persons whose salaries exceed \$1083 per month, the 80% limitation does not apply if the primary duty consists of work requiring knowledge of an advanced type in a field of science or learning which requires consistent exercise of discretion and judgment.

"PROMOTION" – The appointment as a result of recruitment, examination and certification, of a permanent employee to a position in another class having a higher salary range maximum.

"PROVISIONAL APPOINTMENT" – Appointment made prior to establishment of an eligible list, per the provisions of WAC 251-18-300. A person so appointed is required to apply through the competitive process to be considered for the position on a permanent basis.

"PUBLIC RECORDS" – Any writing containing information relating to conduct of government or the performance of any governmental or proprietary function prepared, owned, used or retained by any state or local agency regardless of physical form or characteristics.

"REALLOCATION" – The assignment of a position by the personnel officer to a different class.

"REASSIGNMENT" – A management initiated movement of a classified employee from one position to another in the same class.

"RELATED BOARDS" – The state board for community college education, the council for postsecondary education, the higher education personnel board, and such other boards, councils and commissions related to higher education as may be established. For purposes of application of these rules, the term "institution" shall be considered to include these related boards, unless specifically indicated to the contrary.

"RESEARCH EXEMPTION" — Individuals in research—exempt positions spend the majority of their time in one or more of the following activities: Identification and definition of research problems, design of approaches or hypotheses and methodology to be used, design of specific phases of research projects, analysis of results, development of conclusion and hypothesis, presentation of research results in publishable form.

"RESIGNATION" - A voluntary termination of employment.

"REVERSION" - The return of a permanent employee from trial service to the most recent class in which permanent status was achieved.

(("SEPARATION" - Resignation, retirement, layoff or dismissal from the classified service.))

"SUPERVISOR" – Any individual having authority, in the interest of the employer, to hire, transfer, suspend, layoff, recall, promote, discharge, assign, reward or discipline other employees, or responsibility to direct them or adjust their grievances, or effectively to recommend such action if in connection with the foregoing the exercise of such authority is not of a merely routine or clerical nature, but requires the use of independent judgment.

"SUSPENSION" - An enforced absence without pay for disciplinary purposes.

"TEMPORARY EMPLOYMENT" -

- (1) Work performed in the absence of an employee on leave; or
- (2) Extra work required at a work load peak or special projects, or cyclic work loads not to exceed one hundred eighty calendar days.

"TRAINING" - Formal and systematic learning activities intended to provide employees with the knowledge and skills necessary to become proficient or qualified in a particular field.

"TRANSFER" – An employee initiated change from one classified position to another in the same class within the institution without a break in service.

"TRIAL SERVICE" – The initial period of employment following promotion, demotion or lateral movement into a class in which the employee has not held permanent status, beginning with the effective date of the change and continuing for six months, unless interrupted as provided in these rules or extended as provided in WAC 251-18-330(5).

"UNDERUTILIZATION" - Having fewer minorities, women, or handicapped persons in a particular job

group than would reasonably be expected by their availability.

"UNION SHOP" – A union membership provision which, as a condition of employment, requires all employees within a bargaining unit to become members of an employee organization.

"UNION SHOP REPRESENTATIVE" – An employee organization which is the exclusive representative of a bargaining unit that has been certified by the director as the union shop representative following an election wherein a majority of employees in the bargaining unit voted in favor of requiring membership in the employee organization as a condition of employment.

"UNION SHOP REPRESENTATION FEE" – Employees who are granted a nonassociation right based on religious tenets or teachings of a church or religious body of which they are members, must pay a representation fee to the union shop representative. Such fee is equivalent to the regular dues of the employee organization minus any monthly premiums for union sponsored insurance programs.

"WRITING" — Handwriting, typewriting, printing, photostating, photographing and every other means of recording any form of communication or representation including letters, words, pictures, sounds; or symbols or combination thereof and all papers, maps, magnetic or paper tapes, photographic films and prints, magnetic or punched cards, discs, drums and other documents.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 71, filed 2/27/79, effective 4/2/79)

WAC 251-12-600 REMEDIAL ACTION. When it has been determined that an individual has served six consecutive months in an institution in a position subject to the civil service but whose appointment by the institution has not been in accordance with the provisions of these rules, and the employee was not a party to the willful disregard of the rules, the director may take such appropriate action as to confer permanent status, set provision for salary maintenance, establish appropriate seniority, determine accrual of benefits, and such other actions as may be determined appropriate pursuant to the best standards of personnel administration. The order of the director shall be final and binding unless exceptions to the order, as provided in WAC 251-12-085(((a))) (1) through (((c))) (5), are filed with the board within thirty calendar days of the date of service of the order. The board will review the exceptions and may hold a hearing prior to modifying or affirming the director's order.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 17, filed 2/1/74)

WAC 352-32-210 CONSUMPTION OF ALCO-HOL IN STATE PARK AREAS. (1) Opening ((and)), possessing alcoholic beverage in an open container, or consuming any alcoholic beverages in any state park area shall be prohibited except in the following designated areas and under the following circumstances:

- (a) In designated campgrounds, by registered campers or their guests;
- (b) In designated picnic areas, which shall include those sites within state park areas where picnic tables, benches, fireplaces, and/or outdoor kitchens are available, even though not signed as designated picnic areas; and
- (c) In any building operated and maintained under a concession agreement, wherein the concessionaire has been licensed to sell alcoholic beverages by the Washington State Liquor Control Board, and where the dispensation of such alcoholic beverages by such concessionaire has been approved by the commission.
- (2) The provisions of this rule shall not apply to any part of the Seashore Conservation Area, as designated and established by RCW 43.51.655.
- (3) Opening, consuming, or storing alcoholic beverages in Fort Simcoe State Park shall be prohibited.

WSR 81-24-021 PROCLAMATION OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR

PROCLAMATION BY THE GOVERNOR

WHEREAS, between November 13 and November 19, 1981, several violent wind storms moved through Washington State. High tides and storm driven waters caused saltwater flooding of businesses and homes in

coastal areas. High winds resulted in blown down electric and telephone transmission lines, roads blocked by fallen trees, and damage to homes and businesses.

WHEREAS, the severity and magnitude of the destruction and damage are beyond the capabilities of affected political subdivisions, and subsequently, I find that a disaster affecting life, health, and property exists within the state of Washington.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, JOHN SPELLMAN, Governor of the state of Washington, as a result of the aforementioned flooding and under the provisions of chapters 43.06 RCW, RCW 38.08.040, and RCW 38.52.060, do hereby proclaim that a State of Emergency exists in Washington State and that the Washington State Disaster Preparedness Plan be executed. The resources of the state of Washington are authorized to be employed to assist affected political subdivisions in a concerted effort to cope with the emergency. Additionally, the Department of Emergency Services is instructed to coordinate all state assistance, to include the Washington National Guard, to the affected areas. The department is also instructed to determine if federal assistance is needed.

IN WITNESS WHERE-OF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the state of Washington to be affixed at Olympia this twentieth day of November, Nineteen Hundred and Eighty-One.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

Title: Amending WAC 230-08-130, Quarterly Activity Reports by Operators of Punchboards and Pull Tabs; amending WAC 230-40-400, Hours Limited for Card Games; and amending WAC 230-40-120, Limits on Wagers in Card Games.

Description of Purpose: Amendment to WAC 230–08–130. The purpose of this proposed amendment is to lessen the reporting requirements for quarterly activity reports by operators of punchboards and pull tabs; amendment to WAC 230–40–400. The purpose of this proposed amendment is to require a licensed card room employee or the operator of the card room to be on duty and in the licensed card room area during all times a Class E card room is in operation; and amendment to WAC 230–40–120. This proposed amendment has as its purpose increasing the maximum value of chip for payoff in a panguingue game from one dollar to two dollars.

Statutory Authority: The statutory authority for the amendment to WAC 230-08-130 is RCW 9.46.070(8). The statutory authority for the proposed amendment to WAC 230-40-400 and 230-40-120 is RCW 9.46.070(11).

Summary of Proposed Rules and Reasons Supporting Action: Amendment to WAC 230-08-130. In its original form, WAC 230-08-130 sets forth the information which must be disclosed to the commission on quarterly activity reports by operators of punchboards and pull tabs. The proposed amendment deletes the requirement that the licensee exclude salaries and overhead for facilities from its calculation of expenses relating directly to the operation and purchase of punchboards and pull tabs and deletes the requirement that the licensee report the number of people employed as a direct result of the operation of punchboards and pull tabs. The reason for this proposed action is to lessen the record keeping requirements of licensees; amendment to WAC 230-40-400. As it exists, this rule sets forth the limitation on the hours of operation of a public card room. The proposed amendment requires that Class E card rooms have an operator or licensed card room employee on duty and in the licensed card room area at all times of operation. The purpose of the proposed amendment is to require actual oversight of card games in large card rooms both for the protection of operators and for the protection of the gambling public; and amendment to WAC 230-40-120. This rule sets forth the limits on wagers in card games. The proposed amendment will increase the maximum value of a chip for payoff in panguingue from one dollar to two dollars. The purpose of this proposed rule is to allow an increase in the money which flows in a panguingue game and to try to make it the equivalent of authorized poker games insofar as money which may be won.

In addition to the Gambling Commissioners themselves, the following agency personnel have responsibility for drafting, implementing and enforcing these rules: Keith Kisor, Director and Elwin Hart, Deputy Director, Capital Plaza Building, 1025 East Union, Olympia, WA, 234–0865 Scan, 753–0865 Comm.

Proponents and Opponents: The proposed amendments to WAC 230-08-130 and 230-40-400 are proposed by the staff of the Washington State Gambling Commission. The proposed amendment to WAC 230-40-120 is proposed by Mr. Mike Imamura.

Agency Comments: The agency believes the proposed rules are self-explanatory and need no further comment.

These rules were not made necessary as a result of federal law or federal or state court action.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 80, filed 12/28/77)

WAC 230-08-130 QUARTERLY ACTIVITY REPORTS BY OPERATORS OF PUNCHBOARDS AND PULL TABS. Each licensee for the operation of punchboards and pull tabs shall submit an activity report to the commission concerning the operation of the licensed activity and other matters set forth below during each of the following periods of the year:

January 1st through March 31st April 1st through June 30th

July 1st through September 30th October 1st through December 31st

If the licensee does not renew his license, then he shall file a report for the period between the previous report filed and the expiration date of his license.

Each report shall be received in the office of the commission or postmarked no later than 30 days following the end of the period for which it is made.

The report shall be signed by the owner, president, or equivalent officer and shall be submitted upon a form to be obtained from the commission. If the report is prepared by someone other than the licensee or his employee then the preparer shall also sign the report. The report shall include, among other items, the following:

(1) The gross receipts of the licensee from all sources other than licensed gambling activities during the reporting period.

- (2) The portion of the receipts set out in response to (1) above related solely to the sale of food and drink for consumption on the premises.
- (3) The gross receipts from punchboards and the gross receipts from pull tabs.
- (4) The total amount of cash prizes paid out and the cost to the licensee of all merchandise prizes paid out, for punchboards and for pull
- (5) All expenses relating directly to the purchase and operation of punchboards and pull tabs ((excluding salaries and overhead for facilities)).
 - (6) Total net income.
- (((7) Number of people employed as a direct result of the operation of punchboards or pull tabs.))

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 112, filed 9/15/81)

WAC 230-40-120 LIMITS ON WAGERS IN CARD GAMES. The following limits shall not be exceeded in making wagers on any card game. For games in which the following method of wagering is allowed:

- (1) Multiple wagers per player per hand during each round, each wager or raise shall not exceed \$5.00. There shall be no more than a total of two raises per round irrespective of the number of players.
- (2) Single wagers per player per hand during each round (no raises), each wager shall not exceed \$5.00.
- (3) Single wager per player per game, each wager shall not exceed \$5.00.
- (4) Amount per point, each point shall not equal more than five cents in value.
- (5) An ante, except for panguingue (pan), shall not be more than twenty-five cents per person per hand to be played, contributed by each player, or the dealer of each hand, subject to house rules, may ante for all players before dealing in an amount not to exceed \$2.00.
- (6) Forced wagers or raises are prohibited except an ante and as they may be expressly included with the definition of poker games set out in WAC 230-40-010 or, for other authorized games not specifically defined by commission rule, within the basic definition of the particular card game in Hoyle's Modern Encyclopedia of Card Games, by Walter B. Gibson, published by Doubleday & Company, Inc., April 1974 edition.
- (7) Panguingue (pan) maximum value of a chip for payoff will not exceed ((\$\frac{\pmax}{1.00}\)) \$2.00. Ante will not exceed one chip. No doubling of conditions. Players going out, may collect not more than two chips from each participating player.

No licensee shall allow these wagering limits to be exceeded in a card game on his premises.

The employee will be notified of the director's recommended allocation and of the right to pursue the case to hearing if desired. If the employee wishes to pursue the case to hearing, he/she must so notify the director within twenty-one calendar days of service of the director's notice.)) Allocation appeals will be processed under the procedure provided in WAC 251-12-075.

(((3) The burden of proof in an allocation appeal shall rest with the

appellant.

(4) Allocation appeal hearings will be informal and will allow sufficient time for the parties to present facts pertinent to the proper allocation of a position. The appellant may represent him/herself or may be represented by any person of his/her choosing at the hearing. In appeals heard by a hearing examiner, the hearing examiner will issue a recommended decision within thirty calendar days of the hearing. The recommended decision will be transmitted to both parties by certified mail with a statement regarding the right to file exceptions to the recommended decision. Within thirty calendar days of service of the recommended decision, any party adversely affected may file written exception to the recommended decision. If no written exceptions are filed, the hearing examiner's recommended decision will become final forty calendar days after service of the recommended decision unless within that forty calendar day period the board issues a notice to each of the parties that a hearing will be scheduled for reconsideration of the hearing examiner's recommended decision. When exceptions are filed, such written statements must indicate in detail the specific items of the recommended decision to which exception is taken. Thereafter, a hearing on the exceptions will be scheduled before the board at which time all parties may present written and/or oral argument. Within thirty calendar days of hearing the testimony or arguments upon exceptions, the board will issue a decision which is final and binding.))

- (3) A permanent status employee scheduled for layoff shall receive written notice of any available options in lieu of layoff as provided in WAC 251-10-030(5) and (6). The employee shall be given no less than three working days to select an option, if available, or to elect to be laid off and/or be placed on the appropriate institution-wide layoff list(s).
- (4) Written notice of at least fifteen calendar days must be given to the employee after he/she has selected one of the options or upon completion of the option period.
- (5) Within the layoff unit, a permanent status employee scheduled for layoff shall be offered employment options to comparable position(s), as determined by the personnel officer, in:
- (a) Class(es) in which the employee has held permanent status which have the same or lower salary range maximum as the current class;
- (b) Lower class(es) in those same class series for which the employee is qualified.

The employee may exercise either option WAC 251-10-030 (5)(a) or (5)(b) provided that the employee being replaced is the least senior in a comparable position in the class and has less layoff seniority than the employee replacing him/her. A vacant position, if available, should be considered to be the position in the class held by the least senior person. The employee may elect to have access to less-than-comparable positions by so notifying the personnel officer in writing.

(6) Except as provided in WAC 251-10-035, a permanent employee scheduled for layoff who has no options available under subsection (5)

above shall be offered position(s) as follows:

(a) The personnel officer will offer in writing not less than three positions from among the highest available classes (unless the total available is less than three); provided that any position(s) offered must be:

 At the same level or lower than the class from which the employee is being laid off; and

- Vacant or held by a provisional, temporary, or probationary employee; and
- (iii) In a class for which the employee being laid off meets the minimum qualifications and can pass the appropriate qualifying examination.
- (b) The employee will be required to indicate within three working days his/her interest in a specific class(es) so that the personnel officer may schedule the appropriate examination(s).
- (c) Upon satisfactory completion of the examination(s) the employee will be offered option(s) to specific position(s), including salary information.
- (d) Employees appointed to positions through provisions of this subsection (6) will be required to serve a trial service period.
- (7) In order to be offered a layoff option or return from layoff to a position for which selective certification as identified in WAC 251-18-250(1)(a) has been authorized by the personnel officer, the employee must possess the required prerequisite skill(s) called for in the selective certification.
- (8) In a layoff action involving a position for which a particular sex is a bonafide occupational requirement, as approved by the Washington State Human Rights Commission, the most senior employee meeting the occupational requirements may be retained in the position over more senior employees in such class who do not meet the occupational requirement.
- (9) When it is determined that layoffs will occur within a unit, the personnel officer will:
- (a) Provide a copy of the institution's reduction-in-force procedure to all employees subject to layoff;
- (b) Advise each employee in writing of available options in lieu of layoff;
- (c) Advise each employee in writing of the specific layoff list(s) upon which he/she may be placed as required per WAC 251-10-055 and 251-10-035;
- (d) Provide information about the process by which the employee may make application for state-wide layoff lists, as required per WAC 251-10-060(7);
- (e) Advise each employee in writing of the right to appeal his/her layoff to the board per WAC 251-12-080.
- (10) Layoff actions for employees of special employment programs as identified in WAC 251-18-410 shall be administered as provided in WAC 251-10-035.

WAC 173-14-090 FILING WITH DEPART-MENT AND ATTORNEY GENERAL. Any ruling by local government ((or)) on an application for a substantial development, conditional use or variance permit, whether it be an ((approved)) approval or denial, shall be filed with the department and attorney general. When a substantial development permit and a conditional use or variance permit are required for a development, the filing of local government's rulings on the permits shall be made concurrently.

Copies of the original application, affidavit of public notice, site plan, vicinity map, permit, and final order shall be filed with the ((regional office of the)) department and attorney general within eight days of the local government final decision. Where applicable, local government shall also file the following materials required by chapter 43.21C RCW, the state environmental policy act((;)): environmental checklist, threshold determination, and environmental impact statement, or in lieu thereof, a statement summarizing the actions and dates of such actions taken pursuant to chapter 43.21C RCW.

Filing shall not be complete until the required documents have actually been received by the ((regional office of the)) department ((within which the project lies,)) and by the attorney general. This same rule shall apply to conditional uses, variances, rescissions and revisions of permits.

"Date of filing" of a local government final order involving approval or denial of a substantial development permit, or involving a denial of a variance or conditional use permit, shall be the date of actual receipt by the ((regional office of the)) department. With regard to a permit for a conditional use or variance approved by local government, and such permits which also involve concurrent filing by local government of a substantial development permit, the "date of filing" shall mean the date the ((departments)) department's final decision on the variance or conditional use permit is transmitted to local government and the applicant. The department shall in all circumstances notify in writing the local government and the applicant of the "date of filing".

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 2, Resolution 79-3, filed 9/26/79)

WAC 247-02-040 DESCRIPTION OF ORGANI-ZATION. (1) The authority is a public entity established under the provisions of chapter 70.37 RCW, which exercises essential governmental functions.

(2) Members. The authority consists of the governor; the lieutenant governor; the insurance commissioner; the chairman of the Washington state hospital commission; and one public member appointed by the governor on the basis of his or her interest or expertise in health care delivery, and confirmed by the senate for a term of four years. If the public office of any of the first four mentioned members is abolished, the resulting vacancy on

the authority shall be filled by the officer who shall succeed substantially to the powers and duties thereof.

- (3) Officers. The officers of the authority shall be a chairman, who shall be the governor, and a secretary. The secretary shall hold office for two years, or until his or her successor is later elected, and shall be elected by a majority vote of the members from among themselves. Whenever a vacancy occurs in the office of secretary, the members of the authority shall elect a successor who shall serve out the remaining term.
- (4) Authority staff: The staff of the authority shall consist of an executive director and such other employees as are determined by the authority as necessary to fulfill its responsibilities and duties. The executive director shall be the chief administrative officer of the authority and subject to its direction. All other staff shall be under his or her supervision and direction. The executive director shall keep a record of the proceedings of the authority and, when required by the authority, shall sign notes, contracts and other instruments ((and affix thereto the scal of the authority)). The executive director shall have custody of and be responsible for all moneys and securities of the authority and shall deposit all such moneys forthwith in such banks as the authority may designate from time to time.
- ((PROVIDED, HOWEVER, That the secretary of the authority, elected from time to time, shall exercise the duties of executive director specified in these rules until such time as an executive director is retained by the authority.))
- (5) Administrative office: The administrative office of the authority shall be located((, until such time as an executive director and/or staff are retained by the authority, at 4300 Seattle-First National Bank Building, Scattle, WA 98154,)) at 504 E. 14th, Suite 130 Olympia, Washington 98504, which office shall be open each day for the transaction of business from ((9:00)) 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. (Saturdays, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, and except for business relating to public records, which is governed by WAC 247-12-050).
- (6) Address for communications: All communications with the authority, including but not limited to the submission of materials pertaining to its operations and these rules, requests for copies of the authority's decisions and other matters, ((until such time as an executive director and/or staff are retained by the authority,)) shall be addressed as follows: Washington Health Care Facilities Authority, ((4300 Seattle-First National Bank Building, Seattle, WA 98154)) 504 E. 14th, Suite 130, Olympia, Washington 98504.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 2, Resolution 79-3, filed 9/26/79)

WAC 247-02-050 OPERATIONS AND PROCE-DURES. (1) Uniform Procedure Rules: Practice and procedure in and before the authority are governed by the Uniform Procedural Rules codified in the Washington Administrative Code, WAC 1-08-005 through 1-08-590, as now or hereafter amended, which rules the authority adopts as its own, subject to any additional rules the authority may add from time to time. The authority reserves the right to make whatever determination is fair and equitable should any question not covered by its rules come before the authority, said determination to be in accordance with the spirit and intent of the law.

- (2) Authority meetings: The meetings of the authority shall all be "special meetings" as that designation is applied in chapter 42.30 RCW. They may be called at any time and place by the chairman or a majority of the members of the authority. At least ten days' notice of all special meetings shall be given by delivering personally or by mail to each member a written notice specifying the time and place of the meeting and a copy of the agenda prepared by the executive director in consultation with the chairman, and by giving such notice to the public as may be required by law. If an emergency is deemed to exist, the chairman may shorten the notice period to not less than twenty-four hours. An executive session may be called by the chairman or by a majority of all members of the authority to consider the appointment, employment or dismissal of an officer or employee, and such other matters as are permitted by RCW 42.30.110.
- (3) Quorum: Three members shall constitute a quorum, and the act of a majority of the members present at any meeting, if there is a quorum, shall be deemed the act of the authority except as specified hereafter in WAC 247-02-050(7).
- (4) Chairman's voting rights: The chairman shall have the right to vote on all matters before the authority, just as any other authority member.
- (5) Minutes of meetings: Minutes shall be kept of the proceedings of the authority.
- (6) Rules of order: The authority shall generally follow Robert's Rules of Order, newly revised, in conducting its business meetings.
- (7) Form of authority action: The authority may act on the basis of a motion except when authorizing issuance of bonds pursuant to WAC 247-16-070 ((and when adopting a plan and system of an applicant pursuant to WAC 247-16-080,)) and when otherwise taking official and formal action with respect to the creation of special funds and the issuance and sale of bonds for a project of a participant, in which case the authority shall act by resolution. Such resolutions shall be adopted upon the affirmative vote of a majority of the members of the authority and shall be signed by the chairman and ((attested by)) the secretary. Motions shall be adopted upon the affirmative vote of a majority of a quorum of members present at any meeting.
- (8) Public participation in the meetings of the authority shall be as follows:
- (a) Any person or organization wishing to make a formal presentation at a regularly scheduled meeting of the authority shall so notify the executive director in writing at least forty-eight hours prior to the time of the meeting.
- (i) Such notification shall contain the name of the person, association, corporation or organization that desires to make a presentation; the address of such person

and, if applicable, the address of the entity to be represented in the presentation; and the topic to be presented or discussed.

- (ii) Permission to make a presentation to the authority shall be granted by the executive director as authorized by the authority.
- (iii) Confirmation of permission to make a presentation to the authority shall be made, if at all possible, by the authority staff prior to the meeting of the authority and shall include the date and time of the meeting and time set for the formal presentation.
- (b) The chairman of the authority shall have the discretion to recognize anyone in the audience who indicates in writing at the time of the meeting a desire to speak at such meeting, provided that remarks by any individual person shall be limited to five minutes unless a time extension is granted by the chairman.

WAC 247-16-010 PURPOSE. The purpose of this chapter shall be to set forth the procedures pursuant to which the authority determines those ((hospitals)) health care facilities to which the authority will give financial assistance.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 2, Resolution 79-3, filed 9/26/79)

WAC 247-16-030 APPLICATIONS FOR FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE. Because the needs of ((hospitals)) health care facilities in the state vary substantially, no application forms shall be provided by the authority. However, an applicant should furnish the following information to the authority, where applicable, with its request for financial assistance, and such other information as is deemed pertinent by the applicant or the executive director of the authority:

- (1) Identification of applicant:
- (a) Legal name and address of applicant;
- (b) Names, titles and telephone numbers of chief executive officer, chief financial officer and person assigned responsibility for liaison with the authority;
- (c) Names, addresses and telephone numbers of applicant's legal counsel, outside accounting firm and financial consultant or investment banking firm (if any);
- (d) Description of applicant's legal structure (e.g., private nonprofit corporation, public district hospital). If private, describe type and ownership of stock, if any; how assets held and by whom; and attach copies of articles of incorporation or similar documentation;
- (e) If applicant is a private hospital, attach a copy of IRS determination of 501(c)(3) status;
 - (f) Religious or other group affiliation, if any.
- (2) Project for which financial assistance is sought (if applicable):
- (a) Amount and requested terms of repayment for financing sought;
- (b) General description of project to be accomplished with authority financial assistance:
- (c) Current status of planning for project and dates proposed for (i) completion of drawings for project, if

- necessary (attach copies if completed); (ii) filing of environmental impact statement, if necessary; (iii) entry into construction contract; and (iv) completion or occupancy;
- (d) Recommendations of the appropriate regional health systems agency, and of the state hospital commission, or the current status of their respective reviews;
- (e) Current status of certificate of need for project. If certificate has been issued, attach copy;
- (f) Cost of project (including simple breakdown of costs of general construction, site work, utilities, equipment, land acquisition, architects' and other fees, contingency, interim interest, other);
- (g) Sources of funds for payment of project costs and dates of expected receipt (assistance from authority, interim financing, grants, funds on hand, interest and profit on interim investment of construction funds, other);
- (h) Amount of projected revenues to be derived from project, the sources of such revenues, when expected to begin, and a three-year projection;
- (i) Feasibility studies on project, if any (attach copy if one has been completed);
 - (j) Proposed security for authority-issued bonds;
- (k) Contracts or preliminary arrangements with planners, architects, consultants, investment banking firm, if any, regarding project.
- (3) Debt to be refinanced with authority assistance (if applicable):
- (a) Amount, date, maturity or maturities, interest rate or rates, prepayment penalties, if any, debt service and form of applicant's existing debt to be refinanced;
- (b) Source of revenue for payment of existing debt, security for debt and rating, if any, assigned to debt instruments at time of debt issuance;
- (c) Most recent decision and order of the state hospital commission on its annual review of the applicant's budget;
 - (d) Holder of debt (if ascertainable);
 - (e) Any negative debt service payment history;
 - (f) Proposed security for new authority-issued debt;
- (g) Proposed date schedule for accomplishing debt refinancing.
 - (4) Finances of applicant:
- (a) Audited (if audited) financial statements for past three years;
 - (b) Latest current financial statement;
- (c) Current year's budget of revenues, expenses and capital expenditures;
- (d) Projection of revenues, expenses, capital expenditures for next three-five years, including revenues and expenses of proposed project (if applicable);
- (e) Description of long-term debts of applicant, if not already given above, including date incurred, by whom held, debt service schedule, interest rate, form of debt, source of revenues for repayment, security for repayment;
- (f) Sources of hospital revenues (private patient, Medicare, Medicaid, welfare, Blue Cross, grants, etc.) and approximate dollar volumes and percentages of total revenues for each source in last three years.
 - (5) General:

(a) Pending or threatened litigation or administrative actions with potential of material adverse effect on

applicant;

(b) ((Willingness and ability of applicant to convey all of the real and personal property of hospital or of the project to authority until bonds are retired, with reconveyance of said property to applicant thereafter for \$10.00. If willing and able to convey, estimate of time to accomplish and any expected obstacles;

(c))) Brief description of existing medical facilities, including number of beds, number of medical and other staff, categories of medical services offered, and labora-

tory and research facilities, if any;

(((d))) (c) Brief description of hospital expansion

plans, if any, in next ten years;

(((c))) (d) Brief summary of statistics (last three years, if available) on percentage of bed occupancy and types and numbers of patients cared for (inpatient, outpatient, welfare, etc);

- (((f))) (e) Estimate of aggregate savings over the life of the proposed financing to be realized by applicant through authority financing by tax-exempt bonds as compared to financing through taxable obligations. Specify interest assumptions on which savings calculations based;
- (((g))) (f) Describe means applicant proposes to use to ensure that savings from tax-exempt financing are passed on to patients of applicant.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 2, Resolution 79-3, filed 9/26/79)

WAC 247-16-040 FEES. (1) Authorization to charge fees: The authority, pursuant to RCW 70.37.090, shall require applicants to pay fees and charges to the authority to provide it with funds for investigations, financial feasibility studies, expenses of issuance and sale of bonds, and other charges for services provided by the authority in connection with projects undertaken, as well as the operating and administrative expenses of the authority. In accordance with this authorization, an applicant shall pay to the authority such fees and charges as are necessary to meet any and all expenses incurred by the authority in connection with the processing of the application of the applicant, together with an annual service fee to defray expenses of the authority in administering and servicing the financing provided to the applicant and other allocable expenses of the authority. The authority shall assess an annual fee of one-tenth of one percent of the outstanding and unredeemed bonds of each applicant. The initial annual fee shall be paid to the authority on the date of closing of each tax exempt note or bond issue and in every anniversary date thereafter: PROVIDED, HOWEVER, That the authority by an adopted motion may set a different fee schedule and may waive all or any part of the annual or application fæ.

((All of the costs and expenses of the authority shall be paid from such fees. No moneys of the state of Washington shall be expended for such purposes.))

(2) ((Initial payment on fees and charges obligation:))
Fee obligations of the applicants: An applicant shall submit with its application an initial remittance of

\$7,500.00, to be credited against the fees and charges imposed or to be imposed by the authority on such applicant pursuant to this section in connection with the processing of an application. The applicant shall pay such fees and charges as they are billed to it from time to time by the authority. These expenses may be reimbursed to the applicants from the bond proceeds if financing is consummated. In addition, the application shall contain an appropriate legal commitment to indemnify the authority against any expenses or costs incurred by it in connection with the processing of the applicant's application and the completion of any project or plan and system subsequently approved and undertaken by the authority, as well as to pay the authority an annual service fee to defray expenses of the authority in administering and servicing the financing provided to the applicant and other allocable expenses of the authority, which annual fee shall be imposed so long as financing is being provided by the authority to the applicant.

((PROVIDED, HOWEVER, That the initial applicants whose applications are used for purposes of testing in court the constitutionality of the act shall pay such fees as are necessary to defray all expenses of the authority in processing such applications and conducting such court test. The amount or amounts of such fees and the time or times and the manner in which such fees are to be paid shall be determined by the secretary of the authority, elected from time to time. Such initial applicants shall provide to the authority an appropriate legal commitment to indemnify the authority against such expenses. If such court test is successful and financing is provided by the authority pursuant to such initial applications, the authority may waive the levy of annual service fees upon such applicants.))

(3) Refund of excess fees: The authority will refund any surplus fees paid or deposited by an applicant or participant which exceed the actual application-processing expenses and authority-determined pro rata administrative and operating costs of the authority.

(4) All the costs and expenses of the authority shall be paid from fees assessed pursuant to this section. No moneys of the state of Washington shall be expended for such purposes.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 2, Resolution 79-3, filed 9/26/79)

WAC 247-16-060 PRIORITIES REGARDING APPLICANT FUNDING. ((The authority may establish and revise priorities for the providing of assistance to applicants based on criteria which best effectuate the purposes of the act, including but not limited to:

(1) Determinations of area-wide needs for additional or improved health care facilities;

or improved health care facilities,

(2) Determinations regarding public benefit and good; and

(3) Determinations regarding the reasonable expectations that the project can be funded on terms satisfactory to the authority.)) The authority will process health care facility applications for assistance in the order of their date of receipt. The date of receipt shall be the date the health care facility application together with

the application fee is received by the authority at its Olympia office.

The authority reserves the right to change priorities and scheduling when the authority determines that a "first come, first served" priority scheduling is detrimental to the sale of another health care facility's bond issue or when conditions of health and safety or public benefit require a different priority.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 2, Resolution 79-3, filed 9/26/79)

WAC 247-16-070 AUTHORITY ACTION ON APPLICATIONS. (1) The authority shall meet to review and consider the staff analysis and recommendations and the application.

- (2) The authority may approve an application ((and its proposed plan or system)) and adopt a resolution authorizing the issuance of bonds for the requested financing where it determines:
- (a) It is necessary or advisable for the benefit of the public health for the authority to provide financing for the proposed project;
- (b) The applicant can reasonably be expected to achieve successful completion of the health care facilities to be financed by the authority;
- (c) The proposed project and the issuance of bonds by the authority for such project are economically feasible and can be undertaken on terms economically satisfactory to the authority;
- (d) The proposed health care facility, if completed as described in the application, will carry out the purposes and policies of the act;
- (e) The applicant has satisfied the authority that substantially all of the savings realized by the applicant from the availability of financing through tax-exempt bonds, as contrasted to financing through taxable debt, will be passed on by the applicant to its patients;
- (f) The applicant has reasonably satisfied the requirements of the act and these regulations; and
- (g) Other criteria that the authority has determined are appropriate factors in its decision-making process have been met.
- (3) The authority may approve an application ((and its proposed plan or system)) and a bond resolution on a conditional basis where the criteria of WAC 247-16-070(2) have been met and pending satisfaction of such other conditions or requirements as the authority shall determine to be reasonable and necessary in order to carry out the purposes, policies and requirements of the act and these regulations. The applicant shall be notified in writing of such conditions or requirements, which may include, but need not be limited to, the amendment of an application((, plan, or system)) or proposed bond resolution in order to meet the availability of funds, changes in costs, or other purposes or circumstances which may enhance the ability of the authority or the applicant to complete the project or better serve the purposes and policies of the act. Upon the satisfaction of such additional conditions or requirements, the application shall be deemed approved pursuant to WAC 247-16-070(2).

(4) The authority may also deny an application; in such event, it shall notify the applicant of such action, specifying in writing the reasons for its denial.

NEW SECTION

WAC 247-16-090 SELECTION OF INVEST-MENT BANKING FIRMS AS UNDERWRITERS. (1) The applicants may select an investment banking firm as senior managing underwriter for its proposed financing, subject to review and approval by the authority. In every instance, the senior manager selected must be able to demonstrate a familiarity, competence and experience in the structuring and sale of health care facility bonds. The applicant shall notify the authority in writing of its proposed senior manager selection fifteen days prior to the date it intends to enter into a formal contractual agreement. The authority will notify the applicant of its acceptance or rejection of the applicant's senior manager selection no later than ten days after receipt of the applicant's notification. If rejected, the authority will set forth the reasons for rejection, and the applicant will then propose another senior manager, subject to authority approval in the same manner.

(2) To provide balanced management knowledge and sale distribution and to assure the most realistic bond terms and interest, the authority reserves the right to name investment banking firms as co-managers of any authority bond issue(s). The authority will not name an investment banking firm or firms as a co-managing underwriter or co-managing underwriters on bond issues of less than \$10 million unless the authority determines that special circumstances so require. On issues of more than \$10 million the authority will name a co-manager or co-managers for each issue. The authority will also review the division of the management fee in each instance where a co-manager is named. While the authority will actually select the co-managers, it will consider recommendations from the applicant as to the selection of any co-manager or co-managers.

In each instance, the applicant will be given a written notification fifteen days prior to the authority's actual designation of an investment banking firm or firms as a co-manager on a particular bond issue.

NEW SECTION

WAC 247-16-100 SELECTION OF A FEASI-BILITY CONSULTANT. The authority shall maintain a list of management and accounting firms which it deems qualified to conduct feasibility studies for the applicants. The applicant's selection of a firm from the approved list shall constitute authority approval. In the event an applicant wishes to select a firm not on the approved list, the authority will review the proposed firm's qualifications on a case-by-case basis, based on its familiarity, competence, and experience in health care management and accounting. The applicant shall not enter into any contractual agreement with a management or accounting firm not on the approved list until written approval has been granted by the authority.

WAC 296-15-070 ACCIDENT REPORTS AND CLAIMS PROCEDURES. (1) Reporting of accidents and applications for compensation based thereon shall be on a form prescribed by the department, entitled the Self-Insurer's Report of Accident (SIF #2), which will be supplied to all self-insurers, and by self-insurers to their employees. Forwarding a completed copy of this form to the department shall satisfy the self-insurer's initial accident reporting responsibility under the law.

((Noncompensable (medical-only) claims may be withheld from submission to the department for a period not to exceed thirty calendar days. The delayed filing is permissible where by so doing the request for closure can accompany the original submission of the claim.))

- (2) A self-insurer, on denying any claim, shall ((mail)) provide to the claimant, the department, and the attending physician, within seven days after such self-insurer has notice of the claim, a Notice of Denial of Claim, substantially identical to the example SIF #4, incorporated herein by reference. With every such claim denial a self-insurer shall send to the department all information on which the denial was based.
- (3) A self-insurer ((must)) shall file ((in all claims)) a Supplemental or Final Report on Injury or Occupational Disease, on a form substantially identical to the example SIF #5, incorporated herein by reference, at the following times:
- (a) On the date the first time loss compensation is paid.
- (b) On the date the time loss compensation is terminated or the rate thereof changed.
 - (c) On the date a determination is requested.
- All medical reports and other pertinent information in the self-insurer's possession must be submitted with the request for all determinations((, except in noncompensable claims (medical only))).
- ((Self-insurers shall not unreasonably delay action on a claim nor fail to keep the department informed of the existence of an extended or continuing claim.))
- (4) A self-insurer, upon receiving a claim which involves only medical treatment and which does not involve payment of temporary disability or permanent partial disability compensation, shall issue a claim number from S-numbers to be assigned to all self-insurers.

(a) When a worker files a claim the self-insurer shall advise the worker of his claim number, rights and responsibilities, in nontechnical language in a timely manner on a form approved by the department.

- (b) A self-insurer, upon closure of a medical only claim, shall issue an order on a form prescribed by the department entitled self-insurer's claim closure order and notice (LI-207-20), which will be supplied to all self-insurers, and by the self-insurers to their employees, in compliance with reporting responsibilities under the law, a copy of which shall be sent to the attending physician.
- (c) The self-insurer shall submit monthly statistical information to the department on closed claims, on a form prescribed by the department entitled medical only

statistical report (LI-207-19) which will be supplied to all self-insurers by the department.

(d) When a written protest is received by the department, the department may require a self-insurer to submit within ten working days from the date of mailing by the department, all information in the self-insurer's possession which is pertinent to the protest.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 80-29, filed 12/23/80, effective 3/1/81)

WAC 296-20-010 GENERAL INFORMATION.
(1) The following rules and fees are promulgated pursuant to RCW 51.04.020. This fee schedule is intended to cover all services for accepted industrial insurance claims. All fees listed are the maximum fees allowable. If a fee for any particular service is lower to the general public than listed in the fee schedule, the practitioner shall bill the department or self-insurer at the lower rate.

- (2) The rules contained in the introductory section pertain to all practitioners regardless of specialty area or limitation of practice. Additional rules pertaining to specialty areas will be found in the appropriate section.
- (3) The maximum allowable fee for a procedure is determined by multiplying the unit value of a procedure

by the appropriate conversion factor, per the conversion factor tables listed in WAC 296-20-135 to 296-20-155.

- (4) Initial and follow-up visit charges by practitioners include routine examinations, physical modalities, injections, minor procedures, etc., not otherwise provided for in this schedule.
- (5) When a claim has been accepted by the department or self-insurer, no provider may bill the worker for the difference between the allowable fee and his usual and customary charge. Nor can the worker be charged a fee, either for interest or completion of forms, related to services rendered for the industrial injury or condition.
- (6) Correspondence: All correspondence and billings pertaining to state fund and department of energy claims should be sent directly to Department of Labor and Industries, General Administration Building, Olympia, Washington 98504. State fund claims have six digit numbers preceded by an alpha letter other than "S" or "V".

Department of energy claims have seven digit numbers with no alpha prefix.

All correspondence and billings pertaining to crime victims claims should be sent to Crime Victims Division, Department of Labor and Industries, General Administration Building, Olympia, Washington 98504.

Crime victim claims have six digit numbers preceded by a "V".

All correspondence and billings pertaining to self-insured claims should be sent directly to the employer or his service representative as the case may be. A listing of self-insured employers and service representatives can be found in Appendix B.

Self-insured claims are six digit numbers preceded by an "S".

Communications to the department or self-insurer must show the patient's full name and claim number if known. If the claim number is unknown, the patient's name, social security number, the date and the nature of the injury, and the employer's name must be indicated. A communication should refer to one claim only. Correspondence regarding specific claim matters should be sent directly to the department in Olympia or self-insurer in order to avoid rehandling by the service location.

(7) APPENDIX C is a listing of the department's various local service locations. These facilities should be utilized by providers to obtain information, supplies, or assistance in dealing with matters pertaining to industrial injuries.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 80-29, filed 12/23/80, effective 3/1/81)

WAC 296-20-01002 DEFINITIONS. TERMINATION OF TREATMENT: When treatment is no longer required and/or the industrial condition is stabilized, a report indicating the date of stabilization should be submitted to the department or self-insurer. This is necessary to initiate closure of the industrial claim. The patient may require continued treatment for conditions not related to the industrial condition; however, financial responsibility for such care must be the patient's.

UNUSUAL OR UNLISTED PROCEDURE: Value of unlisted services or procedures should be substantiated "By Report" (BR).

"BY REPORT": BR (by report) in the value column indicates that the value of this service is to be determined by report (BR) because the service is too unusual, variable or new to be assigned a unit value. The report should provide an adequate definition or description of the services or procedure (e.g., operative or narrative report), using any of the following as indicated:

- (1) Diagnosis;
- (2) Size, location and number of lesion(s) or procedure(s) where appropriate;
- (3) Major surgical procedure and supplementary procedure(s);
- (4) Whenever possible, list the nearest similar procedure by number according to this schedule;
 - (5) Estimated follow-up;
 - (6) Operative time.

The department or self-insurer may adjust BR procedures when such action is indicated.

"INDEPENDENT OR SEPARATE PROCE-DURE": Certain of the listed procedures are commonly carried out as an integral part of a total service, and as such do not warrant a separate charge. When such a procedure is carried out as a separate entity, not immediately related to other services, the indicated value for "Independent Procedure" is applicable.

SV. ITEMS: Sv (Service) procedures are not essentially a single procedure, rather they are comprised of several other procedures. These "Sv" procedures although identified by a specific code number, can be described only in terms of the several services included. Therefore, unit values are not indicated for Sv procedures and total value is derived from the values of the individual services performed. These Sv procedures require "BR" (see above) information to substantiate billing.

MODIFIED WORK STATUS: The injured worker is not able to return to his previous work, but is physically capable of carrying out work of a lighter nature. Injured workers should be urged to return to modified work as soon as reasonable as such work is frequently beneficial for body conditioning and regaining self confidence.

Under RCW 51.32.090, when the employer has modified work available for the worker, the employer must furnish the doctor and the worker with a statement describing the available work in terms that will enable the doctor to relate the physical activities of the job to the worker's physical limitations and capabilities. The doctor shall then determine whether the worker is physically able to perform the work described. The employer may not increase the physical requirements of the job without requesting the opinion of the doctor as to the worker's ability to perform such additional work. If after a trial period of re-employment the worker is unable to continue with such work, his time loss compensation will be resumed upon certification by the attending doctor.

If the employer has no modified work available, the department should be notified immediately, so vocational assessment can be conducted to determine whether the worker will require assistance in returning to work.

REGULAR WORK STATUS: The injured worker is physically capable of returning to his/her regular work. It is the duty of the attending doctor to notify the worker and the department or self-insurer, as the case may be, of the specific date of release to return to regular work. Compensation will be terminated on the release date. Further treatment can be allowed as requested by the attending doctor if the condition is not stationary and such treatment is needed and otherwise in order.

TOTAL TEMPORARY DISABILITY: Full-time loss compensation will be paid when the worker is unable to return to any type of reasonably continuous gainful employment as a direct result of an accepted industrial injury or exposure.

TEMPORARY PARTIAL DISABILITY: Partial-time loss compensation may be paid when the worker can return to work on a limited basis or return to lesser paying job is necessitated by the accepted injury or condition. The worker must have a reduction in wages of at least five percent before consideration of partial time loss can be made. No partial-time loss compensation can be paid after the worker's condition is stationary.

ALL TIME LOSS COMPENSATION MUST BE CERTIFIED BY THE ATTENDING DOCTOR BASED ON OBJECTIVE FINDINGS.

PERMANENT PARTIAL DISABILITY: Any anatomic or functional abnormality or loss after maximum rehabilitation has been achieved, which is determined to be stable or nonprogressive at the time the evaluation is made. When the attending doctor has reason to believe a permanent impairment exists, the department or selfinsurer should be notified. Appendix D contains a schedule of the permanent disability maximum awards. UN-DER WASHINGTON LAW DISABILITY AWARDS ARE BASED SOLELY ON PHYSICAL OR MEN-TAL IMPAIRMENT DUE TO THE ACCEPTED IN-CONDITIONS JURY OR WITHOUT CONSIDERATION OF ECONOMIC FACTORS.

TOTAL PERMANENT DISABILITY: Loss of both legs or arms, or one leg and one arm, total loss of eyesight, paralysis or other condition permanently incapacitating the worker from performing any work at any gainful employment. When the attending doctor feels a worker may be totally and permanently disabled, he should communicate this information immediately to the department or self-insurer. A vocational evaluation and an independent rating of disability may be arranged by the department prior to a determination as to total permanent disability. Coverage for treatment does not usually continue after the date an injured worker is placed on pension. ((No injured worker receiving scheduled drugs can be placed on pension.))

FATAL: When the attending doctor has reason to believe a worker has died as a result of an industrial injury or exposure, the doctor should notify the nearest department service location (see Appendix C) or the self-insurer immediately. Often an autopsy is required by the department or self-insurer. If so, it will be authorized by the service location manager or the self-insurer. Benefits payable include burial stipend and monthly payments to the surviving spouse and/or dependents.

DOCTOR: For these rules, means a person licensed to practice one or more of the following professions: Medicine and surgery; osteopathic; chiropractic; drugless therapeutics; podiatry; dentistry; optometry.

Only those persons so licensed may sign report of accident forms and time loss cards except as provided in WAC 296-20-100.

PRACTITIONER: For these rules, means any person defined as a "doctor" under these rules, or licensed to practice one or more of the following professions: Audiology; physical therapy; pharmacy; prosthetics; orthotics; psychology; nursing; physician or osteopathic assistant; or other healing art licensed under the method or means permitted by such license.

PHYSICIAN: For these rules, means any person licensed to perform one or more of the following professions: Medicine and surgery; or osteopathic.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 80-29, filed 12/23/80, effective 3/1/81)

WAC 296-20-01501 PHYSICIAN'S ASSIST-ANT RULES. (1) Physicians' assistants may perform only those medical services in industrial injury cases, for which the physician's assistant is trained and licensed, under the control and supervision of a licensed physician. Such control and supervision shall not be construed to require the personal presence of the supervising physician.

- (2) Physicians' assistants may perform those medical services which are within the scope of their physician's assistant license for industrial injury cases within the limitations of subsection((s)) (3) ($(\frac{4}{5})$, and $\frac{6}{5}$) below)) of this section.
- (3) Advance approval must be obtained from the department to treat industrial injury cases. To be eligible to treat industrial injuries, the physician's assistant must:
- (a) Provide the department with a copy of his license ((indicating whether it is Type A or B)).
- (b) Provide the name and address and specialty of the supervising physician.
- (c) Provide the department with the evidence of a reliable and rapid system of communication with the supervising physician.
- (4) ((Those physicians' assistants who hold Type A licenses may: Collect historical and physical data, organize the data, and present such data to the supervising physician who can then determine appropriate diagnostic or therapeutic measures. The physician's assistant may assist the physician by performing diagnostic and therapeutic procedures and coordinating the roles of other more technical assistants. The physician's assistant may under certain circumstances and rules defined by the Professional License Division, perform medical services without the immediate surveillance of the physician. The supervising physician may bill for physician assistant service at eighty percent of procedure value as using applicable modifier code -01 or -04.
- (5) A physician's assistant holding Type B license may: Collect and organize data; perform appropriate diagnostic or therapeutic measures; and perform independent action only within the specialty field of the supervising physician. The supervising physician may bill

for physician assistant services at seventy-five percent of procedure value using applicable modifier code =02 or =05.

(6))) Physicians' assistants may prepare report of accident, time loss cards, and progress reports for the supervising physician's signature. Physicians' assistants cannot submit such information under his/her signature.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 80-29, filed 12/23/80, effective 3/1/81)

WAC 296-20-030 TREATMENT NOT RE-QUIRING AUTHORIZATION FOR ACCEPTED CONDITIONS. (1) A maximum of twenty office calls for the treatment of the industrial condition, during the first sixty days, following injury. Subsequent office calls must be authorized. Reports of treatment rendered must be filed at ((thirty)) sixty day intervals to include number of office visits to date. See WAC 296-20-03001 for report requirements and further information.

- (2) Initial diagnostic x-rays necessary for evaluation and treatment of the industrial injury or condition. See WAC 296-20-121 for further information.
- (3) The first twelve physical therapy treatments as provided by WAC 296-23-710 and 296-21-095, upon written prescription by the attending doctor or under his direct supervision. Additional physical therapy treatment must be authorized and the request substantiated by evidence of improvement. In no case will the department or self-insurer pay for inpatient hospitalization of a claimant to receive physical therapy treatment only. USE OF DIAPULSE, THERMATIC (standard model only), SPECTROWAVE AND SUPERPULSE MA-CHINES AND IONTOPHORESIS IS NOT AUTH-FOR WORKERS **ENTITLED** ORIZED BENEFITS UNDER THE INDUSTRIAL INSUR-ANCE ACT.
- (4) Routine laboratory studies reasonably necessary for diagnosis and/or treatment of the industrial condition. Other special laboratory studies require authorization.
- (5) Routine standard treatment measures rendered on an emergency basis or in connection with minor injuries not otherwise requiring authorization.
- (6) Consultation with specialist when indicated. See WAC 296-20-051 for consultation guidelines.
- (7) Nonscheduled drugs and medications during the acute phase of treatment for the industrial injury or condition.
- (8) Scheduled drugs and other medications known to be addictive, habit forming or dependency inducing may be prescribed in quantities sufficient for treatment for a maximum of fifteen days. If drug therapy extends beyond thirty days, see WAC 296-20-03003 regarding management.
- (9) Injectable scheduled and other drugs known to be addictive, habit forming, or dependency inducing may be provided only on an in-patient basis. Hospital admission for drug provision only will not be allowed.
- (10) Diagnostic or therapeutic nerve blocks. See WAC 296-20-03001 for restrictions.
- (11) Intra-articular injections. See WAC 296-20-03001 for restrictions.

(12) Myelogram if prior to emergency surgery.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 80-29, filed 12/23/80, effective 3/1/81)

WAC 296-20-03001 TREATMENT REQUIRING AUTHORIZATION. Certain treatment procedures require authorization by the department or self-insurer. Requests for authorization must include a statement of: The condition(s) diagnosed; their relationship, if any, to the industrial injury/exposure; an outline of the proposed treatment program, its length and components, and expected prognosis; and an estimate of when treatment would be concluded and condition stable.

- (1) Office calls in excess of the first twenty visits or sixty days whichever occurs first.
- (2) All nonemergent major surgery must be authorized prior to surgery date. Some surgical procedures require concurring opinions prior to authorization. (See WAC 296-20-045 for details).
 - (3) X-ray and radium therapy.
- (4) Diagnostic studies other than routine x-ray and laboratory.
 - (5) Myelogram and discogram in nonemergent cases.
- (6) Physical therapy treatment beyond initial twelve treatments as outlined in WAC 296-21-095 and 296-23-710.
- (7) Diagnostic or therapeutic injection. Epidural or caudal injection of substances other than anesthetic or contrast solution will be authorized under the following conditions only:
- (a) When the worker has experienced acute low back pain or acute exacerbation of chronic low back pain of no more than six months duration.
- (b) The worker will receive no more than three injections in an initial thirty—day treatment period, followed by a thirty—day evaluation period. If significant pain relief is demonstrated one additional series of three injections will be authorized. No more than six injections will be authorized per acute episode.
- (8) Home nursing or convalescent center care must be authorized per provision outlined in WAC 296-20-091.
- (9) Provision of prosthetics, orthotics, surgical appliances, special equipment for home or transportation vehicle; ((orthopedic)) custom made shoes; TNS units; masking devices; hearing aids; etc., must be authorized in advance as per WAC 296-20-1101 and 296-20-1102.
- (10) Biofeedback program; pain clinic; weight loss program; psychotherapy; rehabilitation programs; and other programs designed to treat special problems must be authorized in advance. See WAC 296-21-0501 and 296-20-0502 for details.
- (11) Prescription or injection of vitamins for specific therapeutic treatment of the industrial condition(s) when the attending doctor can demonstrate that published clinical studies indicate vitamin therapy is the treatment of choice for the condition. Authorization for this treatment will require presentation of facts to and review by department medical consultant.
- (12) Injections of anesthetic and/or antiinflammatory agents into the vertebral facet joints will be authorized

to qualified specialists in orthopedics, neurology, and anesthesia, or other physicians who can demonstrate expertise in the procedure, under the following conditions:

- (a) Rationale for procedure, treatment plan, and request for authorization must be presented in writing to the supervisor of medical services.
- (b) Procedure must be performed in an accredited hospital under radiographic control.
- (c) Not more than four facet injection procedures will be authorized in any one patient.
- (13) The long term prescription of medication under the specific conditions and circumstances in (a) and (b) are considered corrective therapy rather than palliative treatment and approval in advance must be obtained.
- (a) Nonsteroidal antiinflammatory agents for the treatment of degenerative joint conditions aggravated by occupational injury.
- (b) Anticonvulsive agents for the treatment of seizure disorders caused by trauma.
- (14) Intra-muscular and trigger point injections of steroids and other nonscheduled medications are limited to three injections per patient. The attending doctor must submit justification for an additional three injections if indicated with a maximum of six injections to be authorized for any one patient.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 80-29, filed 12/23/80, effective 3/1/81)

WAC 296-20-03002 TREATMENT NOT AUTHORIZED. The department or self-insurer will not allow nor pay for following treatment:

- (1) USE OF DIAPULSE, THERMATIC (standard model only), SPECTROWAVE AND SUPERPULSE MACHINES ON WORKERS ENTITLED TO BENEFITS UNDER THE INDUSTRIAL INSURANCE ACT.
- (2) Iontophoresis; prolotherapy; ((chemopapain)) chymopapain injections; acupuncture; injections of fibrosing or sclerosing agents; and injections of substances other than anesthetic or contrast into the subarachnoid space (intra-thecal injections).
- (3) Prescription and/or injection of vitamins to improve or maintain general health.
- (4) Continued treatment beyond stabilization of the industrial condition(s), i.e., maintenance care, except where necessary to monitor prescription of medication necessary to maintain stabilization i.e., anti-convulsive, anti-spasmodic, etc.
- (5) After consultation and advice to the department or self-insurer, any treatment measure deemed to be dangerous or inappropriate for the injured worker in question.
- (6) Treatment measures of an unusual, controversial, obsolete, or experimental nature (see WAC 296-20-045). Under certain conditions, treatment in this category may be approved by the department or self-insurer. Approval must be obtained prior to treatment. Requests must contain a description of the treatment, reason for the request with benefits and results expected.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 80-29, filed 12/23/80, effective 3/1/81)

WAC 296-20-03003 DRUGS AND MEDICA-TION. (1) The industrial insurance program is experiencing a significant increase in incidence of drug dependency and return-to-work apathy from use of addicting and habituating drugs. In response to this, the Washington State Medical Association's Industrial Insurance Committee issued "Guidelines to Assist Attending Physicians in the Care of Industrially Injured Workers Receiving Addictive, Habituating or Dependency Inducing Drugs." This rule is based on those guidelines.

- (2) Agents responsible for inducing dependency and return—to—work apathy when used over a short period of time, i.e. sixty to ninety days are: Antianxiety drugs, sedatives, antidepressants, antipsychotics and oral or injectable natural or synthetic narcotics and other habituating or addictive drugs.
- (3) Both antianxiety drugs and sedatives aggravate the depression which often occurs naturally in the injured worker. This makes return of self-esteem and return to work difficult. Their widespread use as "muscle relaxants" is being increasingly questioned. If these drugs are used after industrial injury, it should be on a short-term basis under careful observation. These include but are not limited to:

Antianxiety Drugs: Including, but not limited to, Valium, Librium, Tranxene, Serax, Meprobamate.

Sedatives: Including, but not limited to, short-acting Barbiturates, Dalmane, Doriden, Quaalude, etc.

- (4) The adverse effects reported for antidepressants and antipsychotics should be considered before prescribing. The manufacturer's precautions should be carefully observed. Psychiatric consultation is recommended if used longer than sixty days. These are:
 - (a) Antidepressants —
- (i) Tricyclics Elavil, Tofranil, Sinequan, Vivactil, Norpramin, Pertofrane, etc.
- (ii) Amphetamines((:)) are Schedule II substances under the jurisdiction of the federal controlled substances act and will not be allowed or paid by the Department of Labor and Industries.
 - (b) Antipsychotics —
- (i) Phenothiazines, including but not limited to, Thorazine, Stelazine, Compazine, and Mellaril.
- (ii) Butyrophenones, including but not limited to, Haldol and Innovar.
- (5) Injectable natural or synthetic narcotics and ((talwin)) other medications known to be addictive, habit forming, or dependency inducing should be used as indicated on hospitalized patients only. No prescriptions for injectable forms of these drugs (nor syringes) should be written on Department of Labor and Industries prescription forms. See WAC 296-20-030(((1)(i))) (9).
- (6) Oral natural or synthetic narcotics. Talwin and other habituating or addictive drugs should be used as indicated for acute pain, but not longer than sixty days. Their use for the relief of pain behavior and "suffering" is being increasingly questioned.

- (7) The department realizes that management of chronic pain cases is most difficult subjecting the physician to extreme pressures. With this in mind, the following guidelines are suggested with the intent that they will help the doctor cope with the pressures and assist in the management of these difficult cases:
 - (a) Keep a drug summary on all claimants.
- (b) Determine if pain complaints are consistent with the amount of injury.
- (c) Write specific instructions for the use of sedatives and analgesics.
- (d) Treat the natural depression in injured workers properly, avoiding tranquilizers, and sedatives which increase depression.
- (e) Evaluate recovery time frequently, and allow patient to regain self-esteem by returning to work.
- (f) If a patient is requiring these drugs in amounts sufficient to cause concern about habituation or addiction or for longer than sixty days, the attending physician should:
 - (i) Revise the treatment plan and withdraw the drugs.
- (ii) If unable to treat addiction or habituation himself, refer the patient to a physician or an institution experienced in drug withdrawal.
- (iii) If (i) and (ii) are not acceptable or appropriate, obtain unbiased concurring opinion, and justify an alternate course in writing to the Department of Labor and Industries or self-insurer and the Federal Drug Enforcement Administration.
- (8) The department or self-insurer will inform the attending physician when it is concerned about the amount of these drugs the patient is receiving and will provide information regarding physicians and institutions experienced in drug withdrawal.
- (9) As per RCW 51.36.010, when a worker ((cannot be)) is placed on pension ((while receiving controlled)) the department cannot pay for Schedule I, II, III or IV substances.
- (10) Physician failure to reduce or terminate prescription of controlled substances, habit forming or addicting medications, or dependency inducing medications, after department or self-insurer request to do so for an injured worker may result in a transfer of the worker to another physician of the worker's choice. Refusal of the worker to select another doctor can result in department or self-insurer selection of new attending doctor. (See WAC 296-20-065 regarding transfer.)
- (11) Should the attending doctor or the injured worker refuse to comply with the department or self-insurer request to discontinue certain medications, the department or self-insurer, after providing adequate prior notice to the worker, doctor, and pharmacy/s involved, may discontinue payment for the medication.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 80-29, filed 12/23/80, effective 3/1/81)

WAC 296-20-035 TREATMENT IN CASES THAT REMAIN OPEN BEYOND SIXTY DAYS. Conditions requiring treatment beyond sixty days are indicative of a major industrial condition or complication

by other conditions. Except in cases of severe and extensive injuries, i.e., quadriplegia, paraplegia, multiple fractures, etc., when the injured worker requires treatment beyond sixty days following injury, a complete examination is necessary to determine and/or establish need for continued treatment and/or payment of time loss compensation. This may be accomplished either by the attending doctor or a consultation exam. In either case, a detailed exam report must be provided to the department or self-insurer. The following information is required. Additional information may be included or requested.

- (1) Attending doctor report.
- (a) The condition(s) diagnosed including the objective and subjective findings.
- (b) Their relationship, if any, to the industrial injury or exposure.
- (c) Outline of proposed treatment program, its length, components, and expected prognosis including an estimate of when treatment should be concluded and condition(s) stable. An estimated return to work date should be included. The probability, if any, of permanent partial disability resulting from industrial conditions should be noted.
- (d) If the worker has not returned to work, the attending doctor should indicate whether he feels vocational assessment will be necessary to evaluate the worker's ability to return to work and why.
- (e) If the claimant has not returned to work, a physical capacities evaluation should be included with the report.
 - (2) Consultation exam.
 - (a) A DETAILED HISTORY TO ESTABLISH:
- (i) The type and severity of the industrial injury or occupational disease.
 - (ii) The patient's previous physical and mental health.
- (iii) Any social and emotional factors which may effect recovery.
- (b) A COMPARISON HISTORY between history provided by attending doctor and injured worker, must be provided with exam.
- (c) A DETAILED PHYSICAL EXAMINATION concerning all systems affected by the industrial accident.
- (d) A GENERAL PHYSICAL EXAMINATION sufficient to demonstrate any preexisting impairments of function or concurrent condition.
- (e) A COMPLETE DIAGNOSIS OF ALL PATHOLOGICAL CONDITIONS FOUND TO BE LISTED AS:
 - (i) Due solely to injury.
- (ii) Preexisting condition aggravated by the injury and the extent of aggravation.
- (iii) Other medical conditions neither related to nor aggravated by the injury but which may retard recovery.
- (iv) Coexisting disease (arthritis, congenital deformities, heart disease, etc.).
 - (f) CONCLUSIONS MUST INCLUDE:
- (i) Type treatment recommended for each pathological condition and the probable duration of treatment.
- (ii) Expected degree of recovery from the industrial condition.

- (iii) Probability, if any, of permanent disability resulting from the industrial condition.
 - (iv) Probability of returning to work.
- (g) REPORTS OF NECESSARY, REASONABLE X-RAY AND LABORATORY STUDIES TO establish or confirm the diagnosis when indicated.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 80-29, filed 12/23/80, effective 3/1/81)

WAC 296-20-06101 REPORTING REQUIRE-MENTS. ((As per WAC 296-20-035, narrative reports in cases extending beyond sixty days are required in order to authorize treatment, pay Time Loss Compensation and treatment bills. Such reports are required at thirty day intervals during first sixty days of treatment and at sixty day intervals thereafter. Attachment of office notes to billings for office visits may reduce the need for subsequent reports. However, in some instances, the department or self-insurer may request the doctor to provide a narrative report supplying additional specific information and/or a status report. When such report is provided in adequate detail to allow adjudication, the department or self-insurer will pay the fee allowed under procedure #99080.)) The department or self-insurer does require several kinds of reports at various stages of the claim in order to authorize treatment, time loss compensation, and treatment bills.

INITIAL REPORT OF ACCIDENT: The first report required is the Report of Accident. The Report of Accident qualifies as the office note or report of the initial visit for brief or limited office calls. In addition to the office call charge, the doctor may bill code 90001 for the filing of the accident report. If the initial visit is a transfer case, a report is required. Billing for an extended or comprehensive initial visit may require submission

of additional reports.

OFFICE NOTES: Copies of office or progress notes are required when billing for all follow-up visits.

SIXTY-DAY NARRATIVE REPORTS: When conservative treatment is to continue beyond sixty days, submission of a narrative report is required to substantiate the need for continued care. A narrative report must contain basic information contained in WAC 296-20-035. For this narrative report, the department or selfinsurer will pay 16.0 units for a routine report in addition to a routine office call if the call is needed to provide the information. If the doctor supplies additional comprehensive information in the report, payment of a charge submitted in excess of 16.0 units will be considered. In most cases, payment for a narrative report in addition to an extended or comprehensive office visit will not be considered as the fee for those services includes a comprehensive report. A narrative report should be billed under code 99080 and described as a "Sixty-Day Report"

CONSULTATION REPORTS: Following one-hundred twenty days of conservative care (nonsurgical cases), a consultation with the doctor of the attending doctor's choice is required to substantiate further treatment authorization. No prior authorization is required for such consultations. The department or self-insurer should be notified via a Consultation Referral form (LI-

210-299). The consultant is responsible for submitting a copy of his report as outlined in WAC 296-20-035 and 296-20-051 with his bill to the department or self-insurer.

FOLLOW-UP REPORTS: Following the one-hundred twenty day consultation, narrative reports are required at sixty-day intervals as outlined in WAC 296-20-035. The department or self-insurer will request additional consultations and/or special exams as warranted by the individual case.

HOSPITAL REPORTS: When injured workers are hospitalized it is the responsibility of the doctor to submit his reports to the hospital for submission with the hospital billing. The doctor may bill for hospital visits without attaching copies of the reports. However, billing for operative procedures requires a copy of the operative report.

REOPENING APPLICATION: The department or self-insurer will pay the doctor for an office visit and diagnostic studies if necessary to complete a reopening application on claims closed over sixty days. (See WAC 296-20-097). In addition, code 90097 "completion of reopening application" can be billed.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 80-29, filed 12/23/80, effective 3/1/81)

WAC 296-20-097 REOPENINGS. When a claim has been closed by department or self-insurer by written order and notice for sixty days, submission of a formal "Application to Reopen Claim for Aggravation of Condition" form (LI 210-79) is necessary. Exam and diagnostic studies associated with the reopening application will be paid by the department or self-insurer regardless of department or self-insurer action on the application. NO OTHER BENEFITS WILL BE PAID UNTIL ADJUDICATION DECISION IS RENDERED. Reopening applications should be submitted immediately. When reopening is granted, the department or self-insurer can pay time loss and treatment benefits only for a period not to exceed sixty days prior to date the application is received by department or self-insurer. Necessary treatment should not be deferred pending a department or self-insurer adjudication decision. However, should reopening be denied treatment costs become the financial responsibility of the worker.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 80-29, filed 12/23/80, effective 3/1/81)

WAC 296-20-1102 SPECIAL EQUIPMENT RENTAL AND PURCHASE PROSTHETIC AND ORTHOTICS EQUIPMENT. The department or self-insurer will authorize and pay rental fee for equipment or devices if the need for the equipment will be for a short period of treatment during the acute phase of condition. If the equipment will be needed on long term basis, the department or self-insurer will consider purchase of the equipment or device.

The prescribing doctor must obtain prior authorization from the department or self-insurer, for rental or purchase of special equipment or devices.

The department or self-insurer will authorize and pay for prosthetics and orthotics as needed by claimant and substantiated by attending doctor. If such items are furnished by the attending doctor, the department or self-insurer will reimburse the doctor his cost for the item ((plus a reasonable fitting fee)). In addition, a handling fee, not to exceed five percent of the wholesale cost of the item, will be paid.

The department or self-insurer will repair or replace originally provided damaged, broken, or worn-out prosthetics, orthotics, or special equipment devices upon documentation and substantiation from the attending doctor.

Provision of such equipment requires prior authorization.

Equipment not requiring prior authorization includes crutches, cervical collars, lumbar and rib belts, and other commonly used orthotics of minimal cost.

Personal appliances such as vibrators, heating pads, exercise equipment, jacuzzies, etc. will not be authorized or paid.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 80-29, filed 12/23/80, effective 3/1/81)

WAC 296-20-1103 TRAVEL EXPENSE. The department or self-insurer will reimburse travel expense incurred by injured worker's for the following reasons:

(1) Special exam at department's or self-insurer's request;
(2) vocational evaluation at department's or self-insurer's request;
(3) treatment at Department Rehabilitation Center;
(4) fitting of prosthetic device; and (5) upon prior authorization for treatment when injured worker must travel more than ten miles one-way from his home to the nearest point of adequate treatment. Travel expense is not payable when adequate treatment is available within ten miles of injured worker's home, yet the injured worker prefers to report to an attending doctor outside his home area.

Travel expense will be reimbursed at the current department established rate.

No travel expense for treatment services will be paid to those injured worker's residing outside the state of Washington. Persons traveling from Washington to another state for diagnostic or treatment services that are not available in Washington will be reimbursed travel expense when approved in advance.

When travel involves need for food and lodging these items will be reimbursed at the currently established

Parking, vehicle storage, ferry and bridge tolls will be reimbursed if receipt is provided. No receipt will be required for parking expenses under two dollars.

Request for reimbursement of travel expenses must be received by the department or self-insurer within ninety days of the date expense was incurred.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 80-29, filed 12/23/80, effective 3/1/81)

WAC 296-20-121 X-RAYS. Recognizing the greatest need for access to x-rays lies with the attending doctor, the department or self-insurer does not require

submission of the actual films except upon specific request when needed for purposes of permanent disability rating, other administrative or legal decisions, or in litigation cases. The department or self-insurer requires the attending doctor retain x-rays for a period of not less than ((seven)) ten years. In transfer cases, the x-rays in the possession of the current attending doctor must be made available to the new attending doctor.

When requesting consultation, the attending doctor should make any x-rays in his possession available to the consultant.

When the doctor's office is closed because of death, retirement or leaving the state, arrangements must be made with the department or self-insurer regarding custody of x-rays to insure availability on request. When submitting billing for x-ray service, a copy of the x-ray findings must be attached. No payment will be made for excessive or unnecessary x-rays. No payment will be made on closed or rejected claims, except under conditions outlined in WAC 296-20-124.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 80-29, filed 12/23/80, effective 3/1/81)

WAC 296-20-12502 PHYSICIAN ASSISTANT MODIFIERS. As the scope of physician assistant treatment covers a broad area of treatment procedures, the following modifier codes are to be used after the applicable procedure code.

-01 Physician Assistant((, Type A License, if)) performing procedure without presence of supervising physician. Bill 80% of Procedure Value.

((=02 Physician Assistant, Type B License, if performing procedure without presence of supervising physician. Bill 75% of Procedure Value.))

-04 Physician Assistant((, Type A License, if)) performing procedure in presence of supervising physician. Bill 80% of Procedure Value.

((=05 Physician Assistant, Type B License, if performing procedure in presence of supervising physician. Bill 75% of Procedure Value.))

-99 Multiple modifiers: Under certain circumstances, multiple modifiers may be applicable. One or more such modifiers may be taken from another section, as applicable. For example, a physician assistant might be serving as a surgical assistant (modifier -80), assisting in performing a multiple or bilateral procedure (modifier -50). In such cases, he would add this modifier (-99) to the procedure code and briefly indicate the circumstances.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 80-24, filed 12/1/80, effective 1/1/81)

WAC 296-20-135 CONVERSION FACTOR TA-BLE—MEDICINE, CHIROPRACTIC, PHYSICAL THERAPY, DRUGLESS THERAPEUTICS AND NURSE PRACTITIONER SECTIONS. This table is a conversion of fee schedule unit values to fees in dollar amounts at \$((0.96)) 1.05 per unit. This conversion factor is to be applied to the medicine section of the fee schedule, the chiropractic, physical therapy, drugless therapeutic and nurse practitioner sections.

The following graduated listing of services is an attempt to reflect the relative values of the time and skills required at the various service levels. The listed values apply only when these services are performed by or under the responsible supervision of a physician. Separate rules and fee structure exist for services provided by other health care practitioners including nurse practitioners and physician's assistants.

- (2) SUPPLEMENTAL SKILLS: When warranted. values for the services of two or more physicians will be allowed. Billings for such services must be supported "By Report". See WAC 296-20-01002 for By Report content information.
- (3) CAST ROOM CHARGES: See ((WAC 296-22-095)) Code 99070 for information.

DEFINITIONS

Definitions and Items of Commonality.

Terms and phrases common to the practice of medicine are defined as follows and apply to procedures 90000 through 90696.

- (1) NEW PATIENT: A patient new to the physician.
- (2) ESTABLISHED PATIENT: A patient known to the physician and/or whose records are usually available.
- (3) INITIAL VISIT: Initial care, including physical examination and initiation of diagnostic and treatment program, for a condition regardless of whether the patient is known to the physician.

(4) FOLLOW-UP VISIT: Subsequent care for a patient and condition known to the physician.

(5) CONSULTATION: A consultation includes services rendered by a physician whose opinion or advice is requested for the further evaluation and/or treatment of the patient. When the consulting physician assumes responsibility for the continuing care of the patient, any subsequent service rendered by him will cease to be a consultation. Four levels of consultation are recognized: Limited, extensive, comprehensive and consultation of complexity.

For example:

- (a) In a LIMITED consultation the physician confines his service to the examination or evaluation of a single organ system for a limited condition. For example, the dermatologist's opinion about a skin lesion, the neurologist's opinion about a disc problem and the orthopedist's opinion about a knee or low back problem.
- (b) An EXTENSIVE consultation involves a prolonged evaluation including more than a single organ system or region. For example: The examination of the cardiac patient who needs clearance before undergoing a surgical operation, consultations involving cardio-pulmonary problems and neurologic and orthopedic examinations of patient whose complaints seem disproportionate to his objective findings requiring detailed psychosocial evaluation.
- (c) A COMPREHENSIVE consultation indicates the performance of detailed history (including the current problem, any previous illnesses, family disease tendencies and a review of all organ systems) and a thorough physical examination on a patient with a complex illness to establish the diagnosis and/or recommended therapy. For example; The young person with fever, arthritis and anemia and examination of patient for diagnosis and in depth evaluation of all organ systems for pre-existing and/or unrelated nonindustrial conditions.
- (d) The consultation of UNUSUAL COMPLEXITY: This is an uncommonly performed service with an indepth medical opinion in a case involving all components

of a detailed history with exhaustive examination of all organ systems and regions. For example: The patient with an undiagnosed fever of several years duration, with multiple hospitalizations, requiring a review of previous records, laboratory studies and radiographs as well as a comprehensive examination. Another example is the psychotic patient with minor cardiac findings who is being considered for cardio-pulmonary bypass because of complaints of angina. Another example is the paraplegic patient with iatrogenic drug addiction or dependency (condition resulting from treatment).

(((4))) (6) REFERRAL: (Transfer) A referral is the transfer of the total or specific care of a patient from one physician to another and does not constitute a consultation. Initial evaluation and subsequent services are des-

ignated as listed below in levels of service.

- (((5))) (7) INDEPENDENT PROCEDURE: Certain listed procedures are commonly undertaken as an integral part of a total service. When such a procedure is undertaken as a separate entity, the designation "Independent Procedure" is appropriate. For example: A patient being seen in consultation by an ophthalmologist and it is necessary for him to perform a gonioscopy or a ophthalmoscopy with intravenous fluorescein as diagnostic procedures in connection with the consultation, then they would be considered as independent procedures. Another example would be cardiac monitoring with electronic equipment in intrathoracic or other critical surgery.
- (((6))) (8) LEVELS OF SERVICE: Examinations, evaluations, treatment, counseling, conferences with or concerning patients, and services which necessitate wide variations in skill, effort and time required for the diagnosis and treatment of illness and the promotion of optimal health. Six levels are recognized:

MINIMAL: A level of service including injections, dressings, minimal care, etc., not necessarily requiring the presence of the physician.

For Example:

- (a) Routine immunization for tetanus administered by a nurse.
- (b) Blood pressure determination by a nurse for medication control.
 - (c) Removal of sutures from laceration.

BRIEF: A level of service requiring a brief period of time, with minimal effort by the physician.

For Example:

- (a) Certification of time loss in a stable or chronic case.
 - (b) Re-examination of contusion or abrasion.
- (c) Examination of conjunctiva by the physician in a patient with subconjunctival hemorrhage, irrigation, medication and removal of foreign body with instrument.

LIMITED: A level of service requiring limited effort or judgment, such as abbreviated or interval history, limited examination or discussion of findings and/or treatment.

For Example:

- (a) Review and examination of uncomplicated sprains and strains with initiation, continuation and/or change of treatment.
- (b) Examination of an extremity fracture not requiring reduction.
- (c) Post-operative care in instances where the unit value is for surgical procedure only.

INTERMEDIATE: A level of service such as a complete history and physical examination of one or more organ systems, or an in depth counseling or discussion of the findings, but not requiring a comprehensive examination of the patient as a whole.

For Example:

- (a) Review of interval history; examination of neck veins, lungs, heart, abdomen and extremities, discussion of findings and prescription of treatment in decompensated arteriosclerotic heart disease.
- (b) Review of interval history, examination of musculoskeletal system, discussion of findings, and adjustment of therapeutic program in low back and/or arthritic disorders.
- (c) Review of recent illness: Examination of pharynx, neck, axilla, groin, and abdomen; interpretation of laboratory tests and prescription of treatment in infectious mononucleosis.
- (d) Evaluation of a chest, post trauma, with impaired respiration with development of shock.

EXTENDED: A level of service requiring an unusual amount of time, effort or judgment but not complete examination of the patient as a whole.

For Example:

- (a) Detailed review of results of diagnostic evaluation including discussion of physical findings, laboratory studies, x-ray examinations, diagnostic conclusions and recommendations for treatment.
- (b) Prolonged evaluation required for psychologically unstable or dependent patient.

COMPREHENSIVE: A level of service providing an in depth evaluation of the patient.

For Example:

- (a) Evaluation of the patient including complete history, physical examination and initiation of diagnostic and/or treatment program.
- (b) Re-examination or re-evaluation of patient with continuing or new illness, including complete history, physical examination and initiation of diagnostic and/or treatment program.
- (c) Evaluation of a head injury immediately post trauma with a known previous history of convulsive disorders and a post trauma history of transitory loss of consciousness, dizziness, visual problems, etc.
- (d) Evaluation of a cardiac problem with respiratory distress resulting from inhalation of toxic and/or irritant chemicals.

Hospital care by the attending physician in treating a psychiatric inpatient may be initial or subsequent in nature (see 90200-90280) and may include exchanges with nursing and ancillary personnel. Hospital care services involve a variety of responsibilities unique to the medical management of inpatients, such as physician hospital orders, interpretation of laboratory or other medical diagnostic studies and observations, review of activity therapy reports, supervision of nursing and ancillary personnel, and the programming of all hospital resources for diagnosis and treatment. Some patients receive hospital care services only and others receive hospital care services and other procedures. If other procedures such as electroconvulsive therapy or medical psychotherapy are rendered in addition to hospital care services, these should be listed separately (i.e., hospital care service plus electroconvulsive therapy or plus medical psychotherapy

Psychiatric care may be reported without time dimensions according to the procedure or service as are other medical or surgical procedures. In reporting medical psychotherapy procedures, time is only one aspect and may be expressed as is customary in the local area. BIOFEEDBACK RULES. WAC 296-21-0501 Procedures listed under WAC 296-20-0502 are for use by M.D.'s, D.O.'s, certified registered nurses and certified psychologists. RPT's and LPT's must use rules and procedures listed under WAC 296-23-710 through 296-

Administration of Biofeedback treatment is limited to those practitioners who are certified by the Biofeedback ((Society of Washington)) Certification Institute of America or who meet the minimum education, experience, and training qualifications to be so certified. Those practitioners wishing to administer Biofeedback treatment to injured workers, must submit a copy of their Biofeedback certification or supply evidence of their qualifications to the department of self-insurer as the case may be.

- (1) The department will authorize Biofeedback treatment for the following conditions when accepted under the Industrial Insurance claim:
 - (a) Idiopathic Raynaud's disease
 - (b) Temporomandibular Joint Dysfunction
 - (c) Myofascial Pain Dysfunction Syndrome (MPD)
 - (d) Tension headaches
 - (e) Migraine headaches
 - (f) Tinnitus
 - (g) Torticollis
- (h) Neuromuscular re-education as result of neurological damage in CVA or spinal cord injury
- (i) Inflammatory and/or musculoskeletal disorders causally related to the accepted condition.
- (2) Twelve Biofeedback treatments in a ninety day period will be authorized for the above conditions when the following is presented:
 - (a) An evaluation report documenting:
 - (i) The basis for the claimant's condition;
- (ii) the condition's relationship to the industrial injury;
- (iii) an evaluation of the claimant's current functional measurable modalities (i.e., range of motion, up time, walking tolerance, medication intake, etc.);
 - (iv) an outline of the proposed treatment program;
 - (v) an outline of the expected restoration goals.
- (b) No further Biofeedback treatments will be authorized or paid for without substantiation of evidence of improvement in measurable, functional modalities (i.e., range of motion, up time, walking tolerance, medication intake, etc.). Only one additional treatment block of twelve treatments per ninety days will be authorized. Requests for Biofeedback treatment beyond twenty-four treatments or one hundred eighty days will be granted only after file review by and on the advice of the department's medical consultant.
- (c) In addition to treatment, pre-treatment and periodic evaluation will be authorized. Follow-up evaluation can be authorized at one, three, six, and twelve months post-treatment.
- (d) At the department's option, a concurring opinion may be required regarding relationship of the condition to the industrial injury and/or need for Biofeedback treatment.

WAC 296-21-125 ANESTHESIA. (1) Values for anesthesia services are listed for each procedure in the surgical section and for certain procedures in other sections. These values are to be used only when the anesthesia is personally administered by a licensed physician and surgeon who remains in constant contact attendance

during the procedure for the sole purpose of rendering such anesthesia service. These values include usual preand post-operative visits, the administration of the anesthetic and the administration of fluids and/or blood in-

cident to the anesthesia or surgery.

(2) "STANDBY SERVICES": When an anesthesiologist is required to participate in the general care of the patient during a surgical procedure, but does not administer anesthesia, these services may be charged on the basis of detention or on the basis of the indicated anesthesia value in accordance with the extent of the services rendered.

- (3) In procedures where no value is listed, the basic portion of the calculated value will be the same as listed for a comparable procedure.
- (4) Where unusual detention with the patient is essential for the safety and welfare of such patient, see 99038, 99040.
- (5) Local infiltration, digital block or topical anesthesia administered by the operating surgeon is included in the unit value for the original surgical procedure.
- (6) SUPPLEMENTAL SKILLS: When warranted by the necessity of supplemental skills, values for the services of the two or more physicians will be allowed.
- (7) Adjunctive services provided during anesthesia and certain other circumstances may warrant an additional charge.

ANESTHESIA MODIFIERS

Since the values of anesthesia services are related to the procedure for which the anesthesia was performed, the anesthesia service is billed under the code number of the procedure. Add appropriate anesthesia modifier -40 to -49 to the procedure number to indicate that billing is for anesthesia service and not the medical or surgical procedure.

Listed values for most procedures may be modified under certain circumstances. When applicable, the modifying circumstances should be identified by the addition of the appropriate "modifier code number" (including hyphen) after the usual procedure number. The value should be listed as a single modified total for the procedure. (When multiple modifiers are applicable to a single procedure, see modifier code -49.)

The basic value is paid to the supervising anesthesiologist and the time units are paid to the nurse anesthetist. Identify by adding modifier -95 to the procedure code

WAC 296-22-010 GENERAL INFORMATION AND INSTRUCTIONS. Rules and billing procedures pertaining to all practitioners rendering services to injured workers are presented in the General Information Section beginning with WAC 296-20-010. Some commonalities are repeated here for the convenience of those doctors referring to the Surgery Section. Definitions and rules unique to Surgery are also included here. Doctor's services rendered for office, home, hospital, consultations and other services are listed in the Medicine Section.

- (1) Listed values for all surgical procedures include the surgery, local infiltration, digital block or topical anesthesia when used and the normal uncomplicated follow-up care for the period indicated in days in the column headed "Follow-up Days".
- (2) Follow-up care for diagnostic procedures (e.g., endoscopy, injection procedures for radiography, etc.) includes only that care related to recovery from the diagnostic procedure itself. Care of the condition for which the diagnostic procedure was performed or other concomitant conditions is not included and may be charged for in accordance with the services rendered.
- (3) Follow-up care for therapeutic surgical procedures includes only that care usually a part of the surgical service. Complications, exacerbations, recurrence or the presence of other diseases or injuries requiring additional services concurrent with the procedure(s) or during the listed period of normal follow-up care may warrant additional charges. (See modifier -68).

When an additional surgical procedure(s) is carried out within the listed period of follow-up care for a previous surgery, the follow-up periods will continue concurrently to their normal terminations.

(4) PRE-OPERATIVE VISITS AND SERVICES: Under most circumstances the immediate pre-operative visit in the hospital or elsewhere necessary to examine the patient, complete the hospital records, and initiate the treatment program is included in the listed value for the surgical procedure.

Additional charges may be warranted for pre-operative services under the following circumstances:

- (a) When the pre-operative visit is the initial visit (e.g., an emergency, etc.) and prolonged detention or evaluation is required to prepare the patient or to establish the need for and type of surgical procedure.
- (b) When the pre-operative visit is a consultation as defined in WAC 296-21-030.
- (c) When procedures not usually part of the basic surgical procedure (e.g., bronchoscopy prior to chest surgery, etc.) are provided during the immediate preoperative period.
- (5) CONCURRENT SERVICES BY MORE THAN ONE PHYSICIAN: Charges for concurrent services of two or more physicians may be warranted under the following circumstances:
- (a) Medical services provided during the surgical procedure or in the post-operative period (e.g., diabetic management, operative monitoring of cardiac or brain conditions, management of post-operative electrolyte imbalance, etc.).
- (b) TWO SURGEONS: Under certain circumstances the skills of two surgeons (e.g., a urologist and a general surgeon in the creation of an ileal conduit, etc.). By prior agreement, the total value may be apportioned in relation to the responsibility of work done. The total value may be increased by 25% in lieu of the assistant's charge. (See modifier -62).
- (c) CO-SURGEONS: Under certain circumstances, two surgeons (usually with similar skills) may function simultaneously as primary surgeons performing distinct parts of a total surgical service (e.g., two surgeons simultaneously applying skin grafts to different parts of the body of the same patient). By prior agreement, the total value may be apportioned in relation to the responsibility and work done. The total value may be increased by an appropriate amount in lieu of the usual assistant's charge. (See modifier -64).
- (d) SURGICAL TEAM: Under some circumstances highly complex procedures requiring the concomitant services of several physicians, often of different specialties, plus other highly skilled, specially trained personnel and various types of complex equipment are carried out under the surgical team concept with a single, global fee for the total service. The services included in the "global" charge vary widely and no single value can be listed. The value should be supported by a report to include itemization of the physician(s) services, paramedical personnel and equipment included in the "global" charge. (See modifier -66).

(6) ASTERISK (*) PROCEDURES OR ITEMS: Certain relatively small surgical services involve a readily identifiable surgical procedure but include variable pre-operative and post-operative services (e.g., incision and drainage of an abscess, injection of a tendon sheath, manipulation of a joint under anesthesia, dilation of the urethra, etc.). Because of the indefinite pre- and post-operative services the usual "package" concept for surgical services (see above) cannot be applied. Such procedures are identified by an asterisk (*) preceding or following the procedure code number.

Where an asterisk (*) precedes or follows a procedure number and its value, the following rules apply:

- (a) The services as listed includes the surgical procedure only. Associated pre— and post—operative services are not included.
- (b) Pre-operative services are considered as one of the following:
- (i) When the asterisk (*) procedure is carried out at the time of an initial visit (new patient) and this procedure constitutes the major service at that visit, procedure number 99025 is listed in lieu of the usual initial visit as an additional service.
- (ii) When the asterisk (*) procedure is carried out at the time of an initial or other visit involving significant identifiable services (e.g., removal of a small skin lesion at the time of a comprehensive history and physical examination), the appropriate visit is listed in addition to the asterisk (*) procedure and its follow-up care.
- (iii) When the asterisk (*) procedure is carried out at the time of a follow-up (established patient) visit and this procedure constitutes the major service at that visit, no visit service is usually added.
- (iv) When the asterisk (*) procedure requires hospitalization, an appropriate hospital visit is listed in addition to the asterisk (*) procedure and its follow-up care.
- (c) All post-operative care is to be added on a service-by-service basis (e.g., office or hospital visit, cast change, etc.).
- (d) Complications are added on a service-by-service basis (as with all surgical procedures).
- (7) MULTIPLE OR BILATERAL SURGICAL PROCEDURES:
- (a) When multiple or bilateral surgical procedures which add significant time or complexity to patient care are performed at the same operative session (See modifier -50).
- (b) Incidental procedures (e.g., incidental appendectomy, incidental scar incision, puncture of ovarian cysts, simple lysis of adhesions, simple repair of hiatal hernia, etc.) do not warrant an additional charge. (See modifier -52). THESE PROCEDURES MUST BE AUTHOR-IZED IN ADVANCE.
- (8) SURGERY AND FOLLOW-UP CARE PROVIDED BY DIFFERENT PHYSICIANS: When one physician performs the surgical procedure itself and another provides the follow-up care, the value may be apportioned between them by agreement along with notification to the department of the fee distribution. (See modifier -54 or -55).
- (9) ANESTHESIA BY SURGEON: When regional or general anesthesia is provided by the surgeon, value

- as "Basic" value for anesthesia procedure without added value for time. (See modifier -47) (For local infiltration, digital block or topical anesthesia, see WAC 296-22-010, item 1).
- (10) In cases where the claimant does not survive, the percentage of the flat fee paid the physician shall be commensurate with the services rendered.
- (11) The emergency room will be considered the office for those physicians providing regular emergency room care to the hospital and fees will be allowed on this basis.
- (12) Materials supplied by physician: Supplies and materials provided by the physician, e.g., sterile trays/drugs, over and above those usually included with the office visit or other services rendered may be listed separately. List drugs, trays, supplies, and materials provided. Identify as 99070.
- (13) Separate or multiple procedures: It is appropriate to designate multiple procedures that are rendered on the same date by separate entries. (See Modifier -50 below.)
- (14) Special report: A service that is rarely provided, unusual, variable, or new may require a special report in determining medical appropriateness of the service. Pertinent information should include an adequate definition or description of the nature, extent, and need for the procedure, and the time, effort, and equipment necessary to provide the service. Additional items which may be included are: Complexity of symptoms, final diagnosis, pertinent physical findings (such as size, location, and number of lesion(s), if appropriate), diagnostic and therapeutic procedures (including major and supplementary surgical procedures, if appropriate), concurrent problems, and follow-up care. See WAC 296-20-01002 for "BR" By Report instructions.
- (15) Surgery modifiers: (For other modifiers, see appropriate sections.)

Listed values and procedures may be modified under certain circumstance. When applicable, the modifying circumstance should be identified by the addition of the appropriate "modifier code number" which is a two digit number placed after the usual procedure number from which it is separated by a hyphen. If more than one modifier is used, the "multiple modifiers" placed first after the procedure code indicates one or more additional modifier codes will follow. All modifiers and their respective codes are listed in Appendix A. Modifiers commonly used in surgery are as follows:

Use the "basic" anesthesia value only. (Note: Surgical units and anesthesia units are not of the same dollar values.) List separately from the surgical service provided and identify by adding this modifier '-47' to the usual procedure number. (For local infiltration, digital block or topical anesthesia, see WAC 296-21-125, item 5.)

- PROCEDURES: When multiple or bilateral procedures which add significant time or complexity to patient care are provided at the same operative session, identify and value the first or major procedure as listed. Identify secondary or lesser procedure(s) by '-50' to the usual procedure number(s) and value at 50% of the listed value(s) unless otherwise indicated.
- -52 REDUCED VALUES: Under certain circumstances, the listed value

for a procedure is reduced or eliminated at the physician's election. Under these circumstances, the service provided can be identified by it's usual procedure number and the addition of modifier '-52', signifying that the service is reduced. For example:

- (a) Incidental procedures (e.g., incidental appendectomies, incidental scar excisions, puncture of ovarian cysts, simple lysis of adhesions, simple repair of a hiatal hernia, etc.) do not warrant an additional charge.
- (b) When the listed value is reduced in conformity with a ground rule (e.g., rereduction of a fracture).
- (c) When charges for multiple procedures (e.g., multiple lacerations, etc.) are reduced at the physician's election to achieve an appropriate total charge.
- ONLY: When one physician performs the surgical procedure and another provides the pre— and/or post—operative management surgical services may be identified by adding the modifier '-54' to the usual procedure number. Value may be apportioned between them by agreement.
- -55 POST-OPERATIVE MANAGE-MENT ONLY: When one physician performs the post-operative management and another has performed the surgical procedure, the post operative component may be identified by adding the modifier '-55' to the usual procedure number. Value may be apportioned between them by agreement.

NOTES

The services normally required in uncomplicated maternity cases include antepartum care, delivery and postpartum care.

Antepartum care includes usual prenatal services (initial and subsequent history, physical examinations, recording of weight, blood pressure, fetal heart tones, routine chemical urinalyses, maternity counseling).

Delivery includes vaginal delivery (with or without episiotomy, with or without forceps or breech delivery) or Cesarean section, and resuscitation of new born infant when necessary.

Postpartum care includes hospital and office visits following vaginal or Cesarean section delivery.

For medical complications of pregnancy (toxemia, cardiac problems, neurological problems or other problems requiring additional or unusual services or requiring hospitalization), see services in MEDICINE section. For surgical complications of pregnancy not listed below, see appropriate procedures in SURGERY.

If a physician provides all or part of the antepartum and/or postpartum patient care but does not perform the delivery due to termination of pregnancy by abortion or referral to another physician for delivery, see 59420-59430.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 80-29, filed 12/23/80, effective 3/1/81)

WAC 296-23-01002 CUSTODY OF X-RAYS. (1) Radiographs should not be sent to the department or self-insurer unless they are requested for comparison and interpretation in determining a permanent disability, administrative or legal decisions and for cases in litigation. X-rays must be retained for a period of ((seven)) ten years by the radiologist or the attending doctor.

- (2) X-rays must be made available upon request to consultants, to medical examiners, to the department, to self-insurers and/or the Board of Industrial Insurance Appeals.
- (3) In cases where the injured worker transfers from one doctor to another, the former attending doctor will immediately forward all films in his possession to the new attending doctor.
- (4) When a doctor's office is closed because of death, retirement or upon leaving the state, department approved custodial arrangements must be made to insure availability on request. If a radiological office is closed for any of the previously listed reasons or because the partnership or corporation is being dissolved, disposition of x-rays for industrial injuries will be handled in the same manner. In the event custodial arrangements are to be made, the department must approve the arrangements prior to transfer of x-rays to the custodian so as to assure their availability to the department or self-insurer upon request.
- (5) Reports of x-ray findings must accompany bills for x-ray services. See WAC 296-20-125 for additional billing information.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 80-29, filed 12/23/80, effective 3/1/81)

WAC 296-23-01006 RADIOLOGY, RADIATION THERAPY, NUCLEAR MEDICINE AND MODIFIERS. Listed services and procedures may be modified under certain circumstances. When applicable, the modifying circumstance should be identified by the addition of the appropriate modifier code which is a

two digit number placed after the usual procedure number from which it is separated by a hyphen. ((The value should be listed as a single modified total for the procedure.)) If more than one modifier is used, the "multiple modifiers" code placed first after the procedure code indicates that one or more additional modifier codes will follow. ((All modifiers and their respective codes are listed in Appendix A:)) Modifiers commonly used in RADIOLOGY (INCLUDING NUCLEAR MEDICINE AND DIAGNOSTIC ULTRASOUND) are as follows:

- -22 UNUSUAL SERVICES: When the service(s) provided is greater than that usually required for the listed procedure, it may be identified by adding modifier '-22' to the usual procedure number. List modified value. A report may also be appropriate. Note: Modifier -22 may be utilized with computerized tomography numbers when additional slices are required or a more detailed examination is necessary.
- PROFESSIONAL COMPONENT: Certain procedures (e.g., laboratory, radiology, electrocardiogram, specific diagnostic services,) are a combination of a physician component and a technical component. When the physician component is billed separately, the procedure may be identified by adding the modifier '-26' to the usual procedure number and value as appropriate. The total cost of procedure cannot exceed the Basic Unit Value.
- -50 MULTIPLE OR BILATERAL PROCEDURES: When multiple or bilateral procedures are provided at the same operative session, the first major procedure may be reported as listed. The secondary or lesser procedure(s) may be identified by adding the modifier '-50' to the usual procedure number(s) and value at 50 percent of the listed values unless otherwise indicated.
- -52 REDUCED SERVICES: Under certain circumstances a service or procedure is partially reduced or eliminated at the physician's election. Under these circumstances the service provided can be identified by its usual procedure number and the addition of the modifier '-52' signifying that the service is ((rendered)) reduced. This provides a means of reporting reduced services at reduced charge without disturbing the identification of the basic service. Note: Modifier -52 may be utilized with computerized tomography numbers for a limited study or a follow-up study.
- -75 CONCURRENT CARE, SERVICES REND-ERED BY MORE THAN ONE PHYSICIAN: When the patient's condition requires the additional services of more than one physician, each physician may identify his or her services by adding the modifier '-75' to the basic service performed.
- -76 REPEAT PROCEDURE BY SAME PHYSI-CIAN: The physician may need to indicate that a

WAC 296-23-200 PATHOLOGY GENERAL INFORMATION AND INSTRUCTION. Rules and billing procedure pertaining to all practitioners rendering service to injured workers are presented in General information section beginning with WAC 296-20-010. Some commonalities are repeated here for convenience

of those doctors referring to Pathology section. Definitions and rules to Pathology are also included here.

- (1) The following values apply only when these services are performed by or under the responsible supervision of a physician. Unless otherwise specified, the listed values include the collection and handling of the specimens by the laboratory performing the procedure.
- (2) Lab reports must be attached to bills for lab services. See WAC 296-20-125 for further billing instruction.
- (3) Laboratory procedures performed by other than the billing physician shall be billed at the value charged that physician by the reference (outside) laboratory under the individual procedure number or the panel procedure number listed under "PANEL OR PROFILE TESTS" (see modifier -90).
- (4) The department or self-insurer may deny payment for lab procedures which are determined to be excessive or unnecessary for management of the injury or conditions.
- (5) Panel (Profile) Tests: Panel (Profile) tests are defined as certain multiple tests performed on a single specimen of blood or urine. They are distinguished from the single or multiple test(s) performed on an "individual," "immediate" or "stat" reporting basis. denotes test performed as part of a panel, see 80003-80013.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 80-29, filed 12/23/80, effective 3/1/81)

WAC 296-23-357 X-RAYS. (1) X-rays should not be sent to the department or self-insurer unless requested for comparison and interpretation in determining permanent disability, other administrative or legal decisions, and for cases in litigation. X-rays must be retained for a period of ((seven)) ten years by the hospital.

(2) X-rays must be made available upon request to consultants, to medical examiners, to the department, to self-insurers and/or the Board of Industrial Insurance

Appeals.

(3) If a hospital ceases to function as an acute care facility, department approved custodial arrangements must be made to insure availability of x-rays on request.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 80-29, filed 12/23/80, effective 3/1/81)

WAC 296-23-610 GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS. (1) Please refer to WAC 296-20-010 through WAC 296-20-125 for general information and rules pertaining to treatment of injured workers.

(2) The maximum fee is determined by multiplying the unit value of a procedure by a conversion factor. The appropriate conversion factor table for chiropractic services is the medicine tables. For x-ray services – use radiology conversion tables and procedure numbers.

(3) In addition to the rules found in WAC 296-20-010 to 296-20-125, the following rules apply when chi-

ropractic treatment is being rendered:

- (a) No more than one chiropractic adjustment per day will be authorized or paid, except on the initial and next two subsequent visits. The attending doctor must submit a detailed report regarding the need for the additional treatment.
- (b) Treatment beyond the first 20 treatments or 60 days, whichever comes first, will not be authorized without submission of a consultation report or a comprehensive comparative exam report regarding need for further care. (See WAC 296-20-051 re: Consultation.)
- (c) If needed, x-rays immediately prior to and immediately following the initial chiropractic treatment may be allowed without prior authorization.
- (d) X-rays before and after subsequent chiropractic treatment will not be paid unless previously authorized. Prior authorization must be obtained for x-rays subsequent to the initial treatment.
- (e) No payment will be made for excessive or unnecessary x-rays taken on initial or subsequent visits.
- (f) No services or x-rays will be paid on rejected or closed claims except those rendered in conjunction with a reopening application.
- (g) See WAC 296-23-01002 for custody requirements for x-rays.
- (h) Treatment as a maintenance or supportive measure will not be authorized nor paid.
- (4) Billing procedures itemized in WAC 296-20-125 must be followed.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 80-29, filed 12/23/80, effective 3/1/81)

WAC 296-23-615 OFFICE VISITS AND SPECIAL SERVICES.

DEFINITIONS:

Routine Office Visit: A level of service pertaining to the evaluation and treatment of a condition requiring only an abbreviated history and exam, i.e.:

- (1) Palpation, exam and adjustment of one or more areas.
 - (2) Brief exam and no adjustment.

Extended Office Visit: A level of service pertaining to an evaluation of patient with a new or existing problem requiring a detailed history, review of records, exam, and a formal conference with patient or family to evaluate and/or adjust therapeutic treatment management and progress.

Comprehensive Office Visit: A level of service pertaining to an indepth evaluation of a patient with a new or existing problem, requiring development or complete re-evaluation of treatment data; includes recording of chief complaints and present illness, family history, past treatment history, personal history, system review; and a complete exam to evaluate and determine appropriate therapeutic treatment management and progress.

REPORTING:

Reporting requirements are outlined in WAC 296-20-06101. The department or self-insurer will accept a brief narrative report of treatment received and the patient's progress as supporting documentation for billings in lieu of routine follow-up office notes.

CHIROPRACTIC MODIFIERS:

- -22 Unusual Services: When treatment services provided are greater than that usually required for listed procedures. Use of this modifier must be based on the injured worker's need for extended or unusual care. A report is required; the modifier -22 should be added to the procedure number.

WAC 296-23-710 PHYSICAL THERAPY RULES. Practitioners should refer to WAC 296-20-010 through 296-20-125 for general information and rules pertaining to the care of injured workers. See WAC 296-20-125 for billing instructions.

Physical therapy treatment will be permitted only when given by a licensed registered physical therapist or a physical therapist assistant serving under the direction of a licensed registered physical therapist upon written prescription by a doctor. Doctor's rendering physical therapy should refer to WAC 296-21-095.

Use of diapulse or similar machine on injured workers is not authorized. See WAC 296-20-03002 for further information.

A physical therapy progress report must be submitted to the attending doctor((, with a copy attached, to)) and the ((billing)) department or the self-insurer following 12 treatment visits or one month, whichever occurs first. Such report must be attached to the billing for services. Physical therapy treatment beyond initial 12 treatments will be authorized only upon substantiation of improvement in the worker's condition in terms of functional modalities, i.e.: Range of motion; sitting and standing tolerance; reduction in medication; etc. In addition, an outline of the proposed treatment program, the expected restoration goals, and the expected length of treatment will be required.

Upon justification and subsequent authorization by the department, or self-insurer, physical therapy treatment to separate noncontiguous areas (i.e., ((tow)) low back, knee) requiring individual treatment or special procedures will be allowed at full rate for each area with a maximum of two areas allowed.

Physical therapy in the home and/or places other than the practitioners usual and customary business facilities ((justification to)) will be allowed only upon prior justification and authorization by the department or self-insurer.

No in-patient physical therapy treatment will be allowed when such treatment constitutes the only or major treatment received by the worker. See WAC 296-20-030 for further information.

Physical therapy treatments exceeding once per day must be justified by attending doctor.

Biofeedback treatment may be rendered on doctor's orders only, by those R.P.T.'s and L.P.T.'s working under the supervision of a R.P.T. The extent of biofeedback treatment is limited to those procedures allowed within the scope of practice of the R.P.T. or L.P.T. See WAC 296-21-0501 for rules pertaining to conditions authorized and report requirements.

Extended Office Visit: A level of service pertaining to an evaluation of patient with a new or existing problem requiring a detailed history, review of records, exam, and a formal conference with patient or family to evaluate and/or adjust therapeutic treatment management and progress.

Comprehensive Office Visit: A level of service pertaining to an indepth evaluation of a patient with a new or existing problem, requiring development or complete re-evaluation of treatment data; includes recording of chief complaints and present illness, family history, past treatment history, personal history, system review; and a complete exam to evaluate and determine appropriate therapeutic treatment management and progress.

REPORTING:

Reporting requirements are outlined in WAC 296-20-
06101. The department or self-insurer will accept a
brief narrative report of treatment received and the pa-
tient's progress as supporting documentation for billings
in lieu of routine follow-up office notes.

DRUGLESS THERAPEUTIC MODIFIERS:

- -22 Unusual Services: When treatment services provided are greater than that usually required for listed procedures. Use of this modifier must be based on the injured worker's need for extended or unusual care. A report may be required. The modifier -22 should be added to the procedure number.
- -52 Reduced Services: Under certain circumstances no treatment may be given, in these cases the procedure should be reduced by 10 units and modifier -52 should be added to the procedure number.

MATERIAL SUPPLIED BY DOCTOR:

Department or self-insurer will reimburse the doctor for materials supplied, i.e. cervical collars, heel lifts, etc., at cost only. WSR 81-24-042 ADOPTED RULES DEPARTMENT OF LABOR AND INDUSTRIES

[Order 81-30-Filed November 30, 1981-Eff. January 1, 1982]

I, Sam Kinville, director of the Department of Labor and Industries, do promulgate and adopt at the office of the Director, Department of Labor and Industries, General Administration Building, Olympia, Washington, the annexed rules relating to method of computing workers' compensation premiums, risk classification definitions for workers' compensation insurance, experience rating plan rules and parameters applicable to workers' compensation insurance, basic insurance rates by risk classification and premium size groups for retrospective rating plans.

This action is taken pursuant to Notice Nos. WSR 81-20-078 and 81-24-004 filed with the code reviser on October 7, 1981 and November 20, 1981. Such rules shall take effect at a later date, such date being January 1, 1982.

This rule is promulgated pursuant to RCW 51.16.035 and is intended to administratively implement that statute.

WAC 296-17-350 MINIMUM PREMIUMS—ASSUMED WORKMAN HOURS. A minimum premium is the lowest amount of premium to be paid by an employer and is also the basis for determining premium computation for workmen for whom an assumed number of workmen hours must be, and hereby, is established:

(1) Minimum premium. Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, every employer shall be liable for a premium not less than ten dollars for any calendar quarter regardless of number of workman hours reported.

- (2) Minimum premium for elective adoption. Any employer having in his employ any person exempt from mandatory coverage under the provisions of RCW 51-.12.020 and whose application for coverage under the elective adoption provisions of RCW 51.12.110 is accepted by the director, shall have a minimum premium rate for such employer's applicable class based upon not less than 40 workman hours for each month, until such time as elective adoption coverage is cancelled: PRO-VIDED, That the minimum premium rate as specified above shall not apply to agricultural workers obtaining coverage under this rule and the elective adoption provisions of RCW 51.12.110.
- (3) Apartment house, apartment hotel, motor court and similar operations. Resident managers, caretakers or other similar occupations who are employed for irregular periods and whose compensation is for a stipulated sum in money or a substitute for money shall be reported for the purpose of calculation of premiums, each ((three)) four dollars of compensation in money or a substitute for money shall represent one workman hour: PROVIDED, That the employer shall not be required to report in excess of 40 hours per week for each person so employed.
- (4) Commission salesman. Commission salesmen are to be reported for premium purposes at a minimum of assumed workman hours of not less than eight workman hours a day for part-time employment, or not less than 40 workman hours per week for full-time employment: PROVIDED, That the assumed eight workman hours daily for part-time employment will apply only if the employer's books and records are maintained so as to show separately such person's actual record of employment.
- (5) Salaried personnel. Salaried personnel for the purposes of this chapter means persons whose compensation is not governed by the number of hours devoted to employment for his employer. Employers having salaried personnel in their employ shall for the purpose of premium calculation report assumed workman hours based upon 40 workman hours for each week in which any duties of salaried personnel are performed: PROVIDED, That salaried personnel, as defined by the foregoing, who are not regularly and continuously employed by the employer may for the purpose of premium calculation

compute premiums in accordance with the piece worker rule, subsection (6) of this section: PROVIDED FURTHER, The 40 hours per week may be substituted on behalf of all salaried employees by assuming 160 hours per month for each month in which employees are on salary: PROVIDED FURTHER, That the department may, at its discretion, authorize some other method in assuming workers hours for premium calculating purposes in the case of contract teachers employed by schools.

- (6) Piece workers. Employees whose compensation is based upon the accomplishment of a number of individual tasks whether computed on the number of pounds, items, pieces, or otherwise, the employer shall for the purpose of premium calculation assume each two dollars of earnings of each employee as representing one workman hour: PROVIDED, That if the average rate of compensation for the applicable classification is at least \$3.00 but less than \$3.50 per workman hour the assumed amount shall be \$3.00 of earnings as representing one workman hour, and on a progressive basis, if the average compensation is at least \$3.50 but less than \$4.00 the assumed amount shall be \$3.50 of earnings as representing one workman hour, etc. The records of the department as compiled for the preceding fiscal year ending June 30, shall be the basis for determining the average rate of compensation for each classification: PROVIDED FURTHER, That if the employer maintains books and records to show separately the hours employed for each workman in his employ engaged in piece work then such actual workman hours shall be reported for the purpose of premium calculation.
- (7) Noncontact sports teams. All employers having personnel in their employ as defined under WAC 296–17-745 shall for the purpose of premium calculations, report assumed workman hours based upon 40 workman hours for each week in which any duties are performed.
- (8) All employers having personnel in their employ as defined under WAC 296-17-739 shall, for the purpose of premium calculations, report assumed workman hours based upon ((one hour)) two hours for each mount in each horse race; professional drivers shall report workman hours based upon ((one hour)) two hours for each heat or race of any racing event; provided, that any day such personnel do not ride or drive in a race, the premium calculation shall be made by assuming ((3)) six worker hours for any day in which duties are performed.

The basis of the experience modification shall be a comparison of the actual losses charged to an employer during the experience period with the losses which would be expected for an average employer reporting the same exposures in each classification. The comparison shall contain actuarial refinements designed to mitigate the effects of losses which may be considered catastrophic or of doubtful statistical significance, due consideration being given to the volume of the employer's experience. Except for those employers who qualify for an adjusted experience modification as specified in WAC 296-17-860 or 296-17-865, the experience modification shall be calculated from the formula:

MODIFICATION =
$$\frac{Ap + WAe + (1-W) Ee + B}{E + B}$$

The components Ap, WAe, and (1-W) Ee are values which shall be charged against an employer's experience

record. The component, E, shall be the expected value of these charges for an average employer reporting the same exposures in each classification. The meaning and function of each symbol in the formula is specified below.

"Ap" signifies "primary actual losses". For each claim the primary actual loss is defined as that portion of the claim which is considered completely rateable for all employers and which is to enter the experience modification calculation at its full value. For each claim in excess of ((2,394)) 2,681, the primary actual loss shall be determined from the formula:

Primary loss =
$$\frac{((5,986)) \frac{6,702}{5}}{\text{Total loss} + ((3,592)) \frac{4,021}{5}}$$

Primary actual losses for selected claim values are shown in Table I. For each claim less than ((2,394)) 2,681 the full value of the claim shall be considered a primary loss.

"Ae" signifies "excess actual losses". For each claim the excess actual loss is defined as that portion of the claim which is not considered completely rateable for all employers. The excess actual loss for each claim shall be determined by subtracting the primary loss from the total loss.

"W" signifies "W value". For each employer, the W value determines the portion of the actual excess losses which shall be included in the calculation of his experience modification, due consideration being given to the volume of his experience. This amount is represented by the symbol "WAe" in the experience modification formula. W values are set forth in Table II.

"E" signifies "expected losses". An employer's expected losses shall be determined by multiplying his reported exposure in each classification during the experience period by the classification expected loss rate. Expected loss rates are set forth in Table III.

"Ee" signifies "expected excess losses". Expected losses in each classification shall be multiplied by the classification "D-Ratio" to obtain "expected primary losses". Expected excess losses shall then be calculated by subtracting expected primary losses from expected total losses. Each employer shall have a statistical charge included in the calculation of his experience modification, said charge to be actuarially equivalent to the amount forgiven an average employer because of the exclusion of a portion of his excess actual losses. This charge is represented by "(1-W) Ee" in the experience modification formula. D-Ratios are set forth in Table III.

"B" signifies "B value" or "ballast". In order to limit the effect of a single severe accident on the modification of a small employer, a stabilizing element (B value) shall be added to both actual and expected losses. B values are set forth in Table II.

WAC 296-17-870 EVALUATION OF ACTUAL LOSSES. Except as provided in the following subsections of this paragraph, actual losses shall include all

payments as of the "valuation date" for each claim arising from an accident occurring during the experience period. Losses for claims open as of the valuation date may also include a reserve for future payments. Actual losses on claims for accidents occurring outside of the experience period shall not be included.

(1) Valuation date. The valuation date shall be on and include December 31, one year and one day immediately preceding the effective date of premium rates as set

forth in WAC 296-17-895.

(2) Retroactive adjustments – Revision of losses between valuation dates. No claim value shall be revised between valuation dates and no retroactive adjustment of an experience modification shall be made because of disputation concerning the judgment of the claims examiner or because of subsequent developments except as specifically provided in the following cases:

(a) In cases where loss values are included or excluded through mistake other than error of judgment.

(b) In cases where a third party recovery is made.

(c) In cases where the claim qualifies as a second injury claim under the provisions of RCW 51.16.120.

(d) In cases where a claim is officially closed and is

determined to be noncompensable.

In the above specified cases retroactive adjustment of the experience modification shall be made for each rating in which the claim was included.

- (3) Average death value. Each ((fatal claim)) fatality occurring to a worker included within the mandatory or elective coverage of Title 51 RCW shall be assigned the "average death value", said value to be the average incurred cost for all ((fatal claims)) such fatalities occurring during the experience period. The average death value is set forth in Table II.
- (4) Third party recovery. In the event of a third party recovery on a claim, the employer shall be charged for a portion of the actual loss amount, gross of such recovery, established on the claim for each year in which the claim's injury date falls within the experience period (see WAC 296-17-850). This portion shall be calculated at the time the recovery is made, and shall be determined by taking the ratio of the total cost of the claim, including attorneys' fees, after recovery, to the total cost of the claim before recovery. If the claim is open at the time the recovery is made, then costs before and after recovery may include an allowance for future claim payments. Both the primary and excess components of the actual loss amount shall be reduced in the same proportion.

actual loss amount shall be reduced in the same proportion.

- (5) Second injury claims. The primary and excess values of any claim which becomes eligible for second injury relief under the provisions of RCW 51.16.120, as now or hereafter amended, shall be reduced by the percentage of relief granted.
- (6) Occupational disease claims. When a claim results from an employee's exposure to an occupational disease hazard, the "date of injury," for the purposes of experience rating, shall be the date on which the disability was diagnosed, giving rise to the filing of a claim for benefits. The cost of any occupational disease claim, paid from the accident fund and arising from exposure to the

disease hazard under two or more employers, shall be prorated to each period of employment involving exposure to the hazard. Each insured employer who had employed the claimant during the experience period, and for at least ten percent of the claimant's exposure to the hazard, shall be charged for his share of the claim based upon the prorated costs.

(7) Maximum claim value. No claim shall enter an employer's experience record at a value greater than the "maximum claim value." The maximum claim value is set forth in Table II.

No grade will be entered on the student's permanent transcript record for course(s) dropped during the first ten (10) calendar days of fall, winter or spring quarter or the first six (6) calendar days of summer quarter:

(2) After the tenth calendar day and prior to the eleventh week of fall, winter or spring quarter and after the sixth calendar day and prior to the seventh week of summer quarter, students wishing to withdraw must complete and submit a withdrawal form to the Registrar's Office. The withdrawal grade of "W" will become a part of the student's permanent transscript record regardless of his grade status at this time.

Area 8A and the Stillaguamish and Snohomish River systems are closed to protect Stillaguamish—Snohomish chum salmon. Areas 11A, 13A, Minter Creek and the Puyallup River systems are closed because the harvestable surplus of Puyallup River and Carr Inlet chum

salmon has been taken. Steelhead management needs prevail in the western portion of Area 10B.

WAC 180-33-005 AUTHORITY AND PUR-POSE. Pursuant to RCW 28A.47.060, the state board of education hereby establishes rules and regulations as set forth in chapter 180-33 WAC to govern the allocation of state funds for modernization of existing school facilities as provided by RCW 28A.47.073.

NEW SECTION

WAC 180-33-010 DEFINITIONS. As used in this chapter the term:

- (1) "Modernization" shall mean the making of major structural changes in such facilities and may include as incidental thereto the replacement of fixtures, fittings, furnishings and service systems of a building in order to bring it up to a contemporary state consistent with the needs of changing educational programs.
- (2) "School facility" shall mean the quantity and description of buildings and sites belonging to or used by a school district for instruction and services supporting instruction for specific grade levels.
- (3) "Major structural change" shall mean major components of a facility contributing to the basic structure and shall not include those components such as portable partitions, free standing panels and screens, portable equipment and furnishings that do not contribute to the basic structure.

NEW SECTION

WAC 180-33-015 ELIGIBILITY FOR STATE FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE. (1) In order to be eligible for state financial assistance, a modernization project shall have as its principal purpose one or more of the following:

- (a) Bringing a facility into compliance with current building and health codes when so required by state or local health or safety officials rather than replacing the facility;
- (b) Changing the instructional use or instructional purpose of a facility; or
- (c) The reduction of the number of operating school facilities in a district by combining the remaining school facilities through modernization and new capital construction so as to achieve more cost effective and efficient operation in the combined school facility or facilities. In order to be eligible for state financial assistance, such a project shall result in additional space for at least 100 additional pupils and the following enrollment in any combined facility:
 - (i) Elementary school facility 500 pupils;
- (ii) Middle or junior high school facility 700 pupils;
 - (iii) Senior high school facility 850 pupils:

PROVIDED, That modernization projects in school districts with a high school enrollment of less than 850 pupils need not comply with the enrollment figures set forth above.

- (2) School districts shall certify that a proposed modernization project will extend the life of the modernized school facility by at least twenty years during which time the district shall be ineligible for state matching funds for replacement of the affected facility.
- (3) School districts shall be ineligible for state financial assistance where the principal purpose of a modernization project is to:
 - (a) Solve delayed maintenance problems;
- (b) Perform piecemeal work on one section or system of a school facility:
- (c) To modernize a senior high school facility in a district with a senior high school where:
- (i) There is existing space available to serve the students involved or affected in a neighboring senior high school without, in the judgment of the state board of education, an undue increase in the cost of transporting the students to and from school, decrease in educational opportunity, or proportional increase in the cost of instruction; or
- (ii) The operating district can be united with another district or districts for the purpose of establishing a high school of more acceptable size.

NEW SECTION

WAC 180-33-020 FORMULA FOR CALCU-LATING AMOUNT OF STATE ASSISTANCE. The extent of state financial assistance in the modernization of school facilities shall be calculated on the basis of the following formula:

Square feet of space eligible for modernization assistance as per WAC 180-33-025 times the dollar per

square foot match times the percentage of state assistance to which a district is entitled under the state matching formula set forth in RCW 28A.47.803 times the state modernization matching figure as set forth in WAC 180-33-040 equals the amount of state financial assistance in modernization to which a school district shall be entitled.

NEW SECTION

WAC 180-33-025 SPACE ELIGIBLE FOR STATE FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE IN MODERN-IZATION. Space allowance and enrollment projection provision for state matching purposes.

- (1) In planning for modernization in any facility, under the provisions of (1)(a) and (1)(b) of WAC 180-33-015, a school district shall estimate capacity needs on the basis of a five-year cohort survival or adjusted cohort survival enrollment as per WAC 180-30-110(2). Any space above and beyond a school district's estimated capacity needs as calculated on the basis of a five-year cohort survival or adjusted cohort survival enrollment shall not be eligible for state financial assistance in modernization with the exception as stated in subsection (2) below.
- (2) In computing the amount of eligible space for modernization, the state will match the entire facility if 3/4 of the overall square footage of the facility is eligible for state financial assistance. If less than 3/4 of the overall square footage of the facility is eligible for state financial assistance, the district shall pay the entire cost of modernizing any additional space.
- (3) In determining the eligible space for modernizing vocational-technical institutes, enrollment data furnished by the school district will be reviewed by the Superintendent of Public Instruction or his or her designee.
- (4) In planning for modernization in any combined facility as per WAC 180-33-015(3)(c) a school district shall estimate enrollment in the district on the basis of a five-year cohort survival or adjusted cohort survival enrollment as per WAC 180-30-110(2).

NEW SECTION

WAC 180-33-030 CERTIFICATION OF CON-TINUED USE. Any facilities modernized under WAC 180-33-015 must be used for at least five years beyond the completion of modernization. Any facility modernized pursuant to this chapter shall be ineligible for additional funding pursuant to this chapter for a period of five years following completion of the modernization. School directors will pass a resolution and submit it to the state board of education that the modernized facility will be used for instructional purposes for five years after the completion of the project. If the facility is not used for instructional purposes during this five-year period, the amount of state money allocated and spent for the modernization project must be returned to the state school building construction fund. The five-year use requirement and the five year prohibition against additional modernization funding shall be waived in the event that a facility is rendered permanently unusable before the end of the five-year period by an unforseen natural event. The definition of "unforseen natural event" shall be as set forth in RCW 28A.41.170.

NEW SECTION

WAC 180-33-035 MINIMUM PROJECTS—TEN PERCENT OF REPLACEMENT COSTS. State assistance in modernization of school facilities shall be limited to projects for which the estimated cost of major structural change is not less than ten percent of the estimated cost of replacement with a comparable facility computed on the basis of the prevailing square foot cost of state support as in WAC 180-30-115 set forth. If an emergency rendering the facility unusable exists within the district, necessitating modernization under WAC 180-33-015(1)(a), the state board of education may waive the ten percent requirement.

NEW SECTION

WAC 180-33-040 MAXIMUM COSTS ELIGIBLE FOR STATE MATCHING PURPOSE—EIGHTY PERCENT OF REPLACEMENT COST. The cost of an approved modernization project in excess of eighty percent of the estimated cost per square foot of replacement with a comparable facility computed on the basis of the prevailing square foot cost level of state support as in WAC 180-30-115 set forth shall be paid from school district local funds applied toward the modernization cost in accordance with the statutory formula governing basic support level as in WAC 180-30-100 through 180-30-117 and 180-30-125 through 180-30-135 set forth.

NEW SECTION

WAC 180-33-045 ARCHITECTURAL AND ENGINEERING SERVICES. In the allocation of state funds for an approved modernization project, architectural and engineering services eligible for state matching purposes shall not exceed one and one-half times the architectural and engineering services as in WAC 180-30-120 set forth.

NEW SECTION

WAC 180-33-050 SURVEY OF EXISTING FA-CILITIES AS PREREQUISITE. (1) A survey of facilities proposed for modernization conducted under the direction of the Superintendent of Public Instruction shall be a prerequisite for consideration of an application for state participation in financing of a modernization project.

(2) Upon determination by the superintendent of public instruction that the survey indicates the proposed modernization project is consistent with the project eligibility requirements hereinbefore in chapter 180-33 WAC set forth, the school district shall provide such information and data on forms prescribed for that purpose as may be necessary to determine the eligibility of the school district for state assistance and the amount of such assistance allocable under state board of education regulations.

NEW SECTION

WAC 180-33-055 REGULATIONS GOVERN-ING. In addition to the regulations hereinbefore in chapter 180-33 WAC prescribed; all regulations governing the basic assistance program prescribed in chapter 180-30 WAC shall govern administration of state participation in financing modernization of school facilities: PROVIDED, That compliance with those regulations not pertinent to modernization projects as determined by the superintendent of public instruction shall not be required.

NEW SECTION

WAC 180-33-060 PROCEDURAL REQUIRE-MENTS. The superintendent of public instruction shall determine procedures and forms for the administration of state participation in financing modernization of school facilities, such procedures and forms to be in addition to or in lieu of procedural requirements prescribed in chapter 180-30 WAC.

WAC 180-90-130 APPROVAL—ANNUAL CERTIFICA-TION REQUIRED—PROVISIONAL APPROVAL. (1) At least ninety days prior to the commencement of the annual school term or period, the chief administrator of each private school shall file with the office of the superintendent of public instruction, in accordance with procedures established by the superintendent of public instruction, a ((notarized)) certificate of compliance in the form and substance set forth in WAC 180-90-160.

- (2) The office of the superintendent of public instruction shall review each certificate. The review may include staff reports of school visits and examinations. The purpose of the review is to determine whether the private school meets statutory and regulatory requirements for approval. The review shall be completed within thirty days after receipt of a completed application.
- (3) Upon completion of the review the office of the superintendent of public instruction shall:
- (a) Notify the private school of those minor deviations which must be corrected:
- (b) notify the private school of the existence of any unacceptable and/or major deviations;
- (c) submit findings and recommendations to the state board of education at the next regularly scheduled meeting of the state board of education: PROVIDED, That if the next regularly scheduled meeting is scheduled to commence within fifteen days, and the private school is found to have a major deviation, the findings and recommendations shall be submitted at the second regularly scheduled meeting following completion of the review.
- (4) In the case of major deviations, the private school may request that the state board of education grant provisional status for one year in order that the private school may take action to meet the requirements for approval contained in statute and regulation. The request shall be made at least fifteen days prior to the meeting of the state board of education contemplated in section (3)(c) of this rule.
- (5) The state board of education shall have the final decision as to whether a private school will be granted approval, provisional approval, or will not be approved((;)): PROVIDED, That if the state board of education determines that an unacceptable deviation exists, the board will not approve that private school.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 2-77, filed 3/24/77)

- (3) All classroom teachers hold appropriate Washington State certification except for:
- (a) Teachers for religious courses or courses for which no counterpart exists in the public schools; and/or
- (b) people of recognized professional competence who are not certificated, but who teach students under the supervision of a certificated person in exceptional cases;
- (c) those people of recognized professional competence who do, and to the best of my knowledge will, teach without a certificate and the circumstances necessitating their employment without a certificate are as follows:
- (4) Measures have been taken to safeguard all permanent records against loss or damage through either the storage of such records in fire-resistant containers or facilities, or the retention of duplicates in a separate and distinct area;

- (5) The physical facilities of the school are adequate to meet the program offered, and all school facilities and practices are in substantial compliance with reasonable health and fire safety standards, as substantiated by current inspection reports of appropriate health and fire safety officials which are on file in the chief administrator's office;

The fee for a lifetime certificate shall be seven dollars and fifty cents for any horse bearing a brand readily visible and currently registered with the director under the provisions of chapter 16.57 RCW or twelve dollars and fifty cents for any other horse. ((In lieu of issuing an identification certificate, a copy of the registration papers of any horse registered with a nationally recognized breed association may be validated by the inspector upon payment of a five dollar annual fee. A copy of such registration papers to

be validated shall also be furnished by the owner for filing with the director of agriculture in Olympia, Washington. Each identification certificate or validation of registration papers shall be valid only for one year from the date of issuance or validation. In addition to the fees enumerated in the regulation, an additional fee for the issuance of identification certificates or validation of registration papers at other than regularly established inspection points shall be actual costs.)) In the event the fees collected do not cover the cost of the inspector in performing any such inspection, an additional charge may be added at actual costs.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

Title: Economic Need, new section WAC 67-30-040. Purpose: To establish rules governing the application of an economic need standard to clients being served under the state-federal vocational rehabilitation program of the commission.

Statutory Authority: Chapter 74.16 RCW.

Summary of Rule: The rule requires that a test of economic ability be applied to applicants for vocational rehabilitation services. Most of the vocational rehabilitation services provided by the commission are included under the rule. Some of the services are excluded. Certain categories of clients are also excluded. The purpose of the rule is to effect a fiscal saving to the agency in order to meet budget commitments and to maintain a satisfactory level of services to as many clients as possible.

Reason Supporting Proposed Action: The commission has never had an economic need policy. It is not mandated under either state or federal statutes. However, given the present severe funding cutbacks at both the state and federal levels and those that may occur in the future, the commission is establishing the rule.

WAC 67-30-040 ECONOMIC NEED. (1) Provision of vocational rehabilitation services by the commission shall be conditioned upon a client's financial inability to purchase these services for himself/herself. The determination of economic need will be made at the time of application.

- (2) Provision of the following services are based on economic need:
- (a) Vocational training;
- (b) Physical and mental restoration services;
- (c) Books and training materials, including tools;
- (d) Maintenance except when necessary to receive diagnostic services:
 - (e) Tools, equipment, initial stocks and supplies;
- (f) Transportation except where necessary to receive diagnostic services;
 - (g) Occupational licenses;
- (h) Services to the members of the client's family when such service contributes to the client's rehabilitation;
 - (i) Post-employment services;
- (j) Other goods and services necessary to the client's rehabilitation.
- (3) Provision of the following services are not based on economic need:
 - (a) Diagnostic services to determine eligibility;
- (b) Transportation and living expenses necessary to receive diagnostic services:
 - (c) Counseling;
 - (d) Adjustment training;
 - (e) Placement services;
- (f) Reader services for the blind including interpreter services for the deaf-blind.
- (4) All vocational rehabilitation services will be provided to the following persons without further consideration of their economic need:
- (a) Persons who have met all of the eligibility requirements for the Social Security Disability Beneficiary Rehabilitation Program;
- (b) Persons whose receipt of Supplemental Security Income has been verified;
- (c) Persons whose receipt of assistance grants from the Department of Social and Health Services has been verified.
- (5) The commission will encourage financial participation by all clients in their own rehabilitation.
- (6) Economic need shall be determined by the director through procedures established by the director. The commission's procedures shall be based on and consistent with economic need standards used by other state and federal agencies in establishing economic need.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

Title: Public Access to Information and Records.

New chapter and section: Chapter 67-14 WAC and WAC 67-14-060.

Purpose: To establish rules under which the public may gain access to information and records of the commission. To comply with appropriate section of chapter 42.17 RCW.

Statutory Authority: RCW 74.16.450.

Summary of Rule: The rule establishes procedures under which the public may request information and records of the commission, defines those records that are exempt from public inspection and guarantees the right of privacy in all instances.

Reason Supporting Proposed Action: The commission currently allows reasonable public access to records where confidentiality and similar consideration are not factors. The Region X office of the Federal Rehabilitation Services Administration has recommended that the commission develop a written public statement, delineating the rules under which the public may have access to commission information and records. Further, this rule meets the mandate of the applicable sections of chapter 42.17 RCW.

NEW SECTION

WAC 67-14-060 PUBLIC ACCESS TO INFORMATION AND RECORDS. (1) The purpose of this rule is to implement RCW 42.17.250 and RCW 42.17.320.

- (2) The definitions set forth in RCW 42.17.020 shall apply to this section.
- (3) "Office" is the office of the state commission for the blind of the state of Washington.
- (4) Public records will be available for public inspection and copying pursuant to this section except as otherwise provided by RCW 42.17-.310 and this section.
- (5) Public records will be available for inspection and copying during the customary office hours of the commission. For the purposes of this section, the customary office hours will be from 9:00 AM to noon and from 1:00 PM to 4:00 PM, Monday through Friday excluding legal holidays.
- (6) In accordance with the requirements of RCW 42.17.250 and RCW 42.17.320, the commission for the blind will prevent unreasonable invasion of privacy, protect public records from damage or disorganization, and will prevent excessive interference with essential functions of the agency.
- (7) Public records may be inspected or copied, or copies of such records may be obtained by members of the public upon compliance with the following procedures:
- (a) A request will be made in writing upon a form prescribed by the office which will be made available to the public.
 - (b) The request will include the following information:
 - (i) the name of the person requesting the record;
- (ii) the time of day and calendar date on which the request was made;
 - (iii) the nature of the request;
 - (iv) an appropriate description of the record requested.
- (8) In all cases in which a member of the public is making a request, it will be the obligation of the staff member to whom the request is made, or his/her superior, to assist the member of the public in appropriately identifying the public record requested.
- (9) The commission finds that it would be unduly burdensome and would interfere with agency operations to maintain an index of records as specified in Section 26(2) of chapter 1 Laws of 1973 because of the

complexity and diversity of its operations and the resulting volume of reports, correspondence, surveys, staff studies, and other materials. The commission will make available for public inspection and copying all indexes which may at a future time be developed for commission use.

(10) No fee will be charged for the inspection of public records. The commission will charge a fee per page of copy for providing copies of public records and for use of the commission's copying equipment. The fee will be the amount necessary to reimburse the commission for its last established actual costs incidental to such copying.

(11) The commission reserves the right to determine that a public record requested in accordance with the procedures outlined in this section is exempt under the provisions of RCW 42.17.260 and/or other such laws as may be deemed applicable.

(12) Pursuant to RCW 42.17.260 the commission reserves the right to delete identifying details when it makes available or publishes any public record in cases where there is reason to believe that disclosure of such details would be an invasion of personal privacy or as otherwise provided in this section.

(13) All denials of requests must be accompanied by a written statement specifying the reason for denial.

(14) Certain personal and other records are exempt from public inspection and copying and will include but not be limited to the following examples:

(a) Personal information in personnel files maintained for employees and/or appointees of the commission to the extent that disclosure would violate their right to privacy.

(b) Information revealing the identity of persons who file complaints with investigative, law enforcement or penology agencies if such disclosure would violate their right to privacy.

(c) Preliminary drafts, notes, recommendations and intra-agency memorandums in which opinions are expressed or policies formulated or recommended except that a specific record will not be exempt when publically cited by the commission in connection with any agency action.

(15) It is the policy of the commission to carry out the spirit as well as the letter of appropriate sections of RCW 42.17., and thus to afford the public maximum access to its records, subject to necessary respect for the right of individuals to privacy and the need for efficient administration of government.

(3) Energy payment assistance units ((who)):

- (a) ((Were)) On the December 1, ((1980)) 1981 warrant roll, and
- (b) ((Have)) Having correctly completed and returned an energy assistance application, and
- (c) ((Have)) Having incomes at or below one hundred twenty-five percent of ((Community Services Administration (CSA))) the federally established poverty level, and
- (d) ((Are vulnerable to rising energy costs as defined by 45 CFR Part 260)) Residing in shelters which meet the eligibility criteria in the low-income home energy assistance act of 1981, and
- (e) Not residing at the same address as another applicant according to DSHS automated client files as of December 1, 1981, and not living in a subsidized rental unit, and

(((c))) (f) ((Whose)) Energy application ((substantiates they are vulnerable,)) certifying the household will be eligible for energy assistance allowances.

- (4) A recipient residing in foster care, a <u>subsidized</u> rental housing unit, a group home for developmentally disabled, nursing home, <u>supplied shelter</u>, congregate care facility or an institution for the mentally retarded will not be eligible for an energy assistance allowance.
- (5) The energy assistance allowance standards shall be the rates established by the Washington state planning and community affairs agency.
- (6) A recipient may request an administrative review by the Washington state planning and community affairs agency regarding denial or underpayment of an energy assistance allowance no later than ((May 31, 1981)) sixty days after the receipt of notice of denial or payment of benefit.
- (7) No energy assistance allowance payments will be made after June 30, ((1981)) 1982.
- (8) Affidavits and requests to replace lost or stolen checks will not be accepted after April 30, 1982.
- (9) Upon cancellation of outstanding warrants or upon verification of forgery as required, DSHS shall immediately initiate replacement of checks reported as lost or stolen.
- (((8))) (10) Energy payments made under Title ((HH Public Law 96-223)) XXVI of the omnibus budget reconciliation act of 1981 shall be exempt as income and resources for all public assistance programs and food stamps.

Chapter 248-75 WAC RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE STATE BOARD OF HEALTH GOVERNING MOBILE HOME PARKS

NEW SECTION

WAC 248-75-010 DEFINITION. The following definitions shall apply in the interpretation and enforcement of this chapter.

- (1) Health officer shall mean the city, county, city-county or district health officer as defined in RCW 70.05.010(2) or his/her authorized representative.
- (2) Mobile home park shall mean any real property which is rented or held out for rent to others for the placement of two or more mobile homes for the primary purpose of production of income, except where such real property is rented or held out for rent for seasonal recreational purpose only and is not intended for year-round occupancy.

NEW SECTION

WAC 248-75-020 SEWAGE DISPOSAL. All sewage and waste water from a mobile home park shall be drained to a sewerage disposal system which is approved by the health officer. Sewage disposal systems shall be designed, constructed and maintained in accordance with chapters 248-96 and 173-240 WAC and local regulations.

NEW SECTION

WAC 248-75-030 WATER SUPPLY. Any public water supply system, as defined in WAC 248-54-560(20), which provides water for a mobile home park shall be designed, constructed, maintained and operated in accordance with chapter 248-54 WAC.

NEW SECTION

WAC 248-75-040 REFUSE DISPOSAL. All garbage, refuse and/or trash in a mobile home park shall be collected, stored and disposed of in accordance with chapter 70.95 RCW and chapter 173-301 WAC and local regulations.

NEW SECTION

WAC 248-75-050 GENERAL SANITATION. The premises of a mobile home park shall be maintained and operated in accordance with chapter 248-50 WAC.

Steelhead management needs prevail in the western portion of Area 10B. Length restriction changed in Area 4B to allow greater harvest of chinook salmon.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

Title: Amending WAC 230-04-050, Qualified Bona Fide Charitable and Nonprofit Organization Qualifications.

Description of Purpose: Amendment to WAC 230–04–050. The purpose of this rule is to set forth the standards by which a qualified bona fide charitable or nonprofit organization is determined. The amendment

has as its purpose simply a clarification of language to eliminate some confusion as to what types of groups qualify.

Statutory Authority: The statutory authority for the amendment to WAC 230-04-050 is RCW 9.46.070(1).

Summary of Proposed Rule and Reasons Supporting Action: In its original form, when WAC 230-04-050(7) was adopted, the words "branch," "chapter," and "subgroup" were meant to be synonyms. The use of the term "subgroup" has caused a great deal of confusion. In order to ensure that the regulation meets its original intent, this proposed amendment deletes the term "subgroup" from the rule.

Proponents and Opponents: These proposed amendments to this rule are proposed by the staff of the Washington State Gambling Commission.

Agency Comments: The agency believes the proposed rule is self-explanatory and needs no further comment.

This rule was not made necessary as a result of a federal law or state court action.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 42, filed 9/18/75)

WAC 230-04-050 QUALIFIED BONA FIDE CHARITABLE AND NONPROFIT ORGANIZATION QUALIFICATIONS. Qualified bona fide charitable or nonprofit organizations, including qualified agricultural fairs, to which licenses may be issued by the commission shall be limited to the following organizations only as provided by RCW 9.46.020(3):

(1) Any organization duly existing under the provisions of chapter 24.12 RCW. That chapter deals only with certain leaders of a church or religious organization who, pursuant to the provisions of that chapter, have become a corporation sole.

(2) Any organization duly existing under the provisions of chapter 24.20 RCW. That chapter deals with certain fraternal societies.

(3) Any organization duly existing under the provisions of chapter 24.28 RCW. That chapter deals with granges.

- (4) Only those charitable or nonprofit organizations, whether incorporated or not, which are organized and operating for one or more of the following purposes only:
 - (a) Charitable
 - (b) Benevolent
 - (c) Eleemosynary
 - (d) Educational
 - (e) Civic
 - (f) Patriotic
 - (g) Political
- (h) Social (i) Fraternal
- (j) Athletic
- (k) Agricultural.
- (5) Any agricultural fair authorized under the provisions of chapter 15.76 or 36.37 RCW.
- (6) Any corporation which has been incorporated under title 36 U.S.C. and whose principal purposes are to furnish volunteer aid to members of the armed forces of the United States and also to carry on a system of national and international relief and to apply the same in mitigating the suffering caused by pestilence, famine, fire, floods, and other national calamities and to devise and carry on measures for preventing the same.
- (7) A branch or chapter ((or subgroup)) of a parent organization, which parent organization is itself eligible for licensure, must demonstrate to the satisfaction of the commission that the branch or chapter ((or subgroup)) was not established and is not and will not be organized and operated with the evasion of the limitations of state law or commission rule on the operation of gambling activities as one of its purposes. The branch or chapter ((or subgroup)) must be organized

and operating for one of the purposes set out above and be otherwise qualified to obtain the license sought. The director may require an affidavit signed by the chief executive officers of the parent organization certifying that the branch or chapter ((or subgroup)) is a bona fide subdivision of the parent organization.

(8) An incorporated city or town in the state of Washington or subdivision thereof.

(9) Each applicant must be organized and operated primarily for purposes other than the operation of gambling activities, in the opinion of the commission, to be eligible for a license to conduct any authorized gambling activity.

WAC 388-100-035 SCOPE OF CARE FOR MEDICALLY INDIGENT. (1) The medical coverage under the limited casualty program-medically indigent shall be available to an eligible individual for treatment of acute and emergent conditions only. This may include: Inpatient hospital services; outpatient hospital and rural health clinic services; physician and clinic services, prescribed drugs, dentures, prosthetic devices, eyeglasses,

SNF, ICF, ICF/MR; home health services; laboratory and x-ray services; and medically necessary transportation.

- (2) Payment by the department will not be made until expenses are incurred by the recipient equal to the deductible amount.
- (3) All services require the approval of the medical consultant.
- (4) When any other medical need is identified for recipients undergoing treatment under the Involuntary Treatment Act (ITA) or detoxification for an acute alcohol condition as defined in chapter 388-40 WAC, the requirements for acute and emergent need and the fifteen hundred dollar deductible shall apply.
- (5) When an applicant indicates that an urgent undefined medical illness exists, the condition will be regarded as acute and emergent and one office visit for diagnosis may be allowed, provided all financial eligibility criteria have been met. Treatment will be contingent upon the criteria for acute and emergent having also been met.
- (6) For other conditions and limitations under which these services may be provided refer to appropriate service in chapter 388-86 WAC.
- (7) No out-of-state care is provided except in the designated bordering cities.
- (8) A request for an exception to policy shall not be approved without review by the division of medical assistance.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

This statement is filed pursuant to RCW 34.04.045. Amending chapter 275-55 WAC.

Purpose of the rule or rule change is to revise, reorganize and clarify rules on admission to mental health treatment facilities.

Statutory Authority: RCW 71.05.560.

Summary of the Rule Change: WAC 275-55-020 Definitions. This section has been expanded to include additional categories as well as to incorporate definitions originally found elsewhere in the chapter; 275-55-021 Application of Rules to Minors. This permits chapter 275-55 WAC to more clearly and more consistently apply to minors; 275-55-030 Private Agencies Which may Admit Voluntary Patients. Deletes language already defined and modifies the title to be consistent with changes under definitions; 275-55-040 Voluntary Admission to Public or Private Agency-Voluntary Adult. Revises language to coordinate with changes in the definition section: 275-55-050 Application for Admission-Voluntary Minor. Changes clarify age groups and addresses the use of inpatient care and/or psychotropic medications for self-admitted minors; 275-55-060 Admission to Public Agency-Voluntary Minor. This change specifies to whom the county designated mental health professional will submit a written evaluation; 275-55-071 Discharge—Voluntary Minor. This was formerly 275-55-130 and that section was moved to this location to become part of a logical grouping of sections related to voluntary patients; 275-55-081 Periodic Review-Voluntary Inpatient. This was formerly 275-55-150. That section is moved to this location to become part of a logical grouping of sections related to voluntary patients; 275-55-090 Limitation on Length of Stay-Readmission Voluntary Patients. This section now references appropriate RCW; 275-55-110 Discharge of Voluntary Patient—Release of Clinical Summary. These changes coordinate language and intent with changes in definitions section. They specify grounds and procedures for discharge of patient by type of admission to better assure patient's right to confidentiality of clinical records; 275-55-121 Involuntary Detention and Commitment-Minor. This was formerly 275-55-140. That section is moved to this location to become part of a logical grouping of sections related to involuntary patients. Language that already appears in chapter 72.23 RCW has been deleted; 275-55-131 Non-admission of Involuntarily Detained Persons-Transportation. This new section is to give prominence to the issue of responsibility for transportation of non-admitted, involuntarily detained persons; 275-55-141 Protection of Patients' Property-Involuntary Patient. This was formerly 275-55-200. That section is moved to this location to become part of a logical grouping of sections relating to involuntary patients. Additional reference is made to the applicable RCW; 275-55-151 Evaluation and Examination-Involuntary Patient. This was formerly 275-55-180. That section is moved to this location to become a part of a logical grouping of sections relating to involuntary patients; 275-55-161 Treatment Prior to Hearings-Involuntary Patient. This was formerly 275-55-190. That section is moved to this location to become part of a logical grouping of sections related to the involuntary patients; 275-55-171 Early Release or Discharge of Involuntary Patient-Release of Clinical Summary-Notification of Court. This was originally part of 275-55-110. This section now more clearly specifies grounds and procedures for discharge of patient by type of admission; 275-55-181 Conditional Release—Involuntary Patient. This was formerly 275-55-120. That section is moved to this location to become part of a logical grouping of sections relating to involuntary patients. Section sets up conditions for continuation of conditional release; 275-55-191 Revocation of Conditional Release-Secretary's Designee—Involuntary Patient. This was formerly 275-55-230. That section is moved to this location to become part of a logical grouping of sections related to involuntary patients; 275-55-201 Discharge of Indigent Patient-Involuntary Patient. This was formerly 275-55-240. That section is moved to this location to become part of a logical grouping of sections relating to involuntary patients. It reemphasizes the procedures necessary to reduce hardship for indigents under initial detention; 275-55-211 Advising Patient of Rights. This was formerly 275-55-170. That section is moved to this location to become part of a logical grouping of sections related to patient rights. It specifies the procedure for advising patients of rights upon admission and further specifies that an involuntary patient shall be informed of who has been notified concerning his admission. It also references advising patients of rights when an initial detention is for an outpatient component; 275-55-231 Conversion to Voluntary Status by Involuntary Patient-Rights. This was formerly 275-55-210. That section is moved to this location to become part of a logical grouping of sections relating to patient rights; 275-55-241 Rights of Patient. This was formerly 275-55-270. That section is moved to this location to become part of a logical grouping of sections related to patient rights. Wording now coincides with the definitions section. Additionally, rule change was necessary to further assure confidentiality of records and to define 72-hour period; 275-55-261 Requirements for Certifying Evaluation and Treatment Components. This was originally included in 275-55-280. It sets out the requirements of an evaluation and treatment program and its components, and clarifies the county's ability to provide these components itself or arrange to have

them provided by other agencies. Section sets out the responsibilities of the individual designated by the county as administrator of the evaluation and treatment pro-275-55-263 Certification Standards for Evaluation and Treatment Components. This includes information originally in 275-55-280. It defines the components of an evaluation and treatment program, and sets out the various requirements necessary for certification to provide these components; 275-55-271 Outpatient Component. This was originally 275-55-282. New section addresses requirements for outpatient services, and subsections (2)(d) and (2)(f) permit the mental health professional to modify review or consultation periods: 275-55-281 Emergency Component. This was formerly 275-55-284; 275-55-291 Short-term Inpatient Component. This was formerly 275-55-286. Subdivision (3)(a) indicates structural standards required for inpatient component and includes skilled nursing home, intermediate care facility and congregate care facility. Subsection (4) also gives the division director authority to exempt these requirements for components providing specially funded residential treatment beds in response to Senate Bill 3636; 275-55-293 Certification Procedure—Waivers—Provisional Certification. The purpose of this new rule is to remove ambiguities and inconsistent practices from the certification procedure; 275-55-295 Decertification. This section is to comply with appropriate RCW covering decertification; 275-55-301 Alternatives to Inpatient Treatment. This was formerly 275-55-080. That section has been moved to this location to give greater visibility to the issue of exploring less restrictive alternatives to inpatient treatment; 275-55-331 Requirements for Evaluation and Treatment Facilities Serving Minors. This was formerly 275-55-288. That section was moved to this location to become part of a logical grouping of sections related to certification standards. It adds a new subsection (3) prohibiting placement of a minor on an adult inpatient unit except where no other alternative exists or in case of an emergency; 275-55-341 Use of Restraints and Seclusions by Agency Not Certified as an Evaluation and Treatment Facility. This is a new rule intended to establish procedures for facilities not covered by this or other appropriate statutes or regulations; 275-55-351 Research. This section now updates the appropriate WAC to be used in the protection of human subject research. It also includes procedures where the disclosure of patients' personal records are involved; 275-55-361 Involuntary Evaluation and Treatment Costs-Responsibility of Involuntary Patient. This was originally included in 275-55-290. Section sets out the responsibility of the patient or his estate for evaluation and treatment costs; 275-55-363 Involuntary Evaluation and Treatment Costs-Collection by Agency. This section sets out the procedure for collecting costs for evaluation and treatment from the involuntary patient. It also indicates the procedure that the provider agency must follow in contacting the local Community Service Office to determine if patient is eligible for any medical assistance programs. Section also sets up the procedure for billing the department for the balance of costs. Subsection (6) indicates that the amount the CSO sets up as that which the patient should be liable to pay shall not be billed to the department but shall be collected from the patient by the provider agency; 275-55-365 Involuntary Evaluation and Treatment Costs—Responsibility of County. This procedure originally appeared in 275-55-290. This section directs that all requests for reimbursement shall be made through the county, which shall review and approve them prior to submittal to the department; 275-55-367 Involuntary Evaluation and Treatment Costs—Responsibility of Department. This section indicates the department's responsibility for payment of uncollected evaluation and treatment costs except those costs for which the CSO has determined the patient should continue to be liable. Section also addresses the definition of increased involuntary commitment administrative costs: and 275-55-371 Exceptions to Rules-Waivers. These rules are necessary to permit reasonable flexibility in responding to unpredictable situations, unusual conditions and marked differences in utilization of available resources. The rules basically state that any person or agency subject to the provisions of this chapter may seek a waiver of any requirement therein.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

Title: Amendments to chapter 131-16 WAC.

Purpose: The principal amendments will correct an inconsistency in the rules regarding calculation of supplemental pension benefits for community college personnel who participate in the TIAA/CREF retirement annuity program. In addition, some minor technical amendments are proposed.

Authority: RCW 28B.10.400(3).

Summary: The existing rules utilize the "Academic Year" (i.e., September through August) as the base period for computing the average salary for determining supplemental benefits eligibility. The "Fiscal Year" (i.e., July through June) is used for determining years of service for this computation. This approach is inconsistent and precludes using total earnings of the last fiscal year worked in these calculations. That is typically the period of highest earnings. The proposed amendment would cause the fiscal year to be used for both purposes. Not only would this be more fair with regard to the employee, it also would be consistent with the methods used by the Teachers Retirement System, Public Employees

Retirement System, and TIAA/CREF retirement plans of Washington's four-year colleges and universities. In addition, a technical amendment would clarify the use of the term "surviving spouse" with respect to designating a beneficiary under the retirement plan. The second such amendment clarifies the conditions under which a retired participant may be reemployed by specifying that such reemployment may occur for periods not to exceed five months in any fiscal year without loss of pension benefits. Currently the rule is not specific with respect to period (fiscal year) during which such employment may

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 80, Resolution 79-44, filed 11/30/79)

WAC 131-16-011 DEFINITIONS. For the purpose of WAC 131-16-005 through WAC 131-16-069, the following definitions shall apply:

(1) "Participant" shall be defined as any individual who is eligible to purchase retirement annuities through the TIAA/CREF Plan and whose basic contribution to such plan is matched by the employing college district or the State Board for Community College Education pursuant to the provisions of WAC 131-16-050.

(2) "Supplemental retirement benefit" shall be defined as payments, as calculated in accordance with WAC 131-16-061, made by the community college district or the state board to an eligible retired participant or ((surviving spouse)) designated beneficiary whose retirement benefits provided by the TIAA/CREF Plan do not attain the level of the retirement benefit goal established by WAC 131-16-015.

(3) "Year of full-time service" shall be defined as employment in an eligible position for a period of not less than five months in any fiscal year during which TIAA/CREF contributions were made by both the participant and a Washington public higher education institution; provided that not more than one year of full-time service will be credited for service in any one fiscal year.

(4) "Fiscal year" shall be defined as the period beginning on July 1 of any calendar year and ending on June 30 of the succeeding calendar

(5) "Average annual salary" shall be defined as the amount derived when the salary received during any two consecutive ((academic)) fiscal years of full-time service for which TIAA/CREF contributions were made by both the participant and a Washington public higher education institution is divided by two.

(6) (("Academic year" shall be defined as the period beginning on September 1 of any calendar year and ending on August 31 of the next

calendar year.
(7))) "TIAA/CREF retirement benefit" shall be defined as the amount of annual retirement income derived from a participant's accumulated annuities including dividends at the time of retirement; provided that, solely for the purpose of calculating a potential Supplemental Retirement Benefit, such amount shall be adjusted to meet the assumptions set forth in WAC 131-16-061, subsection (2).

(((8))) (7) "Salary" shall be defined as all remuneration received by the participant from the employing community college district or the state board including summer quarter compensation, extra duty pay, leave stipends, and grants made by or through the college district or

state board.

(((9))) (8) "Designated beneficiary" shall be defined as the surviving spouse of the retiree or, with the consent of such spouse, if any, such other person or persons as shall have an insurable interest in the retiree's life and shall have been nominated by written designation duly executed and filed with the retiree's institution of higher education.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 28, filed 7/1/74)

WAC 131-16-015 RETIREMENT BENEFIT GOAL ESTAB-LISHED. Subject to the provisions of WAC 131-16-061, the retirement benefit goal for participants in the TIAA/CREF Plan is to provide participants at age sixty-five having twenty-five years of service a minimum annual retirement income, exclusive of Federal Old Age Survivors Insurance benefits, equivalent to fifty percent of the average salary for the two consecutive highest salaried fiscal years.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 80, Resolution 79-44, filed 11/30/79)

WAC 131-16-061 SUPPLEMENTAL RETIREMENT BENE-FITS. (1) A participant is eligible to receive supplemental retirement benefit payments if at the time of retirement the participant is age sixty-two or over and has participated in the TIAA/CREF plan at a Washington public institution of higher education for at least ten years; provided that the amount of the supplemental retirement benefit, as calculated in accordance with the provisions of this section, is a positive amount.

(2) Subject to the provisions of subdivisions (c), (d), and (e) of this subsection, the annual amount of supplemental retirement benefit payable to a participant upon retirement is the excess, if any, when the value determined in subdivision (b) is subtracted from the value deter-

mined in subdivision (a), as follows:

(a) The lesser of fifty percent of the participant's average annual salary or two percent of the average annual salary multiplied by the number of years of full-time service; provided that if the participant did not elect to contribute ten percent of salary beginning July 1, 1974, or if later, after the first day of the calendar year following attainment of age fifty, service for such periods shall be calculated at the rate of one and one-half percent instead of two percent.

(b) The TIAA/CREF retirement benefit the participant would receive in the first month of retirement multiplied by twelve; provided that such benefit shall be calculated on the following assumptions:

(i) After July 1, 1974, fifty percent of the combined contributions were made to TIAA and fifty percent to CREF during each year of full-time service; provided that benefit calculations related to contributions made prior to July 1, 1974, shall be computed on the basis of actual allocations between TIAA and CREF; and

(ii) The full TIAA/CREF annuity accumulations, including all dividends payable by TIAA and further including the amounts, if any, paid in a single sum under the retirement transition benefit option, were fully settled on a joint and two-thirds survivorship option with a ten-year guarantee, using actual ages of retiree and spouse, but not exceeding a five-year difference; except that for unmarried participants the TIAA accumulations, including dividends, were settled on an installment refund option and the CREF accumulations were settled on a life annuity with ten-year guarantee option, all to be based on TIAA/CREF estimates at the time of retirement; and

(iii) Annuity benefits purchased by premiums paid other than as a participant in a Washington public institution of higher education

TIAA/CREF retirement plan shall be excluded.

(c) The amount of supplemental retirement benefit for a participant who has not attained age sixty-five at retirement is the amount calculated in subsection (2) of this section reduced by one-half of one percent for each calendar month remaining until age sixty-five; provided that the supplemental retirement benefit for a participant retired for reason of health or permanent disability shall not be so reduced.

(d) Any portion of participant's TIAA and/or CREF annuity accumulation paid to a participant's spouse upon dissolution of a marriage shall be included in any subsequent calculation of supplemental retirement benefits just as if these funds had remained in the participant's

TIAA and/or CREF annuity.

- (e) The selection of a TIAA/CREF retirement option other than the joint and two-thirds survivorship with ten-year guarantee shall not alter the method of calculating the supplemental retirement benefit; however, if the participant's combined TIAA/CREF retirement benefit and calculated supplemental retirement benefit exceeds fifty percent of the participant's average annual salary, the supplemental retirement benefit shall be reduced so that the total combined benefits do not exceed fifty percent of average annual salary.
- (3) The payment of supplemental retirement benefits shall be consistent with the following provisions:
- (a) Supplemental retirement benefits shall be paid in equal monthly installments, except that if such monthly installments should be less

than ten dollars, such benefit payments may be paid at longer intervals

as determined by the employer.

(b) Supplemental retirement benefit payments will continue for the lifetime of the retired participant; however, prior to retirement, a participant may choose to provide for the continuation of supplemental retirement benefit payments, on an actuarially equivalent reduced basis, to his or her spouse or designated beneficiary after the retiree's death. Notification of such choice shall be filed in writing with the appropriate college district or state board officer and shall be irrevocable after retirement. ((If such option is chosen, the supplemental retirement benefit payments shall be in the same proportion as the THAA/CREF survivor annuity option elected by the participant.))

(c) Prior to making any supplemental benefit payments, the employing college district or state board shall obtain a document signed by the participant and spouse, if any, or designated beneficiary acknowledging the supplemental retirement benefit option chosen by the

participant.

(4) A retired participant who is reemployed shall continue to be eligible to receive retirement income benefits, except that the supplemental retirement benefit shall not continue during periods of employment for more than forty percent of full-time or seventy hours per month or five months duration in any fiscal year. Retirement contributions shall not be made from the salary for such employment, unless the individual once again becomes eligible to participate under the provisions of WAC 131-16-020.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

Chapter 196, Laws of 1981 limits the liability of marine pilots and provides that pilots will provide marine insurance on a "trip" basis upon reasonable notice from the vessel, its master, owners, agents, or operator. The purpose of the proposed rule is to designate the appropriate insurance form and to provide regulations for the keeping of records regarding insurance and limited liability agreements.

NEW SECTION

WAC 296-116-310 MARINE PILOT—TRIP INSURANCE.

(1) Upon boarding a vessel in the Puget Sound or Grays Harbor pilotage district, the pilot shall present to the master a special contract or tariff containing the following terms and provisions:

(a) The rates and charges named in this tariff do not include marine insurance insuring the vessel, its owners, agents, or operators from the consequences of negligence or errors in the judgment of the particular pilots supplying the services. Upon reasonable notice from the vessel, its master, owners, agents, or operator, the pilots, parties hereto, will provide such insurance on a "trip" basis to the value of the vessel and its cargo, the premium of which will be assessed in addition to the rates and charges specified herein.

The election of the vessel, its master, owners, agents, or operators not to request pilots, parties hereto, to procure such insurance and to elect to have the pilots, parties hereto, perform services on the rates and charges specified herein shall constitute a binding and irrevocable agreement on the part of the vessel, its master, owners, agents, or operators to the terms and conditions of the following:

It is understood and agreed, and is the essence of the contract under which the services of the pilot are tendered to the vessel, its master, and owners, that:

(i) The services rendered hereunder are rendered by a pilot duly and regularly licensed by the state of Washington pursuant to chapter 88-.16 RCW, or with respect to domestic vessels, a state pilot who holds a valid license issued by the federal government;

(ii) Such services are advisory in nature only, the master of the vessel remaining at all times in full command of the vessel;

(iii) The services of the pilot are accepted on the express understanding that the master, owners, and operators covenant and agree to indemnify and hold harmless the pilot in respect to any liability including but not limited to suits or actions directly against the pilot by third parties by reason of errors or omissions of the pilot in the performance of pilotage services; excepting, however, such personal liability and rights over as may arise by reason of the wilful misconduct or gross negligence of the pilots; and

(iv) The fees charged for the services rendered by the pilot under this agreement have been computed and are assessed in accordance with and based upon the above stipulations and the regulations governing pilot tariffs adopted by the board of pilotage commissioners pursuant to chapter 88.16 RCW.

(b) A section which indicates whether or not "trip" insurance has been requested.

(2) The master must initial or sign this special contract or tariff before the pilot undertakes his duties aboard the vessel.

(3) If the master, owners, agents or operators have requested "trip" insurance to the value of the vessel and its cargo, a premium will be assessed in addition to the rates and charges specified herein.

(4) If "trip" insurance to the value of the vessel and its cargo has been requested, the pilot must file a copy of the special contract or tariff with the board of pilotage commissioners within thirty (30) days. The commission will retain these copies for six (6) years.

WAC 173-80-010 PURPOSE AND SCOPE. The purpose of this chapter is to set forth limitations on the allocation and uses of monies administered by the Department of Ecology for purposes of providing grants and loans for wastewater treatment facilities, agricultural pollution abatement facilities, and lake restoration projects pursuant to chapter 43.99F RCW (Referendum 39). To derive the most benefit for the state in protecting the health and safety of the people it is necessary to establish criteria for the use of funds made available by Referendum 39. This chapter will outline (1) limitations on the allocation and uses of the funds, (2) the criteria to be considered for determining who will receive funds, and (3) the process to be followed for distributing the funds.

NEW SECTION

WAC 173-80-020 DEFINITIONS. (1) "Department" means the Washington state department of ecology.

(2) "Wastewater treatment works construction program" (hereinafter referred to as the wastewater treatment program) means the state/local program of grants and loans under chapter 43.99F RCW (Referendum 39) to public entities for the purpose of constructing or upgrading treatment works.

(3) "Agricultural wastes grants program" means the program of grants and loans administered by the department for the planning, design and construction of publicly owned or operated agricultural pollution control facilities.

(4) "Lake restoration grants program" means the program of state grants and loans administered by the department for the planning, design and implementation of lake restoration projects.

- (5) "Director" means the director of the Washington state department of ecology
- (6) "Management of wastes" means the control, collection, transport, treatment, and disposal of nonradioactive solid and nonradioactive liquid waste materials.
- (7) "Renewable energy" means, but is not limited to, the production of steam, hot water for steam heat, electricity, cogeneration, gas, fuel through incineration of wastes, refuse derived fuel processes, pyrolysis, hydrolysis or bioconversion, and energy savings through material recovery from waste source separation and/or recycling.
- (8) "Energy savings as a result of the management of the wastes" means but is not limited to the capital cost associated with an energy efficient treatment or transport process chosen over a process more commonly used in standard engineering practice which is more energy intensive.
- (9) "Project priority list" means the annual list of rated and ranked projects for which state grant assistance is expected during the fiscal year for which the list is issued.
- (10) "Priority rating system" means the process and criteria used by the department of ecology to rate and rank projects in the state that are considered eligible for assistance under chapter 43.99F RCW.

NEW SECTION

- WAC 173-80-030 LIMITATIONS ON THE USE OF FUNDS.

 (1) The following water program projects shall be eligible for state grants or loans in an amount not to exceed seventy-five percent of the total eligible cost of the project as determined by the department and subject to the special provisions contained in this chapter.
 - (a) Wastewater treatment projects.
 - (b) Lake restoration projects.
 - (c) Agricultural pollution projects.
- (2) Loans for up to seventy-five percent of the costs of assistance may be authorized by the director, provided:
 - (a) The loan repayment period does not exceed five years.
- (b) The cumulative total of all loans authorized during any biennium does not exceed ten percent of the cumulative total of funds appropriated by the legislature for that biennium, excluding any special appropriation authorized by WAC 173-80-050(6).
- (c) The director or his designee considers and documents why it is in the best interest of the state's citizens to provide a loan.
- (d) The director considers and documents how the loan will be repaid.
- (3) The wastewater treatment program will establish an accounting procedure to identify the money which is spent on projects that are capable of producing renewable energy or energy savings as a result of the management of the wastes.

NEW SECTION

WAC 173-80-040 PROVISION OF GUIDELINES. The department will publish guidelines which establish procedures for awarding grants and eligibility criteria for each Referendum 39 grant program identified in WAC 173-80-030(1). These guidelines will describe the grant application, review, and award process and will be available prior to the first grant award.

NEW SECTION

WAC 173-80-050 WASTEWATER TREATMENT WORKS GRANTS—PRIORITY RATING AND OTHER PROVISIONS.

(1) In instances where applications for wastewater treatment works grant funds exceed the amount currently available to the department, the director or his designee will establish a project priority list using published priority rating criteria which consider, but are not limited to, the following:

- (a) Water quality impacts caused by existing circumstances.
- (b) Public health impacts caused by existing circumstances.
- (c) The prior local effort expended toward correcting the existing or similar problems.
 - (d) The cost-benefit relationship of the proposed project.
 - (e) Problem prevention aspects of the proposed project.
- (2) In instances where a priority list is required, the director or his designee will ensure that:
 - (a) A project priority list is developed on an annual basis.
- (b) The priority list be readily available to the public for review and comment thirty days prior to its approval by the director.

- (c) Comments received during any review period are considered and responded to before a final list is approved by the director.
- (d) An approved list is available on or about forty-five days after the close of the application period.
- (3) The department may use funds authorized by chapter 43.99F RCW as fifteen percent grants to wastewater treatment projects for public entities who have received a federal grant under Title II of Public Law 95-217 prior to October 1, 1982 or a written guarantee from the department, prior to the effective date of this chapter, that such a grant will be available when a federal grant is received. New phases of continuing construction wastewater treatment projects begun prior to October 1, 1982 are also eligible for a fifteen percent grant. Funds are to be awarded under this authority only if funds provided by chapter 43.83A RCW (Referendum Bill No. 26) are not available.
- (4) Prior to December 31, 1982 the department may award a grant for seventy-five percent of the eligible costs for completion of any wastewater treatment facility that began construction under the federal wastewater treatment program prior to October 1, 1981 and is not scheduled to receive a federal grant prior to federal fiscal year 1983.
- (5) Wastewater treatment program projects, except those allowed by WAC 173-80-050(4), shall not receive grants exceeding fifty percent of the eligible costs of the project except that grants to public bodies determined by the department to be suffering economic hardship, as defined in program guidance, shall be for sixty-five percent of the eligible design/construction costs of the project.
- (6) The director may enter into a single lump sum design and construction contract with a grantee whose project exceeds a total cost of \$100 million and requiring more than three years to design and construct, providing that all the following conditions are met:
- (a) The project appears on the current project priority list within the range fundable with remaining, unobligated monies authorized by chapter 43.99F RCW.
- (b) The contract contains provisions limiting the total amount of state funding to fifty percent of the eligible costs or an agreed upon figure (whichever is less), establishing cash flow agreements, and any other provisions the director deems necessary to protect the financial interests of the state.
 - (c) The legislature appropriates the necessary funds.
- (d) The grantee agrees to a one-time grant, including limited increases at time of bid, and will not seek any further funds under the provisions of chapter 43.99F RCW.

NEW SECTION

WAC 173-80-060 LAKE RESTORATION PROJECT GRANTS—GENERAL ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS AND PRIORITY RATING. (1) General eligibility requirements include:

- (a) The lake must have a documented water quality problem which is resulting in impairment of beneficial uses;
- (b) The proposed project must be sponsered by a public entity as defined in chapter 43.99F RCW;
- (c) The project sponsor must be able to provide at least ten percent of the total project cost unless a lower share is specifically authorized by the director or his designee; and
- (d) Public access must be provided which is sufficient to allow the general public the same opportunity to enjoy the lake's recreational benefits as that enjoyed by residents living immediately adjacent to the lake.
- (2) When applications for grant funds exceed the amount currently available to the department, the director will establish a lake restoration project priority list using rating criteria which consider, but are not limited to, the following:
 - (a) Water quality
 - (b) Lake utilization
 - (c) Restoration potential
 - (d) Public health
- (3) When a lake restoration project priority list is required, the director or his designee will ensure that the priority list is readily available to the public for review and comment thirty days prior to its approval by the director.

WAC 173-80-070 AGRICULTURAL WASTES PROJECT GRANT—GENERAL ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS AND PRIORITY RATING. (1) General eligibility requirements include:

(a) The project sponsor must be a public entity as defined in chapter 43.99F RCW;

(b) Eligible project elements must benefit the public and be utilized by more than one member of the sponsoring group or agency;

(c) The project must directly benefit the quality of the receiving water; and

(d) The project sponsor must provide at least ten percent of the grant eligible costs unless a lesser amount is authorized by the director or his designee.

(2) Project Rating—when applications for grant funds exceed the amount currently available to the department, the director will establish an agricultural wastes project priority list using criteria which includes, but are not limited to:

(a) Water Quality

(b) Water quantity

(c)Conservation potential

(d) Impairment of beneficial uses

(3) When an agricultural waste project priority list is required, the director or his designee will ensure that the priority list is readily available to the public for review and comment thirty days prior to its approval by the director.

This statement is filed pursuant to RCW 34.04.045 regarding the adopting of chapter 137-04 WAC, an introduction to the Department of Corrections, and chapter 137-08 WAC, public records disclosure. Also regarding the repeal of chapter 275-52 WAC, Institutional Industries and the repeal of chapter 275-40 WAC, annual inspection of all jails and detention facilities.

These rule changes are necessary due to the establishment of the new Department of Corrections in chapter 136, Laws of 1981.

Statutory authority for this action is found in chapter 34.04 RCW, RCW (uncodified), reference: Chapter 136, Laws of 1981, and RCW 42.17.250 – 42.17.340.

Summary of the Rule Changes: Chapter 137-04 WAC Introductory, a new chapter identifying the new Department of Corrections; chapter 137-08 WAC Public Records Disclosure, a new chapter to ensure compliance with RCW 42.17.250 - 42.17.340; chapter 275-40 WAC Repealed, rule outdated; and chapter 275-52 WAC Repealed, rule outdated.

Chapter 137-04 WAC INTRODUCTORY

NEW SECTION

WAC 137-04-010 DEFINITIONS. As used in this title:

- (1) "Secretary" means the secretary of the department of corrections.
 - (2) "Department" means the department of corrections.
- (3) "Inmate" means any person committed to the custody of the department, including but not limited to persons residing in a correctional institution or facility and persons released on furlough or work release.
- (4) The term "resident", as well as inmate, is used to designate a person on parole or probation status residing at a community residential facility.

NEW SECTION

WAC 137-04-015 ESTABLISHMENT OF DEPARTMENT. The department of corrections was established effective July 1, 1981, by chapter 136, Laws of 1981, 47th legislature. Previously, functions delegated to the department of corrections were assigned to the adult corrections division, department of social and health services.

NEW SECTION

WAC 137-040-020 STRUCTURE OF THE DEPARTMENT. (1) The executive head of the department is the secretary who is appointed by the governor with the consent of the senate, and serves at the pleasure of the governor. The secretary manages the department and is responsible for the administration of adult correctional programs, including but not limited to the operation of all state correctional institutions or facilities used for the confinement of convicted felons.

(2) The department is organized into four divisions which are headed by directors who report to the secretary. The responsibilities of these divisions are:

- (a) The division of prisons is responsible for the operation of all state correctional facilities, including the Washington state penitentiary; the Washington corrections center; the Washington state reformatory; the McNeil Island penitentiary; the Purdy treatment center for women; the Cedar Creek corrections center; the Clearwater corrections center; the Firland correctional center; the Indian Ridge treatment center; the Larch corrections center; the Olympic correctional center; the Pine Lodge correctional center; the special offender center; and such other state correctional institutions, camps or facilities as may hereafter be established pursuant to law under the jurisdiction of the department for the confinement of convicted felons.
- (b) The division of community services is responsible for community based services such as probation and parole and work/training release.
- (c) The division of management and budget is responsible for providing a variety of services to the other divisions and offices of the department including budget and accounting, management information systems, research and analysis, management services, internal audit, and contracts and regulations.
- (d) The division of institutional industries is responsible for providing a comprehensive work program for inmates, including free venture industries, tax reduction industries, institutional support industries, community work industries, and community service programs. All inmates working in prison industries are paid a wage and contribute to the cost of corrections. Inmates are assigned to these programs based on skills, aptitude, and experience.
- (3) Also reporting to the secretary are the chiefs of personnel services, legal services, public information, and special investigations, as well as the assistant secretary for program development.

WAC 137-08-010 PURPOSE. The purpose of this chapter shall be to ensure compliance by the department of corrections with the provisions of the public records disclosure act, RCW 42.17.250 through 42.17.340.

NEW SECTION

WAC 137-08-020 DEFINITIONS. (1) "Public records" include any writing containing information relating to the conduct of government or the performance of any governmental or proprietary function prepared, owned, used or retained by the department regardless of physical form or characteristics.

(2) "Writing" means handwriting, typewriting, printing, photostat-

(2) "Writing" means handwriting, typewriting, printing, photostating, photographing, and every other means of recording any form of communication or representation, including letters, words, pictures, sounds, or symbols, or combination thereof; and all papers, maps, magnetic or paper tapes, photographic films and prints, magnetic or punched cards, discs, drums, and other documents.

(3) "Department" means the department of corrections.

(4) "Client" means any person or organization about whom the department has a record.

(5) "Disclosure" means inspection and/or copying.

(6) "Denial of disclosure" denotes any exempting from disclosure of any public record.

NEW SECTION

WAC 137-08-060 PUBLIC RECORDS AVAILABLE. (1) Requests for any identifiable public record may be initiated at any office of the department during normal business hours.

(2) The department shall at all times take the most timely possible action on requests for disclosure, and shall be required to respond in

writing within ten working days of receipt of the request for disclosure. The department's failure to so respond shall entitle the person seeking disclosure to petition the public records officer pursuant to WAC 137–04–140.

NEW SECTION

WAC 137-08-070 PUBLIC RECORDS OFFICER. The department shall designate a public records officer, located in the state administrative office, who shall be responsible for implementing the department's rules regarding disclosure of public records, coordination of staff in this regard, and generally insuring compliance by the staff with public records disclosure requirements.

NEW SECTION

WAC 137-08-080 PUBLIC DISCLOSURE COORDINATOR. Each departmental administrative unit, for example, each institution, shall designate from among its employees at least one public disclosure coordinator, who shall:

- (1) Have responsibility to respond to written requests for disclosure of the department's nonexempt public records located in that office; and
- (2) Refer the person requesting disclosure to any other office where the record is located, and assist further in the disclosure process; and
- (3) Verify, if necessary, the identity of any person requesting information.

NEW SECTION

WAC 137-08-090 REQUEST FOR PUBLIC RECORDS. (1) Unless waived by a public disclosure coordinator, all requests for the disclosure of a public record must be in writing identifying the record sought with reasonable certainty. The written request may include:

(a) The name of the person requesting the record;

- (b) The time of day and calendar date on which the request is made, nd:
- (c) The nature of the request.
- (2) A request for disclosure shall be made during customary business hours.
- (3) A request for disclosure shall not be made for commercial or political purposes.
- (4) If the public record contains material exempt from disclosure pursuant to law, including those laws cited in WAC 137-08-150, the department must provide the person requesting disclosure with a written explanation for the nondisclosure, pursuant to WAC 137-08-130.
- (5) Any person continuing to seek disclosure, after having received a written explanation for nondisclosure pursuant to WAC 137-08-130, may request a review under the provisions of WAC 137-08-140.
- (6) When a person's identity is relevant to an exemption, that person may be required to provide personal identification.
- (7) Nothing in this section or elsewhere in this chapter shall be construed to require the department to compile statistics or other information from material contained in public records, where doing so would unduly interfere with other essential functions of the department and is not required for litigation by rules of pretrial discovery.

NEW SECTION

2

WAC 137-08-100 DISCLOSURE TO CLIENT'S REPRESENTATIVE. (1) If a client requests disclosure to a representative, that request must be accompanied by a written release signed by the client, except that, as an accommodation to the client and if the legislator or attorney representing the client can provide assurance that the client has authorized disclosure, the client's record may be briefly discussed with that legislator or attorney so long as there is neither physical inspection nor copying of client records by that representative. A written release must include:

- (a) The identity of the person(s) or organization(s) to whom disclosure is to be made;
- (b) An identification of the record, or portion thereof, to be disclosed;
 - (c) A statement of when the authorization for disclosure expires.
- (2) Disclosures of information to a representative shall be made to the same extent as to the client.
- (3) The legal guardian of a client has any and all rights accorded to a client by this section.

NEW SECTION

WAC 137-08-110 FEES-INSPECTION AND COPYING. (1) No fee shall be charged for the inspection of public records.

- (2) The department shall collect the following fees plus postage to reimburse itself for actual costs incident to providing copies of public records:
 - (a) Fifty cents per page for ten pages or less;

(b) Thirty-five cents per page from eleven to fifty pages;

(c) Twenty cents per page for over fifty pages.

- (3) Nothing contained in this section shall preclude the department from agreeing to exchange or provide copies of manuals or other public records with other state or federal agencies, whenever doing so is in the best interest of the department.
- (4) The secretary of the department or his designee is authorized to waive any of the foregoing copying costs.

NEW SECTION

WAC 137-08-120 PROTECTION OF PUBLIC RECORDS. Public records shall be disclosed only in the presence of a public disclosure coordinator or his or her designee, who shall withdraw the records if the person requesting disclosure acts in a manner which will damage or substantially disorganize the records or interfere excessively with other essential functions of the department. This section shall not be construed to prevent the department from accommodating a client by use of the mails in the disclosure process.

NEW SECTION

WAC 137-08-130 DISCLOSURE PROCEDURE. (1) The public disclosure coordinator shall review file materials prior to disclosure.

(2) If the file does not contain materials exempt from disclosure, the

public disclosure coordinator shall ensure full disclosure.

(3) If the file does contain materials exempt from disclosure, the public disclosure coordinator shall deny disclosure of those exempt portions of the file, and shall, at the time of the denial, in writing, clearly specify the reasons for the denial of disclosure, including a statement of the specific exemptions or reasons authorizing the withholding of the record and a brief explanation of how the exemption or reason applies. The remaining, nonexempt materials shall be fully disclosed.

NEW SECTION

WAC 137-08-140 REMEDY FOR REVIEW OF DENIAL OF DISCLOSURE. (1) If the person requesting disclosure disagrees with the decision of a public disclosure coordinator denying disclosure of a public record, this person may at any time petition the department's public records officer for review of the decision denying disclosure. The form used by the public disclosure coordinator to deny disclosure of a public record shall clearly indicate this right of review.

(2) The public records officer shall review decisions denying disclosure in the most prompt fashion possible, and such review shall be deemed completed at the end of the second business day following receipt by the department of the petition for review. This shall constitute final agency action for the purposes of judicial review, pursuant to

RCW 42.17.320.

NEW SECTION

WAC 137-08-150 EXEMPTIONS TO PUBLIC RECORDS DISCLOSURE. The department reserves the right to determine if a public record requested in accordance with the procedures outlined in WAC 137-08-090 is exempt or nondisclosable under RCW 42.17.250 through RCW 42.17.340.

Nondisclosable records include, but are not limited to:

(1) Personal information in any files concerning a prisoner, probationer, or parolee to the extent required by RCW 42.17.310(1)(a); however, disclosure may be made to that person or that person's representative, except as otherwise prohibited by these rules;

(2) Data (including information revealing the identity of persons who file complaints, except as the complainant may authorize) contained in intelligence, investigative, and other related files compiled by investigative, law enforcement or penology agencies, and state agencies vested with the responsibility to discipline members of any profession. This data is nondisclosable to the extent required by RCW 42.17.310(1)(d) and (e), RCW 10.97.080, chapter 446-20 WAC;

(3) Certain juvenile justice or juvenile care records to the extent required by chapter 13.50 RCW;

(4) Personal information in files maintained for an employee of the department to the extent required by RCW 42.17.310(1)(b);

(5) Deliberative material, as opposed to facts upon which a decision is based, contained in preliminary drafts, notes, recommendations, and intra-agency memoranda in which opinions are expressed or policies formulated or recommended; except that a specific record shall be disclosable when publicly cited by the department in connection with any action to the extent required by RCW 42.17.310(1)(i);

(6) Records which are relevant to a controversy to which the department is a party but which records would not be available to another party under the rules of pretrial discovery for causes pending in the superior courts, including records involving attorney-client communications between the department and the office of the attorney general privileged under RCW 5.60.060(2).

(7) Criminal history records information including conviction and

nonconviction information as required by RCW 10.97.

NEW SECTION

WAC 137-08-160 QUALIFICATIONS ON NONDISCLO-SURE. (1) To the extent that nondisclosable information can be deleted from the specific records sought, the remainder of the records shall be disclosable.

(2) No exemptions shall be construed to require nondisclosure of statistical information not descriptive of identifiable persons, as re-

quired by RCW 42.17.310(2).

(3) Inspection and copying of any specific records otherwise nondisclosable is permissible pursuant to an order of the superior court enforcing a subpoena in accordance with the provisions of RCW 42.17.310(3), or an order of the office of hearings enforcing a subpoena.

NEW SECTION

WAC 137-08-170 INTERAGENCY DISCLOSURE. (1) Unless prohibited by law, information may be disclosed by the department to outside agencies, including other state of Washington agencies, or agencies of other states.

(2) Outside agencies receiving information pursuant to subsection (1) of this section shall be thereby subject to the same standards of disclosure as are required of the department.

NEW SECTION

WAC 137-08-180 RECORDS INDEX. (1) The department finds that it would be unduly burdensome and would interfere with agency operations to maintain an index of records because of the complexity and diversity of its operations and the resulting volume of manuals, correspondence, reports, surveys, staff studies, and other materials.

(2) The department will make available for public disclosure all indices which may at a future time be developed for agency use.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

Name of Agency: Washington State Board of Medical Examiners.

Purpose: The purpose of the amendments to WAC 308-52-135 is to clarify the circumstances under which the board authorizes physician assistants to dispense medication directly to patients. Two versions of the amendment are set forth to provide the board with alternatives regarding this clarification; The purpose of the amendment to WAC 308-52-140 is to require proper notification at remote physician assistant sites of the identity of the supervising physician and the identity of the physician assistant; and The purpose of the amendment to WAC 308-52-201 is to correct a reference to the correct national certification organization.

Statutory Authority: RCW 18.71A.020.

Summary of the Rules: WAC 308-52-135 Physician Assistant Prescriptions, describes the manner in which physician assistants may issue written or oral prescriptions and the circumstances under which the prescriptions may be dispensed directly to patients; 308-52-140 provides for the utilization of physician assistants including circumstances under which a remote site practice may be permitted; and 308-52-201 provides for the general continuing medical education requirements for physician assistants, including the acceptance of current national certification as evidence of sufficient continuing education in lieu of obtaining fifty hours of continuing medical education otherwise.

Reason Proposed: The amendment to WAC 308-52-135 is proposed at the request of a physician whose physician assistant is practicing in a remote site that is a substantial distance from any pharmacy. Without clarification as to the physician assistant's authority to dispense some medications directly to patients, the patients in this situation would not be able to receive appropriate medication in a timely fashion; The amendment to WAC 308-52-140 is proposed by the board to insure that members of the public who are visiting a physician assistant at a remote site are informed as to the physician assistant's identity and the identity of the supervising physician; and The amendment to WAC 308-52-201 concerning the identity of the national certifying body is changed because the current reference to the American Academy of Physician Assistants was incorrect and this body does not issue certification of physician assistants.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order PL 317, filed 9/13/79)

WAC 308-52-135 PHYSICIAN((45)) ASSISTANT PRE-SCRIPTIONS. A physician((45)) assistant may issue written or oral prescriptions as provided herein when approved by the board and assigned by the supervising physician.

(1) Except for schedule two controlled substances as listed under federal and state controlled substances acts, a physician((1/3)) assistant may issue prescriptions for a patient who is under the care of the physician responsible for the supervision of the physician((1/3)) assistant.

(a) Written prescriptions shall be written on the blank of the supervising physician and shall include the name, address and telephone number of the physician. The prescription shall also bear the name and address of the patient and the date on which the prescription was written.

(b) The physician(('s)) assistant shall sign such a prescription by signing his or her own name followed by the letters "P.A." and ((\frac{\{the}}{\})) registration number.

(2) A physician(('a)) assistant employed or extended privileges by a hospital((\(\frac{1}{1}\))) nursing home or other health care institution may, if permissible under the by-laws, rules and regulations of the institution, write medical orders, except those for schedule two controlled substances, for inpatients under the care of the physician responsible for his supervision.

(3) To be authorized to issue prescriptions for schedule three through five controlled substances, a physician((43)) assistant must be registered with the board of pharmacy and the drug enforcement administration

(4) The registration of a physician((1s)) assistant who issues a prescription in violation of these provisions shall be subject to revocation or suspension.

(5) Physician assistants may dispense prescriptive medications from office supplies provided the quantities dispensed is limited to treatment for forty-eight hours. The physician assistant shall comply with the state laws concerning prescription labeling requirements.

ALTERNATE

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order PL 317, filed 9/13/79)

WAC 308-52-135 PHYSICIAN((45)) ASSISTANT PRE-SCRIPTIONS. A physician((45)) assistant may issue written or oral prescriptions as provided herein when approved by the board and assigned by the supervising physician.

- (1) Except for schedule two controlled substances as listed under federal and state controlled substances acts, a physician((1/s)) assistant may i-sue prescriptions for a patient who is under the care of the physician responsible for the supervision of the physician((1/s)) assistant.
- (a) Written prescriptions shall be written on the blank of the supervising physician and shall include the name, address and telephone number of the physician. The prescription shall also bear the name and address of the patient and the date on which the prescription was written.
- (b) The physician(('s)) assistant shall sign such a prescription by signing his or her own name followed by the letters "P.A." and ((\frac{\{the}}{\})) registration number.
- (2) A physician(($\frac{1}{3}$)) assistant employed or extended privileges by a hospital(($\frac{1}{3}$)) nursing home or other health care institution may, if permissible under the by-laws, rules and regulations of the institution, write medical orders, except those for schedule two controlled substances, for inpatients under the care of the physician responsible for his supervision.
- (3) To be authorized to issue prescriptions for schedule three through five controlled substances, a physician($(\frac{1}{3})$) assistant must be registered with the board of pharmacy and the drug enforcement administration.
- (4) The registration of a physician(('s)) assistant who issues a prescription in violation of these provisions shall be subject to revocation or suspension.
- (5) A physician assistant may dispense medication that the physician assistant has prescribed for that patient. The physician assistant shall comply with the state laws concerning prescription labeling requirements.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order PL 285, filed 3/14/78)

WAC 308-52-140 PHYSICIAN((4S)) ASSISTANTS—UTILIZATION. (1) Limitations, Number.

- (a) No physician shall supervise more than one graduate physician ((43)) assistant categorized as type A or B without authorization by the board.
- (b) The number of type C physician((s¹)) assistants who may be supervised by a single physician shall be set individually for each category established by the board.
 - (2) Limitations, Geographic.
- (a) No physician(('s)) assistant shall be utilized in a place geographically separated from the supervising physician's primary place for meeting patients without the express permission of the board. The "primary place for meeting patients" shall be defined to include the physician's office, the institution(s) in which his patients are hospitalized or the homes of patients for whom a physician-patient relationship has already been established.
- (b) Special permission may be granted to utilize a type A physician(('3)) assistant in a place remote from the physician's primary place for meeting patients if:
 - (i) There is a demonstrated need for such utilization.
- (ii) Adequate provision for immediate communication between the physician and his physician (('3)) assistant exists.
- (iii) A mechanism has been developed to provide for the establishment of a direct patient-physician relationship between the supervising physician and patients who may be seen initially by the physician((is)) assistant.
- (iv) The responsible physician spends at least one-half day per week in the remote office.
 - (v) The provisions of WAC 308-52-141(2) are met.
- (vi) The waiting room, offices and examining rooms of all facilities approved as remote sites must have posted a printed announcement that the (named) sponsor is responsible for all care rendered, and that the (named) individual providing the care is a physician assistant. Identification of the clinic on the outside facade must include the names of the physician sponsor and the physician assistant.
- (3) Limitations, Hospital Functions. A physician((4s)) assistant working in or for a hospital, clinic or other health organization shall be registered and supervised by a supervising physician in the same manner as any other physician((4s)) assistant and his functions shall be

limited to those specifically approved by the board. His responsibilities, if any, to other physicians must be defined in the application for registration.

(4) Limitations, Trainees. An individual enrolled in a training program for physician((3')) assistants may function only in direct association with his preceptorship physician or a delegated alternate physician in the immediate clinical setting or, as in the case of specialized training in a specific area, an alternate preceptor approved by the program. They may not function in a remote location or in the absence of the preceptor.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order PL 368, filed 1/21/81)

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order, § 2, filed 3/23/60)

WAC 308-40-020 PRESCRIPTIONS. Every dentist who operates a dental office in the state of Washington must write a valid prescription to the dental laboratory or dental technician with whom he intends to place an order for the making, repairing, altering or supplying of artificial restorations, substitutes or appliances to be worn in the human mouth. A separate prescription must be submitted to the dental laboratory or dental technician for each patient's requirements. Such prescriptions, to be valid, must be written in duplicate and contain the date, the name and address of the dental laboratory or the dental technician, the name and address of the patient, description of the basic work to be done, the signature of the dentist serving the patient for whom the work is being done and the dentist's license certificate number. The original prescription shall be referred to the dental laboratory or the dental technician and the carbon copy shall be retained for ((three)) five years, by the dentist, in an orderly, accessible file and shall be readily available for inspection by the director of licenses or his authorized representative.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order PL 342, filed 4/22/80)

WAC 308-40-101 ((EXAMINATION)) APPLICATION PROCEDURE. (1) To be eligible for the dental examination, the applicant must be a graduate from a dental school approved by the Washington state board of dental examiners. The board of dental examiners adopts those standards of the American Dental Association's Commission Accreditation ((of Dental and Dental Auxiliary Educational Programs (C.A.D.D.A.E.P.))) which were relevant to accreditation of dental schools and current ((on)) in January ((15, 1977)), 1981, and has approved all and only those dental schools which were accredited by the ((C.A.D.D.A.E.P.)) Commission as of January ((15, 1977)), 1981. Other dental schools which apply for board approval and which meet these adopted standards to the board's satisfaction will be approved, but it is the responsibility of a school to apply for approval and of a student to ascertain whether or not a school has been approved by the board.

(2) Applications ((blanks)) for the examination may be secured from the Division of Professional Licensing, P. O. Box 9649, Olympia, Washington 98504. The application must be completed in every respect, and reach the division of professional licensing in Olympia at least sixty days prior to the examination.

(((3) Completed in every respect means that all portions of the application blank(s) are filled out and that included with the application

(a) the required application fee;

(b) either a notarized copy of the National Board IBM card or a notarized copy of the National Board certificate;

(d) if not a citizen of or)) (3) Applicants who are not citizens or resident aliens in the United States <u>must attain</u> full citizenship or resident alien status ((must be attained)) within six years from issuance of the license, or the license will be cancelled;

(4) The only acceptable proof of graduation from an approved dental school is ((cither a certified copy of a diploma of graduation and)) an official transcript from such school, or a verified list of graduating students from the dean of the dental school. The verified list of ((candidates)) students will only be acceptable from applicants who have graduated within 45 days of the examination for which they are applying. An applicant may complete his other application requirements and be scheduled for the examination before he ((obtains his diploma)) has graduated, but no ((application)) applicant will be admitted to the examination unless ((the certified copy of the diploma and)) the official transcript or the verified list from the dean has been received by the division of professional licensing of the department of licensing on or before the first day of the examination.

(5) In case of applicant having previously been in practice, the board requires a sworn statement covering history of practice for a five-year period immediately preceding application for this examination. This statement must accompany the application when returning it to the division of professional licensing.

(((6) A fee is required each time an applicant takes or retakes the board examination. Examination fees are not transferable from one applicant to another. Applicants who have paid the fee and do not appear for the next scheduled examination forfeit such fee.))

(6) Candidates will be required to furnish documentary evidence of malpractice and liability insurance.

(7) Upon ((completion of the application for the examination;)) establishing examination eligibility, the division of professional licensing will mail to each applicant ((one "clinical examination record")) examination forms, instructions and schedule. It is imperative that the applicant bring this ((form, unfolded;)) information to the examination as it will be used by the board throughout the practical examination.

(((8) Each applicant must furnish his or her own patient for all phases of the practical examination. Patients must be at least eighteen years of age. Patients should be selected carefully as this is a very important factor of the examination. Be certain that your patient will be present, on time, and will be able to remain at the clinic until the work is completed. An assistant will be permitted to assist the applicant at the chair. Dentists or undergraduate dental students are not acceptable as assistants.

(9) Neatness of the operation, cleanliness and care in handling of patients, thoroughness in technique, and quality of work will be considered in the grading. Quality of the work includes recontouring of restorations of approximating teeth to make good contact. All practical

work must be done under the rubber dam, including the final check on the finished work. (At least six teeth must be exposed under the rubber dam.) An additional check of the foil restoration will be made after dam removal. Application, cleanliness, and neatness of the rubber dam is part of the consideration when grading.

(10) Any applicant whose conduct interferes with the evaluation of professional competency by the board may be dismissed from the examination and all of his or her work will be rejected. Such conduct shall include but not be limited to the following:

(a) Presentation of purported carious lesions which are artificially created, whether or not the applicant created them:

- (b) Presentation of radiographs which have been mislabeled, altered. or contrived to represent other than the patient's true condition, whether or not the misleading radiograph was created by the applicant.
- (e) Giving or receiving aid, either directly or indirectly, during the examination process.
- (d) Failure to follow directions relative to the conduct of the examination, including termination of treatment procedures.
- (11) All applicants shall occupy the space assigned to him or her throughout the entire examination.
- (12) Under no circumstances may an examination paper be returned to an applicant once it has been turned in as completed.
- (13) No persons, other than those directly connected with the examination, shall be admitted to the examination clinical operating and grading areas:))

WAC 308-40-102 EXAMINATION CONTENT. (1) The examination will consist of:

- (i) Restorative examination: Proper radiographs are required for each cavity selection, and the teeth that are selected must be in contact and occlusion. Radiographs are to be mounted with the raised identifying mark out. All proximal restorations must restore contact. The selection must be on an original cavity in a vital tooth and must penetrate the dentin enamel junction, at least on one proximal surface.

Amalgam Class II ((- Teeth restored with two surfaces amalgams and with caries in the remaining proximal surface are acceptable for the amalgam. The candidate must leave a precise model of the cavity

preparation with adjacent teeth:))

((Gold Inlay)) Cast Gold Restoration - Three or more surfaces. ((Teeth restored with two surface amalgams and with caries in the remaining proximal surface are acceptable. Candidates must leave with the board a precise model of the inlay preparation on the day of the inlay preparation. The model must have a separated removable pin die and include adjacent teeth:))

Gold Foil - Class II, III or V((: A selection of a class II foil is confined to those cases where the forces of occlusion do not surpass the

physical properties of the condensed gold.

The gold foil selection will be on a tooth which has original caries or may be on a tooth which has a small existing restoration that has failed. (The latter condition will be determined by the judgment of the board.)

Areas of minimal erosion are not acceptable for the class V foil restoration. The erosion must be well advanced into the dentin.))

- (ii) Prosthetic: Candidates will evaluate a number of completed denture setups as determined by the board. This examination will determine the candidates ability to distinguish between correct and incorrect artificial tooth arrangement and position.
- (iii) The board may, at its discretion, give an examination in oral diagnosis and treatment planning, or any other phase of dentistry. Candidates will receive information concerning such examination.
- (2) Each applicant must furnish his or her own patient for all phases of the practical examination. Patients must be at least eighteen years of age. Patients must be on time and able to remain in at the clinic until work is completed. ((The state board of dental examiners and the school of dentistry assume no responsibility regarding work done on

patients. Candidate will be required to furnish documentary evidence of malpractice and liability insurance:))

(3) An assistant will be permitted to assist the applicant at the chair. Dentists or undergraduate dental students are not acceptable as assistants. Assistants must complete a form of eligibility.

(4) Neatness of the operation, cleanliness and care in handling of patients, thoroughness in technique, and quality of work will be considered in the grading. Quality of the work includes recontouring or restorations of approximating teeth to make good contact. All practical work must be done under the rubber dam, including the final check on the finished work. At least six teeth must be exposed under the rubber dam. An additional check of the foil restoration will be made after dam removal.

NEW SECTION

- WAC 308-40-103 DISMISSAL FROM EXAMINATION, Any applicant whose conduct interferes with the evaluation of professional competency by the board may be dismissed from the examination and all work will be rejected. Such conduct shall include but not be limited to the following:

WAC 308-40-110 FOREIGN TRAINED DENTISTS. The following requirements apply to persons who are graduates of dental schools or colleges not accredited by the council on education of the American Dental Association.

- (1) A person who has issued to him or her a degree of doctor of dental medicine or doctor of dental surgery by a foreign dental school listed by the World Health Organization, or by a foreign dental school approved by the board of examiners, shall be eligible to take the examination given by the board in the theory and practice of the science of dentistry upon furnishing all of the following:
 - (a) A certified copy of dental school diploma.

(b) Official dental school transcript.

- (c) Proof of identification by an appropriate governmental agency; provided, however, that alternate arrangements may be made for political refugees.
- (2) Examination by the board of a foreign trained dental applicant shall be a progression examination given in English in the following sequence:
 - (a) Passing scores on national board examinations, parts I and II.
- (b) Satisfactory performance on a preclinical examination in <u>all</u> portions of the restorative((, operative and prosthetic technique not using patients)) examination. This portion will be completed on a typodont.

(((c) Satisfactory performance or an examination in diagnosis and treatment planning.))

(((d))) (c) Satisfactory performance on a clinical examination required of all candidates for dental licensure including the

prosthetic/ODTP exam.

- (3) When an applicant for a license has received a passing grade equivalent to that required of other applicants in the examination of the kind set forth in subsection (2)(a) and (b), he or she shall be exempt from reexamination in that subject in subsequent examinations before the board held within a two-year period from the date of the examination in which he or she obtained such passing grade. Should an applicant fail the preclinical examination in restorative, ((operative and prosthetic technique,)) the examiners shall determine if remedial training is required and the applicant shall furnish proof of such training before being allowed to retake that portion of the examination.
- (4) The licensure examination for foreign trained dental applicants shall be held by the board at least once a year with such additional examinations as the board desires to hold. The time and place of the examination shall be fixed by the board at least six months prior to the date that the examination is to be held.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1486, filed 2/1/80)

WAC 275-19-020 FACILITY SERVICES. (1) ((Alcoholism facilities may be approved by)) The department shall approve alcoholism treatment facilities pursuant to these rules and regulations to provide the following services:

- (a) Alcohol detoxification ((services are those services required for the)): Care and/or treatment of persons intoxicated or incapacitated by alcohol during the period in which the person recovers from the transitory effects of acute intoxication.
- (b) Alcoholism intensive inpatient treatment ((services are those services)): Provided to the detoxified alcoholic in a ((structured)) residential setting.
- (c) Alcoholism long-term treatment ((services are those services)): Provided on a long-term basis (ninety days or more) in a residential care setting with personal care services for alcoholics with impaired self-maintenance capabilities who need personal guidance and assistance to maintain sobriety and good health.
- (d) Alcoholism recovery house ((services are those services that)): Provides an alcohol-free residential setting with social and recreational activities for detoxified alcoholics to aid their adjustment to sobriety and their engagement in occupational training, gainful employment or other types of community activities.
- (e) Alcoholism outpatient treatment ((services are)): A variety of diagnostic and primary alcoholism treatment services provided according to a prescribed plan in a nonresidential setting.
- (f) Alcohol information and referral ((services provide)): A community-based resource for information concerning alcohol, alcohol abuse and alcoholism; assess the individual's and/or family's involvement with alcohol, assist the individual and/or family in designing a continuum of care and coordinate referrals to and from the appropriate alcoholism treatment programs or other community resources.
- (g) Alcohol information school provides the individual student with information regarding the use and abuse of alcohol and attempts to motivate the individual with a drinking problem to evaluate the problem and seek treatment.
- (h) Emergency service patrol ((services are those services which)): Gives assistance in the streets and in other public places to persons who are intoxicated.
- (2) A facility may be approved for more than one service if the facility complies with the specific requirements for approval of each service provided.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1486, filed 2/1/80)

WAC 275-19-030 DEFINITIONS. For the purpose of these rules and regulations, the following words and phrases shall have the following meanings unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

(1) ((The meaning of all adjectives and adverbs such as adequate, approved, competent, substantial, qualified,

- necessary, reasonable, satisfactory, sufficiently, effectively, appropriately, or suitable used in these rules and regulations to qualify a person, a procedure, equipment, or buildings shall be determined by the Washington state department of social and health services.)) "Acute detoxification" means detoxification service provided to individuals for whom the consequences of withdrawal from alcohol are so severe as to merit assistance from medical and/or nursing personnel.
- (2) "Administrator" means the individual appointed as the chief executive officer by the governing body of a facility to act in its behalf in the overall management of the alcoholism treatment facility.
 - (3) "Alcoholic" means a person with alcoholism.
- (4) "Alcoholism" means an illness characterized by lack of control as to the consumption of alcoholic beverages or the consumption of alcoholic beverages to the extent that a person's health is substantially impaired or endangered or his social and economic function is substantially disrupted.
- (5) (("Alcoholism counselor" means a person who is knowledgeable about the nature and treatment of alcoholism, is knowledgeable about community resources which provide services alcoholics may need, knows and understands the principles and techniques of alcoholism counseling and is skilled in the application of these principles and techniques.
- (6))) "Alcoholism treatment facility" means a ((hospital, sanitarium, treatment center or other)) place whose primary function is the treatment of alcoholism and/or alcohol abuse.
- (((7))) (6) "Approved" means having met the standards of the department contained in these rules and regulations and having been ((approved)) certified pursuant to RCW 70.96A.090.
- (((8))) (7) "Approved public treatment facility" means a treatment facility which is operated under the direction and control of the department, or a treatment facility which is providing treatment for the department either through contract with the department or through a county subcontract, that has been approved by the department pursuant to these rules and regulations and chapter 70.96A RCW.
- ((9)) (8) "Approved treatment facility" means an alcoholism treatment facility, either public or private, profit or nonprofit which has been approved by the department pursuant to these rules and regulations and chapter 70.96A RCW.
- (((10))) (9) "Cancel" means a permanent invalidation of the approval of an alcoholism treatment facility.
- (((11) "Client" means any person receiving services for the treatment of an alcohol-related problem.
- (12) "Counseling, individual" means an interaction between an alcoholism counselor and a client.
- (13) "Counseling, group (or group therapy)" means an interaction between two or more clients, and an alcoholism counselor(s).
- (14))) (10) "Detoxification" means care and treatment of an intoxicated person during the period in which the person recovers from the transitory effects of acute intoxication.

- (((15))) (11) "Detoxified" means withdrawn from the consumption of alcohol, and recovered from the transitory effects of intoxication, and any associated acute physiological withdrawal reactions.
- (((16))) (12) "Department" means the Washington state department of social and health services.
- (((17))) (13) "Facilities" means rooms, areas, and equipment to serve a specific function.
- (((18))) (14) "Governing body" means the individual or group which is legally responsible for the conduct of an alcoholism treatment facility.
- (((19))) (15) "Incapacitated by alcohol" means that a person, as a result of the use of alcohol, has his or her judgment so impaired that he or she is incapable of realizing what his or her condition is and making a rational decision with respect to the need for treatment and constitutes a danger to him or herself, to any other person or to property.
- (((20) "Inpatient" means a client to whom the alcoholism treatment facility is providing treatment, including room and meals, on a 24-hour basis.))
- (16) "Intensive outpatient treatment" means a concentrated, nonresidential program which consists of a combination of education sessions, individual therapy, group therapy, and related activities provided to detoxified alcoholics and their families.
- (((21))) (17) "Intoxication" means acute alcohol poisoning or temporary impairment of a person's mental or physical functioning caused by alcohol in his/her body.
- (((22) "Intoxicated" means in the state of intoxication.
- (23))) (18) "Licensed nurse" means either a registered nurse per chapter 18.88 RCW or a licensed practical nurse per chapter 18.78 RCW.
- (((a) "Licensed practical nurse" is a person duly licensed under the provision of the Licensed Practical Nurse Act of the state of Washington, chapter 18.78 RCW:
- (b) "Registered nurse" means a person duly licensed under the provision of the law regulating the practice of registered nursing in the state of Washington, chapter 18.88 RCW.
 - (24) "May" means permissive.
- (25) "Modified medical detoxification" is detoxification service provided to individuals for whom the consequences of withdrawal from alcohol are so severe as to merit assistance with medication, usually tranquilizers or sedative hypnotics.
- (26) "Outpatient" means a client to whom the alcoholism treatment facility does not provide room or meals on a 24-hour-a-day basis.
- (27))) (19) "Physician" means a ((doctor of medicine or a doctor of osteopathy duly licensed)) person duly licensed to practice medicine or osteopathic medicine in the state of Washington.
- (((28) "Provisional approval" means a status of approval granted to alcoholism treatment facilities which are requesting approval for the first time in order to provide them with the time to develop policies, procedures, files, and program outlines required by chapter 275-19 WAC.

- (29))) (20) "Qualified alcoholism counselor" means ((an alcoholism counselor who meets the following minimum requirements.
- (a) Have no history or substantial evidence of alcohol or other drug misuse for a period of two years immediately prior to the time of employment as a qualified alcoholism counselor and no misuse of alcohol or other drugs while a qualified alcoholism counselor.
- (b) Specialist I—A qualified alcoholism counselor, Specialist I, shall possess these qualifications:
 - (i) A high school diploma or equivalent.
- (ii) Two thousand hours (approximately one year) of supervised work experience, in a counseling capacity, in an approved alcoholism agency or facility. (May include hours spent in supervised field experience under academic supervision.)
- (iii) Satisfactory completion of a minimum of 12 quarter credits or 8 semester credits of course work in an accredited institution of higher learning (college or university), of which (i) at least 6 quarter (4 semester) credits must be in specialized alcoholism courses, and (ii) the remaining 6 (4 semester) credits may be in either such courses or in counseling, psychology, sociology, or social work.
- (c) Specialist II—A qualified alcoholism counselor, Specialist II, shall possess these qualifications:

Education and experience, as described in Option A or Option B:

Option A:

- (i) A bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university; and
- (ii) A minimum of 12 quarter (8 semester) credits of specialized alcoholism courses in an accredited college or university, exclusive of field experience; and
- (iii) Two thousand hours (approximately one year) of supervised work experience in a counseling capacity, in an approved alcoholism agency or facility. (May include hours spent in supervised field experience under academic supervision.)

Option B:

- (i) Qualified as an alcoholism counselor, Specialist I, and, thereafter;
- (ii) Two years of successful full-time experience with duties comparable to those of an Alcoholism Counselor, Specialist I, in an approved alcoholism facility; and
- (iii) A minimum of 12 quarter (8 semester) credits in specialized alcoholism courses, which may include those under (b)(iii)(i) of this subsection for Alcoholism Counselor, Specialist I.
- (d) Complete the following education every two years of employment:
- (i) A minimum of 3 quarter (2 semester) credits, granted by a college or university, in subject areas that will increase the counselor's knowledge and skills in counseling and aiding the alcoholic to recover; and
- (ii) A minimum of two short courses, retreats, or workshops directly relating to alcoholism or alcoholism and other drug dependences. Inservice training does not satisfy this requirement.

- (c) Meet the knowledge and competence requirements in the document "Guidelines for Qualifications of Alcoholism Counselors" published by the office on alcoholism:
- (f) If a counselor is certified as an alcoholism counselor by the Alcoholism Certification Board of the Alcoholism Professional Staff Society of Washington State or the Northwest Indian Alcoholism Drug Specialists Certification Board, it is presumed that he/she is a qualified alcoholism counselor so long as these certification boards maintain standards of practice that equal or exceed guidelines published by the office on alcoholism.)) a person who has adequate education, experience and knowledge regarding the nature and treatment of alcoholism, is knowledgeable about community resources which provide services alcoholics may need, knows and understands the principles and techniques of alcoholism counseling and is skilled in the application of these principles and techniques. A qualified alcoholism counselor shall:
- (a) Have no history of alcohol or other drug misuse for a period of two years immediately prior to the time of employment as an alcoholism counselor, and no misuse of alcohol or other drugs while employed as an alcoholism counselor.
 - (b) Possess these professional attributes:
- (i) Show evidence of a genuine interest in helping alcoholic persons, and of dedication to helping them help themselves as much as possible.
- (ii) The ability to maintain confidentiality of all records, materials, and communications concerning the identity of clients.
- (iii) The ability to work under supervision and to cooperate with other personnel, as well as to function effectively on one's own.
- (iv) The ability to assess one's own personal and vocational strengths and limitations, biases, and effectiveness.
- (v) The ability and willingness to recognize when it is in the client's best interest to refer or release him to another individual or program.
- (vi) Show responsibility for self-evaluation and continued growth through further education or training.
- (vii) Show respect for the client by avoidance of any intrusion into the client's personal life outside of a professional relationship.
- (viii) Show respect for rights and reputation of other alcoholism workers and workers of other professions.
- (ix) Show no discrimination among clients or professionals on the basis of race, color, creed, sex or age.

(c) Possess these qualifications:

(i) A high school diploma or equivalent.

(ii) Satisfactory completion of a minimum twelve quarter credits or eight semester credits of course work in an accredited institution of higher learning (college or university), of which (A) at least six quarter (four semester) credits must be specialized alcoholism courses, and (B) the remaining six (four semester) may be in either such courses or counseling, psychology, sociology, or social work.

NOTE: Effective January 1, 1984, this requirement, (ii), shall change to read: "Satisfactory completion of a minimum of twenty-four quarter (sixteen semester) credits, of course working in an accredited institution of higher learning (college or university) of which twelve quarter (eight semester) credits must be specialized alcoholism courses exclusive of field experience credit, and which must include distinct courses in: (A) Introduction To, or Survey of Alcoholism, (B) Physiological Actions of Alcohol and Other Drugs, and (C) Alcoholism Counseling. The remaining twelve quarter (eight semester) credits may be in alcoholism, multi-drug abuse, counseling, psychology, social work, human services, or social services."

Grandfather Clause

Persons who are qualified alcoholism counselors prior to January 1, 1984 will not be required to meet these new education standards.

(iii) Two thousand hours (approximately one year) of supervised work experience, in a counseling capacity, in an approved alcoholism agency or facility (may include hours spent in supervised field experience under academic supervision).

(d) Possess adequate knowledge and competence in the following areas:

(i) Communications:

- (A) Demonstrated communication skills in writing and speaking.
- (B) Demonstrated ability to maintain clinical records and write reports.
- (C) Demonstrated ability to establish communication readily with incoming referrals in order to evaluate, screen and record pertinent information.

(ii) Knowledge of alcoholism:

- (A) Physiological, e.g., ingestion, absorption, metabolism, effects of alcohol blood level, organic damage, acute alcoholism, long-range management of the illness.
- (B) Psychological, e.g., dependency, patterns of progression (denial, projection, rationalization collapse), psychiatric complications, patterns of recovery, personal and social reconstruction.
- (C) Social/cultural, e.g., history of alcohol use and abuse, family ramifications, value system of subcultures, spiritual, industrial, and legal aspects, including new legislation.

(iii) Evaluation and assessment:

- (A) A thorough knowledge of symptoms of alcoholism—early, middle, and late stages.
- (B) Strategies for assessing the individual in regard to the degree of alcoholism.
- (C) Ability to recognize other medical/behavioral problems.

(D) Case history method.

(E) Ability to assess the effectiveness of various treatment and program modalities.

(iv) Referral:

(A) Knowledge of appropriate referral resources, their eligibility requirements, treatment philosophy, admission and contact procedures.

(B) Skill in evaluating a client's problem, reporting it to him/her at the client's level of understanding, and making a referral to a suitable program. This includes ability to work with persons, groups, or agencies with different treatment philosophies.

(C) Ability to assist clients and families with alcoholrelated problems, with referrals for public assistance, medical or health needs, pastoral counseling, etc.

- (D) Demonstrate exposure to Alcoholics Anonymous, Alanon, and/or Alateen, as well as other community programs, through direct contact.
 - (v) Counseling principles and procedures, including:

(A) Crisis intervention.

(B) Establishing a working relationship with a variety of clients.

(C) Establishing treatment goals.

- (D) Use of techniques designed to educate the client regarding alcoholism, illicit feelings, facilitate self-understanding in the client, and motivate the client for treatment.
- (E) Knowledge of different counseling philosophies and theories.
- (F) Skill in individual and group counseling appropriate to alcoholism.

(G) Appropriate termination of session.

(H) An understanding and adherence to the ethics of counseling.

(vi) Treatment:

- (A) A knowledge of various inpatient and outpatient methods and their rationale, their relation to other methods, and their limitations.
- (B) Skill in managing the transition between detoxification and treatment, and the transition between intensive treatment and rehabilitation.
- (C) Understanding of the steps and traditions of Alcoholics Anonymous, Alanon, and Alateen, their relations to various treatments, and their functions and limitations.
- (D) Knowledge of long-range rehabilitative processes, including awareness of the need for medical care, post-treatment crisis, relapse, and new problems arising from sobriety.

(e) Maintain the qualified counselor status by completing the following requirements within each two years of service.

(i) Sixty clock hours of continuing education, including at least fifteen clock hours in which alcoholism or counseling alcoholic people or families is the primary part of the course content, as evidenced by the course description and/or syllabus. The remaining forty-five clock hours may be in subject areas that will increase the counselor's knowledge and skills in counseling and aiding the alcoholic person or family to recover.

(ii) For any portion of these sixty clock hours of continuing education, college credit-bearing courses will have the value of one and one-half, i.e., one college credit contact hour will equal one and one-half hours of

continuing education.

(iii) No course or workshop previously taken may be repeated to meet these requirements.

- (iv) An acceptable workshop must be conducted by an instructor who is either qualified as an Alcoholism Counselor or has state approval as a trainer.
- (v) In-service training does not satisfy this requirement, but short-courses, retreats, or workshops which meet the above conditions may be used.
- (((30))) (21) "Residential facilities" means facilities that provide board and room as part of their treatment program.
- (((31))) (22) "Revoke" means a permanent invalidation of the approval of an alcoholism treatment facility.
- (((32))) (23) "Secretary" means the secretary of the Washington state department of social and health services or his/her designee.
- (((33))) (24) "Shall" means compliance is mandatory. ((34) "Should" means compliance is suggested or recommended but is not required.
- (35))) (25) "((Social setting)) Sub-acute detoxification" ((is)) means detoxification service provided to individuals in a supportive, homelike environment within which a person can recover from the effects of intoxication. Prescription medication is not provided for the management of withdrawal discomfort.
- (((36))) (26) "Substantial compliance" means being in conformity with the requirements of the major components of each section of chapter 275-19 WAC which applies to the class or classes of alcoholism treatment services for which an alcoholism treatment facility is approved or has applied for approval.
- (((37))) (27) "Suspend" means invalidation of the approval of an alcoholism treatment facility for any period less than one calendar year or until the agency is notified of reinstatement.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1486, filed 2/1/80)

WAC 275-19-040 DEPARTMENT APPROVAL AND ACCREDITING PROCEDURES. (1) Alcoholism treatment facilities seeking department approval of one or more of the services listed in WAC 275-19-020 shall submit written application to the ((chief of the)) office on alcoholism ((of the department)) on a form provided by the office ((on alcoholism)).

(a) Such application shall document the need for the requested services and evidence that the agency meets the requirements of these rules and regulations.

- (b) The applicant shall send a copy of the application to the county alcoholism administrative board in each county where services are to be provided. The county alcoholism administrative board may review the application and send written comments to the office on alcoholism with a copy to the applicant. County administrative board comments should address the issue of the county's need for this new service. If the office on alcoholism does not receive a response from the county alcoholism administrative board within a sixty-day period, the office shall proceed in processing the application without said response.
- (c) After processing the application, the office shall send written notification of approval or denial of approval to the applicant with a copy to the county alcoholism administrative board.

- (2) ((Such application shall include a detailed description of the facility, personnel and programs to be provided.
 - (3) The application shall be supported by:
- (a) A letter from the applicant, including supporting information and statistics, showing that there is a need in the county for the type of facility services requested in the application.
- (b) If applicable, evidence that the facility has met the certificate of need rules and regulations as required by chapter 248-19 WAC.
- (4) (a) The applicant shall send a written notice to the county alcoholism administrative board in each county where services are to be provided giving the date of the application and the classes of service for which approval is being requested. A copy of the notice shall be submitted to the office on alcoholism.
- (b) The county alcoholism administrative board may respond in writing, and within sixty days of receipt of the notice of the application, to the office on alcoholism giving their recommendation on the application and documenting the need, or lack of need, for the additional alcoholism treatment services in the county. If the office on alcoholism does not receive a response from the county alcoholism administrative board within the sixtyday period, the office shall proceed in processing the application without said response.
- (5) Copies of all written documents required by these rules and regulations and not developed for the purpose of caring for or treating a particular client shall be submitted to the chief of the office on alcoholism or his/her designee for department review prior to inspection of a facility.
- (6) If written documents submitted to the department do not meet the requirements of these rules and regulations and/or do not validate the need for the services requested in the application, the office on alcoholism shall notify the applicant agency in writing. The applicant agency shall have thirty days to respond in writing to the contents of the notice. If a response is not received with thirty days, the chief of the office on alcoholism or his/her designee may refuse to grant approval and shall notify the applicant agency in writing of the action taken. If written documents submitted to the department do meet the requirements of these rules and regulations, the chief of the office on alcoholism or his/her designee shall have the facility inspected to ensure compliance with the requirements of these rules and regulations and chapter 70.96A RCW. After inspection the chief of the office on alcoholism or his/her designee shall either approve the facility to provide one or more of the services listed in WAC 275-19-020 or refuse to grant approval. The chief of the office on alcoholism or his/her designee shall send written notification of department approval of the facility as an approved alcoholism treatment facility or shall send written notification of the deficiencies which resulted in the refusal to grant approval.
- (7) The department may grant provisional approval to alcoholism treatment facilities when department staff are unable to determine without a period of operation whether the facility will comply with chapter 70.96A

RCW and these rules and regulations. Provisional approval shall expire automatically after six months and may not be renewed. Such expiration shall not be considered a suspension or revocation pursuant to WAC 275-19-050.

- (8) (a) The secretary or his/her designee may, at his/her discretion, exempt an alcoholism treatment facility from compliance with parts of these regulations when it has been found after thorough investigation and consideration that such exemption may be made in an individual case without jeopardizing the safety or health of the clients in the particular alcoholism treatment facility.
- (b) All exemptions granted pursuant to the foregoing provisions shall be reduced to writing and filed with the department of social and health services and the alcoholism treatment facility.
- (9) The chief of the office on alcoholism or his/her designee shall issue an annual certificate of approval to those approved alcoholism treatment facilities which remain in substantial compliance with these rules and regulations and chapter 70.96A RCW.)) The department may grant provisional approval to alcoholism treatment facilities when office on alcoholism staff are unable to determine whether the facility, without a period of operation, will comply with chapter 70.96A RCW and these rules and regulations. Provisional approval shall be granted for a maximum period of six months and may not be renewed.
- (3) If an approved alcoholism treatment facility plans to move its program to a different location, open a branch office or change ownership, it shall submit a written application to the office on alcoholism. Such application shall be submitted in accordance with WAC 275-19-040(1).
- (4) The secretary or his/her designee may, at his/her discretion, exempt an alcoholism treatment facility from compliance with parts of these regulations when it has been found, after thorough investigation and consideration, that such exemption may be made in an individual case without jeopardizing the safety or health of the clients in the particular alcoholism treatment facility.
- (5) All exemptions granted pursuant to the foregoing provisions shall be in writing and filed with the department and the alcoholism treatment facility.
- (6) The office on alcoholism shall issue a certificate of approval, valid for not more than two years, to those approved alcoholism treatment facilities which remain in substantial compliance with these rules and regulations and chapter 70.96A RCW. This certificate shall be framed and displayed in a conspicuous place in the facility.
- (7) Fees shall be set and charged by the office on alcoholism for inspections and certification of each applicant organization. Such fees shall be reasonably based upon the cost to the office on alcoholism of the inspections and maintenance of certification and shall not exceed the actual costs. Only one such fee shall be charged to an agency during any twelve—month period, regardless of the number of inspections which may be made.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1486, filed 2/1/80)

WAC_275-19-060 INSPECTIONS. (((1))) Any approved public or private treatment facility and any facility seeking departmental approval shall be open to departmental inspection. The facility, its programs, ((including)) all individual and group counseling sessions ((with clients)) and general records of operation((;)) shall be open for inspection in accordance with federal and state confidentiality laws ((by the department upon request)). Such records shall include all policy and procedure documents required herein, personnel records, clinical records, fiscal records, meeting minutes and such other documents as may be needed to verify the provision of services and compliance with these regulations, and chapter 70.96A RCW. Department inspection may be made during any time in which the facility is serving clients, provided, that such inspection shall not unduly disrupt client activity. ((Inspections shall be reasonably calculated to check substantial compliance with these rules and regulations, and chapter 70.96A RCW.

(2) All facilities shall pay a fee of fifty dollars for an inspection. Only one such inspection fee shall be charged during any calendar year, regardless of the number of inspections which may be made.)) Inspection fees shall be set and charged in accordance with office on alcoholism policy. These fees shall not exceed the actual cost of the inspection.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1486, filed 2/1/80)

WAC 275-19-075 ALL FACILITIES—CLI-ENTS' RIGHTS. (((++))) All approved alcoholism treatment facilities shall take reasonable efforts to assure ((the right of)) each client ((to)):

(((a))) (1) Be treated in a manner that promotes dignity and self-respect.

(((b))) (2) Be treated without regard to race, color, creed, national origin, religion, sex, sexual preference, or age.

(((c))) (3) Be treated without regard to ((physical or mental)) disability unless such disability makes treatment afforded by the facility nonbeneficial or hazardous. Reasonable actions shall be taken to accommodate disabled persons within the treatment program.

(((d))) (4) Be protected from invasion of privacy: PROVIDED, That, reasonable searches may be conducted to detect and prevent contraband from being brought in or possessed on the premises.

- (((c))) (5) Have all clinical and personal information treated confidentially in communications with individuals not directly associated with the approved alcoholism treatment center.
- (((f))) (6) Review his or her own treatment record with a treatment staff person upon request.
- (((g))) (7) Be fully informed regarding fees to be charged and methods of payment available.
- (((th))) (8) Be provided reasonable opportunity to practice the religion of his or her choice, alone and in private, insofar as such religious practice does not infringe on the rights and treatment of others, or the

treatment program. The client also has the right to be excused from any religious practice.

(((i))) (9) Not be denied communication with significant others in emergency situations.

(((i))) (10) Not be subjected by facility staff to physical abuse, corporal punishment, or other forms of abuse administered against their will including being denied food, clothing or other basic necessities.

(((2) Policies and procedures for the review of client grievances regarding these rights and agency decisions affecting the client's welfare or status as a client shall be adopted and adhered to.))

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1486, filed 2/1/80)

WAC 275-19-080 ALL FACILITIES—FACILITIES STANDARDS. (1) ((The building(s) provided by)) Alcoholism treatment facilities shall meet all applicable state and county requirements.

- (2) Room for group and subgroup activities will be provided.
- (3) There shall be private space for personal consultation.
- (((4) Medications shall be secured and dispersed in accordance with the requirements of chapter 248-22 WAC.))

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1486, filed 2/1/80)

WAC 275-19-110 ALL FACILITIES—GOV-ERNING BODY. (1) A facility providing alcoholism treatment services shall have ((an effective)) a governing body which is legally responsible for the conduct of the alcoholism service or services provided.

(2) ((A)) The governing body shall:

(a) Adopt bylaws which establish a mechanism for selection of officers and members of the governing body.

(b) Maintain a current job description for the position of administrator which delineates the qualifications for and the responsibilities of the position.

- (c) Establish the philosophy and overall objectives for the alcoholism treatment facility and each distinct part thereof.
- (((d) Adopt administrative policies which establish the mechanism for delegation of responsibility and accountability for operation and maintenance of the alcoholism treatment facility.
- (e) Adopt policies for the care of clients in the facility and every distinct part thereof. These policies shall govern the admission of clients, the length of treatment, the type and scope of services provided to clients, and the transfer or discharge of clients, and shall provide for a continuing evaluation of the alcoholism treatment program(s).
- (f) Provide for the personnel, facilities, equipment, supplies and special services which are necessary to clients' needs for services and to maintain and operate the facility in accordance with applicable laws and regulations:
 - (g) Review and approve written personnel policies.

- (3) The bylaws, job description for the administrator, philosophy and objectives, administrative policies and policies regarding the care of clients shall be consistent with applicable federal and state laws and regulations. They shall be written, current, dated and signed by officers of the governing body, and readily available to all members of the governing body and other persons in accordance with their responsibilities or involvement in implementation.))
- (d) Provide for the personnel, facilities, equipment, and supplies necessary for the care of clients and the maintenance and operation of the facility in accordance with applicable laws and regulations.

(e) Review and approve written personnel policies.

(f) Ensure that the administration and operation of the facility is in compliance with all applicable federal, state, and local laws and regulations.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1486, filed 2/1/80)

WAC 275-19-130 ALL FACILITIES—ADMIN-ISTRATOR. (1) There shall be a chief administrator at least twenty-one years of age who is directly responsible for the operation of the alcoholism treatment facility.

- (2) The administrator shall possess the knowledge and skills in fiscal accounting, personnel management, and other administrative functions necessary to provide adequate supervision to the facility.
- (3) At any time the administrator is not on duty or on call, there shall be a person on duty or on call to whom the administrator has delegated the authority and responsibility to act in his/her stead. Any person to whom the administrator's authority and responsibility are delegated shall be a competent person at least twenty—one years of age who is not currently a client of the facility.
- (4) The administrator shall ((establish and maintain a current written plan of organization which includes all positions and delineates the function, responsibilities, authority, and relationships of all positions, including volunteers, within the alcoholism treatment facility)) ensure that there is a free-flow of managerial and clinical information to facilitate the delivery of services.
- (5) The administrator shall ensure that a written ((policies and procedures are)) program manual(s) is developed((, review)). This manual shall be reviewed and revised as necessary ((to keep them current. They shall be dated and signed by the administrator having responsibility for approval of the policies and procedures)), but no less than once each year. This annual review shall be evidenced by a cover sheet which notes the date of the last review and update and shall be signed by the person(s) making the review. The manual shall be readily available to the governing body and the staff of the facility. The program manual(s) shall include:
- (a) A plan of organization which includes all positions and delineates the functions, authority, and relationships of all positions, including volunteers, within the facility.
 - (b) Policies and procedures to govern the following:

(i) Personnel.

(ii) Care of clients in the facility and every distinct part thereof. These policies and procedures shall govern

the screening and admission of clients, the type and scope of services, the length of treatment, the transfer or discharge of clients and the continuing evaluation of the program.

(iii) Client's rights and client grievances. A copy of these documents shall be posted in a conspicuous place

in the facility.

(iv) Case file management.

- (v) Implementation of the federal confidentiality of alcohol and drug abuse patient records regulations (42 CFR part 2).
- (vi) Provision of client transportation in accordance with RCW 70.96A.110(4).
- (vii) Coordination with ancillary services which include hospital, medical, and psychological back-up services.
- (c) A written description of each modality of treatment within the treatment program. These descriptions shall include a current outline for all educational sessions.
- (d) A copy of the organization's bylaws as required by WAC 275-19-110(2)(a).
- (e) A copy of the philosophy and overall objectives of the organization as required by WAC 275-19-110(2)(c).
- (6) The administrator shall ensure that a fiscal accounting system is developed which reflects the fiscal experience and current financial position of the facility.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1486, filed 2/1/80)

- WAC 275-19-140 ALL FACILITIES—PER-SONNEL. (1) There shall be sufficient qualified alcoholism counselors, clerical, and other support staff who are not of the present client population, to ensure the attainment of program service objectives and properly maintain the alcoholism treatment facility. This shall not preclude the assignment of work to a client when the assignment is part of the client's treatment program, the client's work assignment has therapeutic value, and the client works under the immediate supervision of a member of the staff.
- (a) Personnel employed as alcoholism counselors shall be qualified alcoholism counselors as defined in WAC 275-19-030((;)), or there shall be an individualized training and educational plan developed for any person employed as an alcoholism counselor who is not a qualified alcoholism counselor as defined in WAC 275-19-030. This training and educational plan shall be designed to bring the individual up to the required standards within two years from the date of employment as an alcoholism counselor. This plan shall be placed in the individual's personnel file.
- (b) Counselor trainees and counselor aides working in counselor staff roles shall have no history of alcohol or other drug misuse for a period of one year immediately prior to the time of employment and no misuse of alcohol or other drugs while employed or in training.
- (2) All noncounselor staff members who, as part of their job assignment, have frequent contact with clients and the public shall have adequate training regarding alcoholism and alcohol abuse.

- (((3) There shall be a written job description for each position classification within the facility.
- (a) Each job description shall include: The job title, the definition of the position, the title of the immediate supervisor, a summary of the duties and responsibilities and the minimum qualifications.
- (b) Qualifications listed in a job description shall include the education, training, experience, knowledge and special abilities required for the position.
- (c) The appropriate job description shall be explained to each employee, and shall be used thereafter as one of the means for evaluating the individual's performance.
- (d) The job descriptions shall be dated and shall be reviewed and revised so they are kept current.
- (4) There shall be an education program which affords each employee opportunity to develop the competencies needed to perform the duties and responsibilities assigned to him or her.
- (a) A planned, supervised, orientation shall be provided to each new employee to acquaint him or her with the organization of the facility, physical plant layout, his or her particular duties and responsibilities, the policies, procedures, and equipment which are pertinent to his or her work and the disaster plan for the facility.
- (b) A planned training program shall be provided to any employee who has not been prepared for his or her job responsibilities through completion of a formal education program.
- (c) A record shall be maintained of the orientation, on—the—job training, and continuing education received by the employee. The data contained in this record shall be sufficient to allow determination whether or not the employee has received training or education necessary for the performance of his or her functions.
- (5) Each employee shall have a tuberculin test upon employment and thereafter in accordance with the guidelines laid out in chapter 248-22 WAC.
- (6) Employees with a communicable disease in an infectious stage shall not be on duty.
- (7) For each employee there shall be a current personnel record which includes the following:
- (a) An application form, which includes or is supplemented by a resume indicating the employee's education, training, and work experience.
- (b) Verification of the employee's professional, technical, or vocational education or training.
- (c) A copy of the employee's current job description which has been signed and dated by the employee:
- (d) A copy of a current and valid license, certificate, or permit for any employee for whom a license, certificate or permit is required.
- (e) Written performance evaluations for the initial six months of employment and for each year of employment thereafter. The completed evaluation form shall be signed and dated by the evaluator and the employee.
- (f) Evidence of adequate health supervision including a record of tuberculin skin tests or chest X-rays, and accidents occurring on duty.
- (g) A copy of the employee's individualized training and education plan.

- (h) A current record of all training and education which the employee has completed since the date of employment:
- (i) An assurance of confidentiality statement which has been signed and dated by the employee:))
- (3) For each employee there shall be a current personnel file which includes the following:
- (a) An application which includes or is supplemented by a resume and verification (transcripts, certificates, licenses, etc.) that documents the employee's qualifications for the assigned position.
- (b) A copy of the employee's current job description, signed and dated by the employee, which includes: The job title, a summary of the duties and responsibilities, the minimum qualifications, and the title of the immediate supervisor.
- (c) A record of a planned, supervised, orientation acquainting the person with the organization of the facility, the physical plant layout, his or her particular duties and responsibilities, the policies, procedures and equipment which are pertinent to his or her work, the staff ethical standards, and the disaster plan for the facility.
- (d) Written performance evaluations for the initial six months of employment and for each year of employment thereafter. The completed evaluation form shall be signed and dated by the evaluator and the employee.
- (e) Evidence of a tuberculin skin test or chest x-ray, and a record of any accidents occurring on duty.
- (f) A current record of all training and education which the employee has completed since the date of employment. There shall be sufficient evidence in the counselors records to determine whether or not the counselor has received the training and education necessary to maintain the qualified status required by WAC 275-19-030.
- (g) An assurance of confidentiality certification which has been signed and dated by the employee.
- (4) Employees with a communicable disease in an infectious stage shall not be on duty.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1486, filed 2/1/80)

- WAC 275-19-160 ALL FACILITIES—VOLUNTEERS. (1) Volunteers ((may be used in an alcoholism treatment facility as a staff supplement where their participation is positive and productive in relation to the treatment philosophy. They shall show a strong commitment to the philosophy of the program and meet certain criteria in terms of understanding, dependability and attitude)) working in counselor staff roles shall be directly supervised by a qualified alcoholism counselor.
- (2) Volunteers working in ((treatment)) counselor staff roles (counselors, counselor aides, co-therapists, etc.) ((should)) shall have at least one year of continuous freedom from the abuse of alcohol or other substances.
- (3) ((There shall be a brief but comprehensive orientation program for all volunteers.)) Programs using volunteers shall have a written plan describing how volunteers will be utilized and a written job description for each position filled by a volunteer.

- (4) ((Programs using volunteers shall have a written plan describing how volunteers will be utilized and a written work description for each position fill by a volunteer.)) Each volunteer shall sign an assurance of confidentiality certification which shall be kept on file by the agency.
- (((5) Volunteers working in treatment staff roles shall be directly supervised by a qualified alcoholism counselor.))

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1486, filed 2/1/80)

- WAC 275-19-170 ALL FACILITIES—RE-CORDS. (1) All alcoholism treatment facilities shall have an accurate and complete record system which:
- (a) Provides for maintenance of a current and complete record for each client.
- (b) Provides a systematic method of identifying and filing client's records so each record can be located readily.
- (c) Ensures confidentiality of patients' case records by storing and handling them under conditions which meet all pertinent federal, state, and local regulations governing such records.
 - (d) Includes all required state and county data.
- (e) Reflect all financial transactions of the facility. The accounting system shall meet all federal, state, and county requirements.
- (2) Client file records required in this section shall be retained by the treatment facility for a minimum of five years following the discharge or transfer of the client.

Clinical records still subject to minimum retention requirements, where client consent is not obtained, shall be sealed and labeled as follows: "Records of (insert name of approved alcoholism treatment facility) required to be maintained pursuant to WAC 275-19-170, until a date not later than December 31, (insert year)." Sealed records shall be forwarded to the department, and shall be disclosed only under such circumstances and to such extent as would be permissible for the program in which they originated. The department shall destroy the records as soon as possible after the date specified on the label.

- (3) Residential <u>and outpatient</u> facilities shall have individual case records which include <u>the following</u>:
- (((a) Identifying sociological data including the client's full name, sex, birthdate, social security number, and home address.
 - (b) Date of admission.
- (c) The name, address, and telephone number of the client's next of kin or other responsible person.
- (d) The name, address, and telephone number of the client's personal physician, if any.
- (e) A record of the evaluation and assessment of each client's involvement with alcohol.
 - (f) A record of observations of the client's condition.
- (g) Progress notes on response to care and treatment which relate to the treatment plan and note all significant events during treatment.

- (h) A record of a client's signed voluntary admission and consent to care and treatment or a commitment record:
- (i) At completion of treatment, a discharge summary which includes the date of discharge, and a summary of the client's progress in meeting the goals and objectives in the treatment plan.
- (j) A properly completed authorization for release of information form, which meets all federal and state requirements, for each disclosure of information concerning the client:
- (k) Each entry in a client's record shall be dated and shall be authenticated by the signature of the person making the entry.
- (4) Outpatient treatment facilities shall have individualized case records which include the following:
- (a) Identifying sociological data including the client's full name, sex, birthdate, social security number, and home address:
 - (b) The date the client entered treatment.
- (c) The name, address and telephone number of the client's next of kin or other responsible person.
- (d) The name, address, and telephone number of the client's personal physician, if any.
- (e) A record of the evaluation and assessment of the clients' involvement with alcohol.
- (f) Progress notes on the client's response to treatment which relate to the treatment plan and note all significant events during treatment.
 - (g) The client's voluntary signed consent to treatment.
- (h) A record of referral or transfer which shall include the date and place of said referral or transfer.
- (i) At completion of treatment, a discharge summary which includes the date of discharge, and a summary of the client's progress in meeting the goals and objectives in the treatment plan.
- (j) Each entry in a client's record shall be dated and shall be authenticated by the signature of the person making the entry.
- (k) A properly completed authorization for release of information form, which meets all federal and state requirements, for each disclosure of information concerning the client.))
- (a) An intake form which includes the client's full name; sex; birthdate; home address; date of admission; name, address, and telephone number of the client's next of kin or other responsible person; name and city of the client's personal physician, if any.
- (b) A record of the evaluation and assessment (diagnostic impression) of the client's involvement with alcohol.
- (c) An individualized treatment plan designed to help the person understand his or her alcohol problem which takes into account all case history and diagnostic information. The plan shall include the specific problems to be addressed, the objectives to be accomplished in treating the problems and the time-linked means to be used in achieving the objectives.
- (d) Progress notes on the client's response to treatment which relate to the treatment plan and note all significant events during treatment.

- (e) Each entry in a client's record shall be dated and shall be signed by the person making the entry.
 - (f) The client's signed voluntary consent to treatment.
- (g) A properly completed authorization for release of information form, which meets all federal and state requirements, for each disclosure of information.
- (h) At completion of treatment, a discharge summary which includes the date of discharge, and a summary of the client's progress in meeting the objectives outlined in the treatment plan.
- (i) Medical records in accordance with chapter 248–22 WAC.
- (((5))) (4) Information and referral facilities shall have individual case records which include:
- (a) Identifying sociological data including the client's full name, sex, birthdate, ((social security number,)) and home address.
 - (b) The date of contact(s).
 - (c) A record of the client's problem statement.
- (d) A record of the ((client's problem assessment)) evaluation and assessment (diagnostic impression).
 - (e) A record of any referral.
- (f) A properly completed authorization for release of information form, which meets all federal and state requirements, for each disclosure of information concerning the client.
- (g) Each entry in a client's record shall be dated and ((shall be authenticated)) signed by ((the signature of)) the person making the entry.
- (((6))) (5) Alcohol information schools shall have individual case records which include:
- (a) Identifying sociological data including the client's full name, sex, birthdate, ((social security number,)) and home address.
 - (b) Dates in attendance.
 - (c) Source of referral.
- (d) A record of the assessment of the client's involvement with alcohol.
 - (e) A record of any referral.
- (f) A properly completed authorization for release of information form, which meets all federal and state requirements, for each disclosure of information concerning the client.
- (g) Each entry in a client's record shall be dated and ((shall be authenticated)) signed by the ((signature of the)) person making the entry.
- (((7))) (6) Emergency service patrols shall maintain a log which includes:
 - (a) The time and origin of the call received.
 - (b) The time of arrival at the scene.
 - (c) The location of the pickup.
- (d) The name((;)) and sex ((and the race)) of the person transported.
- (e) The destination of transport (either home or detox facility).
 - (f) The time of transport completion.
- (g) In nonpickup cases, notation shall be made of the reason why said pickup was not made.
- (h) Each entry in the log shall be dated ((and shall be authenticated)) signed by the ((signature of the)) person making the entry.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1486, filed 2/1/80)

WAC 275-19-180 RESIDENTIAL AND OUT-PATIENT FACILITIES—CASE MANAGEMENT.
(1) ((For each client there shall be a case manager who will be responsible for completeness of records and documentation of progress toward an attainment of the treatment objectives.

(2))) The treatment rationale shall be designed to achieve total abstinence for all diagnosed alcoholics.

- (2) Concurrent drug abuse patterns or tendencies toward other drug abuse shall be explored with each client. The client shall be warned of the danger of mixing drugs and alcohol and be warned of the tendency to cross-addiction.
- (3) Medications shall be secured and disbursed in accordance with the requirements of chapter 248-22 WAC. In addition, any treatment that includes the use of disulfiram shall be directly supervised by a qualified alcoholism counselor.
- (4) For each client there shall be a case manager who will be responsible for completeness of records and documentation of progress toward an attainment of the treatment objectives.

(5) Case managers shall be:

- (a) Qualified alcoholism counselors in all intensive inpatient, long-term treatment, recovery house, and outpatient facilities.
- (b) Qualified alcoholism counselors or licensed nurses in detoxification facilities.
- (((3) The treatment rationale will be designed to achieve total abstinence for all diagnosed alcoholics.
- (4) For each client, there shall be an individualized treatment plan which is designed to help the person understand and overcome his or her illness and which takes into account the person's current health status; any medical treatment prescribed; and the client's physical, mental, emotional, and social needs. The client shall be encouraged to participate in developing the treatment plan to the extent he or she is able. The plan shall establish specific, time—linked treatment objectives leading toward a responsible, independent life style and the termination of services.
- (5))) (6) The case manager shall review each active case in his or her caseload regularly to ensure that the treatment plan is valid and that there is movement toward treatment goals. This review shall be evidenced in the individual case files by a progress note. Case managers shall review each active case at least:
- (a) ((Case managers in detoxification facilities shall review each active case at least once daily:
- (b) Case managers in intensive inpatient facilities shall review each active case at least once each week:
- (c) Case managers in long-term, recovery house and outpatient alcoholism treatment facilities shall review each active case at least once each month.
 - (d))) Once each shift in detoxification facilities.
 - (b) Once each week in intensive inpatient facilities.
- (c) Once each month in long term, recovery house and outpatient alcoholism treatment facilities.

- (7) Case managers shall be responsible to follow up on clients who have missed appointments and to pursue all opportunities to keep the client in treatment. In the event a client, who has been court ordered to a treatment program aborts the treatment program, that fact shall be promptly reported to the committing authority.
- (((6) Concurrent drug abuse patterns or tendencies toward other drug abuse shall be explored in each client. The client shall be warned of the danger of mixing drugs and alcohol, and be warned of the tendency to cross-addiction.
- (7) Support services to help modify the client's life style might include but are not limited to the following:
 - (a) Alcoholics Anonymous affiliation;
- (b) Psychological or psychiatric guidance and/or counseling;
 - (c) Special programs for specific or minority groups;
 - (d) Occupational therapy;
 - (e) Vocational rehabilitation;
 - (f) Recreational therapy and vocational development;
 - (g) Spiritual/philosophical counseling and guidance;
 - (h) Activity/socialization programs.
- (8) Medical backup procedures should be available to provide:
- (a) Hospital services to meet life-threatening situations to clients;
 - (b) Consultation for a nonmedical staff;
 - (c) Psychiatric and/or psychological consultation.
- (9) Any treatment that includes Antabuse shall be supervised by a qualified alcoholism counselor and shall meet the requirements for the self-administration of drugs as required in chapter 248-22 WAC unless administered by a licensed nurse acting under a physician's orders.))
- (8) Upon completion of the course of treatment, the client shall be counseled to establish contact with such services or agencies as the staff has determined will assist in maintaining sobriety. The client shall be assisted in identifying and making contact with any agencies as may be necessary. If the facility is discharging a client to another agency for after care services, a copy of the discharge summary shall be forwarded, with the client's permission, to the said agency.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1486, filed 2/1/80)

WAC 275-19-190 TREATMENT REGISTER—RESIDENTIAL FACILITIES. All residential treatment facilities shall have a permanent, current register of all persons admitted for care or treatment. This shall include ((the following data for each person)) at a minimum: The date of admission, full name, ((address,)) and the date of discharge or transfer((, and the name and address of the place to which discharged or transferred)). Data on clients shall be entered into the register in chronological order according to the date and time of admission. When an alcoholism treatment facility provides more than one category of alcoholism treatment service, there shall be a separate register for each distinct part of the facility.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1486, filed 2/1/80)

WAC 275-19-210 ALL DETOXIFICATION SERVICES—CLIENTS. (1) Admission of clients to an alcoholism detoxification facility shall be limited to persons who need detoxification services and do not manifest signs and symptoms of a condition which warrants ((acute care and)) treatment in a hospital.

(2) ((Detoxification services shall be provided by approved public treatment facilities providing detoxification))

Public detoxification facilities shall provide services to all incapacitated persons unless uncontrollable because of violent behavior.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1486, filed 2/1/80)

WAC 275-19-220 ALL DETOXIFICATION SERVICES—GENERAL. There shall be an organized treatment program and staff which shall provide the following services:

- (1) Screening of each person prior to admission to determine whether he or she manifests signs or symptoms of serious illnesses or severe trauma which warrant ((acute care and)) treatment in a hospital and whether he or she needs detoxification.
 - (2) Detoxification of intoxicated persons.
 - (3) Counseling of alcoholics regarding their illness.
- (4) Referral of detoxified alcoholics to other appropriate alcoholism treatment programs.
- (((5) Adequate transportation to clients to meet the requirements of RCW 70.96A.110(4).))

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1486, filed 2/1/80)

WAC 275-19-230 ALL DETOXIFICATION SERVICES—ADMISSION SCREENING. ((There shall be policies and procedures covering the screening of persons prior to admission. There shall be designed to insure that any screening is done)) All clients shall by screened prior to admittance by a person who is knowledgeable about alcoholism, skilled in observation and in eliciting information pertinent to assessment of a health problem, and competent to recognize significant signs and symptoms of illness or trauma.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1486, filed 2/1/80)

WAC 275-19-270 ((MODIFIED MEDICAL))
ACUTE DETOXIFICATION—ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS. Any alcoholism treatment facility
which provides ((modified medical)) acute detoxification
services shall comply with the following additional
requirements:

(1) The client's physical and health care needs shall be met by practices that meet the standards set forth in chapter 248-22 WAC. The facility may provide juices, snack foods, and other like foods capable of being ingested by a person undergoing detoxification in lieu of formal menus as specified in chapter 248-22 WAC.

(2) All personnel other than physicians and licensed nurses who are providing client care in the absence of licensed physicians or nurses in the facility shall possess a valid and current red cross card or certificate for first aid, and cardiopulmonary resuscitation or the equivalent.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1486, filed 2/1/80)

WAC 275-19-280 ((SOCIAL SETTING)) SUB-ACUTE DETOXIFICATION—ADDITIONAL RE-QUIREMENTS. Alcoholism treatment facilities which provide ((social setting)) sub-acute detoxification services shall comply with the following additional requirements:

- (1) ((The physical plant and equipment of social)) Sub-acute detoxification facilities shall meet the requirements set forth in chapter 248-22 WAC.
- (2) No more than twenty clients shall be served in any one facility.
- (3) The facility shall be located within five miles driving distance of a hospital or shall have physician trained mobile intensive care paramedic services as defined in chapter ((248-19)) 248-15 WAC available within ten minutes.
- (4) ((The facility shall be located in an area which is properly drained and is served by a street which is usable under all weather conditions.
- (5) Each client shall be provided equipment, supplies and assistance he or she needs to maintain his or her personal comfort, cleanliness and grooming. Each client shall be provided at least one comfortable pillow and adequate, lightweight warm bedding, clean bed linen, towels and washcloths.
- (6) There shall be a physician who serves as a medical consultant to the facility.
- (7) The facility shall have written policies and procedures for the following areas of client care. These policies and procedures shall be approved by the consulting physician:
 - (a) Client screening.
 - (b) Client care and observation.
 - (c) Referral to medical evaluation.
- (d) Transfer of clients to a modified medical detoxification services (if available):
 - (e) Transfer of clients to a hospital.
- (8) The facility shall have in effect written agreements with the following:
- (a) A modified medical detoxification facility if one exists in the community. The agreement shall assure that clients in need of modified medical detoxification services will be admitted;
- (b) One or more hospitals within the five-mile limitation. The agreement shall assure that a person will be received at the hospital for a medical evaluation and/or admitted to the hospital when the individual's condition necessitates acute care and treatment.
- (9))) Prescription medication shall not be provided for management of withdrawal discomfort ((in a social detoxification facility)).
- (((10))) (5) If a client admitted to the facility has in his/her possession any prescription medications, the staff shall attempt to contact the prescribing physician to

check on the accuracy of the prescription, its usage and document the attempts in the client file.

- (((11) All prescription medications shall be dispersed by the self-administration method. Self-administration of medications by a client shall be in accord with the following:
- (a) The client shall be physically and mentally capable of administering his or her own drug properly.
- (b) Any legend drug which a client has for self-administration shall have been prescribed for the client by a physician or other legal authorized practitioner acting within the scope of his license and shall have been dispensed in a legibly and securely labeled container by a pharmacist.
- (c) Prescription drugs, over—the—counter drugs purchased independently by the client and other medicine or materials used by a client shall be relinquished to the staff and shall be kept in individually keyed and locked storage units (e.g., drawers, medicine cabinets, compartments). Access to and use of such drugs and materials shall be restricted to the particular client for self—administration. All such individual—locked storage units shall be in a central location where personnel can maintain surveillance over the client's self—administration of drugs:
- (d) Any medications retained for the client shall be released to the person upon discharge. A receipt shall be secured for all medications released to the client. Any medications left at the facility by the client shall be given to the consulting physician for destruction.
- (12) The facilities shall have a disaster plan which meets the requirements of chapter 248-22 WAC.
- (13) The facility shall have policies and procedures governing safety measures which meet the requirements of chapter 248-22 WAC.
- (14) A client's next of kin, legal guardian or other person or agency responsible for the client shall be notified as rapidly as possible should a serious change in the client's condition, transfer of a client to a hospital or death of the client occur.
- (15) The facility shall have a current schedule of names and telephone numbers posted at the facility's telephone through which the following can be contacted rapidly in case of an emergency.
- (a) Emergency medical service (Medic I, or its equivalent if one exists).
 - (b) Ambulance service.
 - (c) Hospital emergency room.
 - (d) Police and fire departments.
 - (e) Facility administrator or his/her designee.
- (16)) (6) All personnel providing client care shall have completed, prior to employment, ((the)) standard ((Red Cross)) first aid class and a class on cardio-pulmonary resuscitation ((or its equivalency, and shall complete within six months of their employment the advanced Red Cross first aid class or its equivalent)).

All personnel providing client care shall have completed a minimum of forty hours of classroom training in alcoholism prior to ((employment)) or within six months of the date of employment.

- (((17))) (7) All furnishings and the general decor shall reflect a home-like environment. Each of the following areas shall be provided and structured as stated:
- (a) The dining area shall have provisions for familytype eating arrangements.
- (b) ((The kitchen shall be capable of providing nutrition at all times and three thousand calories per day for each resident. A kitchen should be essentially similar to what is found in a home setting. At a minimum, it must allow for preparation of snacks, soup and sandwiches, decaffeinated coffee, and juice. The fixtures should include a refrigerator, stove, freezer, storage facilities, sink and dishwasher. All fixtures must be in good working order:
- (c) The washroom shall include shower facilities, toilets, and sinks. All must be in good working order. Curtains should be used rather than doors for showers. There shall be no locks.
- (d))) Sleeping areas shall be ((structured)) arranged so as to permit observation of residents and encourage resident communication.
- (((e))) (c) A lounge shall have adequate space for relaxation, group discussion, and peer group interaction.
- (((f))) (d) The reception area shall be separate from living areas in order to maintain the comfort and privacy of residents. There shall be a client reception desk and a comfortable chair for use by those seeking ((admission)) entry.
- (((g) There shall be an area designated as the counseling area. This area shall be available to those desiring private discussion or counsel.
- (h) There shall be a telephone available for use by residents.
- (i) Laundry facilities shall include a washer, dryer; ironing board, and iron. All must be in good working order.
- (j) There shall be a storage area adequate for storage of housekeeping equipment and supplies.
- (k) A safekeeping cabinet shall be available for storage for resident valuables. The key to this cabinet shall be available to staff but not to residents.))

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1486, filed 2/1/80)

WAC 275-19-320 INTENSIVE INPATIENT TREATMENT FACILITIES—REQUIRED SERVICES. There shall be an organized ((alcoholism intensive inpatient)) treatment program and staff ((which)) sufficient to provide the following services:

- (1) Education of clients regarding alcohol and alcoholism;
 - (2) Intensive individual and group counseling;
 - (3) Social and recreational activities;
- (4) Discharge and referral to necessary supportive organizations and agencies;
- (5) A client follow-up program that provides for periodic supportive and evaluative contact for a period of one year following discharge;
- (6) An invitation and encouragement to family members to participate in their own treatment program and in the treatment of the alcoholic. $((\frac{7}{1}))$ Family members $(\frac{1}{1})$ shall be informed of the desirability of

participation in family counseling, Alanon, Alateen and other self-help or specific group or individual resources and be encouraged to pursue these upon return to their home communities in those instances when the treatment staff or family member determines a need for those services.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1486, filed 2/1/80)

WAC 275-19-430 ALCOHOLISM LONG-TERM TREATMENT FACILITIES—REQUIRED SERVICES. There shall be an organized ((alcoholism long-term treatment)) program and staff ((which)) sufficient to provide the following services:

- (1) Education of clients regarding alcohol and alcoholism;
 - (2) Individual and group counseling;
 - (3) Education concerning social and life coping skills;
 - (4) Social and recreational activities;
- (5) Occupational training through cooperation with government and/or private occupational training programs for those clients who need this assistance;
- (6) Discharge referral to necessary supportive organizations and agencies;
- (7) A client follow-up program that provides periodic supportive and evaluative contact after discharge for a period of one year.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1486, filed 2/1/80)

WAC 275-19-530 ALCOHOLISM RECOVERY HOUSE FACILITIES—REQUIRED SERVICES. There shall be an organized ((alcoholism recovery house)) program and staff ((which)) sufficient to provide the following services:

- (1) Education of clients regarding alcohol and alcoholism;
 - (2) Individual and group counseling;
 - (3) Social and recreational activities;
- (4) Assistance in registering and participating in educational and/or occupational training programs when appropriate for clients;
- (5) Assistance, when needed, to clients in seeking and obtaining gainful employment;
- (6) Referral to necessary supportive organizations and agencies;
- (7) A client follow-up program that provides periodic supportive evaluative contact after discharge for a period of one year.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1486, filed 2/1/80)

WAC 275-19-610 ALCOHOLISM OUTPA-TIENT TREATMENT—REQUIRED SERVICES. ((Facilities providing alcoholism outpatient treatment as described in WAC 275-19-020 shall provide the following types of alcoholism treatment services to clients and their families.)) There shall be an organized program and staff sufficient to provide the following services:

- (1) Assessment of each client's needs regarding specific alcohol-related problems as perceived by the client, center staff, and involved others.
 - (2) Immediate evaluation for persons in a crisis.
- (3) Individual, group counseling, and educational services on a scheduled basis which are conducted by a qualified alcoholism counselor or other treatment staff person under the direct supervision of a qualified alcoholism counselor.
- (4) Referral of clients for ancillary services as necessary and follow-up efforts to ensure the efficacy of such referrals.
- (5) A client follow-up program for those completing treatment that maintains periodic supportive and evaluative contact for a period of one year following discharge.
- (6) Facilities which provide intensive outpatient program services as defined in WAC 275-19-030 shall meet the standards for intensive outpatient programs published by the office on alcoholism.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1486, filed 2/1/80)

WAC 275-19-720 INFORMATION AND RE-FERRAL SERVICES—COMMUNITY SERVICES. (1) Facilities providing information and referral services shall provide the communities which they serve with information and education concerning alcohol, alcohol abuse, alcoholism, and their related problems and shall serve as consultant to community agencies.

- (2) The facilities shall develop a priority list of services to be provided in the community. ((The following list of services should be considered when developing community service priorities.
- (a) Provide consultation services to school districts and their personnel.
- (b) Assist in the development of alcohol education curriculum for schools:
- (c) Provide speakers bureau for groups and organizations.
- (d) Disseminate the news releases in articles for media publication.
- (e) Conduct workshops for professionals in social services and related fields.
- (f) Provide educational programs on alcohol, alcohol abuse and alcoholism to the community. Educational programs may take the form of workshops, television and radio programs, newspaper publicity, lecture series, movie presentations, etc.
- (g) Provide assistance to industry for development of industrial alcoholism programs.
- (h) Provide training for professional personnel and to lay public regarding effective techniques of assisting the problem drinker and the alcoholic with his/her illness.
- (i) Serve as a consultant to community agencies concerning services available to the problem drinker, the alcoholic and their families.
- (j) Develop working relationships with the probation department and the courts including:
- (i) Provide courts with recommendations on persons charged with alcohol-related offenses;

- (ii) Provide court involved clients with referral necessary for treatment and follow-up.
- (k) Develop working relationships with social service and related agencies within the community.))

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

In the matter of amending WAC 260-70-021 and 260-70-100 relating to the rules of horse racing.

WAC 260-70-021 and 260-70-100 are proposed for amendment, as indicated in the notice of intention to amend and adopt rules filed this date with the Code Reviser.

These rule amendments are proposed pursuant to RCW 67.16.020 and 67.16.040 under the general rulemaking authority of the Washington Horse Racing Commission. The proposed amendments to WAC 260-70-021 and 260-70-100 are intended to eliminate race day medication; and in the case of permitted medication. to provide penalties for the misuse of Lasix or other diuretics.

George McIvor, Executive Secretary, Suites B and C, 210 East Union Avenue, Olympia, Washington 98504, phone (206) 753-3741 and members of his staff were responsible for the drafting of the proposed rule amendment and are to be responsible for implementation and enforcement of the rules.

The proponent of these rules is the Washington Horse Racing Commission.

There are no comments or recommendations being submitted inasmuch as these rules are being proposed pursuant to existing statutory authority.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 79-02, filed 12/24/79)

WAC 260-70-021 MEDICATION STANDARDS. (1) No horse shall have in its body any prohibited drug while participating in a race.

- (2) No person shall administer, attempt to administer, or aid or abet in the administration of, any medication or drug to a horse on the day of a race in which the horse is entered prior to the race except in accordance with this rule.
- (3) Subject to the provisions of this rule, medication calculated to improve or protect the health of a horse may be administered to a horse in training.
- (4) The administration of medication to any horse on race day, except as hereinafter provided, is prohibited. For the purpose of this rule, the day of the race shall be deemed to commence at 9:00 p.m. on the day preceding the race.

(5) Nutritional aids, administered orally only, will be permitted at

any time.

(6) ((Only lasix (furosemide), and/or conjugated estrogens, will be permitted on race day for the treatment only of horses which have been confirmed as "bleeders" by a state veterinarian. For purposes of this rule a "bleeder" is a horse which has bled on the track or immediately thereafter. Lasix and/or conjugated estrogens shall not be administered within four hours of the published post time for the race in which the horse is entered. No horse shall race with any diuretic other than lasix in its body. Horses treated with lasix and/or conjugated estrogens will be subject to blood, as well as urine testing.

(7))) Approved nonsteroidal ((anti-inflamatory)) anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDS) may be administered to a horse, but not on race day. No more than one of the NSAIDS may be used on or carried in a

horse's body at any one time.

(((8))) (7) Notwithstanding any other provision of this rule, no twoyear old horse shall carry in its body while participating in a race any medication, including medications defined in WAC 260-70-010 (1) through (4). Vitamins are permitted, however. ((The provisions of subsection (6) of this section authorizing the stewards to grant permission for use of an approved medication on bleeders shall not be applicable to any two-year old horse.)) The finding of any medication prohibited herein in a two-year old horse participating in a race shall disqualify the owner of such horse from participating in the purse distribution; and in addition the stewards may take any authorized action they may consider necessary to preserve the integrity of racing.

(((9))) (8) In the case of delayed-release substances, the time of administration shall be deemed that time at which such medication, drug, or substance is released within the body of a horse.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 79-03, filed 5/7/80)

WAC 260-70-100 PENALTIES RELATING TO MISUSE OF PERMITTED MEDICATION. Should the laboratory analysis of urine or blood taken from a horse, other than a two-year old, show the presence of more than one approved nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drug (NSAID) in violation of WAC 260-70-021, or the presence of phenylbutazone in excess of the quantities authorized by WAC 260-70-090 the stewards shall levy the following penalties against each person found responsible:

- (1) For a first offense within any calendar year, a fine of \$200;
- (2) The second offense, within any calendar year, \$500;
- (3) For a third offense, within any calendar year, license suspension for one year.

If laboratory analysis of urine or blood taken from a horse shows misuse of permitted medication as specified above the owner of such horse shall not participate in the purse distribution of the race wherein the violation occurred, and shall be denied or shall promptly return any portion of the purse, or sweepstakes, and any trophy in such race and the same shall be distributed as in the case of a disqualification.

If any NSAID or other permitted medication is found in the body of a horse which alone or in combination with a second ((NSAID)) medication is of such a quantity so as to interfere with the testing process the penalties for use of a prohibited drug or medication shall apply irrespective of the provisions of this rule. The finding of any diuretic, including Lasix (furosemide), in the body of a horse shall constitute the presence of an interfering substance and the penalties for use of a prohibited drug or medication shall apply.
